VACANT LAND CULTIVATION

At the meeting of the Improvement Committee of the Corporation, the following letter from Councillor John Dalton was read, and it was decided to ask the co-operation of the St Vincent de Paul Society in the matter, and also to ask the V.L.C. Society to send down an Inspector as suggested in the letter:—

High Street, Limerick
August, 1916.

To the Chairman and Members of the Improvement Committee.

GENTLEMEN—I have carefully examined the documents which you handed to me in connection with the Vacant Land Cultivation Society, and it appears to me to be a matter that should receive the best consideration of the Corporation. I may mention that I saw their scheme in operation in Dublin, where it proved to be a great boon to the people. I understand that similar schemes are also successful in Belfast, Waterford, Queenstown, Clonmel and other Irish towns. Briefly it is as follows:—The Society get no profit, and give every information and assistance regarding allotments to individuals and Committees throughout Ireland. They have secured a grant from the Development Commissioners to enable them to send a trained man to give full effect to this arrangement. Vacant land in cities is ploughed out to the working classes in small lots, so that they can occupy their leisure time in growing vegetables for their families. The plot holders pay the rent, if any, of the whole plot between them, but the holdings are subject to a short notice, as it is recognised that land so secured must be available for buildings, etc. at any time, and is only turned to use in the meantime. A portion of Corkanure (where the mud is dumped) would be useful for this purpose. The idea of the scheme is to be of assistance to men who are in the unfortunate position of only having casual employment, and to serve men who are industrious enough to cultivate their plots before or after working hours, and as it would be desirable to avail of these advantages I suggest that we ask the Society to send down a man to consult with the Improvement Committee, and a few outsiders, who may interest themselves in the matter. It is perfectly clear that "an advance" which means an increase in wages such as that applied for by the Inspectors of the Night Watch cannot legally be granted before next estimates and if the Corpora-

tion are going to consider the granting at the present time of a War Bonus to the Employees earning over 25/- per week they will so complicate their already involved financial position that in my opinion it will be impossible for them to provide for their liabilities in the coming year.

Dear Sir,

The question raised in your Memo of the 1st inst is extremely important. I have formed the opinion that, under Section 56 of the Limerick Improvement Act of 1853, the Council not only have power to light the streets, but also have a duty placed on them to do so adequately. The words of the Section are "The Mayor Aldermen and Burgesses shall and may, subject to the provisions of this Act, cause to be paved, drained, lighted, cleansed watered, and otherwise improved, the Borough of Limerick". I have been able to lay hands on only one reported case in the matter. Mellor .v. Hywood Corporation. There, Plaintiff, driving his brougham on a dark night, collided with a gas lamp of Defen-

dants, which had not been lighted, and this was the immediate cause of the accident. Plaintiff failed in his action for damages, because it was held that, although Defendants had taken it on themselves to light the streets, under powers in that behalf contained in the local acts, they were not in terms bound to do so. In similar circumstances I think the Council would have been held liable, owing to the presence of the words "shall" in the section above quoted. Of course, under the "Lights on Vehicles Acts", Locomotives and other cars are bound to carry lights, from one hour after sunset to one hour before sunrise, and these Statutes either minimise the risk of accidents when observed, or affect the question of liability when not observed. I already recommended, in connection with this matter of economy in Street Lighting, that full particulars should be furnished the Ocean Accident Guarantee Company, with whom the Council have a third Party Risk Policy, and I trust this

EXTRACT FROM COPY

PETROL FOR HIRED MOTORS.

The Petrol Committee of the Board of Trade is prepared to issue special permits for motor cars to be let for hire for certain specified purposes in those districts where there are no taxicabs or other hackney vehicles standing or ply- ing for hire in a public place or street or at a railway station. The permit will be issued subject to the condition that the hired motor car is used only for the conveyance of pas- sengers, Government or public officers, business purposes of farmers, veterinary surgeons, nurses, funerals, or newspapers. A record of all lettings of motor cars for hire, giving the names and addresses of hirers and particulars of purposes, shall be kept, and be open to inspection if required. A permit must be carried by the driver, and returned after the expiration of the period for which it is granted. Applicants should furnish the name and address of the owner, numbers of owner's motor spirit licence, purposes, and the period for which the car is to be let.

