The Trustees of the Anglican Episcopal Chapel in making a proposal to purchase the Advowson of the Parish of Laurence Laurence lay before the Mayor Council the following particulars

When first they thought of the purchase they referred to a history published in 1710 in which it is stated in reply "The Parish is worth nothing in the market and if purchased it must be at a fancy price"
