 of practice affected the powers vested in the Committee as
 above defined. In this connection, however, I should add
 that the actual building of the Free Library and Museum is
 vested in the Council under section 13 of the Act of 1855 and
 the Council covenants in the lease under which the site is held
 to keep the building in good repair. It will be noted that the
 powers of the Committee under Section 12 do not include the power
 to keep the premises in repair. Therefore if in any year there
 is a want of repair it would be the duty of the Council to
 earmark a portion of the 1d grant for the purpose ~~of~~ the

Dear Sir,

In reply to your letter of the 31st ulto. and the queries of Alderman Molleice herewith returned on which I was directed to report by the Improvement Committee I beg to state as follows;)-

1. Mr. Carnegie granted £7,000 for a Free Library building on condition that £350 per annum was raised locally for the support of the Library and a site provided for the building.
2. The functions of the Free Library and Museum Committee appointed pursuant to section 12 of the Act of 1855 and Sec. 4 of the Act of 1877 (copies of which I enclose for reference) are defined by Section 12 of the Act of 1855.
3. Having regard to section 12 of the Act of 1855 I do not think that the Committee decisions are subject to



I enclose copy Opinion of Counsel (Mr. P. Kelly, B.L.) on case submitted to him. The Opinion may be summarised as follows:-

1) That the work to be done in execution of the Working Classes Act is not within the scope of Mr. Peacocke's employment, either as Town Surveyor, or Executive Sanitary Officer.

2) That in Counsel's view payment to Mr. Peacocke on a separate contract for such work is not the proper course.

3) That without the consent of the Lord Lieutenant a salary office of City Architect cannot be created.

4) That in Counsel's view the proper course is to obtain an Order from the Local Government Board under Section 11 of the Public Health Act 1878 imposing on Mr. Peacocke as Executive Sanitary Officer and Engineer the engineering work to be done under the Housing of the Working Classes Acts in connection with the preparation of schemes and the erection and completion of Dwelling Houses, and fixing the salary to be paid to him therefor.

I have yours of the 31st ultimo with enclosures which I return.

I have inspected the Resolution of Council of 1896 relating to the Town Clerk's appointment which provided that his salary was "to include all remuneration and expenses receivable by and payable to him under the Franchise Acts, and payable to him by the Corporation of Limerick under the said Acts". THE TECHNICAL EDUCATION SCHEME 1919-20

Dear Sir,

I have recently attended several Meetings of the Technical Education Committee, The Members of the Council are, I have no doubt, familiar with the details of the controversy which has been going on between the Committee and the Department. So far as I can judge a deadlock has been arrived at, and, as neither party seems likely to give way, certain consequences are likely to follow the development of which will closely concern the Council. I feel bound as Law Agent to direct the attention of the Council to this matter. In the absence of an agreed Scheme for the year 1919-20 the annual grants from the Department amounting to approximately £3000 will be withdrawn so that the work of Technical Instruction in the County Borough cannot be carried on. In order to curtail their personal liability for salaries to the Staff the Committee will naturally terminate their employment or in the altered conditions the Staff might seek the permission of the Department to resign. In either event the individual members of the Staff who are whole-time officers will have pensionable rights or the right to a gratuity under the Local Govt. Ireland Act 1919 and such pensions would have to be provided by the Council out of the rates and would be tenable for life. The amount of such pensions or gratuities in each case would be fixed by the Local Govt. Board. The maximum pensions would be in each case two-thirds of the then salary, fees, and emoluments and the minimum one-sixtieth of such salary etc. for each year of service. Where the Officer had not served ten years payment of a lump sum would be substituted for a pension and calculated at one year's salary etc for a year of service plus one-fourth of a year's salary for each half-year's service after the two first with a minimum of five years salary. I estimate the minimum amounts which would have to be provided under the foregoing heads at £475 per annum for pensions and a lump sum of £2720 for gratuities to those Officers who have less than ten years service. In this calculation I have not included the Carpenters as Officers but I have included the War bonus paid to the Officers as part of their salaries since I find that same are paid by the Committee in the first instance and then refunded by Treasury Grants. Another matter which must not be lost sight of is that if the Department Grants were withdrawn the Council would have to find about £500 per annum to pay the principal and interest on the Building Loan. Having regard to the foregoing I think it is my duty to inform the Council that, if they so desire, it is open to them to revoke the powers delegated to the Committee under the Technical Education Acts with a view to taking up with the Department the question of a Scheme for the year 1919-20. This might properly be done by Council Resolution pursuant to a Notice of Motion handed in at the Meeting by any Member who desired to have a decision on the question. In the meantime I would be glad if you would bring the contents of this letter before the Members in Committee and have a paragraph dealing with the consideration of same in the Agenda for next Council Meeting.

