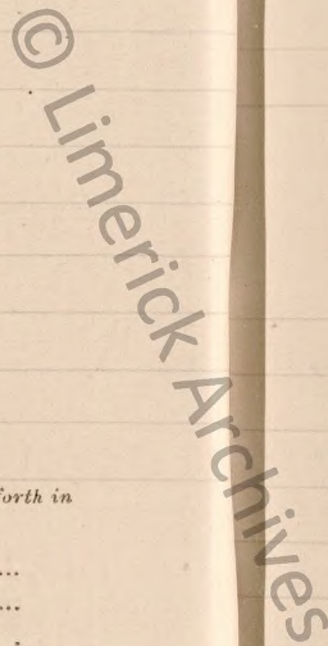

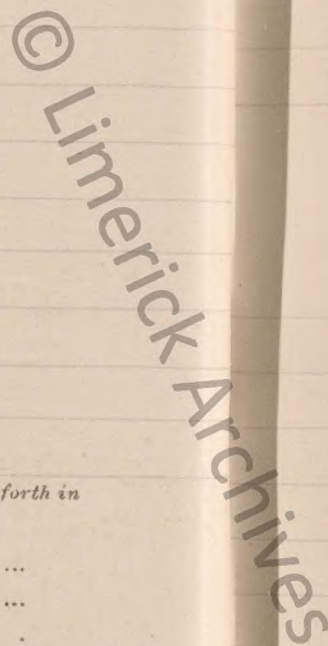

Leamy P.P. acknowledging receipt of the guardian's letter asking him to consider the advisability of closing the Dominican National Schools temporarily in view of some recent cases of scarlatina in the neighbourhood and stating that it is now two or three weeks since any case occurred in the district, that where it did occur the houses, clothes &c, have been disinfected and that there is no communication that he can discover between the convalescents and the children who are attending the schools. Under these circumstances he does not think it likely that any other case will occur. but if any other case does occur he shall close the schools instantly that the case comes to his knowledge. Master's Reports

On the morning of Friday 15th Instant I received a telegram from Mr. Freer Relieving Officer to send the ordinary van and two nurses for patient to Charleville.

The Van and nurses returned here at about 4-20 pm. having a patient Ellen Casey aged 22 years. She was sent without delay to the Infirmary, on that evening she was visited by Mr. James H. Leary. She died next day.

An Inquest was held on Saturday evening and adjourned to Monday. The following is a copy of the Verdict of the Jury.

"We find that Ellen Casey aged 22 years died at "Kilmallock Workhouse on the 16th July 1898 and that death "was due to Inflammation of the lungs"

In connection with the foregoing attention was called to a report which appeared in the "Cork Herald" newspaper of the 21st Instant and the "Cork Examiner" of the 21st Instant. The Reports of the Master and all other Officers were read, and Orders made thereon as follows:—

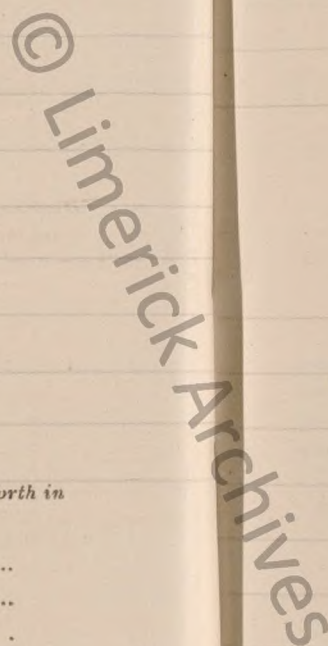

in use at the workhouse are of similar construction
They are two-wheeled vehicles. The bodies are too small
and at too great a height from the ground. They are
without proper provision for ventilation and they
do not afford sufficient room to permit of patients
being conveyed in a recumbent position. Owing to
their form of construction they jolt to a degree calculated
to have a most injurious effect on patients. The
Board, therefore, must call upon the guardians to be
so good as to take immediate steps to provide
two

two four-wheeled ambulances of an approved modern type, the plans of which should, in the first instance, be approved by the Workhouse Medical Officer and by the Local Government Board.