EXTRACT FROM COPY REGULATION HELD BY POLICE.

After Regulation 8G the following regulation shall be inserted

8GG On and after the Twelfth day of May nineteen hundred and seventeen motor spirit shall not be used for the purpose of any motor car let for hire except where the letting of the Car

(a) is in connection with ambulance or hospital work or the conveyance of wounded soldiers, or is to a qualified medical practitioner for the purpose of his profession or

(b) is in connection with naval or military or munition service or the conveyance of munition workers to or from their work or

(c) is authorised by the Board of Trade for any special purpose.

"If any person uses motor spirit or causes or permits motor spirit to be used in contravention of his Regulation he shall be guilty of a summary offence against these regulations.

"In this regulation the expression Motor Spirit has the same meaning as in Part VI of the Finance (1909-10) Act 1910.

"Nothing in this regulation shall apply to any motor cab or motor bus standing or plying for hire in any street or public place or in any railway station; but any question as to whether or not a car is exempt under this provision shall be referred to the Board of Trade whose decision shall be conclusive.

The Fire at Imperial Bakery.

About midnight on Xmas Eve a fire broke out in the Imperial Bakery,

When the Fire Brigade arrived they had neither ladders, Fire
engines nor ambulance, and with defective lines of hose, one of
which I found myself in the Street with my handkerchiefs.
On Xmas day the firemen went away leaving nobody in charge and
at 5 a.m. the Night Watchman called me to say that the fire was
again burning fiercely. He notified the Fire Station and a
brigade man came down, examined the place and said he would send
down a line of hose at 7 a.m. when the men came on duty.
At 8.45 a.m. the Fire again broke out in my loft adjoining Cannocks
premises and was subdued by Constable Leader from the William St
Police assisted by my son. The brigade although notified at 5
a.m. did not attend until the second outbreak was extinguished.

morning and drew his attention to the incompetency and conduct of

In reply to your letter of the 12th inst. In every sworn information to found a claim for malicious injury the informant is bound to state whether he knows the person or persons who committed same. In the case arising out of the recent disturbance at the County Council offices the information is made by Mr Quaid Secretary and he states that he does not know the person or persons who did the damage. In any event knowledge of a claim, but the applicant having such knowledge would be bound to prosecute the offender criminally, and the Court might direct the person guilty of the offence to pay compensation for the damage.

I beg to report for the information of the Committee concerned and Council that the Judge of Assize affirmed the Decree of the County Court Judge awarding £28 damages against the Council for the larceny of lace and a marble clock from the Lace School premises on the night of the fire at Kid's on the 20th March 1879. The Judge stated that in the circumstances no particular blame attached to the Captain or any Members of the Fire Brigade for what had occurred, but having regard to his observations on the case it would I think be advisable that the following precaution should be taken in the event of it becoming necessary for the Fire Brigade to enter unoccupied premises for the purpose of putting out fire.

- 1) That the Owner or care-taker of the premises should be notified if possible.
- 2) That while the fire is on and the Brigade using the unoccupied premises the Captain should be empowered to utilise the services of the Night Watch in preventing unauthorised persons from getting into the premises.
- 3) That failing arrangement with the owners as to their future security the Captain when leaving unoccupied premises into which he has had to break should secure same so far as possible from the possibility of being entered by unauthorised persons.

Alderman Keble inquired as to whether it was the intention of the Committee that the night watch staff should receive night duty duty, as heretofore, having regard to the decision of the whole of the Committee who were endorsing the report of the Sub-committee, to reinstate them. But the Chairman pointed out that this decision must first be ratified by the Council before it is acted upon.

To: The Chairman and members of the Gas Committee.
Gentlemen,

With reference to the application from the Town Clerk requesting for the information of the Corporation the cost of lighting 50 extra gas lamps before dealing with the matter I deem it my duty to draw your attention to the serious loss that will be incurred this Lighting Season on Public Lighting.

