# INSTRUCTIONS FOR USING THE "K. & J." LEVER LETTER BINDER.

In filing Documents the metal back should be kept upright so that the pins are exactly in the centre of the holes in the lever rod. The Binder can be best kept in position and the metal back upright, by allowing the back cover to rest against the breast, thus leaving both hands of the operator free. Raise the lever handle to a vertical position as far as it will go, when the lever rod will be automatically kept in position until released again. Insert the Document to be filed between the needles and the under side of the lever rod, keeping it as flat as possible. Release the rod by lowering the lever to its horizontal position.

Give all the needles the same number of Documents as far as possible, i.e., the Documents which do not cover all the needles should not be all filed at one end.

When the needles are full, lay the Binder open on its back, turn back the inset and its contents, unscrew the ring-headed screws, whilst in this position raise the lever rod by means of the lever, and the Book will be released from the Binder. Then bring the loose cover round the back of the Documents over the needle points, force the needles through the cloth, take the loose iron strip from pocket under front cover of Binder, withdraw the wire pin, insert the projecting needles in the holes in strip and run the pin through groove—taking care it passes through the eye of each needle—thus forming a complete volume, permanently bound.

To insert another case remove strip from top of needles by withdrawing the long wire pin and place same in pocket under front cover of Binder, unscrew the rings—the case now being inside, out—thread the needles through the lever rod, release the lever—when the case will be securely held between the brass rod of metal back and the lever rod—fasten to the bottom rod by means of the ring-headed screws, and the case is again ready for use.

Extract from Mr. O'Connor's Report, dated the 30th October, 1905.

#### OUT-DOOR RELIEF.

The expenditure incurred in affording out-door relief to destitute poor persons, or persons stated to be destitute, is a matter which should seriously occupy the attention of the Guardians. I have had a return made out showing the numbers getting out-door relief in the years 1897 and 1900—1905 inclusive, also the total amount expended in this form of relief each year. I give the particulars of this return for the information of the Guardians.

It will be seen from these figures that the average sum allowed per head in 1897 was £2 18s 6d in 1900, £3 4s. od.; 1901, £3 9s. od.; 1902, £3 9s. od.; 1903, £3 8s. od.; 1904, £3 8s. od.; 1905, £3 10s. 6d., or a rise per head in 1905, as compared with 1897, of 12/6 per head.

I find from a reference to statistics that the expenditure incurred on out-door relief in the North and South Dublin Unions, which are both considerably larger than Limerick, averages about £3500 to £4000 in North Dublin, and £5500 to £6000 in South Dublin; and the average number of persons in receipt of out-door relief would be, in North Dublin between 1400 and 1600, in South Dublin between 2500 and 2700. The population of Limerick Union is 66,014; that of North Dublin 166,887; and of South Dublin 212,777. I am of opinion that if the Limerick Guardians adopted the same method of giving out-door relief as the Dublin Guardians, a considerable saving to the rates would be effected; and, in addition to this, out-door relief would in many cases be applied to a much better use than it probably is at present, and the really destitute would apply for it. In both the Dublin Unions, except, I think, in one outlying district the out-door relief is given in food, which is all stored in the Workhouses and distributed in some instances by carts from them.

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

In accordance with your request of the 29th ultimo, that I should furnish you with further details concerning the relative expenditure on out-door relief in the Limerick Union and the North and South Dublin Unions, and, also, as to the manner of administration of out-door relief in the Dublin Unions, I now have the honour of submitting to you the following returns relating to the expenditure.

Return A.—Shows table I. the population of each of the three Unions, the average number of cases and persons relieved each week for the years 1900-1905, both inclusive, also the actual yearly expenditure on out-door relief in each of the three Unions for the same period.

Table II. shows the yearly average of the above six years both as regards cases, persons, and expenditure in the three Unions.

Table III shows the average expenditure per head relieved, calculated on the average number of persons for the six years.

Table IV. is a comparative statement of the average yearly expenditure in the Limerick Union on out-door relief with the same in the Dublin Unions, and a comparison is also drawn, between the number of persons relieved in the Limerick Union and those relieved in the Dublin Unions.

Return B shows table I. the average number of persons and cases relieved in the year 1905, together with the actual expenditure for the same period in each of the three Unions.

Table II. shows the comparison between the average number of persons relieved in Limerick Union and the North and South Dublin Unions for the year 1905, also the comparison of the expenditure in the Limerick Union and the Dublin Unions.

Table III. shows the average expenditure per person relieved in the three Unions for the year 1905.

