Read following letter from Doctor McDonnell Medical Officer to the Fein District School. Sir.

As Medical Officer of the School I deem it my duty to say a word as to the water supply. The cost of altering and remodelling the house, in order to satisfy modern requirements is no doubt enormous, but if you now hesitate to take immediate steps to provide a proper water supply for the inmates of this good institution all your laudable intentions and efforts will be rendered nugatory. If you insist on the plan of supplying the inmates by carting the water from neighbouring wells you will be very much disappointed at the result, as it will lead to endless trouble and interfere much with the proper working of the establishment. If I have got the correct number of inmates 5,000 gallons of water will be required daily and to distribute this in fair to the various departments will be most tiresome, besides you will require water for flushing your water closets and sewers without which their usefulness is not only interfered with but they become an intolerable nuisance. In the absence of a good and ample supply of water, the health of the inmates will be imperilled, as Zymotic diseases such as Typhoid & Typhus Fever, Diarrhoea, Cholera & Scarletina are produced and spread rapidly in an

an institution where the water supply is scant and of bad quality. There are several peaces within short range of the house where a permanent and good water supply could be procured which could be conveyed at such a pressure as to carry water to the top story of the highest room of the Institution.

In connection with S. M. Donnell's letter relating to the water supply for Glin Schools the Engineers are directed to examine the surrounding springs and other available supply which may be best and report to the Board at next meeting to be held at Limerick on Saturday the 23rd Inst. the result of their observations and at the same time giving as near as possible the probable cost. The Board are of opinion that this work is of the utmost importance and should be urged on with as little delay as possible and that the Engineers be further directed to forward samples for analysis where they consider the supply sufficient.

Report of Committee on the water supply.

We the undersigned members of the Committee visited this day with Mr Leahy C.E. the following & suggested sources of water supply viz:—

- (1) Aghnaspridda Spring
- (2) Culhane's Spring.
- (3) The river at the point where it is proposed by the Engineers to construct a filter bed and a storage reservoir
- (4) Hogan's well.

and we measured the yield of water at the three Springs nos (1) (2) & (4).

With reference to the Springs we are of opinion that no 4 is the only one suitable. The yield this day was at the rate of 9600 gallons per day; on the 8th March 95 the yield was 9969 showing a ^{diminution} decrease

of only 369 gallons; whereas the yield of Aghnaspridda was this day ⁸⁶⁴⁰ and

on the 18th March 95, 10800 ^{gallons} showing a ^{diminution} decrease of 2160 gallons which appear to point to

a further very serious decrease in a dry season.

We were also informed that the Aghnaspridda Spring dwindled down to a very small supply in 1894, although that year was not a dry one,

Moreover the distance from Hogan's well to the public road is only about 200 yards, and the pipes would have to be taken through the land of only two occupiers, whereas in the case of

of Aghnaspridda spring it would be necessary to carry the pipes for a very considerable distance through the fields before the public road would be reached, and numerous claims for compensation would have to be dealt with.

As regards the permanence of the supply from Hogan's well we were assured by the tenant on whose farm it is situated that not only does it never fail, but that he cannot perceive that it varies appreciably. The spring lies at a very considerable height above the level of the top of the school.

The water of both Aghnaspridda and Hogan's Springs has been analyzed and has been pronounced first-class, and suitable for potable and domestic purposes.

With regard to Culhaney Spring (no 2) at the time of our visit it was yielding only 3444 gallons per day, an amount wholly insufficient for the consumption of the school. It might however be used (if desirable) to supplement the supply from Hogan's well, but we believe that this will be quite unnecessary.

With regard to the ~~scheme of forming a large storage~~ to the question of obtaining a supply from the river by gravitation we are of opinion that it is not desirable to adopt this scheme for the following reasons. (1) It would be imperfect without the construction of a large storage reservoir as originally proposed, and even if the reservoir were dispensed with it would be necessary to provide & maintain an elaborate

system of filtration (2) It is almost certain that ^{and embarrassing} numerous claims for compensation from parties affected by a substantial diminution of the water-supply of the river would have to be dealt with.

The choice in our opinion lies practically between a supply by gravitation from Hogan's well and one from the river by a ram or pumping from the point nearest to the School. The latter scheme has not been considered by the Engineers and we are not therefore in a position to report upon its practicability in detail. It seems evident however that the objection from possible claims for compensation ~~as~~ would apply with much less force in this case than in that of a gravitation scheme from the river inasmuch as the ^{water} would be taken from the river at a point much further down its course - about 1 1/2 miles.

We think that whatever scheme be adopted ~~the~~ ^{the} large storage reservoir proposed in the Engineers reports might practically be dispensed with, and a large part of the expense thereby saved. Provision however should be made in the plans for the construction of such storage reservoirs in case they should prove here after to be required.

