Gentlemen

I submit herewith for your information Designs for Seven different types of cottages in connection with above scheme. Particulars as to accommodation and estimated post-war cost of each cottage are given in the table below:-

The dimensions of the various rooms are shown on the accompanying drawings. The cottages are to be built of nine-inch brick walls plastered externally in cement having slated roofs and fitted with casement windows.

The accommodation on ground floor of each cottage comprises Living Room, Kitchen, Food and Fuel stores and W.C. There will be 2 bedrooms on the upper floor of "A" cottages and 3 bedrooms to "B", "C", "D", "E", "F" and "G" cottages. Houses "F" and "G"

will be 1, 2 and 3 roomed, and will be a separate house. It is suggested that a separate house would be approved and

will have in addition a Parlor on the ground floor.
Back Living Room will be fitted with an open
fire range. The scullery will contain sink,
Bath and Wash Boiler. D, E and F houses will
have Bath Room apart from scullery. The bedrooms
are entered separately having a fire-place in each
with the exception of bedroom 3 in type B and C.
Cottage "B" is self-contained having all accommodation
under one roof. Cottage "D" is similar to the
houses recently erected at Prospect and Congreve.

The houses are set back 7 feet from the
footpath leaving a grass plot in front. The
cottages can be built in blocks of 4, 6 or 8
houses but the best arrangement is in pairs
as by this means access to the back garden
can be obtained at the side of the house. The
elevations and finishings will be like or plain
as possible and in designing all the type
of houses I have tried to provide the necessary
accommodation to enable people keep their
homes clean and tidy.

£800,000. This was seconded by Mr
Stewart and passed unanimously.

Mr. Pearson proposed that Mr. Brian E. J.
Sheehy be added to the Sub-Committee.
This was passed unanimously.

Mr. Stewart discussed the question of
getting large employers in the City to
contribute towards a Small Housing Scheme.
Mr. Sheehy was of the opinion that this
would not work and nothing further
was done in the matter.

Mr. O'Connor referred to a tenement house
which had been fitted up in flat, as a
model, in Clare St., and suggested that
a repetition would be appointed and

he would make arrangements for the committee to visit and report back to the committee with a view to something of a similar nature being done soon to relieve congestion in the near future.

So Conon's suggestion was agreed to and the following were appointed on the deputation viz. Ald H. O'Keefe, Mr. Curran and Mr. Stannison.

The Meeting was held in the Council Chamber
after the Standing Committee on the 28th day
Aug. 28th August 1918.

It was decided by the latter Committee that
all the members present should take part in
this important question of fixing a Retail
Price for coal sold in the City.

At the request of the Mayor Mr. Knight, the
Gas Engineer explained that it would cost
for 500,000 tons of coal S.P.A. to Dublin
The carriage for Dublin to Limerick would
be $7/6$ per ton (57/6) The Cartage and handling
of coal (6) would cost 6s. Making the
price (plus 1/2 profit) 64/6 ex Railway (Limerick)
and the price delivered from the works
yard would be 3/6 extra making 68/6.
All these figures included or allow for
loss in transit of the coal, which Mr.
Knight estimated would be from 3 to 5 per cent.
It was unanimously decided to adopt
the figures and to have a committee

with the City Gas Co. Mr. Clark re same.
He stated the Conference was fixed
for Monday next @ 4 o'clock.

A letter was read from Mr. Power
Secretary Chamber of Commerce
stating that he was calling a
meeting of the Directors for 17 October
on Friday when they would be
glad to receive the Deputation
from the Corporation, as suggested
at last board meeting.

The Committee discussed the question
of fixing a price for a considerable
time during which the following proposals
were made out viz:

Carriage from Liverpool (or Glasgow) to
Dublin 15/- per ton
Carriage from Dublin to Limerick 1/10 per ton
Cartage plus @ Limerick Station was set
at most amount to 7/- per ton (19/10)
Loading and delivery at Mr. Clarke's
Yards would cost 4/- per ton (33/10).

Adding the figures to the list of coal
at the City through the Limerick prices
would be obtained. Mr. Keenan remarks
that damage @ 1/- per ton would have to be
added to this figure.

The Mayor stated they would look into
these figures before the next meeting of the

Committee, which was decided on Friday next @ 4 o'clock. The Mayor asked the Mr. Clark if they would agree to sell the City through Dublin at the same price fixed in that City plus 11% Carriage & expenses to Limerick, and Mr. Booroy on behalf of the Mr. Clark said they would consider the question.

It was understood that the City through Cork and Waterford would be sold on a similar basis as made out above.

Special Improvement Committee

A Meeting of above was held in the Council Chamber Town Hall, on Friday evening the 6th September 1918 @ 8 o'clock pm.

There were present. The Mayor in the Chair.
Aldermen McNaice

C.B.S. Walsh, Connor, Donnellan, Johnson,
McNamara, Deegan, McEath, Duggan,
McCarthy, McGriffin.

With the Asst. Town Clerk, The Asst. City
Surveyor, The Asst. City Treasurer, and the
Secretary Water Committee.

The Asst. Town Clerk submitted the
appended Schedule showing the Salaries
paid Corporation Officials in Limerick, Cork,
Dublin and Waterford in the years 1914
and 1918 and the increase granted since 1914.
Also the result of the Arbitration of the
Salaries and wages of the Gas Department.
(see copy appended).

A long discussion took place as to the
means by which money to meet the
increases might be legally raised
when it was finally decided to leave
this question for the Law Agent when
he returned from holidays.

On the motion of Alderman McNaice
the Committee decided that the wages
of all employees should be increased
by 18% per week on pre-war wages
as decided on at the Gas Arbitration.

This was seconded by Councillor McGriffin
& Donnellan proposed an amendment that

the whole matter of increases be postponed as he could not right the City we unable to bear it. The vote was not recorded and a deal. Mr. Gieve's proposition was declared passed unanimously by Spinnaker dissenting.

The list of Official Salaries was then taken by hand gone through and the following increase were suggested viz: Asst. Surveyor £14 p.a. Clerk to Surveyor £19 p.a. Road Steward £23 p.a. Sanitary Officer £19 p.a. Asst. Treasurer £14 p.a. W. Long, Clerk in Treasurer's Office £19. I. Hall, do £19 p.a. The Town Clerk £50 p.a. and Asst. Town Clerk £30 p.a. The Rev. Agent Clerk Clerk £31 p.a. The Rev. Agent £50 p.a. The High Constable £15 p.a. The Supt. Const. Depot £15 p.a. C. N. S. £24 p.a. The Captain for Brigade £12 p.a. The School Attendance Officer £19 p.a. The Mayor's Serjeant £16 p.a. and the Mayor's Serjeant £16 p.a. per annum.

These increases would bring the salaries in each case to £50 over proper rate, except in case of W. Long, Asst. Clerk, Clerk, which would be a gross pay. The Asst. Treasurer stated in reply to the Committee that it would be £500 to meet these increases for the full year or £3750 for the main half

Sir,

Adverting to the Minutes of Proceedings of your Committee at their meeting on the 30th ultimo, it is observed with regret that the Committee, contrary to the terms of the Department's letter of the 28th ultimo, decided to include in the Treasurer's Advice Note a payment of £13. 6. 8. to Mr de Lacy as salary for the month of August. In these circumstances the Department have no option but to decline to approve of the Committee's proposals for a scheme of technical instruction for the County Borough of Limerick for the current session beginning the 1st August last.

The Department are accordingly unable to approve of any expenditure whatever beyond that already incurred by the Committee up to the 31st July in accordance with the scheme approved for the session 1917/18, and I have to point out that any expenditure which may be incurred by the Committee subsequent to the 1st August is consequently illegal.

A copy of this communication is being forwarded to the City Council.

THE COUNTY BOROUGH COUNCIL OF LIMERICK under the powers conferred upon them by the Retail Coal Prices Order, 1917 hereby announce that the following Schedule of prices has been drawn by them (after consultation with representatives of the local coal merchants as to their costs) as the maximum prices chargeable for the sale of coal by retail for domestic purposes in the COUNTY BOROUGH OF LIMERICK.

SECOND.....	72/- (seventy-two shillings).
BEST.....	73/- (seventy-three shillings).

Merchants selling quantities of two cwt or under to charge at the rate of 4/- per cwt.

No household may be supplied with more than one ton in six weeks.

Prices must be prominently displayed in offices and yards.

The prices to be charged by bellmen and hucksters to be 6d per stone.

No huckster or bellman may sell more than two-and-half cwt to any customer in one week.

Hucksters must prominently display prices in shops or yards.

Bellmen are to be compelled to have on their carts notices displaying prices fixed.

MR. MAYOR AND GENTLEMEN,

I herewith present a report on the working of the Electricity Department for the period from March 31st, 1917, to March 31st, 1918.

The maintaining of the supply has been carried out with the utmost difficulty owing to the impossibility of obtaining spare parts and supplies from the manufacturers without a Priority Certificate, and these have to be very carefully worded or else you find yourself in trouble. Our supply has been continuous during the whole of this period, except for one local failure owing to the very bad wet weather we experienced. I am pleased to inform the Committee that our Day Load is still on the upward curve as we have sold more units than the corresponding previous period.

There has been extensive repairs carried out to most of the plant, especially to the Gas Plant, Gas Producer, and Mains. With regards to the roof, I have all the leaks repaired and wire woven glass fixed instead of the plain glass. The latter very often cracked when the small Gas Engines were running, pieces of glass falling into the engine room, thus running the risk of causing serious damage to the staff or machinery. The Gas Holder and Gas Generating Plant have been working fairly well during the year, except for No. 3 Generator which had to be replated on top, and new cast iron valves fixed—we have practically made a new Generator. The scrubbers will have to be replated about the base as the iron they are made of is of a very scaly nature.

The Mains have given us a lot of trouble during this period chiefly owing to the rain soaking through into the old joint boxes.

The old cables have been very troublesome and I am afraid some scheme will have to be devised, and carried out slowly, to cut them out altogether. The New Type Disconnecting Boxes have been of great utility in enabling the faulty sections to be cut out.

The Mains are far from being unserviceable, seeing the manner in which some portion of them has been laid. In one case we found wooden boxes instead of cast iron, and not even bonded, therefore asking for and looking for trouble at every one of these wooden boxes.

The Battery has been working very satisfactory only that the capacity of it had to be cut down to 60 per cent. of its original capacity by order of the Ministry of Munitions. The very great scarcity and difficulty of obtaining lead, oxygen, and acid, all of which being very much controlled and therefore difficult to get, has been the chief cause why the Ministry of Munitions cut down the capacity. We had to replace several of the glass boxes owing to breakages.

Some of the consumers wiring has had to be condemned, owing to the wiring being a source of danger from firing to our supply as well as to themselves.

In reference to the Engines, Generators and Switchboard, these are in good order as can be ascertained from the report of the Engineering Inspector. The Electrical Machinery has given us very little trouble; none from the Switchboard what ever, the Engines, especially the Small Gas Engines, are mostly under repair.

To give you an idea of the revenue the separate engines are earning, I give the number of units separated for the above period:—

"On the 13th ultimo one of our Diesel Engine Surveyors made an examination of the above engine.

He reports that the engine is fitted with Smith & Johnson's Pulverisers and Flame Plates and run on Tar Oil. He further reports that the engine is started up on petroleum and turned on to tar oil when hot. Below half load one cylinder is cut out. Indicator diagrams were taken from 1 and 3 cylinders and shewing M.E.P. of 75.3 lbs and a compression of 456 lbs. The diagrams appear quite satisfactory. The outboard bearing was slightly warm, and appears to have rather too much weight. This should have your attention."

I must bring the Committee's notice to the time and amount of office work that has to be done before you can obtain anything in the electrical line especially as to spare parts of engines.

If the war was over next week, I consider that it would be as hard, if not more difficult to obtain material for one or two years owing to reconstruction work.

Taking all analysis of the past period (31st, March 1917 to 31st March 1918) on the working of the Department. My estimate of the work's costs, including all loan charges, was £8,546 os. od. This was exceeded by exactly £200. The cause of this excess was that before March 31st, 1918, the Committee granted increases in wages and paid £188 os. 1d., also an increase of £23 5s. 8d. under the head of salaries, making a total of £211 5s. 9d., which would have left the total works cost £11 5s. 9d. under the estimate.

I submit the following analysis of the expenditure under the various headings as compared with my estimate of last year. I have to point out that the receipts were £8,284 or £462 behind the total expenditure of £8,746. Now please analyse my estimate of last year's receipts. The estimate expected a total revenue of £7,565, taking prices as they stood, but certain recommendations I submitted, which I estimated would bring the total revenue up to £8,525. The receipts fell short of this amount by £241. My recommendations that all discounts be discontinued was rejected, which reduced the revenue estimated, by my recommendations, by £322. The figure in my estimate for the Harbour Board lighting was £175, but we only

realised £38, leaving £137 short. From the two causes above the loss on the revenue was £459, proving that £218 was gained on the other items, namely, sale of current, meter rent and other sources. Most of this increase is by sale of current for power purposes.

I think this result highly satisfactory for the working of the concern, taking into account the soaring prices of fuel and wages.

We have to consider a scheme to counteract the loss £744 that I estimate on our next year of working, ending March, 1919. Firstly by cutting off all discounts, this will bring in say, £300, and instead of these discounts use the lever that consumers will be cut off at the end of the quarter following after the date of the register of the meter is taken, as counted from the first of the nearest month.

Secondly—to increase the prices one penny per unit all round for lighting and power. This on last year's number of units sold to private consumers would bring in £1,324, making a total of £1,624, but owing to further economies by the consumers and the possibility of continued lighting restrictions by the Coal Controller, an estimate of £1500 would be about the mark, and this only with the help of the new consumers.