RE PROFITEERING ACT.

I have now obtained copy of this Act. The Corporation has no power to take action under same unless and until the Board of Trade establish or authorise the establishment of a local Committee under the Act to whom the Board of Trade may delegate all their powers except the power to fix prices. The powers which might be so delegated include the investigation of prices, costs, and profits at all stages for which purpose a Committee might summon any person to appear and give such information and furnish such documents as might be required. Also to receive and investigate complaints that a profit is being or has since the 19th August 1919 been made on the sale of any article whether wholesale or retail which is unreasonable, and on such complaint may require the seller to repay complainant the excess price charged.

The Act also contains a provision to the effect that the Board of Trade may authorise local authorities to purchase and sell articles on a commercial basis. The Expense of a Local Committee would be payable out of the Local Rate directed by the Board of Trade. The Act is to continue in force until the 19th February 1920 and no longer.

In reply to yours of the 24th inst: the owners of Heavy Motor Cars including the Military cannot be made to pay compensation for damage caused to roadways by such traffic. A private owner or Company engaging in a special business and employing heavy motor or other haulage system in connection therewith which could be held to be extraordinary traffic whereby on the Certificate of the City Surveyor special expense was incurred in the maintenance and upkeep of a road or roads so used could be sued for recovery of such extra expense. For example if a person purchased a large quantity of timber near the City and proceeded to use heavy motors for the haulage of same to the Docks whereby special and extraordinary traffic passed over certain of the roadways within the City for a period he would be liable for such special damage to the roads as could be shown on the Surveyor's Certificate to have been due to such unusual traffic.

With regard to the provision of Mud Splashing devices on Motors you will please send me the Order in question. I notice that same is being observed in Dublin and suggest you should communicate with the Town Clerk there to ascertain how same has been put in force.

In reply to yours of the 25th inst; so far as I can find the City Court House would appear to have been established as such by the Grand Jury of the County of the City of Limerick prior to 1853 under the Grand Jury Act 637 Wm IV Cap 116. Petty Sessions are appointed to be held therein under the Petty Sessions Ireland Act 1851 and City Criminal business is also transacted there at Assizes. The property powers and duties of the Grand Jury were transferred to the Council by the Limerick Corporation Act 1853 and in my opinion the City Court House is maintainable as a Public Court by the Council as successors of the Grand Jury and by means of the General Purposes Date and the premises could not be devoted to other purposes such as a City Hall.

In reply to yours of the 10th inst. as I have already pointed out in my Report on the above Act the Council has the following powers in this matter:

A Person who at any time after the 3rd December 1919, without the permission in writing of the Council, demolishes, in whole or in part, or uses otherwise than as a dwelling-house any house which was on that date reasonably fit or reasonably capable without reconstruction of being rendered fit for human habitation, is liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding £100 or to imprisonment for a term not exceeding three months or to both.

It is, therefore, unnecessary for the Council to make the Order indicated in the Committee's decision, because any person who desires to convert premises used as a dwelling-house or capable of being so used on the 3rd December 1919 into a Cinema Theatre must first obtain the written permission of the Council so to do under the penalties above mentioned.

In reply to your letter of the 3rd inst herein from which I note that Mr. Walsh's tender was obtained in reply to an advertisement, and accepted by the Committee on the 24th March last. The conditions of Tender provide that the Contractor shall pay to those employed on the work not less than the minimum standard of wages at the rate paid in Limerick, and shall observe the conditions and hours recognised as proper in the City. The Tender also prescribes that the Contractor shall engage regular tradesmen to perform tradesmen's work.

The question whether Mr. Walsh is a non trades union man or not does not appear to affect the matter, and unless it is clear that he violates the conditions quoted above he might sue the Council for breach of Contract if they now re-advertise and give the work elsewhere.

If the Council cancel this Contract I think there would be ground for a surcharge if any new Tender was accepted at a higher rate.