The Board also request that the most objectionable practice of sending pauper attendants to take charge of patients while being removed to hospital may be discontinued, and that the Guardians will in future employ responsible paid Officers on this very important duty. The Board think it unnecessary to dwell upon the most discreditably incidents that occurred during the removal of Ellen Casey to Hospital, such incidents prove how necessary it is that a nurse should be in charge of patients instead of a woman who was so unacquainted with the proper treatment of the sick that she permitted a patient suffering from pneumonia to continue talking to her throughout a journey of many miles.

The Board have to point out that the Master of the Workhouse, in the exercise of his discretion, committed an error of judgement in not sending at once for the Medical Officer on the admission of Ellen Casey.

As the Guardians are aware the Van Driver has ceased to hold office and it is therefore unnecessary for the Board to comment upon his conduct.

I deny the right of a section of this board to disregard the duties and responsibilities of individual members, and doubt whether it is competent or even dutiful of the Master to refuse to answer questions when put to him by a Guardian in reference to such matters. Consequently I once more press my determination to have the following questions answered:-

1st. How did it happen that the Charleville dispensary patient Ellen Leary who died the day after her admission to the workhouse received no medical assistance until 9 o'clock PM on the day she entered the hospital though the master had sent out the van and two nurses for her as early as 10 of AM to a distance of less than six Irish miles. Was this neglect due to the Medical Officer or the Master?

2nd. Was there a coroners inquest in this case, and did was the Coroner the same Medical gentleman who was selected by the Medical Officer of the Workhouse to do his urgent duty?

3rd. Did the Coroner refuse to allow his jury men to put questions to the witnesses and when neither the medical officer nor his substitute could be found why was not some other medical man called in?

4th. Was the male assistant night nurse named John Kelly while in charge of a delirious fever patient found in the sleeping apartments of females by Miss Carroll who was herself in charge of the patient?

5th. Did Miss Carroll report this conduct?

6th. Was the man Kelly discharged on the following day, most likely taking with him the seeds of

disease and fever?

7th was the assistant fever Hospital nurse Bedina (Bridget) Dunne in whose bed Kelly was found also discharged to mid with the people indiscriminately in town and country?

To these questions I request replies.

There was diphtheria in this house some years ago and Mr. Lush informed ^{me} that a throat spray used at that time was kept in the house till the recent case."

The following report from the Medical Officer of Health Turfman Dispensary District was read: "On Friday Morning last the 14th I casually heard that the Police had taken the licensed premises of Mr. Allen for a Temporary

Barrack and were about leaving the old one. From further information I received I immediately waited on the Inspector of Police Mr. Rutledge, and asked him was there Fever in the Barrack. He at once admitted that there was and I then pointed out to him the serious danger he was running, in having the bed clothes so removed through the town without being properly disinfected. He agreed to carry out any instructions of mine, and I then ordered the Relieving Officer Mr. Brown, who accompanied me to wire for the Fever Van, and to have the clothes removed to Kilmallock Hospital for disinfection. I also directed to have the iron bedsteads used by the Constables washed with boiling water, and Carbolic soap. At this time some of the clothes had been already removed down to the new Barracks, and a horse load of bed clothes were ready to be sent down which however we stopped until disinfected.

About five hours after this, I received by hand a notification from Dr. Connerly that a daughter of Head Constable Fitzgerald was suffering from Typhoid fever, i.e. long after we had taken proper precautions against the spread of the disease.

I may also add that one of the Constables who is ill and confined to bed for the past five weeks was unable to leave the old Barrack with his comrades. I send you a specimen of the water used by the Police, kindly have it analyzed and the result communicated to me. I also inspected the Privies which ought to be abolished and properly flushed ^{to} provided. The patient is properly isolated.

Minute - Copy to be sent to Dr. Connerly and the District Inspector R.D.C. and ask for ^{explanations} information.

