The Out-door Relief Register was produced, examined, and authenticated, from No. to No. both inclusive, by the signature of the Chairman and counter-signature of the Clerk.
The Clerk's Report on the execution of Orders previously made by the Board was read to the following effect.

That in accordance with the Order of the Board of the 24. ult. he had made application by letter to the sureties of the late Oliver Harty for payment of £10.16.4. due by him and that he had not received any reply, nor had he heard that the money had been lodged. And that it was therefore for the Board to decide whether or not they would take legal proceedings in the case.

Sir,

We forward for the information of the Board of Guardians the following extracts from the Inspectors Report of visits on the 14th and 18th March to the Kilmallock Poor Law Union National School:

"Both Teachers are fully qualified, and conduct their respective departments with tolerable degree of

of success. The Mistress has somewhat the advantage of the Master in the results of School management. The general answering in the Female department was tolerably satisfactory; and in none of the subjects of instruction was a marked defect observable.

"In the Male School a considerable improvement has taken place in the Senior Boys knowledge of Arithmetic, in which branch they were backward at last inspection. Generally speaking the proficiency of the Pupils appears to be fairly in accordance with the requirements of the programme for the classes in which they are at present. There is however a tendency on Teachers part to keep the Boys continually going over the same subjects, even when acquainted with them; as an evidence of this, but three boys were advanced to a higher class since 1st Oct. 1838. and two Boys were brought up by Teacher for examination in the first lesson of the first book which they appear by the School Register to have commenced respectively in February 1833 and July 1834. These latter, however, Teacher stated to be exceptional cases."

"Considering the attendance - never as fluctuating as in the ordinary National Schools; and the small number of Boys committed to his charge; I am still of opinion that a higher order of instruction might reasonably be maintained by the Master - who, judging from his class, first Division of Second, possesses sufficient qualifications for the purpose. The remuneration granted by the Board of Guardians for his duties in connection with the School is liberal."

I have to inform the Board that agreeably to its Order of the 14^m inst: all the healthy Classes of Workhouse Inmates were served with a substantial Breakfast and Dinner on Easter Sunday. They got on an average 1/2 lb Pork (with a quarter of Veal for every six persons boiled into Soup) (117 lb Pork and 32 qrs Veal) with 3 1/2 lbs. Potatoes for Adults, and 3 lbs. for Children (44 Stones) with the usual Bread and Tea Breakfasts given them at other Festivals. They were very thankful for the kindness, and every one was well satisfied.

With reference to the Commissioners letter read at last meeting of the Board suggesting that the new Tea Dietary would be defined and the Order of the Board referring it to the Master and Medical Officer, I beg to submit the following scale of Diet as the Medical Officer recommends and Approves of.

April 25th 1859.

Having been written to by your Clerk directing me to furnish you with a written explanation relative to any defects which may appear in an extract from the School Inspector's Report on the state of the school, I beg to report submit to you the following statement which I trust will satisfy you on those points.

The first defect mentioned is a tendency on the Teachers part to keep the Boys going over the same subjects even when acquainted with them; and as an instance of this only three Boys have been advanced to a higher class during the half year. With reference to this I may state that this number falls far short of the number for the same term on other occasions: and that it is owing to the diminution of the number of Boys in the school and the consequent diminution of the number in each class, that I have been prevented on the occasion from having a greater number removed to a higher class. For though some Boys have been fit to be removed to a higher class, yet on many occasions I could not with propriety have removed them to a higher class, for the number in each class as I before mentioned, being comparatively small, some classes may have been rendered entirely too small, or perhaps broken up entirely;

and

and this would not accord with the organisation and system of the school. On this head, Gentlemen, you may consider that it is wrong to preclude those Boys from being removed to a higher class who are fit. In reply to this I can state that on all such occasions whenever Boys are fit to be removed to a higher class, and are not removed, I do not on any account retard their progress. — I teach them subjects for the ~~above~~ class above that in which I am necessitated to keep their names.

The second defect alluded to, viz: two Boys examined in First lesson of First Book which they appear by the School Register to have commenced respectively in February 1853 and July 1854. To account for this, I beg to state that one of the two is pumblind, and is also a Pauper. He has since left the House with an elder brother of his. His name is Michael Connors. The other Boy is almost blind. His name is Patrick Hennessy, and is still in the House. He cannot be taught anything but Religious Instruction, which he can take in by the ear, and with which he is fairly acquainted.

In the winding up of the Report appears the third and last defect alluded to; viz: Considering the attendance never as fluctuating as in ordinary National schools, and the small number in school, a higher order of instruction might be maintained by the Master whose qualifications are sufficient for the purpose. To account for this last defect, I must say that although the number in the school did not fluctuate much since the previous inspection this was by no means the case on former occasions. For it was quite customary for Farmers and other persons who wanted Boys for herding &c. to come and make their selections from among the best boys. Besides these many others of the best Boys have been taken from time to time into the Office here as Writers, messengers &c. When the school has been thus thinned of the best Boys, none remain for me to make any proficiency, but the young class, who are too small to get service, but who as soon as they increase a little in size and acquirements are sure to follow the others. Besides these few instances there are many others which were I to detail would occupy too much of your time to peruse, but which would equally well militate against the Teacher in the discharge of his school duties.

Hoping that you will be satisfied with these reasons and also hoping that I have not too much trespassed on your time,

But as there still remain a considerable number of Boys and as ample facilities exist for the industrial training if proper arrangements were made for affording such, I am anxious to afford a further trial, in the hope that a better system may be adopted.

"The course of instruction in both Schools is suitable to the circumstances of the Pupils; and a very fair degree of proficiency has been attained in the several subjects prescribed by the School Programme. The answering of the Boys, especially in the second class, was considerably better than at last and previous visits. The literary condition of the Schools is on the whole above average."

The Board considered this Report satisfactory.

Letter from Wm Taylor Esq Secretary to Great Northern and Western Railway Company in reply to letter from the Clerk of the Union of the 21st

21st July as follows:

Sir,

2nd August 1859.

I have to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 21st ultimo which I have laid before the Board of Directors; and in reply am instructed to state that the Board cannot admit the right of the Guardians of the Kilmallock Union either to withhold relief in such a case as that of the boy, James Farrell, to which you allude, or to regard such relief as 'given by way of loan'.

The Guardians appear to have altogether overlooked the fact that to their Union, and to every other Union in Ireland through which this Railway passes, the Company largely contribute to the Rates for the support of the Poor; while they may fairly assume that, indirectly, the Railway otherwise aids in reducing Pauperism in its District; and the Board must take leave to doubt that an occasional instance of Relief extended in emergency to a poor person injured on the line, affords any proportionate return for the very large pecuniary assistance which the Unions derive from the Company.

The Guardians are mistaken in supposing that the Company have a staff of Medical Officers in their service to attend on persons injured on the Railway; although, if such were the case it should rather enhance their legitimate claim when an application is made to the Union on their behalf. The Company however, in addition to very large payments of Poor Rates and other Taxes, also contribute a considerable sum to the Funds of a Friendly Society established for the relief and support of the Company's servants in cases of illness, accident, &c.; and which Society employs Medical Officers to attend its members when requisite. The great majority of the Railway servants belong to this Society, and have therefore no occasion to seek relief from Poor Law Unions; but there are some who cannot be induced to join it, and James Farrell, the person in question is one of this class. Had he been a member, the Society would have afforded him the necessary assistance, and thereby saved your Union from the burden of his temporary relief - and saved the Company the fee which your Medical Officer demanded for attending the sufferer.