It must be borne in mind that the loss of £462 on last years working together with the estimated loss of £744—a total of £1,206 must be made good, and that there can be only one quarter of this year at the increased price to meet the deficiencies. I recommend that the discounts, which are in the nature of a gratuity for prompt payments, should be stopped forthwith, and an increase of one penny per unit for lighting and power.

There is not much comment necessary on the above items of expenditure. Fuel cost £653 more than the corresponding period and £138 more than the estimate. The difference in quantity of both fuels consumed is not more than 3 per cent. over the corresponding period. Coal, both steam and anthracite, rose from 5 1/2 to 8 1/2, equal to 19 per cent.

Fuel Oil, of which we are using two classes, Fuel Oil and Tar Oil. Fuel oil has risen from £24 per ton to an average price of the two oils in the proportion of their uses to £21, equal to 50 per cent. These remarks also refer to Lubricating and other Oils.

I am afraid that Steam Coal will, for some time, be very hard to obtain at any price. Anthracite will not be so difficult to get.

Of course wages have risen and there is a likelihood that a still higher rate will have to be paid.

The General Repairs and Maintenance are very satisfactory, taking into account the amount of work carried out and the high cost of material.

Sir,

The Local Government Board for Ireland desire to state, for the information of the Local Authority, that they have received many inquiries since the cessation of hostilities as to the terms and conditions on which the Government propose to grant loans for new housing schemes in Ireland, and several authorities have pointed out that, until the financial facilities which the Government are prepared to offer are definitely known, it is impossible for them to determine the extent of the schemes which it will be within the limits of their financial powers to promote.

The Board presume that, while the issue of the war was uncertain, it was not possible for the Government to decide definitely as to the extent and nature of the financial assistance they would be in a position to give with a view to improving the housing of the working classes. At all events, the Board have not yet been apprised by the Government of the terms on which they will lend money for this purpose, or whether it is intended to grant subsidies in Ireland for the purpose of reducing the loss on building in urban districts, such as exist under the Labourers (Ireland) Acts, or are contemplated for post-war schemes for housing under the English Housing Acts. They are aware, however, that the President of the Board has addressed the Treasury on the subject and that an estimate of the total number of houses required for Ireland is in the hands of the Government. It is, therefore, hoped that an announcement may be expected at an early date after the general election.

Meanwhile, local authorities whose operations under the Housing of the Working Classes and Public Health Acts were suspended after the outbreak of the war, would be well advised to take stock of their position with regard to the housing and public health requirements of their districts, so as to be in a position to take in hand any works already sanctioned, or to be in contemplation, as soon as the restrictions on borrowing are removed and the necessary materials, etc., are available.

The Board are aware that many local authorities acting upon the recommendation of the Board's Departmental Committee on Housing of 1914, have considered the requirements of their districts and are well informed both as to the number of the working class inhabitants in their areas and as to the conditions under which they live. Although the Local Authorities may not be able to determine the extent to which they can carry out their building operations until the post war terms on which loans will be granted for housing schemes are made public, there is much that might be done in regard to the tentative selection of sites suitable for building, as well as the preparation and consideration of plans for the dwellings to be erected. I am to state that, as soon as the Council are able to submit to this Department

any proposals with the view of expediting the carrying out prospective building schemes the Boards will be prepared to cause preliminary inquiries to be made as to sites, to examine suggested plans and generally to afford local authorities such advice and all assistance in their power, in order that such schemes as may ultimately be decided upon may be commenced delay when the authorities are made aware of the borrowing other facilities available for this purpose.

In reference to the application of the
 Amalgamated Society of Engineers, for an increase of 6d per week and
 a reduction of hours to 47 per week, for members of the society, I beg
 to report as follows,-

The present wages of the 7 men effected is
 £3/12/6 each: I recommend that the increase of 6d. per week be granted
 by the Committee, as it is the district rate and is paid by other firms.
 With regard to the hours, the following are
 the present hours worked by the men mentioned,- J. Grant, £1: F. Flynn,
 47: M. Kelly, £1: J. Ryan, 48 & £6 alternate weeks,- £2 weekly: K.
 Donnelly, ditto: M. Johnson, 48: J. Lawlor, £1.

I may mention that the question of hours is
 distinct from wages, & one in which this undertaking is entitled to
 consideration of what is known as "Special Circumstances" for the following
 reasons,-

- (1) Our men receive 14 free holidays in the year.
- (2) When ill, the difference between the National Health Insurance grant of 10/- weekly, and half pay, is paid to them.
- (3) It is a public service worked by shifts.

I understand that in the government awards made "Special Circumstances" such as above, have been taken into consideration, and I would suggest that a consultation on this question take place between the vice-chairman and a member or two of the Committee as well as myself, and the officials of the A.S.E. The matter could then be further reported upon.

It would be an easy matter for me to arrange a 47 hour basis for 5 of the men. It would not be an easy matter to arrange for the 2 shift workers, or perhaps 3 in the coming winter, and I would direct the attention of the Committee to the fact, that if the 47 hours week were granted to the switchboard attendants, as against the £2 hours at present worked by them, it would also have to be conceded to the Engine Drivers and Gasmen.

Sir, I am directed by the Local Government Board for Ireland to inform you that His Majesty's Government have considered the terms of financial assistance that should be given to Local Authorities in connection with the provision of Houses for the working classes in Urban Districts and Towns in Ireland at the present time. The Government are desirous of securing the rapid erection of the number of houses needed to make good the existing shortage, and they believe that under the terms now proposed they will be able to rely upon the active and energetic co-operation of the Local Authorities as a whole. The Housing Schemes of Local Authorities to which the State will be prepared to grant financial assistance, if they are submitted in complete form to the Local Government Board before the 15th April, 1919 and carried out within a period of two years from the date of the Board's sanction, or within such further period as may be approved of by the Board, are:-

- (a) Schemes under part III of the Housing of the Working Classes Act 1890 for any area for which the Board are satisfied that it is desirable that houses for the working classes should be provided.
- (b) Re-housing schemes in connection with improvement and re-construction schemes under parts I & II of the Housing of the Working Classes Act 1890, except that no part of the cost of acquiring and clearing a site would be made the subject of financial assistance if either (1) the site had been acquired or cleared before the date of this letter or (2) the needs of the district could in the opinion of the Board, be adequately met by means of a Scheme under part III.

The full cost of a scheme will, in the first instance, be met out of a loan or loans raised by the Local Authority, and, while the Treasury are prepared to make loans from the Local Loans Fund where this is necessary, it is essential having regard to the heavy claims on that Fund, that wherever possible and in particular in the case of large Authorities loans should be raised by the Authorities in the open market. As the financial assistance to be granted from public funds for Housing Schemes will take the form of a subsidy as explained below and as it is important to secure that the whole of the State assistance may be given under one head, any loans granted from the Local Loans Fund

fund for the purpose of assisted schemes will not be made at the preferential rates ordinarily allowed for housing loans but at a rate fixed by the Treasury so as to correspond with the full current market rate of interest.

In respect of any housing scheme or series of schemes carried out by a Local Authority within the period mentioned, Parliament will be asked to vote financial assistance calculated on a basis estimated to relieve the Local Authority of any loss incurred within a maximum of £1. for £1. of rent actually collected each year from the occupiers of the houses as certified by the Local Government Board Auditor. The amount of the subsidy will be reconsidered at the end of seven years when it will be open to the Local Government Board to reduce it if they consider that there is evidence that the Local Authority has not exercised due economy in management and in not securing the best rents obtainable.

Pending the completion and letting of the houses the subsidy from the State will be equal to the interest on the first and subsequent instalments of the loan for a maximum period of one year from the signing of the contracts for the erection of the houses.

It must, however, be borne in mind that schemes subsidized in these ways will not be entitled to participate in the distributions of the Housing Fund provided by the Housing of the Working Classes (Ireland) Act, 1908.

The Local Government Board rely on the Local Authorities to exercise the utmost economy in the making of contracts, the selection of land, and the cost of management, as if by reason of any failure to observe these conditions the cost of the houses involve a rent which, even with the subsidy, would place them beyond the rent paying powers of the working classes for whom they are intended, and would result in their being occupied by more comfortably circumstanced people, the Board would be obliged to consider the propriety of reducing the subsidy, or withdrawing it altogether.

The Board, with the approval of the Treasury have requested the Royal Institute of Architects of Ireland to conduct an architectural competition under conditions calculated to secure design of suitable and economical types of houses grouped in a most advantageous manner on typical sites, and copies of the promissory design will be available for the guidance of the Local Authorities after awards of the assessors have been made.

Legislation will shortly be introduced to give the necessary statutory powers to Local Authorities which may be required in regard to the provision of houses for the working classes, to enable Local Authorities under the Housing Acts to assist Public Utility Societies to provide houses for the very poor; to deal with bye-laws and Local Act provisions which may be found to impede desirable housing proposals; and generally to facilitate the execution of schemes.

In view of the pressing urgency of the housing situation, the preparation of their schemes by Local Authorities should not be postponed until the proposed legislation. Having regard to the terms of the financial assistance now offered, the arrangements which are being made for the provision of materials and the supply of labour which is becoming available owing to the cessation of War contracts and the demobilisation of the forces, there should be no reason for any delay. The Government are looking to the Local Authorities to start at once upon the Housing Schemes which are regarded as forming one of the most urgent and essential parts of the whole program of reconstruction.

Memorandum for the guidance of Local Authorities with respect to the selection of sites and the accommodation to be provided in houses erected under State Aided Schemes.

SITES.

1. The selection of suitable sites is a matter of the utmost importance and should not be made without expert advice. It requires the consideration and balancing of a large number of elements which are found in widely varying forms and degrees in different localities, and demands great judgment and skill. For example, it is important that the sites should not be at a great distance from centres of employment, and on the other hand, they should not be so close to them as to make the provision of ample space impossible or difficult.

2. To secure satisfactory results, two prevailing ideas must be overcome: first, that it is sufficient to provide in towns houses of minimum size with no open spaces attached to them except small yards; and second, that it is impossible to build large numbers of houses for the working classes without seriously depreciating the amenities and value of adjoining lands and houses. Hitherto a most mistaken policy has been common of crowding thirty or forty families on an acre of land, with no reasonable provision of spaces on which children can develop themselves by playing in a healthy and satisfactory way. Under such conditions children and youths naturally often find an outlet for their activities by climbing the confining yard walls and trespassing on adjoining property, when not engaged in games on that most dangerous and unhealthy playground, the public street. Another inevitable result of the crowded way in which small houses in towns, have been built during the last fifty years is that they rapidly depreciate in condition and value. Houses built in an open manner, with a liberal allotment of land, may, on the other hand, be expected to retain their value over a very long period.

3. No rigid rules are possible with respect to the sites of all the houses which should be built for the working classes in towns, as the conditions of them differ greatly. In some cases a number of houses should be built on sites, formerly built on, near the centre, if the depth of land affords sufficient space in front of and behind the new houses, but the governing idea, even in such cases, should be that ample provision must be made for gardens and for open spaces.

4. Most of the new houses should, however, be built on *large* sites, on which there is room for development in a way which will make each of the new houses satisfactory, and the effect of the whole scheme beneficial, instead of detrimental, to the adjoining areas. To many people this will certainly appear to be impossible, but experience has shown that it is not so.

5. The main essential is to secure ample space and lay it out under the best expert advice obtainable. One safe rule in preparing for such a scheme is to include an ample area on the preliminary plans. *The area scheduled can be reduced, but it cannot be increased except by agreement at any inquiry with relation to compulsory powers of acquisition.*

6. Some of the obvious points to be regarded in selecting a site are:—

- (1) Accessibility, levels, aspect, and nature of the soil and sub-soil.
- (2) Its position with relation to existing roads or streets, sewers and water-mains.
- (3) How the development of the site and building on it will or may affect adjoining areas, as to density of population, facilities for traffic to and through them, and their general amenities.

7. In the lay-out of a large site, it is necessary to consider:—

- (1) What roads are required to improve access to and across the site, and what subsidiary roads for access to new houses.
- (2) What areas should be set apart for open spaces, allotments and sites for shops and other buildings than houses, having regard not only to the new houses proposed to be erected, but also to the conditions on adjoining areas already built on.

Strict economy should be exercised in development work such as road construction, much of which may be carried out in stages as the need arises.

The planning of the roads, and the disposition of the houses thereon, should receive the utmost consideration, as on that the success of the scheme will greatly depend.

8. In all well and economically designed schemes on a large scale for housing, the development or lay-out should provide for:—

- (a) An ample width between the building lines of the houses of at least 70 feet.
- (b) Garden spaces in front of the houses. Such spaces give some privacy in the front rooms on the ground floor which is lost when houses are built on the edge of the footpath.

(c) Wide spaces on main roads between the front garden fences and carriage-way, with moderate widths of footpath-pavement and gravelled or turfed margins in which trees should be planted. On minor roads these spaces may be reduced and the front garden spaces correspondingly increased.

(d) Carriageways of moderate width, from 9 feet without footpaths to 16 feet with footpaths, according to the probable traffic. Cheap light curbing should be used and the channels should be formed of the same material as the rest of the carriageway, unless a steep gradient necessitates a special material to stand the erosion of storm water.

In many cases a number of houses arranged in a crescent or on three sides of a square can be best approached without a carriage-way passing or coming close to each house.