Councillor Mr. Conis strongly objected to reducing the already insufficient pressure to the district mentioned above and asked the Committee to consider the matter very fully before going further.

That the Cleaning Department shall have the right to suspend employees for offences for which they ought not to be suspended. Such suspensions to be reported to the City Surveyor not later than the following morning; after the day on which the suspension is made, and he will deal with same.

The Powers of the City Surveyor shall include the right of instant dismissal for gross misconduct or gross neglect of duty or dishonesty, but in all ordinary cases a week's notice must be given.

In any case of dismissal or suspension the employee has the right of appeal to the Borough Council or to another Council.

A Notice of the disciplinary code is to be

to be posted up in the Depot and it was suggested a copy might be sent to the Employers Society.

Councillor Matt. Griffin suggested that the entire control of the Cleaning Department Staff should be left in the hands of the City Surveyor.

On the application of the Employers Society it was decided that the pay of men receiving less than 12 days the employees use or strike, is to be done by W. P. P.

On their application on behalf of the Quarry men it was decided to pay the Quarry employees the time stopped from them while they are on strike viz: 12 days - time to be stopped in full from their annual holidays.

Annual Supplies - Twelve tenders were received in reply to advertisement for the Annual Contract which were opened, initiated by the Chairman and referred to W. P. P. to tabulate for next meeting.

Special Street naming Committee -

A Meeting of the above Committee, appointed at the Standing Committee on the 30th March was held in the Mayor's Office, Town Hall, Limerick on Monday the 4th April 1911 at 5 o'clock pm.

Present: Mr. Mayor - presiding
Councillors - Mr. O'Leary, Mr. Giffen, and Mr. McNamee
Billie McLeod to the Town Clerk.

The Committee went into the question of re-naming some of the Streets of the City and calling them after some of the recent Martyrs (Such as St. Columba, St. Mary, St. Michael, St. Peter, and St. John) who were born in the County of Limerick during or after the 12th - 16th century.)

After debating the matter for some time the opinion of the Committee was that about three streets only should be renamed for the present; this decision was arrived at on the ground that if too many names were changed immediately the names would not be very well remembered by the Citizens. It was also the general opinion that the particular names to be given the Streets should be confined to Citizens for the present.

Finally the Mayor was deputed to interview Mr. Clancy and Mr. O'Callaghan and the Misses Dwyer and find out their views on the matter, as it was decided to make a start by calling any three Streets

after Messrs. Clancy, O'Callaghan, and Misses Dwyer to commemorate the great sacrifice of these Martyrs.

The following Streets were suggested as being the most suitable to re-name, but the Committee decided to allow the relatives to select any other Streets they wished (not already bearing a Patriotic name) viz:

For George Clancy Street - Earl Street or the Strand

For Mr. O'Callaghan St. - William Street or the Strand

In the event of the Strand being selected by both relatives - It was decided to divide same by the Wellsby Bridge, and give half to each.

Councillor Care Owen and I attended at the Exhibition at Olympia by order of the Committee on 18th and 19th April for the purpose of inspecting machinery used in Municipal work and improved methods of road making. We also saw the Brush Contractors Co and Mr Percy Griffiths on 20th April in reference to adoption of bitumen to check wear. The best class roads in London are still made with crushed deal blocks, laid on concrete foundation, but the depth of the foundations are now never less than 12" thick. The second class are constructed with 1/2" macadam laid on foundation of 6" tar macadam. Ordinary roads are either tar macadam or bitumen is used instead of tar. For Limerick roads generally I consider tar macadam the most suitable, as it is the cheapest. The Municipal street should be resurfaced with 1" bitumen. The Highways Construction Co who have done a great deal of work in London have quoted me 1/49 per sq. yard for 2" Bitum with 1" wearing surface. The Binder course is composed of Blunnen Gravel & Sand, and the wearing surface consists of Blunnen and Sand. This work would be done much cheaper if done by our own workmen but the plant is expensive. We saw at the Exhibition a machine for this purpose made by Parsons Machinery Co. The cost of this complete would be £1635 at the works. A large shed should be erected at the Quay so as that the work done under cover. This would cost about £500

The tar generally used is distilled. There may be some trouble preventing the Limerick crude tar boiling over. The Cartage of stones from the quarry costs £20 per week. We saw at the Exhibition a tractor and tipping waggons. The price of tractor and two waggons would be £1768.