During the Lighting Season ended in the last financial year and although the lamps were extinguished at mid-night there was a loss of £445. The number of lamps lighting was 402 averaging five lighting hours per lamp per night. In the current year and under present conditions the average time of lighting will be approximately 02) twelve extinguishing hours per lamp per night, seven hours extra for each of the 403 lamps equivalent to 16,926 0 feet of gas per night at 7/6 per 1,000 0 feet representing a further charge of £6,611 per night or for the lighting season of 215 nights a total of £1,564,7.1 in addition to the £445 above mentioned thereby increasing the estimated loss to £1,909,7.1.

The estimated cost of supplying gas to 50 additional lamps (all night lighting) should be £302.10. for 215 nights or £3,110 per lamp. If mid-night extinguishing is reverted to the cost would be £2,135.5 per lamp.

The above estimate only provides for the quantity of gas consumed, manholes, glasses and where service columns &c exist, but does not include wages for lighting, extinguishing, maintenance or for lanterns.

Meeting of this committee held on above date in Council Chamber, Town Hall, immediately after the meeting of the foregoing Fire Brigade Committee - the same Chairman and members of Council being present.

With the least Town Clerk and the City Surveyor. The minutes of the last meeting and also minutes of special lighting Committee held on 21st September were read, confirmed, and signed.

Lighting Committee - A discussion took place as to the necessity for some extra lamps being lighted - it being pointed out that each lamp on an above the 400 situated for should be paid for by the Council - Ald. Wall proposed and Councilman O'Brien seconded a resolution to recommend Council to light an extra lamp in Catherine Place, as it was not possible to shut off a lamp elsewhere in the ward and transfer it to this locality. - He was agreed to nemine. Alderman McManis proposed and C. Dr Griffin seconded a resolution to light an extra lamp in Arthur's Quay and one in Market Alley - There being no objection the resolution was agreed to.

Councillor Gough proposed and Councilman Cronin seconded a recommendation to light an extra lamp at the corner of the New Street (or Ballinacree Rd) This recommendation was also passed without dissent. It was understood that there four extra lamps would be paid for.

Dark Committee - There was no business - Letter read from Mr. Patrick Hourigan, Corkmore, who was previous to the Petitioners Committee recommendations of 1921 being passed through Council - Councillor J. Corkmore -

Mr. Hourigan requested the Committee to re-iterate their Council - Councillor - Councillor O'Brien proposed and C. Gough seconded - that no action be taken herein.

As an amendment - Ald. McManis proposed and Councillor Dr Griffin seconded a recommendation to Council to re-iterate Hourigan at a weekly wage of £50 (two pounds) after deducting the matter for some time if we agreed to adjourn action herein.

Extension -

Coming out of Minute, the attached copy of letters (1) from John Carr to Secy. Harbour Board and (2) Harbour Secy's reply thereto - were read and discussed very fully and the following decisions were come to thereon - viz:-

(1) Councillor Dr Griffin proposed and it was unanimously agreed to advise the rest to be charged Harbour Board - for fuel required at Estuary for Dock extension - to the sum of Fifty pounds (£50) per annum without any option to purchase at terms quoted in Mr. Power's letter.

(2) Regarding New Entrance at West side - Councillor O'Brien objected to the portion of Mr. Power's letter. He considered the making of a new entrance should be insisted on and proposed a resolution to that effect or as an alternative that the present entrance be deepened, made deeper.

The Mayor said he understood that any boat or steamer that could pass over the bar could pass on the side of the present entrance - Councillor Dr Griffin and Alderman Wall as regards of the Council on the S. Side pointed out the matter of making the second entrance was a question of Finance - as it would be a very costly job. Councillor Gough seconded Councilman O'Brien's resolution.

FIRE BRIGADE COMMITTEE.

Meeting of this Committee held in the Council Chamber on Wednesday evening, 31st day of October, 1923, at the hour of 7:30 o'clock, p.m.

PRESENT:- Alderman Walsh, Acting Mayor, in the Chair. ALDERMEN- Mrs. O'Donovan, and Doyle. COUNCILLORS- Centy, Quilligan, Ryan, Gough, Cronin, D. Griffin M. Griffin, O'Halloran, Tom Burke, Barry, Eddan, Clancy, O'Brien, and Hennessy.

OFFICIALS:- The Assistant Town Clerk, The City Surveyor, and Captain Dan Hogan.

The Minutes of the last Meeting held on the 3rd inst., were read, confirmed as a correct record and signed by the Chairmen.

