BACKGROUND

Mental health conditions are among the major non-communicable diseases, often coexisting with others and leading to significant suffering, excess mortality and reduced life expectancy. Those with severe mental illness who develop terminal conditions are some of the most underrepresented and deprived in society. Given the prolonged course of many mental illnesses, a palliative approach becomes especially relevant. Palliative psychiatry is emerging globally as a promising approach that bridges mental health and palliative care to address complex, ongoing needs with compassion and dignity.²



METHODS

- Apply palliative and public health principles to mental health care through community engagement.
- Enable task sharing across a multidisciplinary team to deliver outpatient, home-based and end-of-life care.
- Support screening, referral and capacity building for integrated mental and palliative care







DISCUSSION

This model has proven to be cost-effective, feasible, replicable and sustainable, particularly in resource-limited settings. Its success is driven by strong community participation, effective task sharing, collaboration and integrated care. Key challenges include navigating bureaucratic processes, mobilising resources and budget allocation.