Mr. J. J. For Limes, Sand and Bricks, Lime, Portland Cement, Bricks & Laths there were four tenders - from W. Morgan & Mahon, Messrs. J. McManus Ltd., Messrs. O'Sullivan & Co. and Messrs. Spright Bros.

The lowest price quotes for each item a marked by W. Morgan & Co. on the Specification form were accepted. As to the quantity of cement the one price for one per ton was quoted by three firms but the Committee was of opinion the material would be used in price and decided to make no contract and left the purchase of cement to the City Surveyor - to use his own discretion.

For Iron-Mongery, Metal Castings, etc., there were two tenders - Messrs. O'Rourke and Messrs. Spright. The lowest price quotes on each tender - price was accepted, as marked by the City Surveyor.

For Stone-laying there was only one quotation received - from E. Mulvey. Demand of whose price was being 10% or 12% - amount of:

and ceiling of the tender was accepted it being pointed out that the above prices were lower than those quoted last year.

For Bricks, All and Paint - there were three tenders submitted - from Messrs. O'Rourke, W. O'Sullivan, W. O'Sullivan and Messrs. Spright Bros. - The lowest price quoted for each item is marked on the tender forms by the City Surveyor, and were accepted.

Cleaning of Streets re. Smaller St. Public initiated a long discussion on the matter of better cleaning of the streets & surveys of the City. It stated the cleaning staff were not altogether so portable as the staff is thrown out of the car has proved away from that particular locality - It made the following suggestions viz: - (a) That notices be issued to shopkeepers to that their trade refuse should be disposed of by themselves & not taken such refuse on the pavements, and that if the notices are not complied with written from City the officers be instructed to put the shopkeepers in force.

To: Each County, District and Urban Council.

A Chaira,

During the coming financial year large sums of money representing the balance of Grants withheld from your Council during the war period after deducting all the normal payments made to the British Government in respect of interest and Principal on loans etc. will be available. This will relieve the rate for which you are now estimating and enable the County Councils to bring back to normal conditions the service which has been generally most neglected throughout the Country, namely, - Road Maintenance.

The Ministry of Local Government, realising the enormous expense to which further neglect of the roads must naturally lead, has decided to encourage immediate action towards their repair by forwarding the first instalments which come to hand of the withheld Grants to those Councils which are reported by our Inspectors to be devoting to roads the necessary attention.

Each Local Authority must include in the estimate for the coming year all sums due to the British Government which were withheld and in striking the rate for the year 1922-23 you should assume an Agricultural Grant equivalent to that of the normal year together with the balance of Grants due to your Council from the war period after discharging all liabilities in respect of Government Loans. Where the Agricultural Land in the year 1921-22 received the benefits of differentiation of rates based on the assumption that the Grants should be credited whether received or not, the above should not be construed to give to Agricultural Land greater relief than usual.

Your Office Staff, with the assistance of the County Surveyor, should immediately tackle the question of internal financial adjustments as between different services in your County, and where monies levied for one service were expended on another the adjustment should be completed with the least possible delay. The Road Service in most cases has been particularly hit in this way. You will therefore now consider it your duty to restore this important branch of your administration proceeding as follows:-

You will instruct your County Surveyor to prepare his Road Estimate for maintenance and repair not including Bridges, with a view to putting the roads back to their normal condition within the year. Such estimate should not be reduced by the Council unless it exceeds the last approved limit of expenditure. Having thus provided a reasonable annual estimate under prevailing conditions you will add and place at the Surveyor's disposal all monies levied in respect of Road Expenditure during the past two years and not applied for that purpose.

With a view to levelling up the total expenditure on roads over the past three years by the end of the current year you will further instruct your Surveyor to estimate the Council's war losses for bridges, roads, etc., and lodge a claim with the Council's Secretary just as a private individual would. In this connection it will not be necessary to hold over work of repair until distress are secured. In fact it is a matter of primary

importance that bridges which have been temporarily filled up are now causing or are liable to cause floods, should be dealt with immediately.

Your Surveyor should therefore be formally instructed to get his road and maintenance going with the least possible delay while you on your part ought to have arrangements completed for meeting expenses incurred by him in connection with this Scheme.