For the carriageway, tarred macadam of moderate depth, or a plain stone macadam surface tarred, is excellent if carefully laid down on suitable bottoming. For footpaths, plain cinders are frequently used in modern schemes, but tarred stone chippings are more satisfactory. Obviously on minor roads lighter construction than on main thoroughfares can be used.

(e) Open spaces of ample size, very simply laid out, so that young people may have room and freedom to play on them. They should be carefully drained, and if the soil is of a retentive character at least a part of the area should be improved by suitable simple treatment to prevent it from becoming muddy in wet weather.

9. All fencing, except on the boundary lines of the site should be of a cheap, open character and elsewhere hedges should be used instead of fences or walls as much as possible. Until the hedges are well grown, they should be protected by two lines of wire on low posts or standards.

Careful attention should be given to the possibilities of preserving with advantage existing trees and hedges. Small areas planted with trees and shrubs add greatly to the appearance of large schemes.

10. An indispensable preliminary to a proper lay-out of any large area, unless it has a nearly plane surface, is the preparation of a plan showing the relative levels thereon by contour lines—that is, by lines joining points on the site which are all at the same level. The convenient vertical distance between such contour lines will usually be from 3 to 5 feet, according to the slope of the ground. The levels should be referred to Ordnance datum. The use of such a plan by a skilled person enables him to minimise the cost of cutting and filling for new streets, the cost of foundations, the cost of laying sewers, and generally to make the best use of the site in an economical manner.

Trial pits should be used in all doubtful cases to ascertain the nature of the ground, as the presence of rock or of a boggy subsoil may greatly affect the value of a site.

GROUPING AND ASPECT OF HOUSES.

11. With respect to the grouping of houses, much depends on the area, shape and aspect of the site. For some important reasons it is desirable to build semi-detached houses, but a saving is secured by building blocks, which should not, however, contain more than eight houses. In large schemes a variety in the size of the blocks is desirable, and the houses in each block may, with advantage, be of different types.

12. A good architectural effect can be most satisfactorily secured, not by expensive ornamental treatment or great variations in the design of the houses, but by grouping them skilfully so as to avoid the monotony of long, unbroken building lines. Corner sites should be treated with special care so that blank gable walls may not be prominent features.



13. The question of access to the rear of the houses presents no difficulty when they are semi-detached, but requires careful consideration when they are built in blocks or ranges. Much depends on the precise way in which the land at the back of the houses is laid out, as that will largely determine the extent to which access to the rear of houses built in blocks of more than two, otherwise than by passing through the houses, should be provided. In some satisfactory modern schemes a considerable area is used for open spaces and allotments lying beyond back gardens of small size. Elsewhere gardens occupy the whole space behind the houses. In the former case it is not necessary that each house should have a separate approach to ground behind it; but when all the space behind is occupied by gardens attached to the houses, it has in some districts been deemed necessary, in deference to the wishes of the tenants, to provide access by covered passages through the blocks. It is now generally agreed that back laneways, especially between walls, are most objectionable, and should be avoided as much as possible.

14. It is most important that the internal plan of each house should be carefully adapted to its site. The living room and principal bedrooms should have the sunniest aspect, and to secure that, in all the houses, different plans should be used for the two sides of a road, or a long-fronted type of house with a through living room lighted at both ends.

NUMBER OF HOUSES TO THE ACRE.

15. In estimating the number of houses per acre, only the area within the fences of the site is to be reckoned. It is desirable also that new roads on the site should be excluded, but on that point some elasticity of practice may be allowed where suitable building ground in a convenient position is hard to obtain.

The average number of houses to the acre should not exceed twelve, and on no single acre should the number exceed twenty. The latter density will only be permissible when, in addition to moderate-sized gardens attached to each house, permanent open spaces for allotments or recreation grounds are provided, within the area which is being dealt with by a scheme, to an extent which will reduce the average density to the lower figure.

It is to be distinctly understood that the numbers of houses per acre above stated are the maximum numbers considered desirable, and it is to be hoped that, having regard to the keen desire for allotments in addition to gardens of moderate size, a number of Town Authorities will frame their schemes so as to provide a larger area of open space attached to and adjacent to the houses, than the maximum numbers referred to would permit.

In all large schemes land should be set aside, unless sufficient provision already exists in the immediate vicinity, for the future erection of shops and public buildings.

HOUSE ACCOMMODATION.

16. The minimum accommodation that should be provided in a new house is a living room, scullery and two bedrooms; but in most of the houses three bedrooms should be provided, and in large schemes a few of the houses may, with advantage, have four bedrooms. In at least 40 per cent. of the houses it is desirable that parlours should be provided.

In determining what accommodation should be provided in new houses, it should be remembered that most of the existing houses are deficient in bedroom accommodation, and that large families are those for which houses are most urgently required.

The types of houses to be erected and the number of each type should be carefully decided as soon as possible, so that their positions on the lay-out plan may be determined.

17. The minimum floor areas which the Board think desirable are:—

	180 sq. feet.	Minimum Floor Area
Living room (in a house without a parlour)
Scullery (if no separate bathroom is provided)
Principal bedroom
Smallest bedroom
Cubicle
Parlour

The height of rooms throughout on the ground floor and the average height of rooms on the upper floor should be eight feet, with a minimum height of seven feet where the ceiling is coved.

18. It is desirable that the plan of a house should be nearly square, but rooms of oblong shape are most advantageous.

A sheltered space at the front windows of the living room is very desirable, and can often be conveniently secured by placing the living room door at a short distance from the front wall.

Economy and other advantages will be secured by planning those parts of the house for which plumbing and drainage are required as nearly as possible together, and by grouping the flues so as to minimise the number of stacks.

Each house must have separate sanitary accommodation.

There is a general opinion that the provision of baths with a hot water supply in all new houses is essential or most desirable, and even if it is not proposed to provide baths at the outset, the plans should show convenient spaces for their future installation.

Return buildings should be avoided as far as possible, and for simplicity and economy there should be no unnecessary breaks in roofs or walls. Most useful protection to walls is given by a moderate projection of the roof at the eaves.

19. It was always of great importance to plan a workingman's house with the utmost care, as even a few feet of cubic space could not be lightly dealt with, but, as the cost of a gross cubic foot of a plain building in many districts at present exceeds a shilling and the corresponding cost of a cubic foot of habitable space more than two shillings, it is evidently much more difficult now than it would have been a few years ago to provide houses sufficiently spacious to be sanitary dwellings for the working classes. Special skill and care are, therefore, essential for the preparation of economical designs well suited to local conditions in each case.

It is most desirable that plans for the new houses should show in position principal articles of furniture.

20. It is necessary to provide suitable storage space for a ton of coal, a small larder ventilated to the open air, and a convenient space for a bicycle or perambulator. Every house ought also to have convenient cupboards, shelving in the scullery, and wooden rails for cup hooks and for hanging pictures. A small lock-up shed for garden tools, etc., is most desirable. Where no such convenience is provided, the tenants often put up makeshift outhouses which are unsightly. Some simple arrangement for putting up a clothes drying line should also be made. It is assumed there will be no storage of ashes or house refuse. If these are burned to the extent which economy dictates, a small covered ash pile kept dry and emptied once a week will be found satisfactory.

21. Beyond the provision of a fireplace in each room, louvered openings of large size close to the ceiling over all bedroom doors, outlet flues built in the chimney-stacks, and deep beads at the bottom of hung sash windows—there is little to suggest in this connection. Some attempts have been made to use spare heat from the kitchen fire to circulate warmed air to other apartments, but hitherto without much success. Ventilating panels in outer walls are practically useless, as they are speedily closed by pasting paper over them, or otherwise. If it is deemed impracticable on account of cost to provide a fireplace—which is the best simple means of ventilation—in the smallest bedroom in a house, it should be a cubicle, that is, a room separated from the larger room or passage by a partition stopping a foot or more below the ceiling.

SIR,

I am directed by the Local Government Board for Ireland to bring under the notice of your Council, as a rating authority, the case recently decided in the King's Bench Division of the High Court, of "County Council of Donegal v. Margaret McCrossan and Elizabeth McCrossan."

The facts are as follow:—A Mrs. Breslin was rated in respect of certain lands, but was not in occupation when the rate was made. The Defendants were in occupation, but were not rated. The question for decision, which came before the Court on a case stated, was whether the Defendants were liable to pay the poor rate for the period during which Mrs. Breslin was rated as the occupier of the lands.

The Court answered the question in the negative and laid it down as clear that in order to have a valid rate where there is an occupier, the occupier upon whom the rate is made must be named, or at least sufficiently described to be capable of identification, and that if this is not done no valid rate has been made.

The Council will see from this decision the absolute necessity of having the occupier either named or so sufficiently described as to be capable of identification. The responsibility for having the names accurately inserted in the Rate Book rests upon the rating authority and their officers. The names set out in the lists of the Commissioner of Valuation are not binding upon either the persons rated or the rating authority, and the latter are empowered by Section 6 of 23 & 24 Vic., c. 4 to make such departure not affecting value, from the particulars contained in the lists, as may be necessary at the time of making the rate, to enable them to make a valid rating, while through their rate collectors who presumably are acquainted with the circumstances of their respective districts, they can and ought to be informed as to the persons then in occupation of the rateable tenements.

The Board consider that the Council would do well to bring the matter specially under the notice of the rate collectors and all officers responsible for the preparation of the Rate Book.

THE TECHNICAL EDUCATION SCHEME 1919-20

Dear Sir,
 I have recently attended several Meetings of the Technical Education Committee. The Members of the Council are, I have no doubt, familiar with the details of the controversy which has been going on between the Committee and the Department. So far as I can judge a deadlock has been arrived at, and, as neither party seems likely to give way, certain consequences are likely to follow the development of which will closely concern the Council. I feel bound as Law Agent to direct the attention of the Council to this matter. In the absence of an agreed Scheme for the year 1919-20 the annual grants from the Department amounting to approximately £3000 will be withdrawn so that the work of Technical Instruction in the County Borough cannot be carried on. In order to curtail their personal liability for salaries to the Staff the Committee will naturally terminate their employment or in the altered conditions the Staff might seek the permission of the Department to resign. In either event the individual members of the Staff who are whole-time officers will have pensionable rights or the right to a gratuity under the Local Govt. Ireland Act 1919 and such pensions would have to be provided by the Council out of the rates and would be tenable for life. The amount of such pensions or gratuities in each case would be fixed by the Local Govt. Board. The maximum pensions would be in each case two-thirds of the then salary, fees, and emoluments and the minimum one-sixtieth of such salary etc. for each year of service. Where the Officer had not served ten years payment of a lump sum would be substituted for a pension and calculated at one year's salary etc for a year of service plus one-fourth of a year's salary for each half-year's service after the two first with a minimum of five years salary. I estimate the minimum amounts which would have to be provided under the foregoing heads at £435 per annum for pensions and a lump sum of £2720 for gratuities to those Officers who have less than ten years service. In this calculation I have not included the Carpenters as Officers but I have included the War Bonus paid to the Officials as part of their salaries since I find that some are paid by the Committee in the first instance and then refunded by Treasury Grants. Another matter which must not be lost sight of is that if the Department Grants were withdrawn the Council would have to find about £500 per annum to pay the principal and interest on the Building Loan. Having regard to the foregoing I think it is my duty to inform the Council that, if they so desire, it is open to them to revoke the powers delegated to the Committee under the Technical Education Acts with a view to taking up with the Department the question of a Scheme for the year 1919-20. This might properly be done by Resolution pursuant to a Notice of Motion handed in at next Council Meeting by any Member who desired to have a decision on the question. In the meantime I would be glad if you would bring the contents of this letter before the Members in Committee and have a paragraph dealing with the consideration of same in the Agenda for next Council Meeting.

With reference to the Minutes of the Proceedings of your Committee at their meetings on the 24th and 30th ultimo, and to the proposals submitted for a Scheme of Technical Instruction for the County Borough of Limerick for the academic year 1919-'20, the Department regret to observe that the Committee have included in the Scheme provision for the appointment of Mr. M. DeLacy as headmaster of the School of Commerce. In their letters of the 21st January, 14th February and 28th August 1918, the Department have fully set out the reasons which prevent their approving of this appointment.

It is observed further that the Committee have included in the Scheme a special grant from the Department "to make up the deficiency due to influenza epidemic, etc." The Department would not in any circumstances be able to make any such special grant as the Technical Institute was not closed on account of the epidemic, nor are they satisfied that the small attendance at classes subsequently to the opening of the Institute in January was due to this cause. They are not prepared to consider an application for a special grant in respect of the loss of grants consequent upon the late opening of the Institute as this was due wholly to the action of the Committee.

The Department will be glad if the Committee will immediately reconsider their Scheme, and submit amended proposals which will have regard to the income available for the year. In this connection, they desire to state that, in the existing financial circumstances of the Committee, they are not prepared to sanction the appointment of further whole-time officers, and, in the case of vacancies that may occur in the whole-time staff, arrangements for the work affected by the vacancy should not be made until after consultation with the Department. The Committee should also carefully consider the numbers in attendance at classes conducted in previous sessions by the part-time staff with a view to the discontinuance of the less successful of these classes.

The Department note that the Committee have decided not to carry out the resolution adopted at their meeting on the 24th ultimo "to give notice to the entire staff terminating their engagements respectively on 1st July, 1919". In view of this decision it is not understood why advertisements have been issued inviting applications for the post of Principal and Organising Secretary to the Committee. In this connection I have to point out that, in the event of any whole-time officer of the Committee (who was in office on 3rd June 1919) being removed from office for any cause other than misconduct or incapacity, he would be entitled, under Section 8 of the Local Government (Ireland) Act, 1919, if he has been ten years in the service of the Committee, to a retiring allowance of not more than two-thirds of his salary at the time of his removal, or a gratuity if he has served for a shorter period. All such superannuation allowances and gratuities would be payable by the local authority out of funds other than those now allocated to Technical Instruction.

