They contain rather large amounts of ammonia and excessive quantities of nitric acid. They do not contain very much actual organic matter but still they are not good potable waters. The best I can say of them is that they are second class waters only to be used if no better be procurable.

As Hill Pump } This water is turbid and contains numerous micro-organisms. It is polluted with sewage and unfit for use.

To The Chairman and Board of Guardians
Kilmallock Union

Gentlemen

I was surprised to find on last Thursday evening (23rd) that a minute had been made respecting me, arising out of the wrangle between the Master of the Workhouse and the unfortunate and misguided boy-Cronin. no doubt unwittingly by some gentlemen. but which is bound nevertheless to have an unwise effect. I saw on after reflection that I was called on suddenly on Thursday to reply to a refractory and prearranged little plot that was evidently formed to entrap me.

I was so stunned at the audacity of the thing when I was called up that I forgot almost everything. When I asked for an inquiry I feel I was wronged in any minute being made against me until the thing was probed to the depths of its enormity.

The plain facts of the case are: - The Master summoned Cronin to Petty Sessions for refusing to work on Saturday the 11th inst. Some time on the same day Cronin retaliated by writing a charge against the Master to the L. G. Board, which he told me he gave the Master to post for him. Monday the 13th inst was Court day. ~~but~~ Cronin was not brought to the Court at all - but, strange to say - his nuptials were solemnised here ^{out of} the Workhouse during that week. ^{Someday} It would be interesting to know where Cronin got money since last Board day to maintain himself and spend a honey-moon in Kilmallock.

Now what is the meaning of all this thing. To put it plainly I suspect some persons got him to withdraw his charge and tell a false story about me. If you look into the causes for which he has been sent to jail on the last two occasions you will find how easily he can do things of this kind. I would now beg to refer the Gentlemen of the Board to a letter I wrote to the Board on the 23rd Feb 1888, copies of which, both are on the minutes of the Board of that date and at the Office of the L. G. Board. I can explain fully on oath when required what business Cronin had into my school, I would request the Gentlemen of the Board to scrutinise all this carefully and I fear very much without desiring harm in the least to any one that some persons will find out that a straight forward course is the best and safest in the long run. of a similar deposit, from which a most disagreeable odour escapes. This accumulation of sewerage is chiefly caused by the sewerage of the town of Charleville emptying into the mill stream and also the waste water from the Creamery. To the latter is ascribed the cause of the offensiveness complained of. but I hold that the town sewerage contributes considerably to the nuisance. I would direct the Board's attention to sec 19 of the Public Health Act. from which you will see that the existing state of the Charleville sewerage is a direct violation of the act.

About 8 years ago I called the Board's attention to this matter when I had the assistance of Oliver Lyons Esq. of Mallow who at that time expressed the opinion that as Charleville had not a good water supply he could not recommend a regular system of sewerage for the town matters have remained in this way since, except that several additional connections have been made into the mill stream since, as well as the waste from two creameries. I still adhere to the opinion I held 8 years ago that it would be necessary to divert the sewerage of the town from entering the mill stream, and construct a suitable filtering tank in which all the sewerage of the town would be filtered before entering the public stream.

As regards costs Mr. Davern states "I had nothing to do with the fixing of those costs more than to demand car hire from Elton to Kilfinane which I paid out of my own pocket - I believe 4/6 - I did not pocket one penny of costs from him in June 1891. nor did I demand them from the Barrister either, but as Mr. Ryan felt so much aggrieved let him blame himself as he had ample time to pay his poor rates which were struck last October"

Mr. Davern also stated that he could not be vindictive towards Mr. Ryan who was a perfect stranger to him before his appointment as Rate collector, and his indulgence to him does not show that he was so, and the omission of his name from the Voters Lists must have been an oversight which he (Mr. Davern) regrets.
