(29th May 1830).

WHEREAS within the City or the County of the City of Limerick, containing a Population exceeding Ninety thousand Persons, no Hospital or Infirmary has been erected or established under Acts of Parliament in force in Ireland for erecting and establishing Infirmeries and Hospitals, nor is there any general Hospital or Infirmary for the said City or County of the City of Limerick: And whereas the same, from the great Number of infirm and diseased Poor therein, stand greatly in need of an Hospital or Infirmary maintained and supported as those of other Counties are supported: And whereas Joseph Barrington of the City of Limerick, Esquire, and his Sons Matthew Barrington, Daniel Barrington, Croker Barrington, and Samuel Barrington, have purchased Ground and erected at their sole Expence an extensive and commodious Stone Building on George's Quay in the City of Limerick, known and called by the Name of Barrington's Hospital, intending, without Remuneration or Reward, to give up the same, with all its Appurtenances to the Use of the Poor of the said City and County of the City of Limerick for ever: And whereas it is expedient that for the regulating, Management, and Direction of the said Hospital such Rules and Regulations shall be enacted as hereinafter mentioned: Be it therefore enacted by the King's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the Authority of the same, That the said Building called Barrington's Hospital, from and after the Day that the said Building shall be conveyed in Perpetuity to the Governors of Barrington's Hospital and City of Limerick Infirmary, the same, with the Appurtenances, shall, from and after the Date of such Conveyance, be and become and be deemed and considered the Hospital or Infirmary for the City and County of the City of Limerick.

iii And be it further enacted, That the Bishop of the Diocese of Limerick, the Rector or Vicar of the Parish in which the said Hospital and Infirmary is situate, the Mayor of the City of Limerick, the Representative in Parliament for the City of Limerick, the President of the Chamber of Commerce of Limerick, all for the Time being, the Right Reverend John Ryan Doctor in Divinity, and the Reverend Thomas Enraght, shall be and remain and are declared to be Governors for Life of the said Hospital and Infirmary.

And be it further enacted, That the said Joseph Barrington, Matthew Barrington, Daniel Barrington, Croker Barrington, and Samuel Barrington, and William Hartigan Barrington and Croker Barrington, Grandsons of the said Joseph Barrington, shall be for their respective Lives, and that the several Heirs Male for the Time being of their respective Bodies shall be for ever, Governors of the said Hospital and Infirmary, and Members of the Committee for conducting and managing the same; and that every Donor of any Sum not less than Twenty Guineas shall from the Time of such Donation become a Member of the Body Corporate and Governor of the said Hospital for the Term of his or her natural Life; and every Person who shall subscribe and pay any Sum not less than Three Guineas annually for the Use of the said Hospital and Infirmary shall become a Member of the said Body Corporate and Governor up to the First Day of January next following the Time of paying such

Subscription; and such Donors and Subscribers as aforesaid shall be a Body Politic and Corporate in Law to all Intents and Purposes, and shall have perpetual Succession, and be called "The Governors of Berrington's Hospital and City of Limerick Infirmary," and shall be enabled to plead and be impleaded and to sue and be sued by such Names of Incorporation, and may take Securities upon Contracts to be made by them for any of the Purposes herein mentioned, and shall and may have a Common Seal, and that they and their Successors for ever shall and may take and receive any Lands, Tenements, or Hereditaments whatsoever, not exceeding the annual Value of Two thousand Pounds, and shall and may be capable of taking Gifts, Grants, Contributions, Legacies, and Benefactions to any Amount, in Personal Property, in Trust for the sole Use and Benefit of the said Hospital and Infirmary, and shall have Power to employ the same for the Use of the said Hospital and Infirmary, in such Manner as they shall judge proper, unless the Donor shall direct the Manner of applying such Benefactions, in which Case the Directions of the Donor shall be observed; and such Corporation or Body Politic shall and may receive all Donations and Subscriptions for the Support of the said Hospital and Infirmary, and for all other Purposes connected with the Welfare and Advancement of its Concern.

V And be it further enacted, That an Annual Meeting of such Body Corporate or Governors of the said Hospital and Infirmary shall be held once in every Year, the first Meeting to be held within Six Months after the passing of this Act, and all subsequent Meetings to be held on the second Monday in the Month of January in each Year, to be convened at such Infirmary and Hospital by previous public Notice by Advertisement, Six Days previous to such Meeting, in One of the Limerick Newspapers, for the Purpose of electing from amongst the Governors of the said Hospital a standing Committee of Thirteen Persons by Ballot, in addition to the Persons herein-before mentioned, for the conducting and managing the said Hospital or Infirmary, and all the Affairs and Business thereof; and the first Thirteen Persons so to be nominated on the said Committee, who shall appear to have the greatest Number of Votes, should be declared duly elected; and in case of the Death of any One of the said Thirteen Persons during the said Year, then and in such Case a similar Election shall be had for a Member of the Committee in place of the Person so dying.

