

Helicobacter Pylori breath test

What does the test involve?

This test involves taking a breath sample by asking you to blow into a bag. You will then be asked to swallow a tablet with a glass of water and after 10 minutes another breath sample will be collected. There will be no side-effects from the tablet. In total, the whole test will take about 20 minutes. This should enable us to check for a bacteria called Helicobacter Pylori which can sometimes cause symptoms such as heartburn and abdominal discomfort.

What preparation is required?

- Please do not have anything to eat or drink for six hours before test.
- No antibiotics for four weeks before the test – if you have taken antibiotics in the four weeks prior to the test please contact us as soon as possible.
- Please do not take the following medication for two weeks prior to the test:
Omeprazole (Losec) Lansoprazole (Zoton) Esomeprazole (Nexium)
Rabeprazole (Pariet) Pantoprazole (Protium)

Please bring a list of current medications with you.

Where is the test carried out?

Please report to the Louise Ryan Unit on the lower ground floor of the Royal Free Hospital at the date and time specified in your appointment letter. We aim to see patients on time and therefore if you are more than 15 minutes late we may not be able to proceed with your test.

The result of the test will be sent to the referring consultant who will make a decision about the need for further treatment. This will be communicated to you either by letter, telephone appointment or clinic appointment.