We find that the Engineers would be unwilling to undertake the responsibility

of designing and carrying out an expensive scheme ~~for~~ without the advice of a consulting engineer, and considering ~~that~~ ^{the} numerous cases of failures of ~~water~~ schemes for water supplies that have occurred and the expense ~~involved~~ ^{entailed} thereby on public bodies we would strongly urge on the Board the advisability of complying with their wishes, and we would suggest that the Committee should be empowered to ascertain from Mr John Horan C.E., County Surveyor for County Limerick on what terms he would undertake to act as consulting engineer

The following Members of the Committee appointed to consider the best way the land attached to the Schools may be utilized for instruction of the children in agriculture and and dairying and also for the building and firing of workshops attended Mr. W. Noonan, J. Bourke, P. O'Laughnessy, W. Fitzgibbon and M. J. Nolan.

The Committee is of opinion that the grassland attached to the institution should be used for the rearing and feeding of milch cows with a

a view to train some of the female children in Dairy business. The milk to be used for the benefit of the institution

The garden at present under potatoes and cabbage we recommend to be still used for these purposes. The plot of land lying between the above garden and the building formerly used as an Infirmary could also be very conveniently converted into a vegetable garden.

We are of opinion that workshops should be erected on or against wall at west side where pointed out to the Engineers by the Committee and that our Engineers be directed to have plans and specifications ready for the next meeting of the Board.

The fence between garden and field at east side should be made so secure with barbed wire and thorn quicks as to prevent by any possibility the communication of smallpox and female children. *Adopted*
The Reports of the Master and other Officers were read, and Orders made thereon as follows:—

That for the past few days one of the boys has had a serious attack of chest disease and it was very difficult to get a proper person to nurse him. The Board is respectfully asked to make provision for the nursing of the sick children. The boy is now convalescent.

for the children of this school has my entire approval. It is quite sufficient in quantity and varied - the latter feature is a great advantage since sameness of diet is apt to lead to disgust and to the consumption of an insufficient amount of food. I have also to report that ophthalmia has appeared amongst some of the children and I have adopted the necessary measures with a view of preventing it spreading. I have also to report the death of a little girl named Margaret Sheahan aged 13 years who has been under my care since the 13th Sept. suffering from disease of the heart. Her death occurred on Sunday the 3rd Nov.

Read following letter from Dr. McDonnell Medical Officer of the School.
 Gentlemen.

It becomes my duty as Medical Officer of the 5th District School to report to you that the water supplied to the school is deficient in quantity and bad in quality.

The cost of altering and remodelling the old workhouse buildings in order to satisfy modern requirements & prepare them for the reception of the children is no doubt enormous but if you now refuse to take immediate steps to provide a proper water supply for the inmates of the Institution all your efforts & good intentions will be rendered nugatory. The existing plan of supplying the school with water - namely carrying it from neighbouring wells and rivers is most objectionable and dangerous and will lead to

to endless trouble & interfere very seriously with the proper & efficient working of the establishment. If I have been furnished with the correct amount of inmates which I am certain I have about 6000 gallons of water will be required daily besides water is necessary for flushing lavatories urinals and sewers, if you wish to prevent to prevent these appurtenances from becoming most intolerable nuisances

In the absence of a pure and plentiful supply of water the lives of the inmates will be imperilled as zymotic diseases - (Typhoid & Typhus Fevers) Diarrhoea cholera & scarlatina are produced & rapidly spread where the water supply is scant and of a bad quality. There are several places within a short distance of the school where a good and permanent water supply could be procured. I fear the sewage from the old drains is finding its way into the wells in the yards from which we are expected to get our water supply. Within the last few days the Lady Superioress directed my attention to the bursting of an old drain close to and in connection with the Laundry and in close proximity to the well in the female side of the Institution. I shall never forget the odour that came from that drain - it was most abominable. I now am of opinion that the Laundry & kitchen are served by the old drains or sewers & have no



Read following report from the Medical Officer of the Glin District School.

Gentlemen,

In compliance with your request I beg leave to report for your information that the girl Margt Sheehan was sent from the broom union to the Glin District School on the 13th of September last. In two days after her admission I observed that she appeared ill and put her under Medical treatment and kept her under my care until her death on the 3rd of November. During the seven weeks that she was in Hospital I was on three occasions hastily summoned to this girl who it was alleged was in a "fit" but on each occasion when I arrived at her bedside the attack was over, although those around her thought that the fit might have been of an epileptic character yet from the disease from which she suffered I came to the conclusion that it was an attack of Syncope or fainting a symptoms that frequently accompanies the form of Heart Disease from which she suffered. With regard to the girl Bridget Noonan who also came from the broom union I regret to say that she is quite idiotic and perfectly incapable of receiving any instructions of any description either industrial or literary. The poor girl also suffers from spinal deformity whether congenital or acquired I am unable to state I would suggest that this girl should be sent back to her union as no useful purpose can be served by her further detention here. I am glad to say that there are now

now only four cases of ophthalmia under treatment and only one of those is what I would call an obstinate case. The girl Mary Anne Gorman aged about 14½ years and sent from the Limerick Union is the case alluded to. This girl was the first inmate attacked with ophthalmia of a granular type and notwithstanding my unremitting attention to her the disease is slow in yielding to treatment. I would therefore suggest her removal to an ophthalmic hospital. The yards at male and female side would be very much improved by having them paved as they are very muddy and wet and in their present condition likely to cause illness amongst the children.

