POOR LAW COMMISSION OFFICE, DUBLIN,
10th September, 1846.

SIR,

ADVERTING to the information received from the Board of Guardians regarding the state of the Potato Crop in the *Kilmallock* Union, I am directed by the Poor Law Commissioners to express their deep regret that the Report of the Guardians is to so great an extent unfavourable.

The Commissioners anticipate, in consequence hereof, a great increase of poverty and distress among the labouring population of the Union, and it is their earnest wish that those means of affording relief which the law has placed at the disposal of the Guardians, should be made available to the utmost practicable extent.

They recommend, therefore, that the Guardians should promptly bring under review the subject of their Contracts for Provisions and other Supplies; the present state of their stocks of Bedding and Clothing, and the general state of their Finances, so as to be prepared in due time for any accession to the number of inmates which the present circumstances of the Union render probable.

In making such preparations the Commissioners urgently advise and call upon the Guardians to base the estimates for their financial and other arrangements on the assumption, that the whole accommodation which the Workhouse affords, will be placed in requisition, during a considerable period, commencing from the close of the present Autumn. The means of relief placed at the disposal of the Guardians being limited, it will be a source of satisfaction hereafter both to the Public and to the Guardians themselves, if nothing be left undone to make the utmost use of those means, so far as may be found necessary, especially in the relief of the primary objects of the Irish Poor Law, aged, infirm, or otherwise disabled persons, to whose relief, the recent measures of Parliament enacted for the employment of labour, apply only in an indirect manner, and who may, therefore, be expected to form the class most liable to destitution, in consequence of the present calamity.

What number of inmates may be safely and properly accommodated in each department of the Workhouse, is a question upon which the Guardians will not fail to consult their Medical Officer, from time to time, as occasion may require.

With reference to any change of the Workhouse Dietary, which may become desirable through failure of a supply of sound Potatoes, the Commissioners call the attention of the Guardians to their sealed Order of the 27th October last, which remains in full force, authorizing such departure from the prescribed form of Dietary, as to the Guardians, subject to the approval of the Commissioners, shall seem fitting and expedient.

The Assistant Commissioner in superintendence of the Union, is specially instructed to afford the Guardians, on this occasion, all the assistance and co-operation it may be in his power to give.

To the Board of Guardians of the Poor of the KILMALLOCK UNION; To the Clerk or Clerks to the Justices of the Petty Sessions held for the Division or Divisions in which the Townlands and Places comprised in the said Union are situated, and to all others whom it may concern:

In pursuance of the Provisions of an Act

passed in the Second Year of the Reign of Her present Majesty, Queen Victoria, intituled, "An Act for the more effectual Relief of the Destitute Poor in Ireland," and of an Act passed in the Seventh Year of the reign of Her said Majesty, intituled "An Act for the further Amendment of an Act for the more effectual Relief of the Destitute Poor in Ireland," and of another Act passed in the Seventh Year of the reign of Her said Majesty, intituled "An Act to amend an Act of the Third and Fourth Years of Her present Majesty, for the regulation of Municipal Corporations in Ireland," We, the Poor Law Commissioners, do hereby Order and Direct the Guardians of the Poor of the Kilmallock Union, to appoint a fit person to Revise and Correct the Valuation of Hereditaments liable to be rated under the said first recited Act, within the said Union.

AND We do hereby Order and Direct that the Valuation [of the Hereditaments aforesaid shall be set forth, revised and corrected as aforesaid, in the Forms V. 1, and V. 2, to this Order respectively annexed, and to this end the person so appointed shall separately value all property in the said Union liable to the payment of any Rate or Assessment, under the provisions of an Act passed in the Ninth Year of the reign of King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act to make Provision for the Lighting, Cleansing, and Watching of Cities, Towns Corporate, or Market Towns in Ireland, in certain cases," and which is or shall be by law exempted from the Rate, or not rateable to or which shall not be included in the Rate for the Relief of the Poor in the Union; and in the case of Dwelling-houses valued together with other property, the person so appointed shall separately value all such Dwelling-houses; and that the Valuation of all Hereditaments situate in the Borough of Charleville be made in the Form V. 2.

