Number of Scholarships:-

There shall be awarded one Scholarship in each year which shall be tenable at any constituent College of the National University of Ireland, Dublin, Cork or Galway, but subject to the Student during each year of the course satisfying such tests of ability as may be prescribed by the University.

Tenure of Scholarship:-

(See new par.)
~~The Scholarship shall be tenable during the Normal University course up to the Bachelor's Degree in Medicine, and up to the Master's or Doctor's Degree in other faculties, and may be extended for post graduate work in cases where a student gives evidence of exceptional ability.~~

VALUE OF SCHOLARSHIP:-

Each Scholarship shall be of the annual value of £50. *(increased to £60)*

Choice of College:-

The choice of any College of the National University of Ireland shall be left to the student, his parents, or guardians.

Residential qualifications:-

The Scholarship shall be restricted to Students who are permanently or ordinarily resident in the City, and whose parents or guardians continue so to reside. Persons who have resided in the City for five years up to the time of examination to be considered ordinarily resident.

Qualification as regards Valuation and Means:-

The purport of the Scheme being to assist Students whose private means would not enable them to avail of University education it is primarily intended for the children of Tradesmen, Mechanics, Labourers, and the Working Classes generally, and of Clerks and all Assistants in Offices and Shops.

N.B. As regards other students a declaration by the parents or guardians that they are in need of a Scholarship renders them eligible to compete for same if the Committee are satisfied that the declaration is well-founded.

Age Limit:-

Students shall be eligible for Scholarship up to, but not exceeding 20 years of age, and no Student may compete more than twice.

Examination Tests:-

Candidates for Scholarship shall be subjected to a competitive examination, such examination to be held by a competent body of Examiners. The Intermediate Senior Grade Honours course shall be the Standard for such examination.

References:-

Every Candidate for a Scholarship shall, before being admitted to Examination, produce a recommendation from the Teacher of the School at which he has been studying, as well as a recommendation from the Clergyman of his Parish as to character, and in addition a Medical Certificate as to fitness, and Birth Certificate.

Committee to make Awards:-

Scholarships shall be awarded strictly in order of merit by the County Borough of Limerick University Education Committee after due consideration of the report of the Examiners, but the Committee reserve the right to withhold a Scholarship from any student whom they may consider unsuitable.

Retention of Scholarship:-

In order to retain a Scholarship a satisfactory report regarding the holder must be sent to the Committee by the University Authorities at the close of each Academic year.

Proficiency in Irish:-

Holders of Scholarships must show continued proficiency in Irish, attend classes in Irish for two years, and satisfy the Professor of Irish in the University of their proficiency.

General Powers of Committee:-

The Committee reserve to themselves the right to exclude any candidate from competing for a Scholarship without assigning a reason. The Committee also reserve to themselves the right to revise the foregoing Scheme at any time, subject to the sanction of the County Borough Council. The decision of the Committee on all questions relating to Scholarships and on all other matters within their jurisdiction shall be conclusive and final.



The following Scholarships are offered:
1. The normal annual value of a Scholarship is £100, but if there are special reasons, the Corporation may, on the advice of the Scholarship Committee, increase the amount of a Scholarship by their own authority to be disbursed by them in the year of issue.

Sweeney namely "a Scholarship is reserved for the following section subject to satisfactory reports on the conduct, attendance and progress of the holder and is recommended for award by the Academic Council of the College to or vice versa."

At the end of Regulation 11 the following words were added viz: "a Scholar may not accept from one faculty of awards without leave of the Academic Council of the Corporation."

The Committee unanimously decided to admit the students to the examination for the Scholarships.

In the case of Miss Burke a letter was read from her stating that should she gain the Scholarship she would not be able to take advantage of it until the session commencing in May 1932, as she would be obliged to spend two years in New South Wales Training College, Liverpool.

A decision was placed upon, during which Mr. Walker pointed out that one year in the training college would be sufficient if Miss Burke took the University course first. It was also reported that the Law Dept. to the Council had expressed the opinion that it was not competent for the Council to reverse a Scholarship.