Dr. Brennan Medical Officer of Health Charleville Dispensary District reported that two children cases of scarlet fever occurred in the family of Thomas Sheehy Carpenter

Ballyshonkin. The cases are isolated and all necessary precautions taken to prevent the disease spreading. Both children were at school on the 13th Instant. He previously advised the closing of the schools without his recommendation being carried out.

The Clerk's Report of Vaccination was read—(this on the first Meeting in every Month). Number of successful cases:—

The Report of the Visiting Committee was read, and Orders were made thereon as follows:—

In accordance with the resolution of the 13th of the 8th of the Committee visited the Infirmary on 20th of the 1898. Sister Francis Russell Acting head nurse explained to the Members of the Committee the existing arrangements and pointed out the defects and difficulties which existed. The average number of inmates whose meals are provided from the

Infirmary Kitchen, are about 150. So sometimes the number amounts to 170. Of these about 60 are imbecile and about fifteen are fever patients.

The kitchen is small and is provided with a five foot range which is in bad repair and only a limited quantity of meat can be roasted or broiled at a time in the oven while the boiling has to be done by pots placed on the range. The bricks are burned away and there would appear to be a waste in the consumption of coal for the amount of work done owing to this defect. Hot water is laid on to a sink from a tank overhead where the water is heated by means of a steam-pipe from the central boilers. The steam is cut off between morning and evening so that no hot water is supplied except during the night and morning. The nurses complain that they have no means of providing hot water for baths during the day to the invalids. The

The Reports of the Master and other Officers were read, and Orders made thereon as follows:—
Cooking arrangements which have been recently erected. For the general purposes of the house the steam is heated in two large boilers and conveyed by pipes to the portions of the house which are heated. A pipe conveys the steam to the general kitchen where there are three large boilers and four smaller vegetable boilers. These boilers cook all the food required for the general inmates.

The Committee beg to report that no facilities have been provided to the cooking for the Infirmary by the introduction of this apparatus. The general kitchen supplies food to about 350 inmates. The Committee are of opinion that greater facilities should be given for cooking in the Infirmary and they recommend the following.

1st That the existing range should be thoroughly repaired if as they think it can be put into good order, but if this should not be so they recommend a new six-foot range with a vast boiler so that the nurses may have hot water day and night for the patients.

The following Orders of the Local Government Board for Ireland were laid before the Board, and directions given thereon, as follows:—

2nd That a steam-pipe be conveyed into the Infirmary Kitchen and that three cooking boilers be provided. One for boiling meat, another for soup and a third for tea. These recommendations are made subject to the existing steam boilers being capable of doing the additional work.

Some Members of the Committee were favourable to a small extension being made to the kitchen, but the majority are of opinion that for the present the improvements above suggested will be sufficient. It may be observed that if all the boiling can be done in the Infirmary by steam the range will be able to do considerably more roasting than it can at present as broils can be cooked on the top of the range when the spade is not required for boiling.

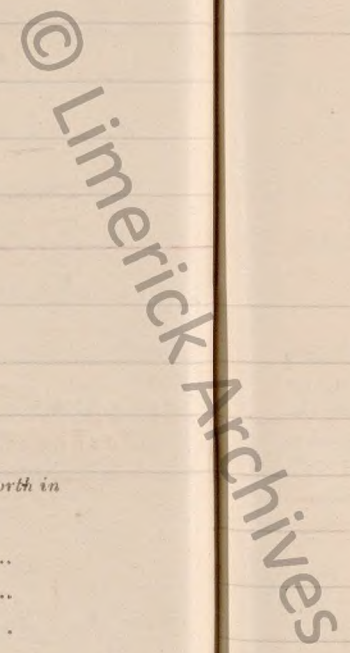

He communicated with the medical officer acquainting him of the occurrence of fever in his district.

All precautions have been taken against the spread of disease. Four children of Daniel McCarthy Lower Effen are suffering from scarlatina of a mild type three of them are now convalescent and the fourth nearly so. all precautions have been taken to prevent the disease spreading.