Revo. Dr. Dwyer Lord Bishop of Limerick

Sir - Having visited Glin District School on Tuesday last, 23rd ult. and seen it working in all its parts, I cannot deny myself the pleasure of addressing to your Board my most earnest congratulations on the good work which they have done.

Some remarks which I read in the newspapers a few months ago had disheartened me very much, and made me fear that, however good the idea of such a school might be in theory, there were practical difficulties which would doom it to failure. You can, then, imagine with what intense satisfaction I express my individual opinion that it is in every respect a great and conspicuous success. It was simply delightful to go through the schools and see the children at their various occupations. To all intents and purposes they are industrial schools, and can compare favourably with any other schools of the same class.

In the first place the moral and religious condition in which the poor little children now grow up are as different from those of the Workhouse out of which they have been taken as the pure air which they breathe on the hill-side over the Shannon is from the fetid atmosphere which they have left.

This change alone must tell not only on their characters both religiously and morally, but on their physical health and contribute to reduce the number of paupers and criminals in this city and county.

Then industrial training is a feature of great importance. They do all their own work, and make their own clothes. The girls knit stockings, make their own dresses and inside clothing for the boys, and cook and wash. The boys make all the boots and shoes, and all their own clothes, and while they thus contribute largely to their own support, at the same time both boys and girls are getting an industrial training which will afterwards enable them to earn their own bread decently and independently.

But some very practical people will ask at what cost all these results have been attained. To hear and read certain statements that have been made, one would think that the whole project had been one series of waste and extravagance. But it has been nothing of the kind. I do not say that some things might not have been done better, and more cheaply, but I should like to know the extensive buildings at the completion of which the same may not be said. But I have no hesitation in affirming that the Glin Board need have no fear of standing before their constituents on the outlay which they have made.

We must remember with what they began. Out of an old abandoned workhouse they have made a most complex institution. They have provided a Monastery and a Convent, simple, no doubt, but, on the whole, comfortable. They have made, practically, two industrial schools, with fine Chapel, refectory, kitchen, and fitted them all up in a very complete and elaborate manner. When the project was first in contemplation the Local Government Board Inspector should be prepared for an outlay of 31 in the £. As a fact the expenditure has come to less than half that estimate, that is for less than one levy of 1 1/2 in the £ this splendid institution has been reconstructed and equipped. I venture to think that in lieu of that simple fact there will be an end to criticism on the score of extravagance.

But when we come to consider the cost of maintenance and clothing we find most satisfactory results. At the end of the first half year's working we find the cost per child per week to be: in food, 2s 1s; in clothing, 3s; total, 2s 4s; an amount which will compare favourably with the cost in ordinary Workhouses, although the scale of dietary is much higher in Glin.

For myself, sir, having had some responsibility for the constitution of this school, I must say that I got those figures from the very courteous clerk, Mr Conway, with real satisfaction.

There is, however, one great defect to which I take the liberty of inviting attention of your Board, that is, the want of a proper water supply. The present state of things is indefensible, and when I mention two facts, first, that the sewers have not been flushed for nearly a year for want of water; and second, that there is at this moment a case of scarlatina amongst the boys, it will be a matter of surprise to everyone that the guardians should have removed the children, and, much more, that the Local Government Board should have allowed them, until so vitally important a want was properly supplied.

What is going on at present is expensive, and at the same time ludicrous. A man and horse are employed drawing water from a well in the neighbourhood; they throw this down into a well in the yard of the school, and two men pump it up again to the reservoir.

Then a contract has been entered into for exploring for water within the grounds, at a cost of £3 per foot of sinking, all at this may turn out pure loss; yet, at the same time there are two springs, from either of which an abundant supply of the very pure water can be had for very little.

If the impounding reservoir, which the engineers specify be omitted, or at least postponed, there is no question that for £700 to £800, which at five per cent would come to £40 a year, the whole question of water supply may be most thoroughly and completely solved. Without the reservoir you will not be in any worse position for any reason than if you find a spring within the grounds; but you will be better because you will need no pumping. There are other items in the Engineer's estimate, as, for example, £20 for fountains, and £100 for connections, which I think would admit of reduction. But even were them I think the Board may be satisfied that for the amount which I have named they can provide water. I would then venture to press upon your Board the importance of taking this matter in hand, and thus bringing to completion an institution which will take its place amongst the best and most useful in the country.

