THE MINUTE BOOK, in which shall be entered the statistical information laid before the Board of Guardians relating to the inmates of the Workhouse, the collection of the Rates, and the state of the Finances of the Union; Minutes of all Orders received from the Commissioners for administering the Laws for Relief of the Poor in Ireland, and of all Letters received from the Commissioners or other parties relating to the business of the Union, and of all directions given by the Board of Guardians thereon; Minutes of the production and examination of the Register, and all other Books and Accounts which are required to be periodically produced, examined, and signed; Minutes of the Reports of the Visiting and Finance Committees, and of the Clerk, the Master, and other Officers of the Workhouse, and of all directions given by the Board thereon; Minutes of all monies received and paid, all orders and checks given, all accounts examined and allowed, and all salaries ordered to be paid; a statement of the number of cases of provisional relief, and of applications for relief, brought before the Board and considered and decided on by them; as well as all other business, proceedings, and transactions of the Board of Guardians, at any of their Meetings.

in continuation of their Circular on Small pox, informing the Guardians that during the quarter ended 30th Sept. last, 4 deaths occurred from small pox 2 in Belfast Union & 2 in Lisham Union - & stating that at the present time Belfast has become a focus of small pox contagion which is daily spreading to other towns in its neighbourhood - 77 cases, resulting in 9 deaths having occurred there since March 1870. After further observations as to the importation of that disease the Commrs. state they believe that by keeping before the Guardians the cause of events regarding small pox in Ireland they are taking the best way of stimulating the Guardians & their Officers to those exertions in enforcing the Compulsory Vaccin Act by which alone the country can be preserved in its present comparative immunity from that pestilence.

