A Brief History of Rogerthorpe from 1610 to 2010

The earliest known owner of the Rogerthorpe Estate was a Samuel Saltonstal who in 1610 started to build the house, which later was to become known as Rogerthorpe Manor.

By the late 1700's a Colonel Edward Rawstone resided at Rogerthorpe Manor.

The successor to Rogerthorpe Manor after the death of Joshua Mason (jnr) in 1879 was William Brackenridge.

Later in 1891, Ramsden bought Rogerthorpe Manor from his Landlord, Oxley of Ripon. The purchase price was £12,000 for the house and 214 acres of land.

Rogerthorpe Manor, having been left by Lt Col Ramsden to his nephew, was sold at public auction on 1st October 1928

In 1943 Rogerthorpe Manor and 3.5 acres of land was bought by Frank Bramley Jackson, a director of Jackson's Glassworks at Knottingley.

Rogerthorpe Manor changed hands again in 1955, being bought by Stanley Tinsdale.

In 1972 Kenneth Buchanan took the Manor and stayed for eleven years, and opened the country club to the general public.

In 1987 the Manor was bought by Melvyn Wallis and his wife from London. Their stay was short however, as the Manor went into receivership in 1989.

In 2004 Rogerthorpe Manor was bought by the Metcalfe family who continue to improve the Manor into one of the premier venues in the area.

2010 saw the 400th year anniversary of the Manor and the newly refurbished 1610 Steakhouse and Lounge was completed.