And be it further enacted, That, at such Meeting so to be convened, a State of the Accounts and Proceedings for the last Year shall be laid before the said Governors for their Inspection; and that the said Committee shall by a Majority of those present at each Meeting have the full and entire Management and Direction of the Funds and Affairs of the said Hospital and Infirmary for One Year from the day of their said Election, Three of whom shall be a Quorum for the Purpose of transacting or managing all the household Affairs of the said Hospital and Infirmary, but not less than Five of the said Committee shall be a Quorum for the electing or removing of the Servants of the said Hospital and Infirmary, and not less than Nine of the said Committee shall be a Quorum for the Election and Removal of the Physicians, Surgeons, Apothecary, Housekeeper, Registers, and other officers of the said Institution, or for the placing out Money at Interest, making Rules and Regulations, and for all Matters respecting the said Institution; and the Committee so elected, or any Three, Five, or Nine, or more of them, in the respective Cases before mentioned shall have the exclusive and entire Direction and Management of the Funds, Property, and Affairs of the said Corporation, and shall have the Power of electing and removing of all Persons in the Service of the said Corporation for Neglect, Nonattendance, or any reasonable Cause, and the Right of Appointment to all Vacancies which may occur in the Situation of Officers and Servants of the said Infirmary, and shall have Power to lay out in the Public Funds, or upon private Security, at Interest, or in the Purchase of Land or Houses, all such overplus Income as may come into their

Hence: Provided always, that the said Committee shall not in any Manner be authorized or empowered to dispose of or let any Part of the Property in Lands or Houses of or belonging to the said Hospital and Infirmary, or which may hereafter belong to the same, without the previous consent of the Governors to be had at a General Meeting to be convened for that Purpose, and called by public Advertisement in some One of the Limerick Newspapers, and at which there shall be Nine Members at least attending.

X And be it further enacted, That no Patient shall be admitted into the said Hospital and Infirmary but upon a written Recommendation from One of the Governors of the said Hospital and Infirmary, except in Cases of sudden Accidents which may require immediate Relief; and in case it shall so happen that more Patients shall be so recommended than can be conveniently or expediently admitted into the said Hospital and Infirmary, then the said Physician or Surgeon shall admit such Patient or Patients according to the Priority of their several Recommendations, unless otherwise regulated by the Committee; and the said Recommendations shall be carefully preserved by the resident Apothecary in the said Hospital and Infirmary as Vouchers that the said Patients were admitted in manner aforesaid: Provided also, that Persons subscribing the Sum of Two Guineas shall have a Liberty of recommending Ten Patients, and Persons subscribing One Guinea, of recommending Five Patients to the said Hospital, up to and for the First day of January next following the Payment of such Subscription, but they shall have no Control or Direction whatever in the Management of the said Hospital, or the Funds thereof, or in voting for the Election of a Committee.

XI And be it further enacted, That this Act shall be deemed and taken to be a Public Act, and shall be judicially taken notice of as such by all Judges, Justices, and others, without being specially pleaded.

BARRINGTON'S HOSPITAL.

Dear Mr. Killeen,

The map which you forwarded with your letter of the 12th instant was most interesting and provides the key piece for solving one half of the Barrington's Hospital jig-saw puzzle. I have had a copy made. I should have known that this map was made, as there was a long-drawn-out dispute for years between John O'Brien and Barrington's Hospital, which was settled in 1856 by a Deed to which O'Brien, the Hospital Governors and Lord Dunraven were parties and which provided for the surrender to the Governors of portions 1 and 2 on the attached map.