At a Conference called for the purpose on the 24th instant a representative of this Department explained to the surveyors in detail the line of action they should take up with a view to assisting their several Councils in every possible way to have the terms of this Circular carried out without delay. It should be noted that for the year 1922-23 Limit and Expenditure will apply only to the Surveyor's Estimate and not in any way interfere with the gross expenditure on Roads. Surveyors will see that the terms of the scheme have since been considerably changed. This, however, will necessitate only slight alterations in their plans.

Motor Transport

Meeting of the Committee was held in the Council Chamber Town Hall Limerick on 2nd day of February, 1932, at the hour of 5:30 o'clock from the Workshop. Ald. Sir Oswald Mayor, in the Chair.

The Committee then discussed the question of George O'Brien - Mr. Sheehan said he would require 140 tons per day, and a tractor engine and

couple of trailers would be necessary owing to the distance of any of the quarries from the City. The cost of the present average 76 p. ton. The cost of traction engine and four trailers would be £400. (1000 for engine and fuel cost tractor).

It was calculated that the saving per week on the working of the new quarry (employing County labourers etc) would be about £25.

The Committee did not favour the idea of re-employing the present quarry staff in the new quarry, as it would necessitate the purchase of a special conveyance for bringing them to and carrying them from their work, and owing to the loss of time this would entail.

It was suggested that the able staff might be procured off or employed in some other capacity under the Corporation.

On this point it was decided to consult the mine Society and it was arranged that a deputation therefrom should await on the next meeting of the Committee.

HOUSING OF WORKERS

STATEMENT BY PROVI- SIONAL GOVERNMENT

Circular to Public Bodiss

His Excellency the Provisional Government has issued the following circular to Irish public bodiss:—Housing of the Working Classes (Ireland) Act, 1921. A Circular—The Minister of Local Government desires to state that the Provisional Government have had under careful and anxious consideration the best method of assisting housing in municipal areas in such a way as to secure a speedy supply of houses and a reduction of unemployment. There are doubtless special difficulties with respect to these matters, but the Government consider they can rely upon such a measure of interest and untied effort on the part of local authorities and all others concerned as will enable those difficulties to be overcome. It is clear that the Provisional Government cannot adopt any policy of financial assistance which may involve the future Government of the State as hitherto in financial commitments extending over a long period of years, and the Minister is confident that local authorities will not expect any such policy to be announced at this juncture. The issue of long period loans by the Government, if only for this reason, not practicable, and any State assistance must be suitable for the present transitional stage.

The Provisional Government are accordingly prepared at present to give State aid which they consider ample on the following lines:—

In such cases where a special housing rate of not less than 1s in the £ is struck for the purpose of new construction and arrangements are made (subject to the sanction of the Minister) to obtain from local banks or other sources a short period loan equal to three times the produce of the aforesaid rate, the Government will be prepared to make a grant in the proportion of 1 to 1 to the total amount raised locally by housing rate and loan. Provision for meeting the loan charges must be made in addition to the special housing rate of 1s, and such charges will not rank for the Government subsidy.

For example, if a municipal authority, the assessable valuation of whose district is £100,000, raises by a 1s rate £750, and borrows locally £3,750, making the local contribution £4,500, then the Government will contribute £4,500 x 2, i.e., £9,000 making available £13,500, which is sufficient to provide 12 new houses at £1,125 each as the result of one year's operations.

The Minister understands that the great majority of the municipal authorities furnished particulars of their housing needs and proposals in the autumn of 1919 on special forms of survey issued by the Local Government Board of the British Government, and in that in every case where sites were selected by the authorities for the purpose of such schemes they have been inspected and approved, or alternative sites suggested. In this respect, therefore, there seems nothing to hinder steps being taken forthwith to obtain possession of sites with a view to building.

The Council (or Town Commissioners) should therefore at once proceed, if they intend to avail of the Government's offer, to include in their estimates of expenditure for the coming year the produce of a poundage of at least 1s as a special housing rate for new construction. At the same time they should ascertain from their measurer or some other source particulars of the terms of interest and repayment on which a loan of an amount equal to three times the produce of the special rate may be obtained.