It was accordingly decided to admit Miss Burke to the Examination provided that should she be successful in obtaining a Scholarship the University course must be started this year.

In accordance with Regulation 9 of the Scholarships Scheme the Committee selected the University College Dublin to adjudicate on the results of the Lawing Certificate Examination.

Scholarships - Primary to Secondary Schools - 16th May 1930

A joint meeting of the University Scholarships Committee and the Special Committee appointed by the Improvement Committee on the 21st May, 1920, was held in the Mayor's Office, Town Hall, Liverpool, on Friday afternoon the 16th day of May, 1930, at the hour of 4¹⁵ pm, immediately after the foregoing meeting of the University Scholarships Committee, the following members of the Council being present, viz:-

The Assistant Town Clerk submitted copies of the Scheme operating in Suffolk, Leam and Westford which, together with a list of headings to form the basis of legislation for a Scheme -

The first heading was the amount and number of Scholarships to be awarded -

The Assistant Town Clerk pointed out that 4 Scholarships per annum @ £20 each would at the end of six years when was the maximum duration of a Scholarship amount to the Regulations made by the Ministry, amount to an expenditure of a total of £480 - A Survey Report for a period of six years would approximately amount to £1900. Five Scholarships per annum @ £20 each would mean a total expenditure of £600 over six years of £1200. It was also noted that the expenditure on the sixth year when the maximum number of pupils would be reached under the Scheme would be £480 and four respective

SECONDARY SCHOOL SCHOLARSHIPS

1. The number and amount of each Scholarship:-

A Meeting of the Scholarship Sub-Committee was held in the Council Chamber, Town Hall, Limerick on Monday evening the 5th day of September 1933 at the hour of Seven o'clock pm. The following members being present namely: Mr. H. Scraggy, P.M. was asked to be Chair and President over the meeting.

General: P. Gault, Messrs. Callan, Conroy and Boyd (with the Assistant Town Clerk).

The Clerk Mr. Kelly, P.M. for the Office of National Education was admitted and read a letter, in reference to Scholarships in Secondary Schools, that the Department had not adopted by the Committee of the suggested alterations in clauses 6, 8, and 13 of the proposed Scheme with the exception of the omission of the word "inspectors" in the case of clause 6.

With regard to clause 14 the Department did not agree with the suggestion for a reduction in the percentage of marks from the standard laid down, for eligibility of an award of a Scholarship.

A question with the last clause in clause 6 that "a person to whom Secondary Scholarship cannot be best at the same time as a Scholarship or free place awarded on other grounds" the Department had no objection if it referred to Scholarship awarded by the Secondary Board of the Department. It was agreed that Scholarship holders who subsequently became Primary Teachers or Secondary College Students the Department would apparently not approve of the Scheme - See letter attached. A copy of the proposed syllabus for 1933/4 was received and the Department advised that it be included in the Scheme.

The members discussed the question of percentage of marks and made the following observations in favour of the original

and the year Scholarships to them and to inquire as to their intention in regard to running the Public Schools (immaterially) or otherwise. It was further decided to consult the Council for Oged in the matter of further deposit or second examination is suggested by P.P.C. Oghin. When the above information is had it was also decided to call a further meeting of the Committee to definitely formulate its recommendations to the Council.

Applications for increase in value of Scholarships - Applications were submitted from Mr. H. Kern, Town St., and Mr. P. J. Murray of Kellanmore, two of present holders of Scholarships for the Council relating an increase in the value of their Scholarships and stating that holding, to help fees, had books cost approximately £8 per annum, whilst the value of of the Scholarship is £4 per annum.



Meeting duly convened by circular to each member was held in the Council Chamber, Town Hall, Liverpool on Friday afternoon the 16th SEPTEMBER 1952.