Under the Criminal/Act of 1919 Section 80, sub-
section 1, of the Local Government Act, 1898 is made
applicable to the payment and collection of such Decrees,
I call your attention to the fact that the Section
contains the following:-

The Treasurer of the Council shall pay same out of moneys
under his control as such Treasurer, and, if those are
insufficient, out of the first moneys coming under his
control as Treasurer, and such payment may, to the extent
of any such moneys, be enforced against such Treasurer in
like manner as it might be enforced against the Council"

• This section imposes personal obligation on you to
pay in proper case. The Fund applicable to the payment of
Malicious Injury Decrees is the General Purposes Fund. It is
open to the applicants who obtain Decrees against the Council
forthwith take proceedings in the King's Bench Division for
mandamus to compel the Council to make payment to them. This

Dear Sir:- I wish to point out with regard to note at the end of this
 month's finance sheet that when I proposed the increase of a 1d per
 unit I showed that there was a loss on the previous years working, and
 I also stated that the proposed increase would not clear the deficit
 of last year, which was due to the fact that we were selling current
 at a low rate, and in some cases considerably lower than very large
 undertakings who could buy coal vastly cheaper than us.

At the last meeting of the Electric Lighting Committee, I
 reported on the necessity of further increasing the charge, but
 suggested that as the Government were certainly taking over all
 electric works that the matter would be left in abeyance for a short
 time.

I am of opinion in view of the increased cost of coal of
 which only the worst qualities will be barely obtainable in this
 country, and the fact that every other commodity except fuel oil is
 also soaring in prices, instead of falling as was hoped, and also
 taking into account that our bank deficit will further increase
 during the summer months, steps should be taken to increase the price
 to clear last year's deficit.

I may mention that up to March of this year the increase in
 our rates was from pre war times only 33%, whilst coal, wages, fuel oil
 and materials had gone up from 100 to 400%. Our present rate is only
 10% above pre war rate, whilst coal etc., with the exception of fuel
 oil have further increased.

A vast number of Electricity Undertakings have increased
 their charge by 80%, and in one case of an Electricity Concern close
 to coal fields in England, with an output four times as large as ours,
 they found it necessary to increase their price to 1/- per unit in
 order to avoid getting into debt.

At the next meeting of the Electric Lighting Committee the

on behalf of the County Borough Council of Limerick (in reply to the letter received from the Local Government Board for Ireland by the Town Clerk dated the 1st October, 1919, ref No. 51,419:1919) setting forth the reasons why in the opinion of the Council the ex-members of the Staff of the Technical Instruction Committee for the said County Borough are not entitled to either pension or gratuity under Sec. 8 of the Local Government (Ireland) Act 1919.

Prior to the passing of the Local Government (Ireland) Act 1919 the Technical Instruction Committee for County Borough of Limerick were entitled without any cause or without assigning any reason thereof to dismiss any member of their Staff by a legal notice; and an Officer so dismissed had no right to pension. The right to pension or gratuity under said Act depends primarily on the holding of a pensionable office on the 3rd of June 1919, the date of the passing of the Act. Section 8 of the Act is not retrospective in effect and applies only to the case of an Officer who is removed from his office after the 3rd June, 1919. It is respectfully submitted that Mr. Comerton is not legally entitled to pension or gratuity under the Act because he was removed from his office by a legal notice served on him on the 12th November, 1919, a copy of this notice is furnished herewith. This is a purely legal point and it is expected that the Board will obtain the opinion of senior Counsel thereon. In the event of the Board determining said point in Mr. Comerton's favour the County Borough Council, being credibly informed that the Technical Instruction Committee had good cause within the meaning of the Act for dismissing Mr. Comerton at the time of the service of the said notice, will demand a sworn inquiry to be conducted by the Local Government Board into that question as a preliminary to the determination of the right of Mr. Comerton to a pension under the Act of 1919.

It should be noted that at one time Mr. Comerton took up the attitude that the Committee had waived the notice of 12th November, 1918, but the Correspondence (copies herewith) shows that he has abandoned this contention, (a) copy letter of 29th July 1919, John J. The Accounts of the Committee were separately Audited by the Local Government Board. Since the year 1896 the Council has annually raised and levied a rate of 1d in the £ in the County Borough in aid of Technical Instruction. This rate has been so raised and levied in pursuance of the power in that behalf contained in Section 1 of the Act of 1889. The Council has never exercised the power to levy an additional rate in aid under Section 19, S.S. 3 of the Technical Instruction Act 1899. The Act of 1899 applies to Ireland only (vide Sec.31) and does not contain any provision either that same shall be construed as one with the Technical Instruction Acts 1889 to 1892 or that the Council may delegate all or any of their power thereunder to a Committee. After the passing of the Act of 1899 the Limerick Committee carried on their work by means of Schemes annually approved of by the Department established by that Act in order to obtain the Grants-in-aid the administration of which was thereby entrusted to the Department. The power of the Department to control the work of the Committee is not absolute and is merely negatively established by Sec.16 of the Act of 1899 which provides that grants-in-aid are to be applied for the purposes of schemes approved by the Department and subject to any conditions which the Department may require. Where no grants-in-aid of Technical Instruction provided by the Act of 1899 is used by the Committee in a County Borough the Department created by that Act has no control or jurisdiction over the operations of such Committee. The Committee were advised by Mr.S.L.Brown, K.C., in the year 1918 that the tenure of Office of the members of the whole-time staff did not depend on the existence of a Scheme approved of by the Department under the Act of 1899, and that, in the absence of such a Scheme, and so far as the necessary funds were not otherwise available for the purpose, the Committee were individually responsible for the payment of the Salaries of their Staff. It is submitted that the following propositions may be deduced from the foregoing:-

- (a) That the Technical Instruction Committee appointed by the County Borough Council on the 6th February, 1919, for the period of one year was a Committee for the purpose of the Act of 1889, and had all the powers of the Council under Sec.1 of said Act.
- (b) That the Officers of said Committee were Officers of the Committee appointed for the purposes of the Act of ~~1889~~ 1889, and ceased to be Officers of a Committee appointed for the purposes of the Act of 1899, when the Committee ceased to work under a Scheme approved by the Department,
- (c) That the power vested in the Department under Sub-Sec.3 of Section 8 of the Act of 1919, to sanction the resignation of an Officer of a Technical Instruction Committee is limited to the case of an Officer actually employed at the time under a Scheme approved by the Department.

Owing to the refusal of the Department to sanction the appointment of an Officer elected by the Committee the relations between the Committee and the Department terminated on the 31st July, 1918, when the working of the last Scheme approved by the Department came to an end.

The Committee then made arrangements to continue the work of Technical Instruction in the County Borough for the year 1919-20 and succeeded in obtaining sufficient moneys to enable them to carry on the work on the same scale as in previous years, and to supply the place of all the grants-in-aid under the Act of 1899, which the Department had withdrawn. No change was contemplated by the Committee in the salary or other conditions of employment of the then existing members of the Committee's Staff by which the position of any member of said Staff could be said to be materially altered to his or her detriment. It is respectfully submitted that the mere absence of a Scheme approved by the Department under the Act of 1899 was of no material consequence whatsoever to the then existing Staff in view of the Committee's powers under the Act of 1899 (eighty-nine), and the liability of the Committee for the salaries of their Officers which continued a personal liability so far as funds were not otherwise available to meet same. It would seem however that certain members of the then Staff, whose position is now being dealt with contended that their right to pension under the Act of 1919 was adversely affected by the absence of a Scheme approved by the Department. Again it is respectfully submitted that there was absolutely no foundation in law for this argument which appears to have been made the ground of their application to the Department for liberty to resign their positions under Sub-Sections 2 & 3 of Sec. 8 of the Act of 1919. Assuming that one of the Officers concerned had continued to discharge his duties under the Committee up to the present time and now resigned his Office because he had become incapable of discharging the duties of same by reason of permanent infirmity of mind or body, surely his right to pension or gratuity under Sec. 8 of the Act of 1919 is absolute and quite unaffected by the consideration that he had not been working under a Scheme approved by the Department after the 31st July 1919; because it could not be argued that he had ceased to be an Officer of the Committee in the interval between said last mentioned date and the date of his resignation. The only difference would be that the sanction of the Local Government Board and not that of the Department would be required to his resignation.

In the ordinary course the several members of the Committee's Staff attended at the Technical Institute at the end of August or beginning of September, 1919, to make arrangements for the resumption of their duties after the holiday month of August. Mr. Frank McNamara ex-Assistant Secretary and Mr. Sciascia, ex-Clerk, had attended in the discharge of their respective duties practically continuously during the month of August. Prior to a meeting of the Committee which was held on the 5th September, 1919, some of the then Staff had an informal interview with an acting sub-Committee at which they first outlined their objections to resume their duties. At this meeting they were definitely informed that no change whatsoever was contemplated in their respective duties or the salaries or conditions attached to their employment. At the meeting of the Committee held on the 5th September, 1919, a document was read by Mr. Frank McNamara on behalf of the signatories thereto. A copy of this document marked "A" bearing same date is sent herewith. The Committee then took no action in the matter but adjourned consideration of same to a further Meeting on the 8th September, 1919, when the document dated 6th Sept. 1919, a copy of which marked "B" is sent herewith was received and re

A copy of the Minutes of the Committee Meeting of 8th September and Sub-Committee ~~Committee~~ Meeting of 11th September, 1919 marked "C" are herewith sent. Each member of the staff concerned personally received an intimation of the order of the Committee directing his or her resumption of duty at a specified ^{hour} on the 9th September, 1919. No member of the ex-staff concerned in this matter did in fact attend in answer to this summons either on the 9th September 1919 or on any subsequent date. It is submitted that in these circumstances the Staff concerned accomplished their own dismissal on the 9th September, 1919 by refusing, after notice to take up their several duties at the order of the Committee and that the grounds of their refusal were inadequate to justify their action as they were mistaken in the view that their right to pension under the Act of 1919 was in any way affected by the absence of a Scheme approved by the Department under the Act of 1899. It was not until the 15th September, 1919 that they obtained the permission of the Department to resign their positions and therefore nearly a week after they had disobeyed the order of the Committee to perform their duties. All the members of the Committee's staff were by Order of Committee made at the meeting of 8th September, 1919 paid their salaries for the month of August, 1919. It should also be noted that the Department proceeded to exercise the power to sanction the resignation of the ex-staff, which it has been hereinbefore submitted did not lie with them in the circumstances, on the ex parte statement of the individuals concerned and without any notification to or consultation with the County Borough Council in the matter. All the foregoing arguments apply to the case of Miss Murphy except that she never reported for duty after the holidays this year or even returned to Limerick for the purpose and probably obtained another appointment at the time the Department sanctioned her resignation of her office under the Committee which was at a later date than 15th September, 1919. Moreover it is submitted that the Local Government Act of 1919, Section 8 cannot be held to govern the case of either Mr. Sciascia or Mrs. Mary Halpin. Mr. Sciascia was first employed as a Caretaker about the year 1903. Later he was assigned the further duty of Laboratory Attendant and later still he was employed as a Clerk in the Secretary's Office which last mentioned duty he performed up to September last. He was in receipt of a weekly wage for his services. Mrs. Mary Halpin was also in receipt of a weekly wage as Charwoman at the Technical Institute and while so employed by the Committee she performed similar duty for the County Borough Council at the Offices of the Electricity Works for which she was paid a separate weekly wage by the Electricity Committee. She was clearly not "a whole-time officer."