It is requested that each local authority will, as soon as possible furnish the Minister with information as to the extent to which it proposes to avail itself of the foregoing offer of the Government. Full financial particulars of proposals should be forwarded together with the proposed lay out, house designs, etc., where such documents have not already been approved. Where approval has been given it should be stated with which section of the scheme it is intended to proceed in the first instance.

The Minister trusts that not only will local authorities treat this matter as urgent, but that persons interested in suitable sites will recognize their responsibility for facilitating in every way this attempt to grapple with the housing problem, the solution of which has been so much delayed.

Statement made by a deputation from the "Limerick Workers Housing Association" at the Town Hall, Limerick, Wednesday 22nd March 1922.

Mr. Mayor and Council,

AS you are aware the "Limerick Workers Housing Association" come before you tonight in co-operation with the Representatives of the Limerick Trades Council for the purpose of pressing upon you the necessity for the immediate erection of 3,000 houses in this City for the workers who at present exist in the most shockingly neglected property, neglected now for years by your Council, and because your Council did not do its duty with the powers it possessed.

We now urge upon you to do your duty by striking a Rate to provide houses for us and to relieve the appalling congestion existing. Argument may be used against your Council striking a Housing Rate, but no argument against, should convince you that things should go on as they are - Housing evils cannot go on any longer, and it is imperative for the honour and peace of the town that every means available be grasped for the purpose of putting an end to slumdom in Limerick once and for all.

Some time ago The Late Most Rev. Dr. O'Dwyer in an address on the "Housing of the Workers" at the Agricultural Hall, Limerick Exhibition said:-

"In this City a state of things exists that is absolutely appalling. Hundreds and thousands are living in conditions, in which, I will say deliberately, it would be inhuman and cruel to condemn convicted criminals to live in."

We append fifty cases for your inspection and Report, and to substantiate our claim for houses to be erected. In those cases you will find overcrowding unparalleled in any City, com-

for the purpose of taking advantage of the grants outlined in the letter from the Government.

The Mayor questioned the Deputation on their attitude in amending certain houses in the City recently - Mr. Jarkin (in reply) stated that if the Corporation took up the matter of providing housing accommodation seriously this attitude would not continue. In the course of a general conversation on the subject of providing a rate for housing purposes, His Worship pointed out the difficulties the Council had to contend with if they strike too high a rate - he referred to the figures of outstanding Rates (nearly £50,000) etc. on month of Feb'y 422

The Deputation thanked the Committee for receiving them and withdrew, feeling confident that the Council would do their best in the matter -

At a later stage of the meeting the question was again taken up -

The letter from the Provisional Government was read, as was also a report of the City Surveyor viz:-

Some of the members were in favour of dropping the Road Improvement Scheme and utilizing the shilling in the £ for the Housing purposes - Hereby raising two shillings for Housing Scheme which would enable the Corporation to build about 120 houses.

Councillor Dr. Griffin suggested multiplying

the cost per house to meet etc by fitting more houses on the land than was proposed by the Surveyor.

After a long discussion it was decided to refer further consideration to the Housing Committee and the Housing Committee date of meetings being fixed for these Committee -

The Minutes of the last meeting held on the 27/2/27 Feb 544, were read, confirmed and signed.

Arising out of same Mr. Seacoch reported the result of his inspection of the various Quarries around the County. He had failed to make term with any of the owners. The only one now available was Lord Sulistat Carny - over 5 mile from the City - This he considered too far away.

He submitted the following letter from a Mr. Hartigan to carry out "maxphalts" work on the roads, with limestone which could be got in the City - viz. Galvan Hotel Dublin, 14/3/27

"To the City Surveyor -
 Sir Sir - I beg to confirm my verbal offer of today to undertake the provision of super-surface, maxphalts, and all that necessary for the making of maxphalts necessaries, for the sum of two shillings and three pence per sq. yard

for not less than two miles of Road. Since I supply a combined stone dryer and San Mateo mixer, with a man to operate, all maxphalts (the Corporation to Cart/iron Station or Sacks), tar boilers, and buckets, rammers etc.

I will supply all petrol, paraffin and lubricant for mixing plant, the Corporation to supply fuel for tar boiling, and to move the plant from place to place & the work provided I will supply all plant, tar and maxphalts for any tar painting work at 20 per sq. yard.

Mr. Seacoch pointed out that by taking advantage of this offer they could save 2 miles of Road 10 yds wide for the sum of £3960 plus the cost of rolling the road, etc, which should be done by the Corporation in the usual course.

