



COVID-19 Direct Emergency Response for Children and Young People Fund

The funding for the grant that we have awarded has been made as a result of a partnership with The National Lottery Community Fund, in order to deliver £2 million in National Lottery grants to support vulnerable children and young people. The information below is for those that have received this funding to encourage you to share the story of what it is achieving.

You can tell people your funding came from The National Lottery

Only if it is appropriate and with the consent of your clients, we would like as many people as possible to see how we use the money raised by National Lottery players. And telling everyone where your funding comes from will help you spread the word about the great work you're doing in your community.

Sharing your story

Again, only if it is appropriate and with the consent of your clients, you can share the good news about your National Lottery funding with your community and local MP before we may choose to publish anything. Have a look [here](#) to find out more on how to share the good news.

Information about using The National Lottery Community Fund logo (the "Logo")

The Logo is made up of The National Lottery crossed fingers and the words "Community Fund." The Gambling Commission owns the trademark for the crossed fingers part.

You are hereby granted a right to use the Logo, for the purposes of promoting your National Lottery funded project. This permission is personal to your project and you can't transfer any of your rights to another person or project.

The National Lottery Community Fund might share your details with Camelot UK Lotteries Limited, and The Gambling Commission, in order to fulfil their obligations under their agreement with Camelot. The National Lottery Community Fund have the right to end your permission straightaway to use the Logo, at any time and for any reason. This might be in the following circumstances:

- if Camelot or the Gambling Commission ends The National Lottery Community Fund's permission to use it
- if you don't comply with our guidelines
- if your grant from National Lottery funds is withdrawn, suspended or terminated.

When this permission ends, you must stop using the Logo immediately.

Keep a copy of your agreement and terms and conditions (for your records). You can find more information on what happens next on our website.

If you are going to take pictures of the people taking part in your project

Think about your data protection responsibilities. If you want to share images of people, make sure you get their consent first. You would normally do this with a consent form. Once you have the photos make sure they're stored safely.

We would like to keep in touch – to see how you are getting on

We will keep sending you email updates. They should help you with things like:

- how to publicise your funding
- information on other funding
- ideas and tips on projects from other fund holders.

A reminder to hang on to your receipts

The National Lottery Community Fund could ask to see receipts and invoices related to your funding for at least seven years. There is more information on their website about how to keep them up to date, and what sort of information you should keep.