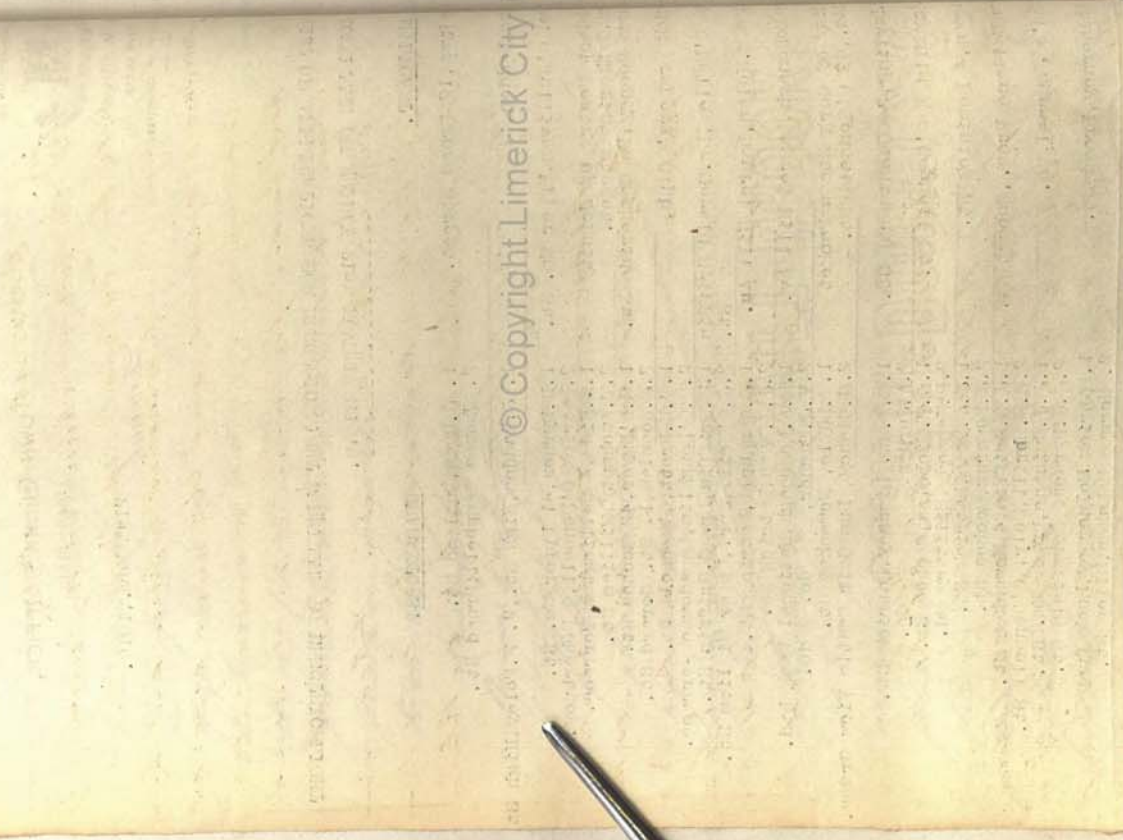

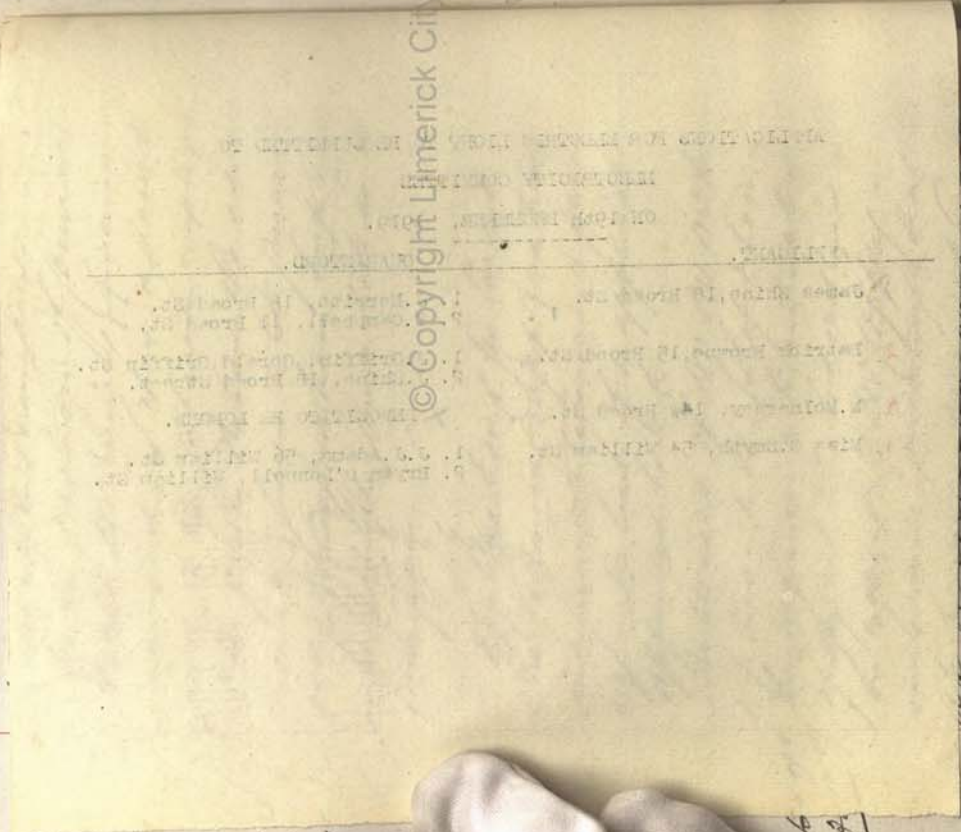

Item 133 - Public Engineering - The City Engineer stated that this item be increased so as to provide for the employment of permanent if there is a wish, as it was necessary to have a permanent man employed in order to keep the clean, as ordered by the Committee previously. Some of the members suggested a permanent man unnecessary, and suggested we make that the Secretary Official should

the member was that they would be best dealt with by their own Committee - The Electricity Committee - as they were in a better position to judge from their work the increase of salary they would be entitled to. It was accordingly agreed to leave this case to the Electric Light Committee.

The Mayor submitted a letter he had received from Mr. Donnellan, Secretary Electric Committee, asking that he be acquainted with the other persons (Class) and any increase granted to the others should apply to him - At the request of the Mayor the Secretary read Council Minute dealing with Mr. Donnellan's case and the Mayor's.

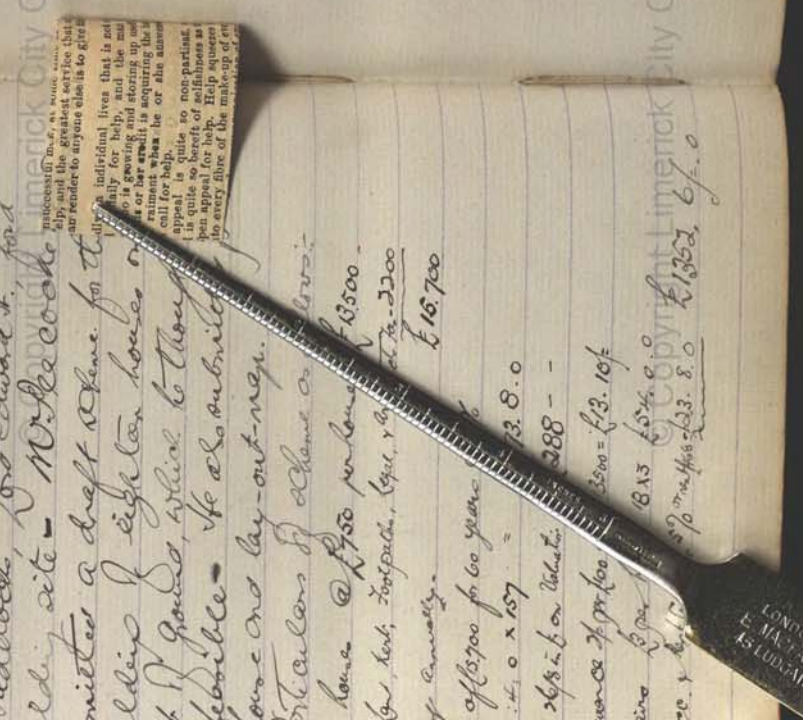

Irish Housing Problem.

GENTLEMEN,

As you are aware I have strenuously advocated (1) The fixing of the State Subsidy on the Capital Expenditure; and (2) The application of preferential terms in regard to the re-housing on virgin sites of the occupants of hovels condemned as "unfit for human habitation." Accordingly I have put forward a Proposal on these lines to the Chief Secretary, through the Special Housing Committee of the Association of Municipal Authorities, on the 18th inst., and at the Clonmel Inquiry on 20th inst. My Proposal provides for the payment of Subsidy at the rate of 5% per cent. on Capital Expenditure in ordinary cases, and 6 per cent. in respect of slum dwellers. On a Capital Expenditure in all of 50 millions, of which 90 millions are taken on the 6 per cent. basis, the yearly State Subsidy under the Proposal would amount to £2,775,000.

The existing Subsidy Regulation provides for payment of 27s. 6d. in exceptional cases, for each £1 of rent collected. It is conceded that under existing conditions, the 27s. 6d. rate is of all round application. The Subsidy regulation, although having an adverse result in practice, was intended to give effect to Mr. McPherson's promise, made in February, 1919, "that the Government would provide the deficit between the economic rent and the "reasonable" rent which the tenant could pay." The economic rent covers, loans, Management; Vacancies, etc. 8 per cent to cover all those charges, is regarded as a moderate estimate; and from the tenant works out at £2,815,833 6s. 8d. per year. In other words the Subsidy anomaly whereby the land pressed areas are handicapped can be removed and in addition the needed relief given to those areas by the addition of £459,166 13s. 4d. per year to the amount to which the Government Subsidy is now committed. If the "economic" rent is taken on the basis of 8 1/2 per cent, the maximum Government Subsidy attainable (say £1,154,381 out of the total charge of £82 10s. on a house costing £1,000) amounts to £2,388,142. On this calculation an addition of £386,875 per year to the present commitments of the State, will meet the situation.

The merits of Proposal now outlined are obvious. For instance under existing Regulation the Government Subsidy on a rent of 5s. per week amounts to only £17 17s. 6d. per year. The re-housing of a slum dweller will cost at least £700 or a yearly charge on the lower scale of £96. The rent and subsidy total £30 17s. 6d. leaving a deficit of £29 2s. 6d. per house to be met by the rates. The adoption of my Proposal would leave the tenant rent for a £100 house—to replace a hovel—£14 per year. If only 5s. per week can be got from tenant, the loss of £1 per house per year will be willingly born by the ratepayers. At Clonmel Inquiry it was shown that allowing for a rent of 11s. 6d. per week there will be a loss of £9 per year to the rates in respect of such house costing £1,000. Where this class of house can be afforded, the relief of 3 1/2 per cent. in the shape of Subsidy would prevent any loss to the local rates. In this case the yearly (approx) charge of £40, per house, costing £1,000, can be met by a rent of 11s. 6d. per week. The question as to proportion of a worker's wages to be ear-marked for rent requires careful consideration, and the expenses displayed by the workers for better housing—a very welcome feature—should not lead to a too hasty calculation in this respect.

I have carefully examined this aspect of the problem, and I am convinced that the occupiers of the restricted hovels in our town, who, in the main, are casual workers, cannot pay more than 8s. per week for a new house and plot of land. The better placed worker, under my Proposal, will for a house costing £700 have to pay a weekly rent of 7s. 6d. The Proposal is subject to variation in so far as the existing rate of loan repayment (£5 4s. 0d. per cent. Annuity for 60 years may increase or decrease.

Since the Irish Urban Housing Acts started in 1866 only 10,000 houses have been erected. 50,000 new houses will meet our demands. England and Wales require 800,000; Scotland 250,000. The Irish Housing Problem is a comparatively small affair, and its solution should not be further delayed.

Messrs. Russell & Sabreby, Messrs. Financial Position

Mr Worship, the Mayor, made a long statement in regard to, and commented strongly on, the financial position of the City Council.

The Capital Expenditure amounted to £123,000 of which £6,153 had been paid off. Having £16,846 outstanding for this he added the amount paid by the City Rates to finance or recoup deficits from year to year for the inception of the last thing up to 1914, as per Finance Book £3,890 - making £20,737 of an indebtedness which together with all outstanding at the end of the present time, and outstanding at (altogether amounting to about £6000) showed a very interesting state of affairs. Of course he pointed out that the Stock at the Station should be taken into account and suggested a small Committee should visit the Station and go into that with a view to a valuation being placed on same.

Coming out of last Minute Mr Northcote said he had not yet gone into the Disputed Gasworks Ag. referred to him then, but would do so before next meeting.

The second meeting of this committee was held in the Mayor's Office, Town Hall, Limerick on Thursday evening the 28th May of April 1901 at 5.30 o'clock pm. Abraham James Gray Esq. Mayor, in the Chair.

Item 19: The Collector's Department - The committee ordered it to be noted that

although the collector had increased from £15,000 in 1900 to £17,000 in 1901-02 the net collector (Mr. Gurnee) was still receiving a Commission of 6% in the pound on said collector.

The committee considered the Collector of the Rates to be done much cheaper and for the information of the committee the Secretary at the suggestion of Mr. Matt. Duffin was ordered to look up some particulars in regard to the levying off of the Rates collector etc. which took place during the office of the old Corporation.

Item 20 - Mr. Gurnee's Salary £400 - The committee was of opinion that this salary should be the legal business of all the Department of the Corporation (including Technical School and Athenaeum - ~~from~~ which it was stated he at present receives a separate salary) and they ordered it to be noted that his duties have now been very much lightened owing to the Corporation not bringing people before the District Court.

Cooperation Conciliation Board

The first meeting of this Board was held in the Mayor's Office, Town Hall, Limerick, on Thursday forenoon, the 11th day of April, 1931, at 11.30 a.m.

The Board was formed some time in October 1930 (No. 249 of Improvement Committee Minute Book) and completed by Council on 7th April, 1931. The members appointed on behalf of the Council were the Mayor, Councillor The Duke and the Commissioner.

Appointed on behalf of the employees - Mr. H. Donnellan on behalf of the Officers - Mr. Affrey on behalf of the Corp. Employees Society and Mr. P. Reilly on behalf of the Transport Workers Union.

The three representatives of the officials & employees were present at the meeting together with the Gen. Secy. Mayor (Mr. Coy) Councillors Matt. Griffin and Mr. O'Hagan (as the other members were unable to attend) - Councillor Donnellan turned in after the meeting had started.

The Asst. Town Clerk acted as Secretary.

Mr. J. Mayor explained that the first business of the Board was to appoint an independent Chairman.

After discussing the matter it was agreed by both sides to ask the Rev. J. Hill of the Dominican Order to act as Chairman or failing him the Rev. J. Moloney of St. Mary's Church, and the Rev. J. Mayo was deputed to interview both these Clergymen.

The Board went formally into the application of the Corporation Employees Society for an increase of 10% (2s. 6d.) per week in wages - and brought in a resolution which is referred to them by the Improvement Committee of 26/4/31 (No. 248 of Minutes of said Committee) -

The Representative of the Employees Society, after matters had been explained to him, agreed to withdraw the application for annual holidays, as one week had already been granted by the Council.

The Secretary was instructed to draw up a statement showing the wages &c of the men affected by the application and circulate it to the members for next meeting which was arranged for Friday the 6th day of May, subject to the Chairman's being let us up in the meantime.

