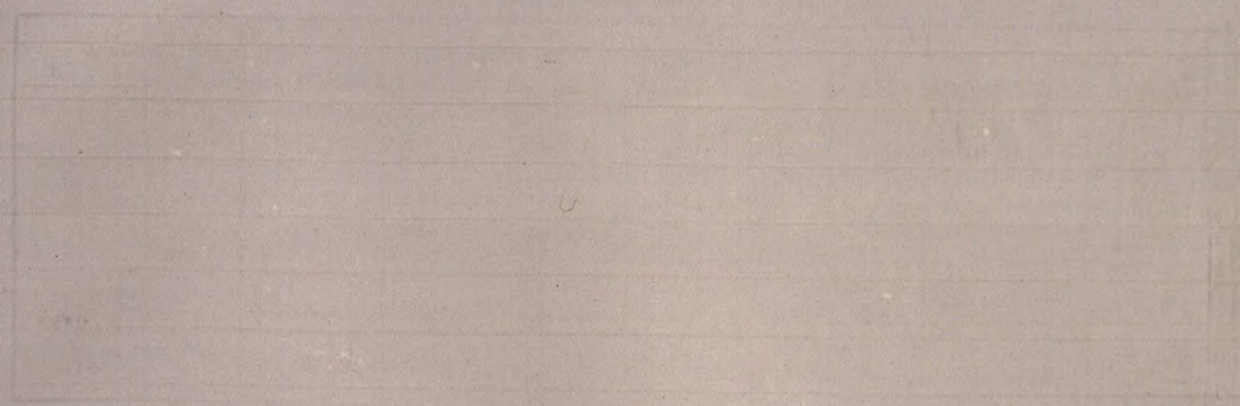

Board request the guardians to intimate to the Collectors that if they desire to retain their positions they must display more activity in the discharge of their duties during the remainder of the time allowed for the collection than they have shown in the past.

As regards the observance of cleanliness in the several departments Mr. Donelan states that he requests to have again to draw attention to the very unsatisfactory condition of the Workhouse in this particular. He reports that while the children in the female school are now well clad and in a very satisfactory condition with respect to cleanliness, the school boys on the contrary, continue in the same state, covered with vermin, in which he found them in January & February last, and he considers that until the present frieze trousers, now so thoroughly infected with vermin, are got rid of no amount of bathing will get the inmates into a proper condition of cleanliness.

Mr. Donelan also reports that he found the sheets in the Infirmary in a very filthy condition, that the floors in places require much more scrubbing and he suggests that a few linoleum mats might be supplied with advantage.

The L.f. Board consider that the state of the

the boys, and the general want of cleanliness adverted to by the Inspector is thoroughly discreditable to all concerned in the management of the departments referred to, and they will instruct their Inspector to make another report in six weeks time, and if the causes for complaint have not been removed, they will not permit the Master and other officers responsible to retain their positions after that date, and adding that while the boys are infested with vermin they must not be sent to the fleu school.

It appears from the report that the changes in the dietary which were approved of some months back have not been carried out on the grounds that some alterations are pending in the kitchen. The Inspector does not think however that any change in the cooking arrangements is necessary, and the L.f. Board request that the Master may be called on to explain why the improved dietary has not yet been supplied to the inmates, and they also request that to be informed why the Carduroy ordered by the Guardians to replace the frieze has not since been obtained and made up. The report also states that the Visiting Committee have only met and reported once during the past half year and the L.f. Board would impress upon the Guardian the necessity of complying with the requirements of Article 59 of the Workhouse Rules in this matter.

Cleary Kilmallock stating that in his opinion the guardians exceeded their powers in adopting the resolution of the 30th inst. requiring the wholesale erection of Privies, and that it is manifestly erroneous, as it implies the building of a privy by the owner of every house whether he has one previously or not, and also that the wholesale erection of privies in the Town and district would bring about the very state of things the guardians want to avoid viz:— an epidemic of typhoid fever. As the yards in the great majority of the houses are so small that privies erected in them would be only a few feet from the doors and windows of the houses and would be, on that account alone, most unsanitary and dangerous to

health, besides, it would be almost impossible to get them cleaved out thoroughly and at sufficiently frequent intervals. Dr. Cleary asked the guardians to re-consider the resolution and to limit it to houses in the Town that have large yards attached and which are suitable for the purpose.