O'Brien was the successor of John Meade Thomas who became a bankrupt about 1818 and in the period 1848 to 1856 the Corporation was paying to O'Brien the rent of £65.2 in respect of plots 3 to 9 on the map together with the remainder of the site of the 1911 Guard House. O'Brien was paying a head rent to Reps., O'Shaughnessy, who are now an O'Connell family, in respect of plots 7, 8 and 9 and after 1856 he paid a reduced head rent in respect of plots 3, 4.5 and 6 to Lord Dunraven. Lord Dunraven, in turn, paid a head rent to Lords Longford and De Vesci out of Lots 1 to 6, an undivided one-fifth share of which had been forfeited after the Williamite Wars and granted, subject to quit rent, to Michael O'Boyle, Archbishop of Armagh and Primate of Ireland, the predecessor in title of Lords Longford and De Vesci. The Stanhope Street Sisters of Charity, I understand, are now endeavouring to buy out the O'Connell and Dunraven head rents and Lord Dunraven has, I understand, either purchased or is in the course of purchasing the Longford and De Vesci head rent.

As, I suppose, you are aware, the Barrington's Hospital Circuit Court appeal will be heard next month, and, following the hearing of the appeal, I should be in a position to let you have a full account of the information I have collected to date about Barrington's Hospital.

In the meantime, of course, I should be very glad if you could dig up some more information out of the archives of the Hospital.

Dear Mr. Killeen,

Thank you very much for your most interesting letter of 16th instant regarding Barrington's Hospital. I await with interest the copy of the lease dated 21st September, 1811.

You have filled in half of a gap which had been left in my information about the property. The position is as follows:-

In 1793 an ancestor of the Earl of Dunraven leased to Dr. Richard Franklin and John Franklin and Nicholas Power a lot of ground running from Mary Street to Georges Quay at a rent of £34 (Irish). In 1828, the successor in title of the Franklins and Power leased the Mary Street end of the property to a Daniel Kenna who, in 1838, conveyed it to Barrington's Hospital - subject to an annual rent of £25 payable to John O'Brien. By a deed of release in 1856 the subject of the Kenna lease was freed by John O'Brien from rent and, at the same time, Dunraven agreed to accept £5 less rent under the parent 1793 lease - leaving £26 sterling payable to him. That cleared up one part of our problem but I have no information as to what happened the Georges Quay end of the property leased in 1793. It looked from the original Valuation List, which showed a half rent of £32.11. payable by the Hospital authorities to John O'Brien, that the Hospital had cleared the Georges Quay end from O'Brien at some stage.

The information in your letter does not complete the picture as far as I am concerned. According to Dunraven's solicitors Sister Josephine Dodd pays £26 head rent annually to Dunraven, making it appear that she is the successor to John O'Brien. From your letter it appears that she obtains the rent of £65. 2. from your Corporation as the successor of John Meade Thomas through the lease dated 21.9.1811. I am now trying to find out how Meade derived his title and what was his connection with John O'Brien.

From the fact that the original Valuer in 1850 inserted in the Valuation List the half annual rent of £32.11. I took it that the Hospital authorities at that time paid the rent out of their own funds to John O'Brien - possibly because the Corporation, having transferred the land to the Barringtons for the purpose of erecting the hospital thereon, would naturally have transferred the liability attaching to the property. Would your records show how long the Corporation has been paying the rent of £65. 2? I have seen the printed annual Hospital accounts for 1892, and it is clear from them that at that date the Hospital was not paying the rent. The earlier printed reports might be of assistance in ascertaining when the Hospital ceased to pay the rent or if they even paid the rent.

Ballsbridge would appear to have been an important Limerick bridge in the old days and from my meagre information on the Barrington's Hospital area there would appear to have been a number of Military Guard or Main Guard houses built at different periods in this area. You will notice that the 1811 lease says "The New Guard House" while Lenihan's history says "The New Guard House".

The whole purpose of my enquiry is to try to map the property

Dear Mr. O'Sullivan,

With reference to the letter which you addressed to the City Manager on the 12th instant (Ref: R.51/1512) and to our subsequent telephone conversation re half-rent on Barrington's Hospital, the following are all the particulars I have been able to trace from the records available.

By Lease dated 21st September, 1811, John Meade Thomas demised to the Mayor, Sheriff and Citizens of Limerick the premises then known as "The New Guard House" for 500 years from the 29th September, 1811, at the yearly rent of £70: 10: 6 sterling (presumably late Irish currency) payable half-yearly on the 25th March and 29th September.

As you will see from the attached extract from Lenihan's History of Limerick Barrington's Hospital was erected on the Site of the old Guard House. By 6th and 7th William 4th Cap. 116 Secs. 81, 82, 83 and 85 the Limerick Corporation makes an annual grant of £466 to the Governors of the Hospital and also continue to pay the ground rent of £65: 2: 0 per annum, after deducting the appropriate amount for rates on the half-rent. I might mention that in the old records of the Corporation it is stated that this is the rent of part only of the site of the Hospital.

