Janry. report on the Union: In which he observes in regard to the financial state of the Union that if the striking of the next rate be deferred until the same period of the Year at which the current rate was made, the Union will be in debt between £2, and 3000: as he fears that the available funds will be exhausted next June.

The Workhouse is reported to be clean and orderly, and in a good state of repair, and its sanitary state satisfactory, there being only four patients in the Fever hospital, 3 of whom are convalescent.

Doctor King states that there is a fair stock of clothing and Bedding in use, but scarcely any in reserve - and that the provisions he had an opportunity of examining, he considered to be of fair quality.

Lavatories are stated to be much required for the several classes

and could be erected, the Commisrs. are informed, in the Male and Female yards at a small expense. - The School children at present wash themselves in the open air; and Dr. King suggests that a Lavatory should be erected in the Laundry yard, and a door leading to it opened from the Girls School, as is the case in several other Workhouses.

A similar arrangement could also be made in connexion with the boys school. The floor of the dining hall which is earthen, is described as being frequently out of repair, and very dirty in wet weather, and Dr. King recommends that the floor should be tiled, which he states can be done at an expense of about £11. He also suggests that the Chapel should be provided with seats, as it must be very distressing, particularly to the old and infirm to be obliged to stand or kneel during the entire service, as is, at present, the case. The Commisrs. recommend the various suggestions above mentioned to the consideration of the Board of Guardians.

In regard to the Schools, Dr. King reports that on the whole, they are tolerably well conducted but he states that he had occasion to call attention to some omissions in teaching which he hopes to find corrected on his next examination.

In the supplement to Doctor King's report, it is stated that Painting is required both inside and outside - the house has not been generally painted for the last 3 years. New locks are required throughout the house, & several latches. The floor of the Mess shed, west side of grounds, are damp. He thinks there is some deficiency in the drainage.

The Clerk states that the Master had been authorized to procure about 80 locks, sometime since. The Board directed the Master to provide seats for a limited number, from time to time, in the Chapel with the assistance of the house Carpenter. The other matters are held over until a meeting of the house Committee shall be held.
