What are we doing in nursery this week?	This term we are reading Traditional tales and this week our story of the week is: "Goldilocks and the Three Bears"
<p>Activity 1: Using items and toys you have at home to retell the story in your own words. http://www.paper-and-glue.com/2015/01/fuzzy-brown-bear-craft.html</p> 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Using one of the books mentioned below, you can retell the story in your own words. You can use teddy bears or any other cuddly toys which are your favourites to tell or even act out the story. You can even make up your own version of the story. You can use paper plates and cut them into small, medium and large sizes and draw a bear face on each plate to represent the bears if you prefer. Can you find three different sized bowls and spoons as in the story? Small, medium and large. You could even use Lego to build your own small, medium and large chairs and beds if you have some. But if you don't, I use food cereal and packaging boxes in different sizes. I turn them inside out and colour them in.
Activity 2: Dancing to music and action words.	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> We've been learning about action words, and we've been dancing, singing and doing lots of different actions to our songs. You can dance to your favourite music, your adult will pause the music and shout out an action word (jump, hop, skip, and gallop) and together you can perform the action. I have recommended some songs which are linked to our story "Goldilocks and the Three Bears" or you may have your own favourite songs. How many different action words can you think of and move to?
Activity 3: Sorting bowls and spoons into groups of small, medium and large.	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Can you go on a hunt to find lots of different sized bowls and spoons in your house? Can you ask an adult to help you sort them into three different groups - small, medium and large?

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Can you write a label and put it next to your bowls and spoon collection? • Which bowls and spoons are made from plastic, metal or wood? • Can you count out how many you have altogether?
<p>Activity 4: Physical activity outside</p> <p>http://treetoolsforschools.org.uk/activities/pdfs/pdf_bird_hunt.pdf</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Can you go outside and close your eyes and listen to the sounds around you? • What can you hear? Can you hear the different birds singing? • Can you join kitchen roll tubes together to make a pair of pretend binoculars and see how many birds you can see?
<p>Activity 5: Cooking Teddy Bear flapjack biscuits. See cooking instructions on page 3.</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Can you help your child read a recipe and weight out the ingredients to make a Teddy Bear shaped flapjack biscuit? • Can you use cutters to make different sized Teddy Bears? • Can you mould the mixture with your hands to make Goldilocks?
<p>Activity 6: Making porridge oat play dough</p> <p>Ingredients</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • 2 cups of plain flour • 1 cup of salt • 2 tablespoons of oil of your choice • 2 tablespoons cream of tartar • 2 cups of boiling water (adults only) • 1 to 2 cups of porridge oats <p>Mix all dried ingredients together, add the oil and stir. Add a cup of water at a time stirring continuously. When cool and if its too sticky you can add more oats if needed.</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Can you use the ingredients to make your own porridge oat play dough? • Can you make Goldilocks and the Three Bears using the play dough? • You could try adding food colouring or spices which you have at home to change the colour and smell of your dough.

<p>Recipe for Teddy Bear flapjacks</p> <p>Ingredients</p> <p>https://thehappyfoodie.co.uk/recipes/fast-flapjacks</p> <p>225g (8oz) butter</p> <p>225g (8oz) Demerara sugar</p> <p>75g (3oz) golden syrup</p> <p>275g (10oz) porridge oats.</p> <p>30cms x 23cms baking tray</p> <p>Bear cutters in various sizes.</p>	<p>Instructions for making flapjacks</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Pre-heat oven to 160C/Fan 140/Gas 3. 2. Grease a 30x23cm (12x9in) baking tray. 3. Melt the butter in a large pan along with the butter and syrup, and then stir in the oats. 4. Mix well. Using a bear cutter, cut out the flapjack mixture into various sizes of bear shapes. Children can also mould the mixture using their hands to create a Goldilocks character. Press flat using a palette knife or the back of a spoon. 5. Put onto a baking tray and bake in a pre-heated oven for 35 minutes or until pale golden brown. 6. Remove from the oven and leave to cool for 10 minutes.