For a long number of years the rent was paid to a Miss Anne Margison, then to Messrs. Maxwell, Weldon & Co., Solicitors, 15 Eden Quay, Dublin, and in recent years to Sister Josephine Dodd, Sisters of Charity, Stanhope Street, Dublin.

There is no trace of the Lease referred to above but some years ago we got a certified copy of the counterpart from Maxwell, Weldon & Co. I had hoped to send you a copy but unfortunately the City Solicitor has been unwell, and so I must leave this over until he returns to duty.

You mentioned on the 'phone that the Earl of Dunraven had an interest in the site and I should be grateful for any information which you may have and if at all possible a small map showing the premises covered by the half-rent.

Subscribers of three guineas to have power to recommend two patients, and of five guineas, five patients annually. The Hospital contained in 1865 45 beds. Patients are only admitted on the ticket of a Governor, unless in cases of persons accidentally injured, who are always immediately received. A Committee of Management is elected annually from the Governors, on the second Monday in the month of January, and the Hospital has now 60 beds available for patients.

"In the seasons of severe epidemic, as at the outbreak of the cholera morbis in 1832, the Hospital was of incalculable benefit to the citizens, as it has been also in all cases of accidents, whenever immediate relief is demanded by the sufferer..... The Board-room is furnished with surgical apparatus, a library of medical reference, a remarkably well-executed picture of the Barrington family, founders of the Hospital, which was painted by Cregan, President of the Royal Hibernian Academy. There are two other pictures in the Hospital - one of "The Good Samaritan," and the other of "Christ Healing the Sick," which were painted by John Murphy, a young Limerick artist, and protege of Sir Matthew Barrington in London."

"In the seasons of severe epidemic, as at the outbreak of the cholera morbis in 1832, the Hospital was of incalculable benefit to the citizens, as it has been also in all cases of accidents, whenever immediate relief is demanded by the sufferer \* \* \* The Board-room is furnished with surgical apparatus, a library of medical reference, a remarkably well-executed picture of the Barrington family, founders of the Hospital, which was painted by Cregan, President of the Royal Hibernian Academy. There are two other pictures in the Hospital—one of "The Good Samaritan," and the other of "Christ Healing the Sick," which were painted by John Murphy, a young Limerick artist, and protégé of Sir Matthew Barrington in London."

## ADMISSION OF PATIENTS.

Governors or subscribers wishing to have a Patient admitted to the house should give him or her, as the case may be, the necessary order of admission to the Resident Medical Officer, Barrington's Hospital, and if there is a bed vacant, and the case is a suitable one for treatment, the patient will be received.

Orders of admission must be made on the printed form, which may be had on application to the Registrar.

Urgent cases are taken in at all hours of the day or night, without an order of admission.

The Dispensary is open all day and night for the treatment of accidents.

Dear Mr. Killeen,

The map which you forwarded with your letter of the 12th instant was most interesting and provides the key piece for solving one half of the Barrington's Hospital jig-saw puzzle. I have had a copy made. I should have known that this map was made, as there was a long-drawn-out dispute for years between John O'Brien and Barrington's Hospital, which was settled in 1856 by a Deed to which O'Brien, the Hospital Governors and Lord Dunraven were parties and which provided for the surrender to the Governors of portions 1 and 2 on the attached map.

O'Brien was the successor of John Meade Thomas who became a bankrupt about 1818 and in the period 1848 to 1856 the Corporation was paying to O'Brien the rent of £65. 2s, in respect of plots 3 to 9 on the map together with the remainder of the site of the 1811 Guard House. O'Brien was paying a head rent to Reps. O'Shaughnessy, who are now an O'Connell family, in respect of plots 7, 8 and 9 and after 1856 he paid a reduced head rent in respect of plots 3, 4, 5, and 6 to Lord Dunraven. Lord Dunraven, in turn, paid a head rent to Lords Longford and De Vesel out of Lots 1 to 6, an undivided one-fifth share of which had been forfeited after the Williamite War and granted, subject to quit rent, to Michael O'Boyle, Archbishop of Armagh and Primate of Ireland, the predecessor in title of Lords Longford and De Vesel. The Stanhope Street Sisters of Charity, I understand, are now endeavouring to buy out the O'Connell and Dunraven head rents and Lord Dunraven has, I understand, either purchased or is in the course of purchasing the Longford and De Vesel head rent.

As, I suppose, you are aware, the Barrington's Hospital Circuit Court Appeal will be heard next month and, following the hearing of the appeal, I should be in a position to let you have a full account of the information I have collected to date about Barrington's Hospital.