The Board then adjourned.

Depot and Sarsaryan Depot and 2 labourers at England Depot - The Committee considered that the cost herein (1904) was too high and should be reduced by about 7500. The Secretary was instructed to draw a statement as to what portion the nine able employees in question would be entitled to under the scale laid down for the night foremen.

Arising out of Items 115-124 - A discussion took place in regard to use of horse drawn vehicles & purchase of horses and also the cost and quality of harness supplies.

The price being paid for horses by the City Council was considered too high, and as it was mentioned that a report on the introduction

Mr. Caffrey then put forward the Claim of his locality (The Corporation Employees) for an increase of wages of 20 shillings per week for the following employees, viz: Cartmen, Sweepers, Corporation Surveyors, Depotmen, Watermen (Carriers), Quaysmen and Labourers.

He stated the reason for putting in such an application was the high cost of living and the fact that the Corporation Employees were not paid the Standard Rate of pay as given by the City Charter and by law generally to their employees.

The Corporation representatives referred

the suggestion that the cost of living had gone up since the last time, it was granted to the new leaseholders and they further pointed out that employees by the Corporation were permanent whereas most of the employment offered by the Merchant and Employers was only casual work, which invariably has to be paid for at a higher rate of wages.

A long discussion took place herein, during which the different rate of wages given to Corporation employees, and City labourers generally were brought in to the Rev. Chairman.

At the Workshop, the Mayor, stating the amount of contribution - He looked in the month of April, 1901, and in April, 1902, for comparison. He found, he said, it was not in a financial position to pay the increase, if granted, and the only alternative left them was to reduce the staff according to the amount of the increase so as to provide funds to meet same.

The decision of the Board lasted about an hour and the final decision was left to the Rev. Chairman. Mr. Coffey undertook to lay the case out forward by his Workshop before

his Society, he was employing some of the staff as to pay any increase of wages that might be granted, with a view to getting them to withdraw their application, and he promised to notify the Board accordingly.

The meeting was called together to consider the attached draft Report of Recommendations made at previous meetings. The following is a result of the proceedings:-

Item 3. discussed - The Schedule showing pensions and salaries proposed to be granted to the Water Works Staff was also submitted. It was definitely decided that the first six cases (Messrs. Faby, Mason, Colley, O'Brien, O'Flynn, and O'Connell) should be dealt with first.

COUNTY BRANCH COUNCIL OF LIMERICK.

MEMORANDUM COMMITTEE.

Meetings of the above Committee were held on the 18th & 28th April and 3rd, 9th, & 20th May, 1921. The following is a summary of the business transacted and recommendations made, viz:-
The Estimate Sheet of Receipts and Expenditure, as circulated for the Estimates Committee at its meeting in April last, was taken up and each item gone through.

- A. Item 1. Public Lighting by gas was discussed. A sub-Committee was appointed to go into the whole matter.
- B. Items 3-16. WATER SUPPLY. The Committee recommend disbanding the Night Watch on pension or retainer at the following scale:- one-third of their present pay plus one-sixtieth of the balance for each year of service. This would apply to all with 10 years service or over. The attached Schedule shows the amount each man would be entitled to. It was decided that the first six cases (Messrs. Faby, Mason, Colley, Russell, Ahern and Inspector McNamara) would be treated as pensioners - the balance (17) would be treated only as retainers, so that the services of these men could be called in at any time at the discretion of the Council - it being understood that the men not in permanent employment should be recalled, when necessary, first. In the cases of Messrs Conway, Boland, Hayes and Maher, who had under 10 years service, it was decided to pay them the retainer for three years only, instead of giving them a gratuity as defined by the Superannuation Acts. It was further decided to pay the retainers and pensions weekly.
- C. Items 17-32. FUEL AND OIL. It was recommended that the coal supply to this establishment should be reduced to 6 tons per annum, and oaks to 1 1/2 tons as from 1st May. Item 26 - Telephone £20. It was recommended that the official number authorised by the Captain and that any outside people using the phone should pay a call fee of 2d.
- D. Item 42. PRINTING, STATIONERY, &c. It was recommended that tenders should be got for all printing and stationery required for one year. The Contractors to state what bulk sum they would be prepared to do the work for and also quote per item, and it could be afterwards decided whether the bulk sum or the lowest item in each case would be the most advantageous.
- E. ITEMS 43-52. SALARIES. Having gone very carefully through all items under this head the Committee made the following observations:- Item 45 - They considered the City Treasurer's office overstuffed and recommended that the Treasurer should be made run his Department at a sum of £1,000 per annum at most. Items 46, 47, 48 - They also considered the City Surveyor's Office overstuffed and recommended that Mr. Keacock should be made run his Department at a sum of £900 per annum at most. Item 49 - Rate Collector's pay - The Committee ordered it to be noted, that, although the collection had increased from £35,000 in 1914-15 to £75,000 in 1921-22 the Rate Collector (Mr. C. Donnell) was still receiving a commission of 6d in the pound on said increased collection. They consider the rates could be collected much cheaper. It was recommended that the Collectors be offered a reduced commission of fourpence in £. (see further minute below in reference to Water Rates and Rents).

Item 50. It was recommended that the Law Agent's salary be reduced to the original figure at which he was appointed, £300 per annum, owing to reduction of work- he having no Courts to attend to now on behalf of the Corporation.

HIGH CONSTABLE'S SALARY. The Committee recommended that the salary provided on Estimate Sheet should be held to cover all duties imposed on Mr. Forrest including Weights & Measures, Bakery, Shop Hours, and Hackney Cars Inspection, and duty of High Constable.

Item 56. TOWN HALL STOKER- The Committee recommended striking out £6, wages of stoker, and ordered Mr. Feacocks to get the work done by one of his employees.

Item 58. The coal supply to the Town Hall was recommended to be reduced to twelve tons per annum and the matter of installing gas fires, with a view to economy, was postponed for the present.

Item 59. RENT OF TELEPHONE. It was recommended that the officials be requested to restrict the number of Telephone Calls as much as possible now that the change has been fixed per call.

Item 60. OCCUPATION TAX. The Committee recommended that the officials be requested to restrict the number of Telephone Calls as much as possible now that the change has been fixed per call.

Item 61. REPAIRS TO SHEDS, BARN, & C. It was recommended that the item £130 be reduced to £100.

Item 62. THE PEOPLE'S PARK. The Committee considered this Park considerably overstaffed, the wage bill nearly amounting to £12 weekly. It was decided to ask the Park Sub-Committee to go into the whole question of the Park and make a recommendation with a view to reducing expenditure on same. The coal supply to Gardener for use in Greenhouse and to Asst. Gardener for own use was ordered to be reduced by one ton each per annum. It was recommended that the supply of clothes and boots to the Head Gardener and Under Gardener be cut off.

Item 81. It was recommended that item Sundries £50 be reduced to £25. In regard to item Stamps £50, the officials were recommended to use as little postage as possible and to utilise the services of the Mayor's Staff for hand delivery.

Items 112 & 114. EX-SWEEPERS AT JARR ST. DEPT AND GARDENING DEPT. The Committee recommended the pensioning off of these seven old men and the amount of the pension should be such as would allow them to draw the maximum Old Age Pension. (This pension would be about £26 per annum).

Item 115 - 124. A discussion took place in regard to the use of horse drawn vehicles and purchase of horses and also the cost and quality of harnesses supplied. The price being paid by the City Surveyor for horses was considered too high. In regard to supply of harness it was recommended that a small Committee should be appointed to visit the Depot occasionally and inspect same, as well as other supplies, and the Depot generally. The Committee to arrange meetings amongst themselves.

Items 138-142. ARTIZANS' DWELLINGS. The Committee expressed dissatisfaction at the loss annually incurred on the letting of the Cottages, and recommended that the rents to be charged should at least bring in a sum equivalent to the annual expenditure. (Repayment of Loans, Rates, etc).

Items 43-53 above- it was further recommended that vacancies occurring in the Departments referred to be not filled, and should vacancies occur in other Departments where it is found necessary to fill same, the surplus staff in above Departments should be transferred to them.

In regard to

The Estimate of the Water Rate was next taken up. It was decided to request the Water Works Committee to go into the Estimate Sheet and find out whether it was necessary for the efficient working of the Clareville Works to have an Engineer, two nightmen and 3 labourers employed there. The Retrenchment Committee were of opinion that less hands could work the place.

Salary of Secretary of Water Committee. It was considered that this official had not sufficient work to perform so as to cover his whole time and it was recommended that Mr. Donnellan be made responsible for the collection of Water Rates and Rents without additional remuneration and thus save the Commission (about £244) at present being paid to the Rate Collector.

The Poor Rate Estimate sheet was next taken up. The item £440, Irish Education Acts, salaries of School Inspectors, was discussed. It was recommended (subject to opinion of the School Attendance Committee) that the services of the two Inspectors be dispensed with, or as an alternative that their salaries be reduced and they be given the option of taking on other work in conjunction with the inspection of Schools, as it was maintained they were not whole-time officers. Before making this decision definite the Retrenchment Committee decided to lay the facts before the School Attendance Committee to find out whether these positions are necessary, if School Attendance has achieved any better results through their influence and whether it is the opinion of School Managers in the City that the number of children attending Schools have increased considerably since 1904, when the S.A. Act came into operation in Limerick.

The Borough Rate Estimate was next discussed. The Committee declined to take any action on the suggestion of His Worship, Alderman C'lara, Mayor, that the salary attaching to the Office of Mayor should be reduced.

It was recommended that the positions of Mayor's Sergeants should be left die out by not filling vacancies as they occur. Arising out of Borough Rate Estimate the Committee ordered it to be noted that the extra penny struck by the Council to meet Free Library expenditure for this year, would only apply to this year, and should not be struck again next year.

In cases where the Committee recommended dispensing with employees on pension, it was decided that it would be a condition attaching to payment of the pension or retainer, that if the Corporation required their services again they would have first claim on such employment.

I return enclosure in yours of the 24th inst.

I have more than once advised that it is illegal to cut off the water supply to any premises except where Water Rate is due, and due notice is given before cutting off the supply to enforce payment of same. This means that a supply to a particular premises can only be cut off to enforce the payment of the Water Rate due out of such premises, and if the water rate is paid the supply must be restored, even though other rates are due out of the same premises.

Under the circumstances mentioned in your letter Dr. Pearse would appear to have a right of action against the Corporation.

Special Electricity Committee

Mr Grant, Acting E.E., has handed me large file of correspondence herein, and has asked me to report on this matter for the information of the Electric Lighting Committee.

To advise fully on this matter would necessitate technical knowledge of Electric machinery, which I do not possess, but from the list of documents before me I have extracted the following information which may be of guidance to the Committee in coming to a decision.

- 1) The Company agreed for a quarterly payment of £34.6.3d to maintain the elements of the battery in good condition for the period of ten years from the 1st April, 1914, in such manner that the battery should have the same capacity at the end of the ten years as when it was first installed. This maintenance fee was to cover all travelling expenses for periodical inspections by the Company, and the costs of any acid required to make up for acid lost when cleaning or renewing plates. The Company was to pay carriage on all new material, and old material was to be the property of the Company.
- 2) The main expenditure of the Company apart from the expenses connected with periodical inspection would be in the supply of new lead plates for the battery, and according to their estimate for a maintenance contract pre war was based on the current market price of lead, which was calculated not to exceed £15 per ton.
- 3) During the war from about the year 1918 lead was controlled by the Government. The control price for the raw material became £40 per ton. The raw material became scarce and it was very difficult to obtain supplies owing to Government control following the main

In addition to the advance in the price of raw material, the cost of the manufacture of lead plates was, of course, greatly increased, and also the cost of delivery of the manufactured article. For these reasons there is no doubt that the Company would have been entitled to go to the Courts to obtain relief from the form of the alterations of the terms of this pre war maintenance contract. Instead of doing this they made a proposition to the Borough Electrical Engineer on the 15th October, 1918, that the maintenance premium be increased by five per cent of the premium for every pound by which the average price of lead exceeded £18 per ton. At that time the price of lead was £30 per ton being an excess of £12 per ton over the main price of £18 per ton. Five per cent for each pound of this £12 increase meant a total increase on the original maintenance charge of 60%, so that the quarterly payment became £54.18.0d instead of £34.3.3d. After some demur and apparently following a personal interview between Mr Thornhill and the Managing Director of this Company, of which there is no record, the Corporation voluntarily agreed to this change in the contract, and later when the price of lead advanced to £40 per ton, being an increase of £22 over the basic price of £18 per ton, the maintenance charge was increased automatically to £22 by 25 or 110 per cent, and apparently on this basis the charge is now paid.

- 4) I learn from inquiry locally that the present market price of lead is £42 per ton and that same is expected to advance to £45 per ton within the next few days, so that this particular commodity has not declined in price on the removal of government control.
- 5) It would appear from the correspondence that the Company did not send a Representative to do maintenance work on the battery in the years 1917-18-19 or 20. During these years they supplied lead plate for the maintenance which were put in by the Assistants at the Power house. All old plates were returned to them from time to time, and on these consignments the Corporation paid carriage.
- 6) Under the Agreement the Corporation were bound to supply certain fortnightly records to the Company of the working of the battery. This obligation does not seem to have been observed, but the Company have not made any objection with regard to this neglect, and it has occurred to me that the observance of this clause may to a certain

No doubt the Company realises this very well, and faced with a demand that they should send a representative over to inspect with a view to making the necessary arrangements to bring the battery up to full capacity, they now put forward a proposition with regard to future payment for maintenance. The proposition is that the original maintenance fee be paid plus the increased cost of labour and material over the pre war cost. So far as I can see the only way to test the comparative amount involved for the Corporation between paying the original maintenance fee plus 110 per cent and accepting the proposition now made by the Company, is to get an estimate of the probable expenditure involved in putting the battery into its original condition.