Captain Hogan's usual Daily Report Sheets as delivered each morning to the Town Clerk were submitted and signed.

There was no matter in them calling for special attention. Arising out of Minutes Captain Hogan reported that since last meeting he made two tests with the new Motor Fire Tender

with Fire Engine attached, and on each occasion the motor failed to tow the Engine up Park Hill. It will work all right on level ground but has not sufficient

power for hill climbing. He recommended the substitution of a 2 ton Chassis instead, and stated, he understood the Contractor, Mr. Breen, is willing to make the

exchange subject to being paid the extra cost of the two ton chassis as against the Ford one ton.

In reply to the Committee the Captain stated the two ton chassis would cost about £250 extra.

A discussion took place herein. The City Surveyor said the test which has been made with the Ford chassis (old one) before placing the order for the Tender had proved

satisfactory, but the New Tender failed to pass the test applied.

Councillor O'Brien said he was opposed to anything except the Motor Fire Engine & Tender combined, particulars of which were submitted to the Committee by Messrs. McDonogh

A show of hands was taken on Councilor O'Brien's motion which resulted in five voting for it and six against - the motion being accordingly declared lost and not carried.

Coming out of the correspondence a letter was read from the Electrical Engineer - Mr. Hart - suggesting that type the agreement is finally sealed, a clause should be inserted in it which would give the Corporation the right to build a new power station on portion of the ground which is under consideration for disposal to the Harbour Board.

On consideration of the letter the Committee did not accede to Mr. Hart's suggestion - it being pointed out that there would be plenty of ground space left at Corsham when the Harbour Board has taken the matter into consideration.

On the motion of Ald. Walsh, seconded by Mr. Dwyer, Mr. Griffin it was decided to place the Mayor on the Sub-Committee of the Harbour & Fire Council who had the matter of the Dock Station under consideration.

Apology for Committee - There was no business -

Apology for non-attendance received from Messrs. Jones, C.A.C. as he was engaged all the afternoon registering cars which came to the City for the Race Meeting.

Arising out of Minutes read letter from the Sec. Gas Committee stating that the lighting of the four additional lamps ordered at last Meeting will receive attention, the extra cost of same to the 31st March, 1924, will be £20 ((£5 per lamp)). Noted.

Requisition read from the Residents of Broad Lane, King's Island, drawing attention to the urgent necessity of providing a gas lamp in that locality. Councillor Cianey proposed and Councillor T. Burke seconded - that the lamp be provided.

A discussion took place herein. Councillor M. Griffin urged the necessity of having the Gas Engineer to report on this matter and whether an exchange could be made from some other locality so as not to be putting up extra lamps.

It was decided that the Gas Engineer should report on the application in accordance with Cr. Griffin's suggestion.

It was also decided that he should report on the lighting of Park, and Mount Kennett.

Councillor Canty complained of non-lighting of the Electric lamps in Mungret St., and the Electrical Engineer's attention was ordered to be drawn to the matter.

Report of Mr. Costelloe of this date read. Arising out of same his application for Coal for Greenhouse, 7 Decz Shrubs, 100 Tulip-bulbs, and 2 Decz Iron Railings 6' high for protecting shrubs going around the Lavatory, was granted.

REPLACING BROKEN TREES & GUARDS:-

On the Motion of Cr. M. Griffin it was ordered that all damaged trees and guards be replaced - guards to be repaired - now that Arbour Day is approaching.

CORKENREE:-

Offer submitted from Mr. J. Crehan, Lickardoon, Ballysheedy, offering a sum of four pounds for the sedge of trenches & rushes at Corkenree. It was decided to accept this offer as the matter had been advertised previously but no offers received.

De-Hourigan:-

Arising out of last Minutes submitted application from Mr. F. Hourigan, Corkenree asking to be re-instated in his position as caretaker of the Lands & Embankment there. Cr. Culligan proposed and Councillor O'Brien seconded a resolution that no action be taken on the request. Alderman J. Molnerney proposed that he be re-instated, but found no seconders; the Chairman accordingly declared the motion to take no action herein carried.

Docks Extension Scheme:-

Arising out of Minutes submitted letter from the Harbour Board's Secretary stating
(1) That as the lands in question will be used for the Public Good of the entire City and for ever, the Commissioners consider that they should have the option of purchase as set out in his letter of the 26th ulto. (See previous Minutes).