Begging you to excuse the length of this letter, and thanking you and your Board and the Guardians of the different contributory Unions for what they have done for the poor of my diocese through this school,

Matrons Report.

The Sisters of Mercy feel much pleasure in being able to report to the Board of Management that the School under their care gives promise of being in every respect as successful as its friends and patrons could desire.

Many difficulties always attend the opening of new institutions, and although they have been increased here by the uncertainty and insufficiency of the supply of water, the school has got on well.

There has been thank God very little sickness in the House with the exception of a pressing epidemic of ophthalmia and the children notwithstanding their strong prejudices against the plague have been on the whole contented and manageable.

There are at present 105 girls in the House; about 75 of these are under

11 years and attend school on 5 days of the week where they are instructed in the Christian Doctrine Needlework and in the elements of reading writing and arithmetic

Thirty of the more grown girls are trained to do all the washing and cooking for the 105 girls and 122 boys and the general house work of the school. They are also taught how to do plain Needlework, to make all their own clothes, to knit and make shirts for the boys and to work the knitting and sewing machines.

The Sisters consider it desirable and necessary in order to secure proper supervision over the children when they go to walk and at other times when the Sisters cannot be with them that a Lay Assistant Matron be appointed at a salary of £25 a year who would be responsible to the Board for the care of the children; and having had an opportunity of judging of Miss V. Feak's abilities, they strongly recommend her as being a very suitable and trustworthy person for the position.

The Sisters have secured at their own expense the services of a Dressmaker and two other assistants, and for these they only ask the usual rations and the sanction of the Board. Their assistance will be needed for a time for the efficient training of the children who are as yet young and unaccustomed to work.

It is proposed to employ Miss Dixon professional teacher of bookery and Laundry classes to give a series of lessons in

in these subjects for a fortnight to the children and to invite her to return at the expiration of six months to give certificates to those who pass a satisfactory examination in these branches. To earn a certificate a pupil should get 30 lessons. The charges for the lessons would be about £5 for each term. The Sisters would continue the lessons in the interval between the first and second term. These certificates besides being a recommendation for getting employment for the girls, would be a proof to the parents of the advantage of leaving their children here until they are trained.

His Lordship Most Rev. Dr. Dwyer visited the School on the 29th January and expressed his approval of the satisfactory working of the School.

When the House is made a little more comfortable and the opportunities of self-improvement more evident the Sisters feel sure the children will not only be contented but sorry to leave the Institution.



Matron's Report

The Sisters of Mercy are most anxious that the Board of Management should take advantage of the Technical Instruction Act 1889 to secure a school grant for the benefit of the classes for cookery and laundry work already opened in this school. Some months ago it will be remembered the Sisters secured at their own expense the services of Miss Dixon to give a course of lessons in these branches to the grown girls of this school. Seeing the beneficial effect of her training the Sisters have employed two young girls who were trained in the Munster Agricultural School Cork to assist the children until they are able to do the work of the institution well.

The Sisters have also purchased at their own expense additional Sewing and Knitting machines for the work room and many of the children can use them very skilfully. Specimens of their work are submitted for inspection - but it is the experience of the Sisters that although there may be and has been from time to time a lack of employment for trades there is never a difficulty in getting situations for girls who can undertake to do cookery or Laundry work, and for this reason the Sisters think it will be well to instruct the greater number of the grown girls in these useful branches of industry. It must be borne in mind too - that the better trained

the girls are before they leave the school the more likely they will be to keep their situations. This is a matter of importance as many of them will have no home to return to when they leave the Institution approved. The assurance in writing is given by the Board and signed by the Chairman and when signed by the Master and Matron to be forwarded to local Government Board.

The food supplied to the inmates of this School since your last meeting was, as far as I can judge of good quality since the advent of this excessively cold weather I find a large number of children both male and female suffering from chilblains. In one or two cases I am apprehensive the chilblains will become gangrenous. With the view of preventing this state of things to a certain extent I would advise that the dormitories be kept warm.

As I find that the top dormitories at both sides of the Institution are neither ceiled nor sheeted I would suggest that either one or the other be done I must also remind you that there is no way of heating these top dormitories so would advise that the pipes be laid on therein as they are in the lower portion of the building.

Good fires should also be put in Hospital both day and night as if a case of Bronchitis appears amongst children say tonight I don't think those

those children suffering therefrom would live until morning. The quantity of coals supplied to Hospital at present is quite insufficient. I would therefore suggest that a liberal amount of coal be supplied to the Hospital during this very cold and damp weather.