In reference to the foregoing the following resolution was adopted:— Resolved That for the effectual carrying out of the resolution of the 30th May, the Sanitary Sub-Officers be directed to furnish the Medical Officers of Health with lists of houses in Towns in their respective districts, which are without Privy or Ashpit accommodation, and that the Medical Officers be requested to state, in each case so reported, what system of privy accommodation is the most suitable, and should be provided.

Dr. Cleary Kilmallock reported that having been informed by the Sanitary Sub-Officers that there was a case of Typhoid fever, in the house of Richard Larkerry Ballingaddy, he visited the place on the 4th Instant and learned from Mr. Larkerry that his son was suffering from Typhoid fever for more than four weeks. All this time he had been sending his milk to a public factory, the cows were milked, the utensils cleaved, and the milk conveyed to the factory by persons living in the house in communication with the infected person and as this is a source of danger to the Public Health he (Dr. Cleary) would ask the Board to cause all communication to be cut off between the infected house, and those milking the cows and conveying it to the factory, or prohibit the sale of the milk altogether. Dr. Cleary also recommended the adoption of the

the Infectious Diseases Act 1890.

Minute "notice to be served on Mr. Lorkery not to permit any person living in his house to milk cows or to have anything to do with the milk or vessels and also call his attention to the provisions of the Dairies & Milkshops Order.

Dr. Macnamara, the medical attendant in the case, states that, in his opinion, all necessary precautions have been taken to prevent the spread of the disease which has now almost disappeared, only one case having occurred.

Dr. Lee Kiefinane reported that the statements contained in the memorial of the inhabitants of Ballyferode are correct, and that a supply of pure water is very much needed.

Mr. Joyce Clerk of Works reported as follows:-

That the medical officer of the Charleville Dispensary District recommends the making of a concrete "ashpit" in Lillis Lane off Ballis Lane Charleville, as the houses there have no back accommodation. The cost will be from £5 to £6.

Pump at Main Street. "Is very hard, it contains excessive quantities of ammonia and did not stand the fermentation test. It is rather bad water."

Pump at Water Street. "Is tolerably clear, it contains great numbers of micro-organisms. It did not stand the fermentation test. It is a highly polluted water unfit for use."

Pump at Ash Hill. "Contains excess of micro-organisms. It does not stand the sugar fermentation test, and it contains an excessive amount of albuminoid and saline ammonia. It is a very inferior water only to be used if no better can be procured."

In reference to the Circular letter of the L. G. Board dated 27th Oct. N^o. 28.631, enclosing a copy of a letter which appeared in the public press respecting the condition of workhouses in Ireland, the following report from the Medical Officer was read:—

"In reply to the circular of the L. G. Board asking me for a report as to the nursing, sanitary arrangements, and the Dietary in the workhouse. I beg to state that the nursing is in charge of the Sisters of Mercy who attend to the care and comfort of the patients far more efficiently than any 'trained' nurse. In addition there are three

paid night nurses of several years experience, so that the nursing arrangements are quite sufficient.

The Sanitary arrangements of the Workhouse, are, I venture to state most perfect.

The Dietary in the Infirmary is also sufficient; but as regards the healthy classes, I had reason to recommend a more varied scale of dietary which was adopted by the Guardians and the dietary is now satisfactory.

The beds and pillows although they can be described as "bags filled with straw" have certainly much to recommend them in preference to other descriptions of bedding, and I would be slow to advise any change.

The inmates are not supplied with either knives or forks to eat their food with, but in the Hospital the food is cut by the nurses before being given to the patients. Up to the present there was no necessity for either knives or forks in the healthy portion of the workhouse as the dietary consisted almost wholly of bread and milk but as meat is now given, it is a question for the Guardians to consider, whether the inmates should be supplied with plates, knives and forks.

The inmates should also be provided with a proper Dining Hall, the present arrangement being very unsatisfactory, and it is also desirable that some arrangement should be devised which would permit of the children taking their meals at a different time from the adult men and women."

The consideration of the report was adjourned for a week.
