




What Happens After the Deal Closes?

- Common forms of breaches reported.

Common Forms of Breaches Reported

Financial statement misrepresentations account for 28% of all claims during the period.




- Most commonly alleged breaches were reported for financial statements, tax information, and contracts.
- The U.S. was the only region to report alleged breaches of intellectual property, data, and insurance.
- Europe, the Middle East and Africa (EMEA), and Asia Pacific reported significantly more alleged breaches of contracts than other categories.



Frequency of Claims Varies With the Size of the Deal

Deals ≥ \$1 billion most likely to claim damages.






How Long is Too Long?

24% of claims reported after the 18-month mark.

26% of claims were reported 18 or more months after the close of the transaction.


0-6 Months

- Purchased the most policies.
- Filed the most claims.

More likely to report a claim.




R&W Insurance in Action Europe