Patrick Cowhey of Kilinchil who was suffering from scarlet fever was removed to hospital on the 1st instant all the clothes and bedding were disinfected. He probably contracted the fever at his Aunt's house in Bruckfield, whose children are suffering from the disease.

In reference to the half yearly report of Mr. Bourke L. G. Board Inspector the following report was read from the Committee appointed on the subject.

"Having visited the Hospital to day in Company with the Medical Officer. We carefully examined into the reported requirements for light and ventilation in the different wards and we thoroughly approve of the suggestions of the Medical Officer which comprise removal of all the old windows and frames and enlarging all the small windows at the North side.

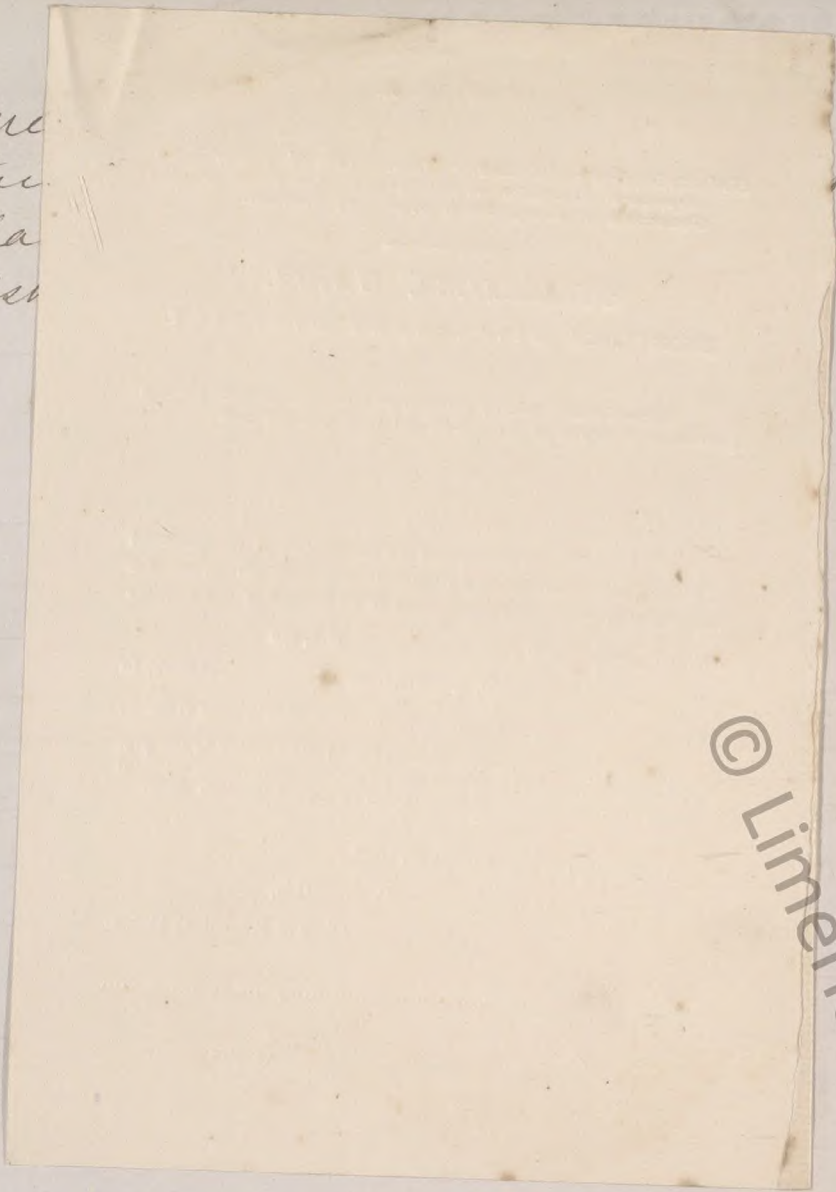