In the meantime, of course, I should be very glad if you could dig up some more information out of the archives of the Hospital.

In 1793 an ancestor of the Earl of Dunraven leased to Dr. Richard Franklin and John Franklin and Nicholas Power a lot of ground running from Mary Street to Georges Quay at a rent of £34 (Irish). In 1828, the successor in title of the Franklins and Power leased the Mary Street end of the property to a Daniel Kenna who, in 1838, conveyed it to Barrington's Hospital - subject to an annual rent of £25 payable to John O'Brien. By a deed of release in 1856 the subject of the Kenna Lease was freed by John O'Brien from rent and, at the same time, Dunraven agreed to accept £5 less rent under the parent 1793 lease - leaving £26 sterling payable to him. That cleared up one part of our problem but I have no information as to what happened the Georges Quay end of the property leased in 1793. It looked from the original Valuation List, which showed a half rent of £32. 11. payable by the Hospital authorities to John O'Brien, that the Hospital had cleared the Georges Quay end from O'Brien at some stage.

The information in your letter does not complete the picture as far as I am concerned. According to Dunraven's solicitors Sister Josephine Dodd pays £26 head rent annually to Dunraven, making it appear that she is the successor to John O'Brien. From your letter it appears that she obtains the rent of £65. 2. from your Corporation as the successor of John Meade Thomas through the lease dated 21.9.1811. I am now trying to find out how Meade derived his title and what was his connection with John O'Brien.

From the fact that the original Valuer in 1850 inserted in the Valuation List the half a nual rent of £32.11., I took it that the Hospital authorities at that time paid the rent out of their own funds to John O'Brien - possibly because the Corporation, having transferred the land to the Barringtons for the purpose of erecting the hospital thereon, would naturally have transferred the liability attaching to the property. Would your records show how long the Corporation has been paying the rent of £65. 2. ? I have seen the printed annual Hospital accounts for 1892, and it is clear from them that at that date the Hospital was not paying the rent. The earlier printed reports might be of assistance in ascertaining when the Hospital ceased to pay the rent or if they even paid the rent.

Ballsbridge would appear to have been an important Limerick bridge in the old days and from my meagre information on the Barrington's Hospital area there would appear to have been a number of Military Guard or Main Guard houses built at different periods in this area. You will notice that the 1811 lease says "The New Guard House" while Lenihan's History says "The old Main Guard House".

The whole purpose of my enquiry is to try to map the property the subject of 1793 lease and, at the moment, I could not make even an approximate shot at it.

I might mention that in the old records of the Corporation, it is stated that this is the rent of part only of the site of the Hospital.

FROM LENIHAN'S HISTORY OF LIMERICK.

"Sir Joseph Barrington, Bart., a name inseparably interwoven with the history of these times in Limerick, undertook in 1829, with his sons Matthew (afterwards Sir Matthew), Daniel, Croker, and Samuel, to found a charitable institution for the relief of the poor of their native City. An Act of the Legislature was obtained in the year after (11th Geo. IV., c.72), constituting the Hospital for the County of the City of Limerick. It is situated on George's Quay, on the site of the old main guard house, is of cut stone, presenting a handsome front, surmounted by an illuminated clock, and for a long time the only one to be seen in the South of Ireland. The Barrington family expended £10,000 on it. By Act of Parliament all donors of a sum not less than twenty guineas are constituted Governors for life; and every person who shall subscribe and pay any sum not less than three guineas annually to be an annual governor. Subscribers of three guineas to have power to recommend two patients, and of five guineas, five patients annually. The Hospital contained in 1865, 45 beds. Patients are only admitted on the ticket of a Governor, unless in cases of persons accidentally injured, who are always immediately received. A Committee of Management is elected annually from the Governors, on the second Monday in the month of January, and the Hospital has now 60 beds available for patients.

"In the seasons of severe epidemic, as at the outbreak of the cholera morbis in 1832, the Hospital was of incalculable benefit to the citizens, as it has been also in all cases of accidents, whenever immediate relief is demanded by the sufferer..... . The Board-room is furnished with surgical apparatus, a library of medical reference, a remarkably well-executed picture of the Barrington family, founders of the Hospital, which was painted by Oregan, President of the Royal Hibernian Academy. There are two other pictures in the Hospital - one of "The Good Samaritan", and the other of "Christ Healing the Sick", which were painted by John Murphy, a young Limerick artist, and protege of Sir Matthew Barrington in London."