I believe it will be found that it would be much better for the Corporation to pay the original maintenance fee plus 110 per cent until the expiration of the contract than to accept the proposition now made, and if on consideration this view is found to be substantially correct, I think the best course of action to take is to notify the Company that the Corporation are not prepared to consider any revision or alteration of the original maintenance fee plus the voluntary increase paid thereon by the Corporation owing to war conditions, until the Company send their representative over to put the battery into good condition and restore same to its original capacity.

LAW AGENT'S REPORT RE MAINTENANCE CONTRACT
 FOR BATTERY AT ELECTRICITY WORKS WITH THE
 PREMIER ACCUMULATOR COMPANY.

Dear Sir,

I have had considerable correspondence with the Premier Company herein which can conveniently be subdivided under two heads. (a) With regard to arrears of maintenance fees I am satisfied that there are three quarters payments due to the Company for £34.3.3. each, September and December 1916 and September 1918. I enclose correspondence from the Company herein with invoices. The total amount payable is £102.9.9. Cr's against this I think the Council should claim a set off against the Company of the carriage paid on old lead plates and other materials despatched to the Company from time to time. I have asked Mr. Grant for detailed particulars but so far he has not given me same but mentioned that some 14 tons of lead plates were sent per Limerick S.S. Company at an approximate cost of £4 per ton. If he supplies an accurate account a paying Order should be issued to the Company for £102.9.9. less amount of a/c for carriage on lead plates and sent me with vouchers for the carriage a/c so that the matter may be settled at once. Please return all correspondence.

(b) With regard to the Contract question, I enclose correspondence with the Company including their letter of the 23rd inst. I have found the Company rather slippery as correspondents. The Corporation's case is no doubt weakened by the failure to supply return records of the working of the Battery in accordance with the terms of the Agreement. My answer to this objection has been that the contract terms are independent of this at the time and that the Company were negligent about giving attention to the Battery and did practically no maintenance or supervision work for years thereby allowing the capacity of the Battery to run down they themselves rendered such records as unnecessary. Now the point at issue is that the Battery is now in a very bad condition. The Company realize this and know that large expenditure will be required to make same good. Hence their attempt to get the Corporation to agree to pay the increased cost of maintenance fee of £34.3.3. quarterly plus the increased cost of labour and materials over 1914. My attitude has been that the Council will not consider the question of revising the terms of the maintenance fees payable until the Battery is put in proper condition by the Company. You will see by the Company's letter of the 23rd June 1921 that they now offer to put the Battery in good working order if we agree to pay £64.18.2 quarterly until that is done and thereafter undertake to pay promptly the original quarterly fee of £34.3.3. plus increased cost of labour and materials over 1914 in respect of any future maintenance work done or material supplied. I am inclined to think that this offer should be accepted provided the Battery is put into good working order within a reasonable time and I now request immediate instructions of the Committee in the matter. The B.E.B. should be able to say within what time the Battery should be put in order and whether the same can be brought up to its original capacity and whether we should stipulate for this. You will note that the Council agreed heretofore to increase the maintenance fee by 5% for each £1 by





I would be obliged if you would place the following letter
 before the Whole House Committee as a preliminary to their considera-

I respectfully submit that this proposal should not be
 adopted for the following reasons:-

1) The ground upon which the recommendation is based is that I have
 not been doing any Court work for the Corporation. This is not strictly
 accurate. Owing to circumstances over which I have no control it is
 true that the normal Court work has been interrupted, but I have many
 times during the past twelve months appeared before various Courts for
 the Corporation, particularly so on recent dates, and under conditions
 peculiarly inconvenient to me, and not unattended by certain risks
 upon which it is unnecessary to dwell. Furthermore, I would point out
 that the interruption of Court work which has taken place only means that
 arrears of same are accumulating, and will have to be ultimately dealt
 with by me. I would be in a far happier position now if the normal
 working of my Department had never been interfered with.

2) My pre-war salary of £300 has only been increased by thirty three
 and one-third per cent while every private person pays his Solicitor
 50% over pre-war costs since the 1st January, 1919.

3) I submit most respectfully that the adoption of the proposal of the
 Committee would be unjust to me for it would involve a partial reversal
 of a long standing arrangement and virtually mean, that, to use a common
 phrase, the Corporation would both have their cake and eat it. Many
 years ago the Corporation paid for their legal work like any private
 person, viz:- for the amount of work done per taxed bill of costs. They
 found in practice that in some years the Department cost them £600 or
 £700 or more, and they decided that it would be an ultimate economy

Dear Sir,

I return file herein. If Mr Harris obtains the necessary sanction to his resignation he would appear to be entitled to a pension on the basis of two thirds of the average amount of his salary and emoluments for the past three years of service. He has 40 years service which entitles him to pension of two thirds of said remuneration. I base my calculation on the three years ending 31st March, 1921, because his rate collection was made half yearly to 30th September and 31st March and the figures supplied to me give his poundage earnings for the 3 years ending 31st March 1921. I find that in addition to poundage rate on his collection Mr. Harris received annually £70 for extra duty involved in making a half-yearly collection instead of the yearly collection which he made as Collector for the Guardians granted by Council on 19th December, 1900, and a further sum of £20 yearly granted by the Council as a gratuity on the 1st February, 1900, for diminution of income owing to reduction in the area of the district of collection on transfer from the Guardians to the County Borough. I consider that both these sums amounting to £100 per annum are for the purposes of pension to be treated as part of Mr Harris's annual income. The figures are therefore as follows:-

On these figures the average for three years is £638. 3. 7d and therefore at two-thirds of said yearly average the annual pension works out at £425.9s.

I note that the circular letter recommends that where an officer has in recent years received an increased salary owing to circumstances arising out of the war that seventy five per cent only of such increase should be taken into account in the calculation for pension. In view of this proviso it may be that the remuneration received by Mr Harris from poundage collection for the past three years should not be fully taken into account and that same should be adjusted by deducting therefrom twenty five per cent of the amount by which same exceeds his poundage from collection in the period ending 31st March 1916, when the Poor Rate became affected by the increased cost of living. This is a matter which the Committee dealing with the question can consider. The point would not affect the other items of Mr Harris' salary.

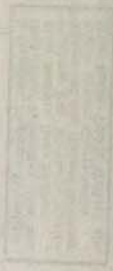

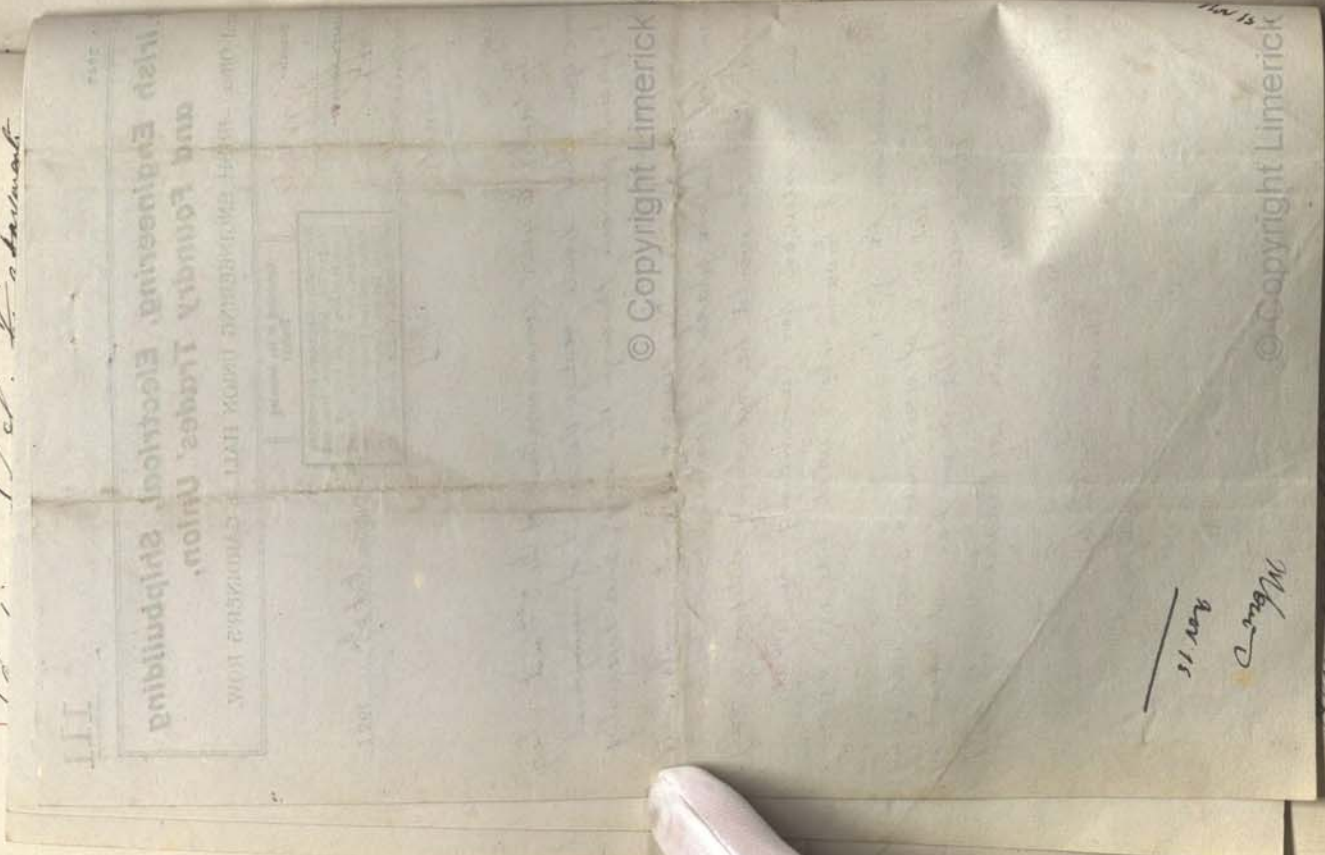

The Meeting was called together to go through the Report of the Committee as adopted by the Borough Council on the 6th October ult. with Mr. Dalton, of the Bail Local Government Department, who was sent down to investigate the matter & recommendations contained in the Report.

The first matter taken up by the Inspector Mr. Dalton - was the case of the School Attendance Inspectors who were principally referred to in Part I of Report as laid out in the Book - For the information of the Inspector the Minutes of the School Attendance

Committee of the 27th May, 1921, were read & the views of that Committee on the proposed

Councillor Matt Griffin pointed out that these men would get preference in case of any vacant positions being filled by the Council. in any future date and that on re-appointment their positions would be merged in their pay.

The Recommendation to reduce the salary of Mr. Dalton, Inspector by £100, the £100 report was gone into. It was pointed out that the reason for reduction of his salary was because he held very little Court work to do at the time the recommendation was made. The Deputy Mayor however pointed out that lately the work of the Court had become very heavy and a heavy amount which Mr Dalton had on hand had to be gone through.

The members present gave it as their opinion that the Law Agent's salary of £200 per annum was quite adequate in regard to in addition he is paid for Council advice, out of pocket expenses - and paid a separate salary for the work of the Attorney, Technical Education & the Committee.

A statement was ordered to be made out for the information of the Inspector giving Mr Dalton's income from Corporate Bodies for the three years 1917, 1918 & 1919 -

1. That the question of payment of amounts of Estimate & Demand of the Limerick Union for the year ending 31st March, 1922 be referred to the L.G. Dept. for decision.
2. That the L.G. Dept. be requested to state definitely the qualifications governing the chargeability of inmates.
3. That payment of Abolition Allowances and gratuities to former officials of the Limerick Workhouse fixed by the L.G. Dept. be made by the Limerick Borough Council, the Limerick Co. Council, and the Clare Co. Council in proportion of the valuation of the Limerick Boro' and such parts of the Limerick County and Clare County as were formerly in the Limerick Union area on the basis set forth in the Estimate & Demand of the Limerick Union for 1921-22.
4. That the Limerick Co. Council and Clare Co. Council pay such amounts as are due by them for abolition allowances and gratuities to the Limerick Borough Council, and that the latter body be responsible for the payment of those sums, and in the event of their re-employing any of the officials in receipt of such that they be entitled to with-held such amount provided that they accept all liability in respect of previous services in future pensions. In case of death of any recipient the amount due by each contributory body in respect of any abolition or superannuation allowance, to be deducted from the amount payable by each contributory body.
5. That in the event of either the Limerick Co. Council or Clare Co. Council failing to transfer to their respective institutions inmates of the Limerick Workhouse who shall to the satisfaction of the L.G. Dept. be proven to be properly chargeable to either the Limerick County or the Clare County, then the County to which such inmates are chargeable shall remove such inmates and further pay to the Limerick Boro' Council the total average costs for the maintenance of such inmates from the 1st April, 1922 to the date of their removal.
6. That in the case of inmates in the Limerick Workhouse on the 1st April, 1922 whose chargeability cannot be established then the Limerick Co. Council, the Limerick Boro' Council and the Clare Co. Council shall pay for the maintenance of such inmates in the proportion of the valuation in the area heretofore known as the Limerick Union.

On the morning of the 9th inst., the supply of current to William Street district was interrupted for two hours owing to the burning out of the internal fittings of Feeder Pillar at the corner of the above street.

The burning was first noticed by the switchboard attendant coming on duty at 6 a.m. On his arrival at the Power Station the automatic switches were open and could not be closed until such time as the faults were located.