He strongly recommended treating the road by this means.

Some of the Members considered that two miles might be too expensive if an experiment is to be put forward no guarantee in the letter. Mr. Hartigan was asked to write Mr. Hartigan to the effect that the Committee were not inclined to do two miles, and to ask him to give a guarantee as to its life - say about 5 years at least.

Cleaning, Repairing, Improvement and Artisans Dwellings Committee

Fortnightly Meetings of these Committee held in the Council Chamber, Town Hall, on Wednesday evening, the 13th day of April 1922, immediately after the meeting of the Fire Brigade, by the 20 Group of Committee which commenced at 7.30 o'clock P.M.

G. Paul O'Brien, Deputy Mayor, in the Chair. Names of other members present are entered in Minutes of Fire Brigade Committee of same date - see also, Book.

Officials - Mr. A. H. Donohoe and Mr. C. G. Sawyer.

The Minutes of the last Meeting were read confirmed and signed as a true and correct Record.

CS' Pay List Bill amounting to £99.18.4 were passed for payment.

CS' Finance List Bill amounting to £110.19 were approved and referred to the Finance Committee for payment.

CS' A Mr. Day was granted to one employee, amounting to seven shillings and sixpence.

The City Surveyor reported he had ordered two of the Graveling Cart from the Lord Surveyor of the Exchequer, instead of one as authorized at last meeting, as it would require them during the season, and they were cheap at the price. The Committee approved of his action having

Watchmen - Application submitted from Corporation Employees Society asking that an employee named James who had been employed by Mr. Peacock to a watchman on some work in Thomondgate be paid a day and a half for one days work having been on duty for 1 1/2 hrs.

No order was made on the application as watchmen wages are not reckoned by the hour throughout the City generally. but Mr. Peacock was asked to arrange the pay of watchmen with the Society and point out to them that unless they agree to a reasonable wage the Corporation would be compelled to employ other workmen from their Society.

Shill Contract - A list of contracts made by the Soil or better of local authorities throughout Ireland were submitted by Mr. Peacock together with applications for contracts named therein for orders for supplies of sand etc. & they had been accepted for by G. Smith - The Committee took no action on this matter as they proposed to make their contracts locally, and keep money and employment in the City.

Selecting Powder - The City Surveyor reports he had applied to the British Department, F. H. Larwin, Burgess & Co. Dublin for a permit to get a supply of blasting powder for quarry work and he received a reply asking for information as to the trade from whom the powder would be purchased, the stores, and method of transport

from trader place to Quarry. The information was wanted owing to the fact that Mr. Peacock had recently been stated in course of transit & was ordered that the Department be informed that the orders would be stored in Wm. S. Peacock or some other place if sent from Dublin (Mr. Peacock stating that none of the local traders would take it) and every precaution would be taken to secure it's safety in transit.

Imports of Nuivana - Application submitted from Mr. Dr. Hovinger, applying for Commission on fine imposed by the Magistrate in cases of prosecution for dumping refuse on the public street &c.

It was pointed out that the Council did not receive these fines, although applied for several times, and Mr. Hovinger had recently been granted full time pay owing to his not receiving the Commission - The application was therefore marked "read" - no action being taken thereon. Also on the motion of G. O'Flynn.

Amateur - Letter submitted and read from the San-anton Society pointing out the amount of unemployment amongst their members, and a they understood "hard time" was required by the Corporation they asked that their members be employed on the work. The Surveyor said he did not require any work for the work he was about to carry out, but no order was accordingly made on the application -

Electric Cables. During our of inquiry it was stated that the Electrical Engineer objected to the wayleave granted to Messrs. Dunne to run a cable across the Dock Road. He admitted it was a matter which should be dealt with by the Electrical Committee. The Recommendation of the last Committee Meeting was not changed.

John Lons. The City Surveyor was asked to remove any marks of broken stones from the ground of the Technical School.

Mayor's Staff Draper. On their application the Mayor's Drapers were granted a sum of £100 (one hundred) each in lieu of Drapers - No qualification having been required for such by the Clothing Committee. This was on the motion of C. New Griffin seconded by C. Redden.

Footpath in Cabbage Market Place. C. Redden explained that a bad footpath in Cabbage Market Place had the Surveyor was asked to substitute concrete for the rubble stone there.