 Sir, I take notice, that, in as much as £50 a year the present Salary of the Medical Officer of this Workhouse is far below his very arduous labours. We propose to move a Resolution on Thursday the 18th of June Instant to raise same to £80 a year, that, on the whole Union, will not amount to the right of a penny in the pound, and we do expect, that, the Board will see into the Justice of warmly entertaining this notice, which we feel ourselves called upon to give on the principle of doing Justice, and of respectfully demanding of the Poor Law Commissioners, not to withhold their sanction thereto any longer, for the reasons following, firstly — because several Boards of Guardians passed Resolutions promising Dr. Donnell an increase of Salary in consequence of the medical relief afforded to the numerous Sick Poor of the Union, who were admitted in Tens, and Twenties on Board Cots, for that purpose chiefly. Your hand has been inspired the sacred question of the Poor Law with all its details - door Relief - compulsory alms giving - mixed Education of Catholic and Protestant youth - the legal provision for the Ministers of Religion - you have carried into operation the spirit of that Law. you have levelled foolish opposition - dissipated prejudice, and by your cordial cooperation have proved how all classes and persuasions, if permitted to know each other might live, and act in Peace and harmony together - Between you and the Poor there should be no Interpretation - no busy agent - the Government its self only gives and by your hands - your administration - sympathy, well laid gratitude, labor unclaimed by human motive will be rewarded by the gratitude of the community, by the prayers of a grateful People - I am truly grateful to you for your kindness to me. In your encouragement in those sentiments written and spoken by those whose greatest praise it is to have walked in their Father's steps, and to have shown themselves unworthy of their proud and good Name: I beg to receive the assurance of all my friends of the assurance of my best regards - R. Burke. Clerk.





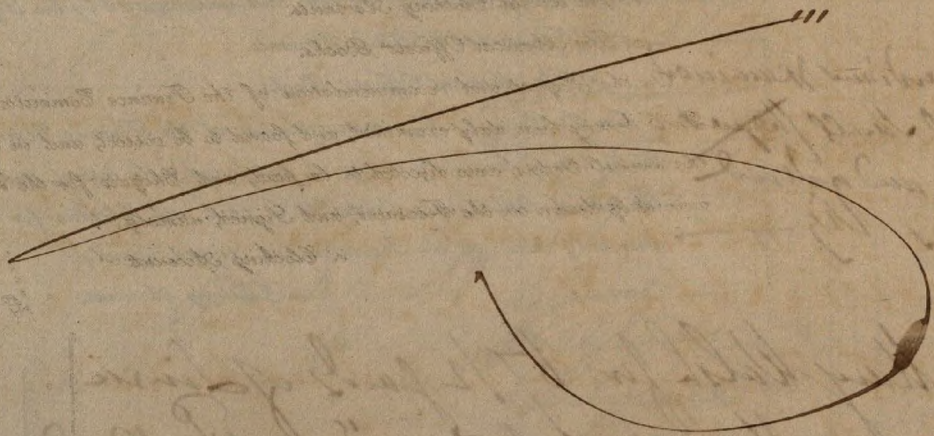

In my opinion, that, the Limerick Work House cannot accommodate more than 800 inmates without engendering disease, the overcrowded state of the House for the last month has already generated Fever attended with Chest affections and, at this moment, there are 37 persons in the Fever Hospital on which account it is now absolutely necessary that the Infirmary additions should be given up properly furnished with beds to make provision for the fever cases daily occurring - The Days and Nights dormitories as also the Nursery and Day Rooms are especially crowded, and the other departments in these Departments, the Infirmary wards too are overcrowded, as already reported on by me Nov 19. 1846 -

It is unprovided for the younger class to their very great and serious detriment -

I am also thoroughly convinced, that independent of impure air, overcrowded apartments and deficiency in regard to Milk, Human beings shut up in Poor Houses require a change of Diet from time to time, as necessary for their assistance, and if this change was not prescribed during other seasons, it was owing to the health of the Inmates being much better on admission, and to their not settling down in the Work House as a permanent habitancy.
