40 Molecular phylogenetic analysis. Total DNA was extracted from cells of strain D13 according to the method of Makimura et al. (1). The 18S rRNA gene was ampligied 41 42 with primer pair NS<sub>0</sub> (5'-TATCTGGTTGATCCTGCC-3') and ITS2 (5'-GCTGCGTTCTTCATCGATGC-3') (2). Purified PCR product was ligated into 43 44 the linear vector pMD18-T (TakaRa biotechnology) and was sequenced with primer RV-M, primer 13-47, designed according to the sequence of vector pMD18-T, and 45 another primer (5'-CGAGGAACAATTGGAGGGC-3') designed according to the 46 18S rRNA gene. A DNA fragment covering the ITS, 5.8S rRNA gene and 26S rRNA 47 48 gene D1/D2 domain was amplified with the primer pairs ITS1 and NL4, the ITS region was sequenced directly with ITS1 and ITS4, the D1/D2 domain was sequenced 49 directly with NL1 and NL4 (3). These sequences were compared with available 50 51 sequences in the GeneBank database by **BLAST** system (http://www.ncbi.nlm.nih.gov/BLAST/). The D1/D2 domain sequence was aligned 52 with closely related sequences using the CLUSTAL\_X program (4). Phylogenetic tree 53 54 was constructed from evolutionary distance data that were calculated with Kimura's two-parameter model (5) by using the neighbor-joining method (6). Bootstrap 55 56 analysis (7) was based on 1000 random resamplings. Reference sequences were retrieved from GeneBank with the accession numbers as indicated in the tree. 57

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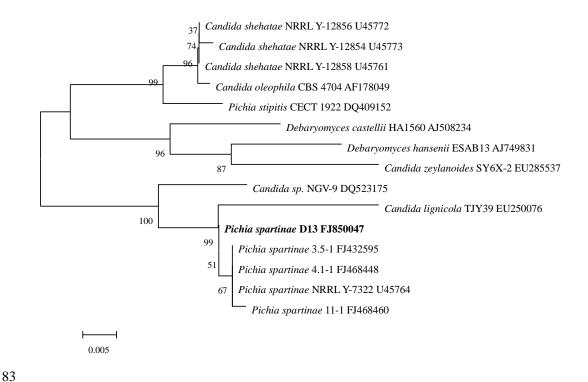
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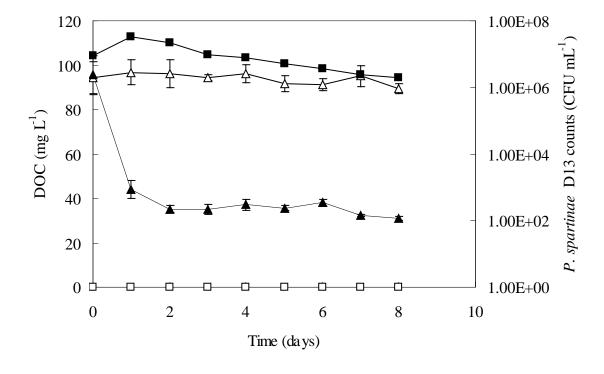

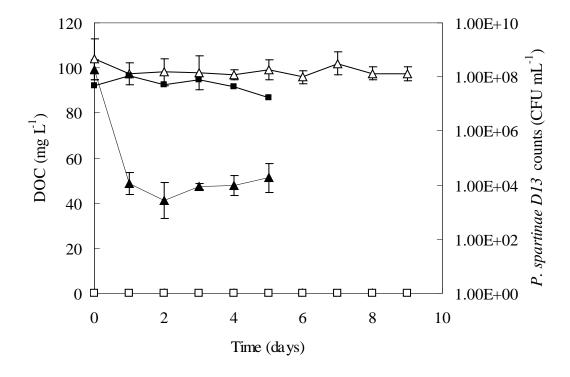