At the hour of four o'clock pm, the following members being present viz:-

Chairman: Robert Bourne was moved to the Chair in the absence of Mr. Stoddy, Mr. Mayes, Mr. W. J. Honey, Principal Technical School, Councilor: Thomas Smyth, Mr. W. S. Latham, Principal George School, Mr. Robert Davis, School: Archbishop, Liverpool College, Mr. Robert Lynam, School: Teachers Association.

The Minutes of the last Meeting held on 8th August were submitted, read over for the Meeting, confirmed as a correct record and signed by the Chairman as read.

Mr. 1 on the Gate - Report of University College, Dublin giving results obtained by the candidates for the University Scholarship offered by the Council. The lowest of merit being 45 points examination - After giving particulars of marks received in each subject the report went on to give a list of the candidates who qualified under the stipulated marks.

George S. Madigan, John Walsh 1375 - 2nd highest was 100/100
Walter Kennedy, 100/100; Anna J. Fitzgerald, 81/100; and
one candidate failed namely Edwin Griffin - marks 49/100.

The President Sir John Chitt reported that only one scholarship was offered by the Council this year it was accordingly proposed by Mr. Honey seconded by Mr. Latham and unanimously agreed to recommend the Honorary Council to award the Queen University Scholarship (State for the year) to Mr. Joseph S. Madigan of 27, Princes Street, Liverpool - value for 1st year £40 and for each of the subsequent 2nd year £40 per annum.

Mr. 7 - Correspondence was submitted from Mr. Robert Bellamy

of 10 Little Stone Terrace, Liverpool, parent of James Bellamy a holder of a Secondary Scholarship from the Council, pointing out that the boy had now secured a place in the Queen's Scholarship. After noting the Department of Education was to report that the Scholarship be transferred as a result to be made at the College - he asked that the full amount of the Scholarship be transferred made payable to himself. Letter submitted from the Department of Education requesting that a School fee of £10 (the parent) be paid to the Queen's College out of the Scholarship held by Bellamy. After discussing the matter very fully it was decided on the motion of Mr. S. L. Latham seconded by Mr. Robert Chitt to transfer the Scholarship as requested as a result to be made at the Queen's College, Liverpool, and to make payment of the full amount of such Scholarship to the parent of the boy subject to the approval of the Council. Legal advice was that this can legally be done under the Council's Regulations, and if same cannot be paid in full to parent then that the request of the Department of Education to pay a school fee of £10, in advance to the Queen's College in respect of the pupil Bellamy, be complied with.

Applications for Extensions:- Applications were submitted and read from Messrs. Davis and Murray, two University Scholarship holders for an extension of each of their Scholarships for a further year to enable them to study for a higher degree & get them to take up positions.

The Council has given Mr. Davis a reply to a number of queries that the results of the final examination of the two scholars had not yet come to hand and it would be necessary to obtain a re-examination from the Academic Council of the College when the papers were available before an extension could be granted. It was accordingly decided to notify the Council accordingly.

A duly summoned Meeting of the Scholarship Committee was held in the Mayor's Office, Liverpool on Friday afternoon, the 28th day of October, 1932, at the hour of 7.30 o'clock, p.m.

The following members being present viz:-
 Mr. C. W. Wall (Chairman) was moved to the Chair in the unavoidable absence of Mr. Mayn.
 Mr. J. G. Harrison of St. Peter's Place (Assistant Secretary) Mr. J. G. Harrison of Broad Street, Mr. J. G. Collier, Group Clerk, W.M.T. Money, Medical Institute, Committee Rugby and Quiligan, also now present.

The Minute of the previous meeting held on the 16th September were read over for the Meeting. Proposed as a Great Review and Report by the Chairman, a vote.

Mr. J. G. Collier. Applications were submitted from Mr. John J. Main and Mr. Robert J. Murray for a year extension of the Scholarship held by them from the Council, (a. before last meeting) so as to permit them to go to quality for a Master's Degree or to obtain the B.A. Diploma in Education. Mr. J. G. Collier moved with a report (see above) was submitted from the University of Glasgow, as follows viz:-

John F. Murray - "Passed the B. A. Honours Degree Examination in 'Elementary Algebra and Mathematical Physics'.
 The Council of W.M.T. Murray Scholarship
 for a fourth year to enable him to take the 'M. Sc. Degree in Commerce'."