(2) Were the Commissioners to understand that the Corporation makes it a condition of the letting that the depth of the existing entrance to the Docks shall be increased by 2 feet 6 inches, or is this only a suggestion. The planning of the extension must be entirely in the hands of the Harbour Commissioners.

(3) When the Commissioners take over the lands in question they will include the sewers and sluices therein which will be otherwise arranged. The Bank will be duly maintained.

A discussion took place herein - Councillor/asked a question in reference to the plans and was informed by the City Surveyor and other members of the Committee that the Plans were submitted to a Joint Committee of the Harbour Board and Corporation. A new and deeper entrance was shown in these plans, but owing to financial reasons as pointed out in previous Minutes the Harbour Board asked that the question of the new entrance be omitted from the conditions of letting as per their letter of the 26th September which was submitted and read. The Corkenree Committee at its last meeting had agreed by a majority to this request.

On a controversy as to whether Breadth or Depth was most necessary in the Docks entrance Councillor O'Brien stated that the present entrance was 70 feet wide. Councillor Fald raised a question in reference to the rent, and as to what would become of the 16 acres proposed to be let other than the land actually wanted for extending the docks, and was replied to by Members, ^{and} ~~that~~ ^{agreements had been made with the agents} ~~the agents~~. In reference to item 1 of letter above, no variation was made from previous decision in this matter.

In reference to item 2 it was pointed out that the matter of increasing the depth of the present entrance was only a recommendation.

On the suggestion of Councillor Cronin it was decided that the Law Agent should draw up a draft agreement and submit same to this Committee so as to see how the matter stood so far. He suggested that there should be a stated period for the letting. ~~MMH~~

It was decided to add the names of Alderman O'Mara, and Councillor O'Brien to the Joint Committee and to ask Mr. Power, Secretary of the Board, to call a meeting of same.

HACKNEY

Report of Mr. Forrest, Inspector, of this date read, also his report for Meeting of the Committee which should have been held on the 17th inst., and same were approved. There was no matter in them calling for special action on the part of the Committee.

Mr. Forrest also reported on the excessive speed of Motor Cars in the City and the danger caused to pedestrians. On his suggestion it was decided to call the attention of the Superintendent of the Civic Guards to the matter.

Dear Sir,

I beg to inform you that at a meeting of the Corkanree Committee on Wednesday evening last a report of the Joint Conference of the Harbour Commissioners' and Borough Council's representatives was read.

It was unanimously decided, subject to confirmation by Council to give the land required, about 16 acres, with a river frontage of about 1,000 feet, at an annual rent of £100 upon terms and conditions to be agreed on between the Council and Commissioners including the following:-

(1). That within a reasonable time the Commissioners shall obtain the necessary statutory authority and proceed to carry out the proposed extension of the Docks, and the making of the new entrance in accordance with the plans produced at the Conference.

(2). That the demised premises, or any part thereof should not be sub-let without the consent of the Council, except in so far as storage sheds or other similar erections therein made by the Commissioners hereafter may be rented for bona-fide users by merchants using the Port and Harbour in import or export trade and in connection therewith.

(3). That the Commissioners shall take over the maintenance and upkeep of the whole Corkanree Embankment so that the public shall enjoy free access thereto as heretofore and that excavated materials shall so far as practicable be used in the widening of same with liberty to the Commissioners to use the portion of same for the extension of quays when required.

Your letter of 24th instant, 6616, and the proposals of the Corkanree Committee of the Corporation were considered on this date by the Extensions of the Docks Committee of the Harbour Board with regard to the letting or selling of about 16 acres of the lands at Corkanree.

With reference ^{to} the rent you put at £100 per annum my Committee consider that you should reduce this figure to £50 per annum with the option of purchase by capitalising this sum at 5%.

(1). That owing to financial reasons my Committee ask that the making of the new entrance be omitted from this condition though they are unanimously and strongly in favour but they must be guided by circumstances.

(2). My Committee agree to this condition.

(3). My Committee will agree to place any surplus of the material excavated, alongside the River Bank; they cannot undertake the bank's maintenance below the premises to be acquired by them.