On the same morning the disconnecting box outside the Technical School gave trouble which necessitated its removal.

In connection with the above breakdowns I wish to point out that in the report of last April, William Street Feeder Pillar was reported on and also the Box outside the Technical School as follows:-

"With regard to the Distribution Pillar at the Corner of William St., it leaves much to be desired as a Feeder Pillar - even the internal fittings were not exceptionally good. These fuse fittings were small and fitted horizontally in close proximity to each other. The porcelain fuse clips were replaced in an attempt towards improvement but is yet far from being good. It may cause serious inconvenience at any time by disconnecting the whole section which it was intended to control.

In reference to the box at the Technical School, it was always a source of danger and trouble."

The breakdown of the William Street Feeder Pillar destroyed cables feeding out from it for a radius of about 12 feet, therefore the work of replacing same had to be carried out by night. In order to make good the internal fittings of the pillar it will cost approximately £20. for new marble panel with the necessary mountings.

I the City Engineer, Lincoln -
Dear Sir,
Reference is made to your letter of yesterday's date. I have pleasure in referring our telephone conversation of this morning to the effect that I would undertake the surfacing of one mile of road on the same condition & forwarded to you, as I have

no doubt whatever that the quantity would be increased when the result was seen.

As regards maintenance I would like to point out that the five years maintenance accepted by some of the English firms, is for asphalt or concrete foundations where the traffic is not variable and the construction price is much as 10% per sq. yard, so that an allowance for maintenance is easily included. If price of oil falling in is only for a portion of the work mesophalt plant & equipment. So that it would not be easy for me to include for maintenance. But I am more than willing to replace any work that is defective or unnecessary and would suggest a 10% retention for 13 months, or any other guarantee that the Corporation would accept. The ~~minutes~~ had work I entered into for some Northampton (about 3 miles) 10% retention for six months and Lincoln 10% retention for twelve months. I think that for the heavier traffic a fixed 3rd cost would be more advisable. Yours faithfully

Housing Committee

Meeting of the Committee was held in the Council Chamber on Tuesday evening, Wednesday, the 30th day of March 1922, at the hour of 8.30 P.M. Present - Chairman Paul O'Brien, Mayor, in the Chair -

Also present - Alderman Boyle, Councilors - Mr. Burke, Dan Griffin, & Hugh (non-member of Housing Committee) Present or invitation of Chairman were - Councilors Mr. Griffin, Blayney, Redden, Cloney and Sullivan.
Outside Representatives on the Housing Committee present were - Messrs. Callan, Leahy, Cronwell, F. J. Patrick, Dwyer, Archer, Malone, McQuinn, & Murphy.

The Chairman explained that at a meeting of the Corporation Streets Committee held on the previous evening a Housing Rate of two shillings in the £ was recommended to the Poor's Committee -

He explained the terms of the Irish Provisional Government Housing Scheme as embodied in their letter of 16th March, a per copy in the Provisional Committee Minutes of March 2nd. It also read for them the City Surveyor's Report as embodied in same Minute -
A Rate of 2/- in the £ would enable the Corporation to build a S.T. of about

120 houses, which could be let at an Economic Rent of 11/- (Class. 1st) per week each house -

The members discussed the possibility of reducing the Rent and decided that the only means to this end would be a reduction in the cost of erection - The Surveyor said each house would cost about £750 (erection, roads, sewers etc. etc. & land).

When inviting tenders for the erection he would specify different materials etc. such as brick house, concrete, etc., and the Committee would, which is the cheaper.

The Surveyor submitted plan of house proposed for the erection which was approved.

He also submitted lay-out plan of a site in Sarsaparilla, Annulla Lane etc., upon which he could build 43 houses.

The Committee approved of the Site - Mr. Peacock stated he had inspected the following site also viz -

1. Church St. - near Nichols - 8 houses -
2. Nichols St. - space near Ann. St. & do.
3. " Margaret Lane - 7 do.
4. " R. Ter. a. Place - 2 do.
5. " Exchange Street - 1 do.

9. John's Street - Station Lane - 8 do.

At a meeting held by members of the

- (c) The thirty elected members of Seanad Eireann shall be elected by Dail Eireann voting on principles of Proportional Representation.
- (d) Of the thirty nominated members, fifteen to be selected by lot, shall hold office for the full period of twelve years, the remaining fifteen shall hold office for the period of six years.
- (e) Of the thirty elected members the first fifteen elected shall hold office for the period of nine years, the remaining fifteen shall hold office for the period of three years.
- (f) At the termination of the period of office of any such members, members shall be elected in their place in manner provided by Article 32.
- (g) Casual vacancies shall be filled in manner provided by Article 34.

Dear Sirs,

I interviewed Mr. Allen (Ministry of Industry and Commerce, Power Section) and placed before him the condition of the Electricity Plant at Limerick. After pointing out that the present Plant was very inefficient and gone beyond repair, I explained the unreliable condition of the present machinery and the liability of a complete shut-down of the whole Electric Supply, if immediate action is not taken to provide plant to replace the existing antiquated Engines. I also directed his attention to the limited space available for carrying out extensions, and our proximity to the gas-holder, which even prevented the storing of sufficient fuel. I gave the gentleman a map of the City showing the streets that were supplied with cables, and also showing the streets that were not supplied.

My interview wound up with a promise from Mr. Allen that he would bring the matter before the Minister of Finance, and at the same time he advised me to get the Electric Lighting Committee to press the matter forward, and that he would do his part. I have received no communication from Mr. Allen although he informed me that he would communicate with me on Monday 15th instant. The financial side of this matter was not gone into, as this gentleman was not in a position to deal with it.

I wish to bring before the notice of the Committee the urgent necessity for immediate action to make provision to supply reliable plant to meet the coming Winter of 1923. It would be absurd to think of facing another Winter with the present plant, taking into consideration the demand there is for both Power and Light. I consider it would be criminal on my part if I were to neglect giving you ample warning, and especially when I find people investing so much money in having Churches and houses wired. In connection with this matter I wish to be absolutely candid that I am reluctantly compelled to discourage would-be consumers. In October, 1910 an expert was employed by the Corporation to report on the condition of the Power Station, and on looking over this gentleman's report I find that he was asked by the Council at that time to place a value on the Machinery, the following are words taken from his report TWELVE YEARS AGO- "for instance I do not think it would be possible to find a purchaser for the old gas-engines at a greater price than that of scrap iron."

Gentlemen, I would like to remind you that I am trying to keep a City with a population of 39000 to 40,000 souls supplied with Electricity, generated by gas-engines that were condemned as scrap iron twelve years ago, to-day they are a revolving mass of dangerous metal. It is extraordinary, yet it is a fact that the total Horse-Power of the Station twelve years ago was 460 (allowing all the old engines to be turned up to their best), to-day the total Horse-Power available in the Station is approximately 480, that is an increase of 20 Horse-Power in twelve years. In the same period you have an increase of over 150% in consumers, in other words at that time 460 Horse Power was available for 249 consumers, to-day I have 480 Horse-Power to supply 320 consumers. This ~~xxx~~ you will note, gentlemen, is a position you cannot allow to continue, it is a position which the public are not aware of. Therefore I would like the Committee to place on record my report in connection with this matter.

 Councillor M.Griffin proposed and Ald. Doyle seconded
 a resolution to strike out this amount.
 Cr. D.Griffin proposed and Cr. Cronin seconded an
 amendment to leave the amount stand on the Sheet.
 On a division six voted for the amendment and
 seven against, and the Deputy-Mayor declared
 the resolution to strike out carried.

Item 65-Election Expenses £200- This item was struck off, as
 there was £524 on hands.

Item 69-Unoccupancies £800- This item was reduced by £100,
 owing to reduction in Rates.

Item 83-Councillor M.Griffin proposed that the item £30 for
 Inspectors of Cowsheds, Milksheds etc be struck off,
 but on the advice of the Law Agent the Chairman
 ruled him out of order.

Item 88-£10 for Burial Registration fee, St. Lawrence.
 On the advice of the Law Agent who suggested that
 the matter of payment of these fees should be
 challenged, it was decided to strike out this amount.

Item 109-Motor Lorry Water Tank etc. £1600. Councillor Dan.
 Griffin proposed that this amount be struck off in
 view of the fact that Watering Carts were bought
 last year. Ald. Doyle seconded.

Councillor O'Brien proposed an amendment that the
 amount be provided which Councillor O'Halloran
 seconded. On a division five voted for the
 amendment and seven against. The Chairman accordingly
 declared the resolution to strike out carried.
 Item 111- New Sewer at Thomond Row £785. The Law Agent
 advised that this sum should be raised by Loan.
 Accordingly on the motion of Cr. M.Griffin seconded
 by Councillor Gough it was decided to strike out £715,
 and to apply for a loan, £70 (seventy) being provided
 for repayment of same.

Items 109 to 124- On the suggestion of Councillor Shaw the
 City Treasurer was instructed to state in the Estimates
 Sheets in future the number of years for which the
 various loans were got.

Item 119-£300 proposed new loan for sewer and new road at
 Fitzgeralds Cottages- On the motion of Cr. M.Griffin
 it was decided to strike out this amount as it would
 not be expended during the current year, owing to the
 land etc not being acquired.

Item 141- £200 was struck off amount provided for Unoccupancés
 Id in the £ for Technical Instruction.

Item 142- A letter dated 10th March was submitted and read from the Limerick Municipal Technical Ed. Committee asking the Council to increase the amount to be struck for Technical Education to Twopence in the pound for this year in order to avail of an increased grant from the Department of Agriculture. A discussion took place hereon. The Law Agent said he would not recommend the Council to raise the Rate as the Department of Agriculture might maintain that the circumstances governing grants towards Technical Education in Limerick had changed from that heretofore prevailing if this were done. He suggested that the Technical Committee should request the Department to treat them on the same footing as when the Schools were working some years ago, and also if necessary to ask them for a Loan to enable them to re-start the Schools. The Law Agent's advice was adhered to; a rate of 1d in the £ only being passed.

Item 16-under the heading of Receipts in Improvement Est. £150 was added as the probable rent that will be received out of the new houses being erected.

New Expenditure-Letter dated 6th February was read from the Gaelic League(Limerick Branch) asking the Council to provide a rate of 1d in the £ tow rds helping the Limerick Branch in the cause of the Irish Language. Arising out of an interview which the Deputy-Mayor had with members of the League a further letter dated 27th March was read saying the Corporation would in their opinion advance the language cause materially if they offered Scholarships (£ 8 or 10) which would afford children of the Citizens a month in an Irish speaking district where a College is already established. The Corporation could also with this money make improvements in the Irish Classes in the Technical Schools and offer inducements to pupils to study there. The League would render any assistance possible to the Council and co-operate with them in the question of Examinations etc., if necessary. A discussion took place hereon. Finally Ald.Mrs. O'Donovan proposed that the money be provided (1d in £) and use same in the Technical Ed.Scheme or keep within the Corporation resources. Councillor M.Griff in seconded the resolution which was passed, nem-con.

 Child Welfare

Letter read from Miss M.Doyle, Hon Sec., Limerick Child Welfare Scheme, enclosing copy of draft Report of her Association, and asking the Council to consider putting the work of her Committee on the Estimates with a view to granting a rate to it. After some discussion on the matter Councillor O'Flynn proposed and seconded Ald.Doyle seconded a resolution to provide a penny in the £, and ~~information being given in Council as to the~~ information being given in Council as to the necessity for same. Councillor O'Flynn undertook to ask Miss Doyle to send a Deputation.

The Committee then went back to item 26-Motor Lorry £550. Ald.Doyle proposed and Ald.Mrs.O'Donovan seconded a resolution to strike out this item, Councillor O'Brien proposed and Cr.O'Halloran seconded an amendment to provide this amount. On a division five voted for the amendment and seven against. The Chairman accordingly declared the item struck off the Estimate.

The City Treasurer here announced that a Rate of Ten shillings and one penny would cover the expenditure under the Improvement Rate Estimate.

The Committee then went through the Estimate for the Borough Rate-

Arising hereout a letter was read from the Director of the Free Library forwarding resolution passed by his Committee asking the Council to strike a Rate of at least twopence in the £ towards the expenditure of that Committee.

Councillor Matt.Griffin pointed out that retrenchments made in the Library would allow it to be run on a Rate of 1d in £ and proposed that a Rate of one penny only be struck. This was agreed to unanimously.

The Committee then went through the Estimate for the Water Rate. The Treasurer Stated that a Rate of eightpence in the £ would be sufficient to meet expenditure herein. The Sec.Water Committee considered they should strike for a higher rate, as he thought some reduction should be made on metered supplies. After a discussion it was decided on the Motion of Councillor Mat.Griffin seconded by Ald.Doyle to recommend Council to strike a Rate of Eightpence in the £ for Domestic Water.

A short discussion took place on the Estimate for Poor Rate when it was agreed to strike a Rate of 5/- in the £ for expenditure under this head.

The City Treasurer then announced that the following Rates would be sufficient to meet the amounts contained in the Estimate Sheets after having allowed for various deductions and additions as recommended, viz:-

These Rates did not take credit for any reductions in salaries or Wages.

As arranged at the commencement of this Meeting the question of reducing salaries and wages was then taken up.

Alderman Doyle proposed and Councillor Clancy Seconded a resolution that no cuts be made in either salaries or wages and that this matter be adjourned for 12 months.

Councillor Mat.Griffin proposed that a five per cent all round cut be made. Councillor Shaw seconded subject to it being revised again in 6 months time. After some discussion Ald.

Doyle modified his resolution by striking out the words "that this matter be adjourned for 12 months."