In addition to the facts which are apparent from these returns I think it well to point out to you that whereas in Limerick Union the expenditure on out-door relief forms about 1/7th of the total expenditure of the Guardians, in the North Dublin Union, it forms about 1/22nd, and in South Dublin Union 1/18th.

Out-door relief in Limerick Union is distributed in money to the persons in receipt of it, from fixed depôts.

In both the Dublin Unions the out-door relief is given in food.

In the North Dublin Union the food is distributed to the recipients living in the city from a store in the Workhouse premises, and to those who live in the rural portion of the Union it is distributed from fixed depôts having first being conveyed to the depôts from the Workhouse in a van. There are in all 13 different depôts in the rural portion of the Union, one of the depôts being 11 miles from the Workhouse, one 8 miles, one 6 miles, and the others being four or less miles from the Workhouse.

These depôts are all included in two dispensary districts, and the van goes to each district twice in the week.

It is important to remember that in the first instance the food is all distributed from the Workhouse store proper, the bread being baked in the workhouse, there being only two paid bakers, and twelve inmates assisting, with a little extra help at Xmas. time

The officers concerned in this distribution in addition to the relieving officers who are primarily responsible for the distribution are the workhouse storekeeper, a wardsman who only assists at the distribution in the city cases, and a van driver.

The wardsman in addition to assisting at the distribution of O.D.R. acts as night attendant every second night in the infirmary.

The scale of out-door relief allowed in the North Dublin Union is as follows :—

For more than 4 persons 8 ozs. of tea, 2 lbs. sugar, 12 two lb loaves. In addition to this, meat, stimulants and milk, as may be ordered by the Doctor. Meat is also given at Xmas and Easter.

In South Dublin Union the method of distribution and the quantity given is much the same, with the difference that the food is distributed from fixed depôts, both in the City and Rural portions of the Union, and that in the winter coal is given out.

## LIMERICK UNION.

The Committee met at the Workhouse on Tuesday, the 12th December, 1905, and made the following recommendations in connection with Dr. Smyth's report.

### 1st—Food Vessels.

We consider that the food vessels should not be washed in the Hospital but in the Scullery. We recommend that a small hand-lift be provided to carry up the food from the kitchen to the Diet Room, and also to be used for lowering the food vessels, &c, to be washed in the scullery. We think that one light ward wagon might be procured for use in distributing the food on the Male side of the Hospital.

We consider that a reduction might be made in the number of inmate helpers in the Infirmary, and that the Doctors should be asked to try to effect this.

### 2nd—Nursing.

We consider that if the Medical Staff can show that a saving can be effected by reducing the number of inmate helpers, it would be advisable to appoint two additional nurses. The Doctors to be asked to report on this.

### 3rd—Dietary.

We consider that any change in the Dietary must be left entirely to the Medical Staff, but suggest that 12 ozs. of beef would be sufficient to allow for making a pint of beef tea instead of 1lb. as at present. We adopt this view in consequence of the present improved method of cooking.

### 4th—Water Supply.

It appears that the water supplied to this Institution by the Corporation is filtered. With regard to a deficiency in the supply of water during certain months of the year, Mr. Hassett, a member of the Committee, considers that a larger main is now necessary, in consequence of the new houses lately built on the Ennis Road. We recommend that a deputation of the Guardians meet the Corporation, with a view of putting this before them.

### 5th—Soiled Linen.

Soiled Linen to be removed as referred to in Dr. Smyth's report.

### 6th—Dietary of Lunatics and Epileptics.

The change suggested by Dr. Smyth to be carried out by the Master as soon as practicable.

### 7th—Children in Infirmary.

The 23 children included in the Infirmary list to be transferred to another list.

That the recommendation of Dr. Smyth, with regard to the children in St. Bridget's Ward, be carried out, and that St. Bridget's Ward be converted into a day room for the Female epileptics.

### 8th—Female Lunatic.

Protection Lattice to be done by the Master.

he Reports of the Master were read, and Orders made thereon as follows:—

He begs to Report—

### 9th—Fever Hospital.

The Master to arrange for the conveyance of Fever Patients in the ambulance to the door of the Fever Hospital. Other details of Dr. Smyth's recommendation, in regard to Fever Hospital, to be deferred until the Sanitary annexes are built. We recommend that the three Nurses living on the ground floor of the Fever Hospital be transferred to the Dormitories of the Girls' School.

The kitchen required for the Fever Hospital would be found in the Living Room of the nurses to be transferred.

### 10th—Fever Hospital Accounts.

We recommend that the Fever Hospital Accounts be kept by the fever day nurse.

### 11th—Ambulance.

We recommend that a second ambulance be provided, and that the covered cars be done away with.