Robert J. Murray - "Passed from the B.A. Honours Degree Exam. in 'Legal and Political Science'."

The Assistant Secretary submitted the Scheme for University Scholarship under which the original award of a scholarship was made in the above two cases.

In the case of Mr. Murray it was unanimously decided on the motion of Mr. Collier, Rugby seconded by Mr. A. H. Mill that the Council should grant a year extension of the

Scholarship for a fourth year, the amount of the award being \$750 per year.

In the case of Mr. Murray a letter was submitted from the Professor (Mr. Long Office) in which it is stated that he was strongly in favor of the Scholarship being extended & he was convinced that Murray would make good use of it and that he would be the only reason for not amplifying the B.A. Degree this year. Several members having spoken in favor of renewing the Scholarship having report to what they considered were exceptional circumstances in the case - money being to where it being stated for the University owing to a temporary break-down in health - and Mr. Colton having stated that Murray attained honors in the subjects which he completed (also such references - it was proposed by Councils Bishop, records by L.S. O'Neil and unanimously recommended to Council that Mr. Murray's Scholarship be extended for a fourth year - Value \$750.

University Scholarships Scheme:-

The Committee recommended to the Board of Governors that the Scheme for the award of University Scholarships as set forth in force be retained subject to the following amendments viz:-

On the motion of Mr. Colton seconded by Mr. Murray it was unanimously decided to fix the amount of the Scholarship to be paid per year at thirty-five pounds (instead of £25 for first year and £30 in each subsequent year).

That Clause 1st of the Scheme be amended so as to provide that a Scholarship may be extended beyond the normal period necessary for obtaining a University Degree only when the Student or Candidate known in the Examination for said University Degree or when the Candidate is not successful but only in case of exceptional circumstances. This was on the motion of Mr. Murray seconded by Mr. Colton.

It was unanimously decided to recommend the Board of Governors to offer one University Scholarship for competition during the coming year of the value as set out above.

Secondary Scholarships Scheme

It was unanimously recommended that the Scheme for the award of Secondary Scholarships as set forth in force be retained for the coming year subject to the following important amendments:-

That Clause 3 of the Scheme be revised so as to provide that no Scholarship shall be made by any student up to his annual income of whose parent exceeds the sum of £80 (exclusive of fifty pounds) plus an allowance of £5 (Thirty pounds) for each dependent child in excess of £50 and depending hereupon this term (i.e. the Director, the Assistant Town Clerk except getting particular of Means Class operating in L.S. O'Neil's and Dublin, before making any award as it was on the amount of force in force. Also that persons whose names have been arrived at, but the Committee would not give to this Scheme.)

The Committee recommended that the Primary & Secondary Scholarships be covered for competition during the coming year.

It was further suggested that given the Primary & Secondary Scholarships Scheme when first established the purpose to the different classes and the University Scholarship Scheme & the Secondary Schools so that the facilities for Education offered by the State might become better known. It was also suggested that the aid of the Government might be sought to subsidize the Scheme as well as the Director of the Education Department.

Warning

Warning the Council of the Education above in

report of the Scheme the Assistant Town Clerk resubmitted
the Financial Statement prepared for the previous
meeting showing the position of the Scholarships
Limerick University Scholarship Scheme and
Primary & Secondary Education Scheme - He pointed out

In case he fails to complete same for a Primary Degree, the Corporation has the right to require the holder to make good the same of students for a Primary Degree, while other members of the Council called the completion of the course equivalent to the Primary of the Examination for a Primary Degree.

It was suggested that Mrs. Conway could still obtain her Degree by presenting herself for examination at the Liverpool Examination and that it was recommended that she should be deferred until the completion of the matter referred.

Renewal of Miss Burke's Scholarship.