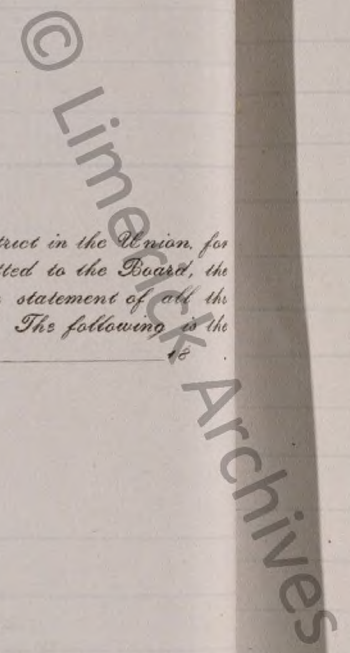

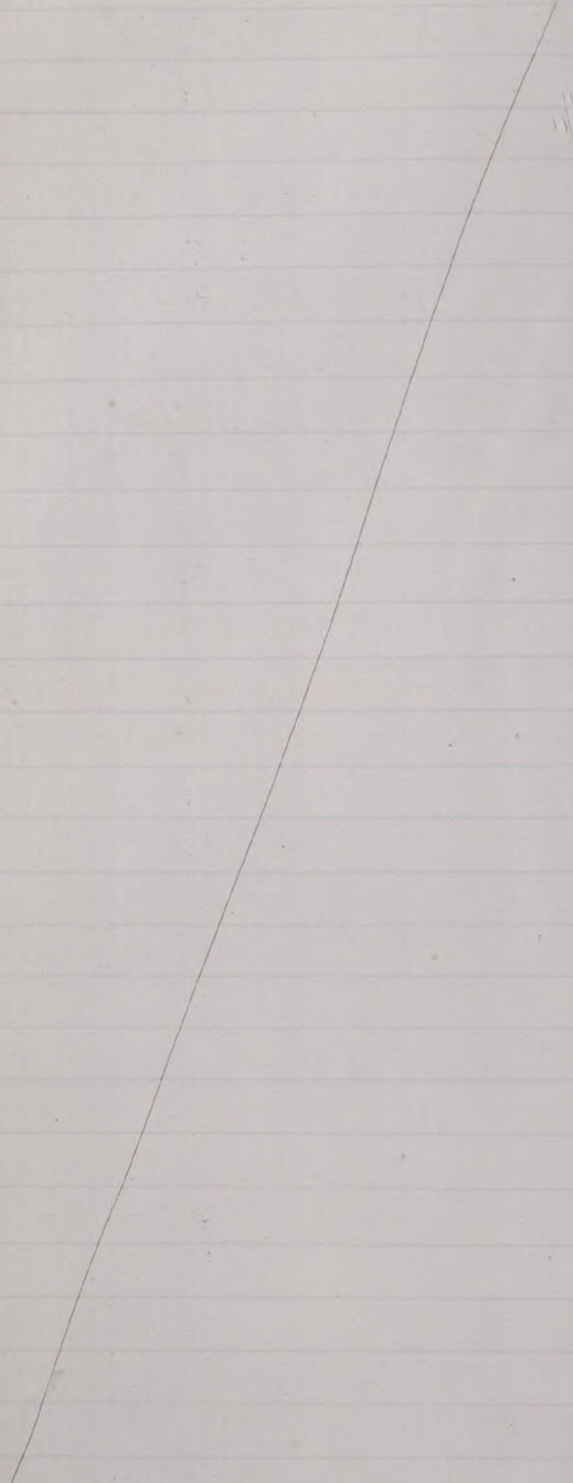

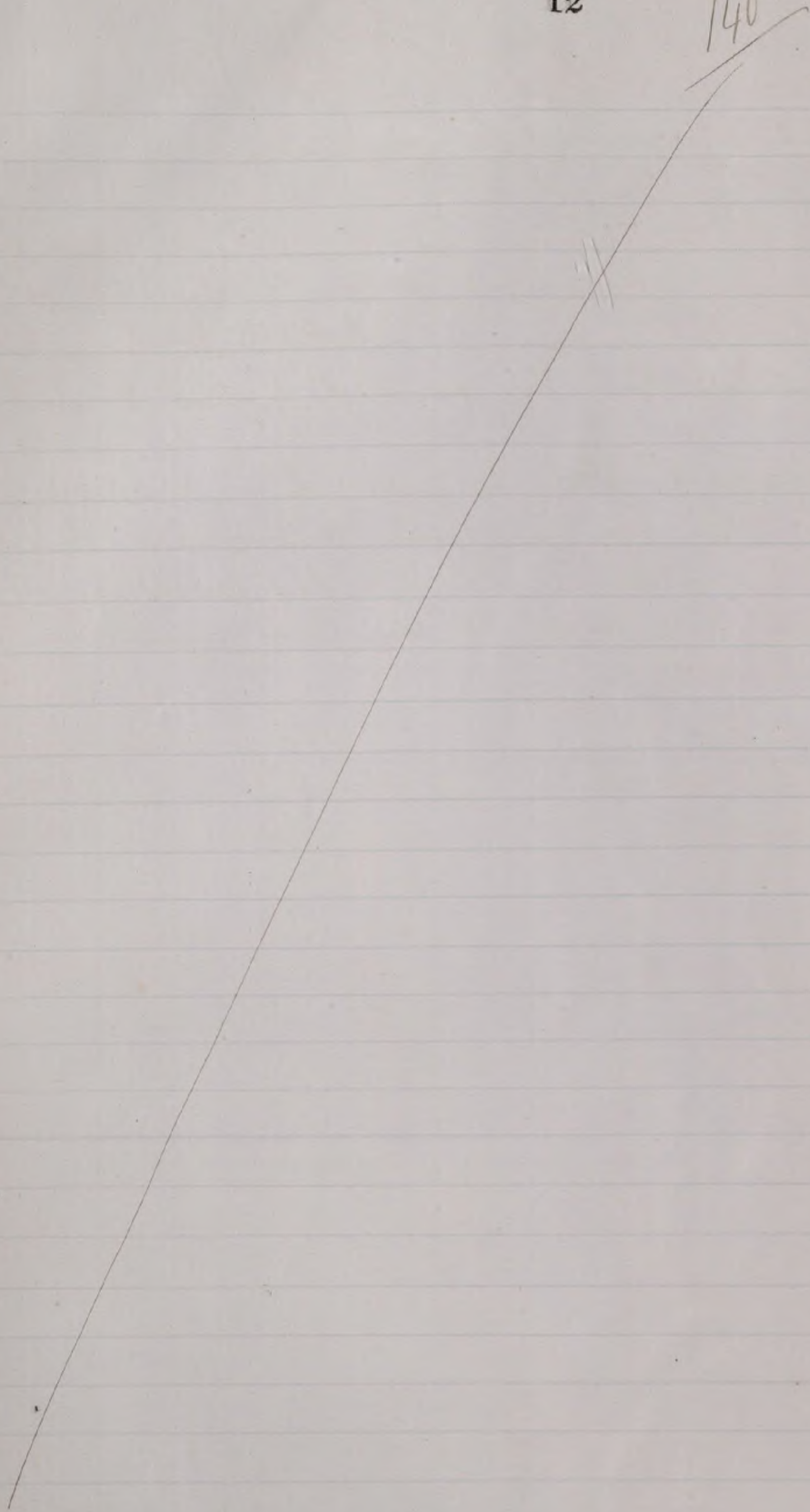

The following Letters from the Poor Law Commissioners and others were read by the Clerk, and directions given to answer them respectively to the following effect (the Orders made on them respectively as follows):—

the 27 July last has been overcome, and D^r King expresses himself gratified to be able to state now that the new rate is sufficient to meet this liability and the current expenses of the Union, and probably to leave a surplus of between £200. and £300. next September.

The Sanitary state of the Workhouse is reported to be satisfactory, there being no epidemic disease, or Ophthalmia and only four patients (mild cases) in the Fever hospital.

(Doctor King states that the house is clean and in an excellent state of repair; and the provisions he had an opportunity of examining, he considered of good quality, with the exception of the Tea, which he observes, could not be supplied at the Contract price (19 parts) (should be 18 only) of even moderate quality; The Milk supplied is reported to produce an average of 10 degrees of cream, but, the supply has lately fallen short of the requirements. On such occasions however, it appears that beef tea, or tea and butter have been substituted.)

There is a fair supply of bedding and clothing in the Workhouse.

In regard to the Condition of the Schools, D^r King states that the School children are well-clothed and healthy in their appearance. The boys are regularly exercised, but the girls are not taken out sufficiently often.

often. Both schools (especially the Boys) are reported to be fairly conducted. The Workhouse Buildings are, as above stated, reported to be in a good state of repair, but under the heading "Leak roofs or gutters and Downpipes", D^r King reports that the pipe facing the Girls Schoolyard is choked. —

1072. & From the Under Secretary to H. C. the Lord Lieutenant 19 Jan.
