

Members in this category are Edward Du Cann (with political reservations), Fergus Montgomery (will be influenced by constituency reactions), James Allason (with general doubts), Sally Oppenheim (who can certainly be won over), Harold Soref (political doubts), Rafton Pounder (doubts about the economic position in Northern Ireland), Patrick Wolrige-Gordon (doubts about fishing).

In the Doubtful category Angus Maude still stands out with reservations. He is happy about the terms but gives a low priority to economic growth.

Of the Thirty Seven (37) listed as being against the Market in the May report four have now come round in favour of entry, Miss Holt, Donald and R.G.Taylor. Kaberry, and D.Coombs, / Twelve (12) others have shifted from a position of total opposition to the Market to a position of Doubt. They are W.H.Baker (concerned about fishing), Edward Brown (who could be persuaded on grounds of loyalty to the Party), Eric Bullus, John Farr (who will be influenced by opinion in his constituency and general public opinion), J.H. Gray (worried about the regions, but who does not wish to bring the Government down), Toby Jessel (who could be persuaded by a leading figure in the Party), Stanley McMaster (concerned about regional difficulties in Northern Ireland), D.C. Mather (generally unhappy about the Market, but could be won over), Geraint Morgan (worried about his own personal position), Jasper More, J.H.Sutcliffe (could be won over if there is a shift in public opinion), Robin Turton (concerned about the continuation of the Conservative Government). Twenty one (21) of the original Thirty seven (37) still remain firmly Against.

Parliamentary Position

There are Six Hundred and Thirty (630) seats in Parliament.