Subway. Letter read from the Friends of Citizens and Subways Association & a strong Resolution passed by that body, as follows: -
(1) "That if the Electric Light Concerns cannot be run without a loss the Corporation ought to dispose of them and remove the City and Subways from further loss." It was ordered that the Clerk be ordered to reply to this and say that the Council are prepared to

receive offers for the purchase of the Concern.
(2) A Resolution approving of the action of the Council in striking a Rate for Housing Purposes but pointing out that as it was estimated each house would cost about £100 to erect that any works carried out under the Housing Scheme should be done by contract in open competition. The Town Clerk has ordered to reply pointing out that contracts are always made for an Act work in competition and the same procedure will apply in the present scheme.

(3) A Resolution strongly recommending the Corporation to get the Roadway at the Sarsfield Bridge properly repaired while the bridge is closed for a section of New Street Bridge.

During the week Mr. Seaworth stated he would be starting the "Meyshale" work next week and asked for instructions as to the roadways they intend doing. It suggested Sarsfield Sarsfield Bridge and the North Road to Clear Factory, and portion of Blaney Sarsfield, Glentworth Sarsfield, Bannock Sarsfield and portion of Scotland Sarsfield opposite the Town Hall.

LIMERICK ADVISORY COMMITTEE FOR JUVENILE EMPLOYMENT
 PAPERS OF CORRESPONDENCE RE JUVENILE STREET-TRADING

At a meeting of the Limerick Advisory Committee for
 Juvenile Employment held in July 1916, the following
 resolution was unanimously adopted and forwarded to the
 Mayor of Limerick :-

"That the Mayor be requested to frame a local Bye
 Law to prevent children under 12 years from selling"
 "newspapers provided that no such bye-law is in existence"

In the following November a deputation from the Committee was
 received by the Improvement Committee of the Borough Council
 and as a result of the discussion which took place, the
 Improvement Committee agreed that Bye-Laws under Sec. 2 of
 the Employment of Children Act 1903 for the regulation of
 Street-Trading in Limerick should be drafted and that the
 necessary estimates should be prepared.

In April 1916 the Advisory Committee was informed by the
 Town Clerk that owing to the increase in the estimates for that
 year, it had been decided to make no provision for the
 administration of the proposed Bye-Laws.

The Committee accordingly adjourned the question for the
 time being, but in the autumn of 1916, in view of strong
 representations made to them by the Munster Women's Franchise
 League on the subject of the evil effects of unregulated
 street-trading on the youth of the city, the Committee
 decided to re-open the matter with the Borough Council, and
 a letter was addressed to the Town Clerk, by the Chairman,
 Lady Emily.

As a result of this further action on the part of the
 Committee a Joint Conference was held in May 1917 and
 attended by Representatives of the Borough Council, the
 Munster Women's Franchise League, the School Attendance
 Committee and the Advisory Committee for Juvenile Employment
 the consider the best means of dealing with the problem.

The Conference recommended the Council to adopt Bye-Laws to
 regulate Street-Trading, and these were accordingly drafted and
 eventually adopted by the Council in Nov. 1917. The Advisory
 Committee was then informed that the Bye-Laws could not come
 into operation until the following year when provision for the
 cost of administration could be made in the estimates. This
 provision would appear to have been duly made in April 1918
 and ratified by the Council.

The Advisory Committee was, however, subsequently informed
 that when the question of the final ratification of the Bye
 Laws came before the Council, the majority were in favour of
 permitting street-trading up to 11 p.m. and as an amendment to this
 effect would defeat the purpose of the Bye-Laws, the whole
 matter was dropped.

BYE-LAWS.

Made by the County Borough Council of Limerick, pursuant to the Employment of Children Act 1903, in respect of Street Trading by persons under the age of Sixteen.

1. No person actually or apparently under the age of 16 shall trade in the streets, unless while holding a licence in accordance with these Bye-Laws.
2. No licence shall be granted to any person under the age of 11 years of age.
3. No. girls under the age of 16 years shall be employed or engaged in street trading after 6 p.m., and no boy under the age of 14 shall be so employed or engaged after 9 p.m. all the year round.
4. No. person under the age of 16 years shall be employed or engaged in street trading on Sundays except between the hours of 7 am and 11P.M.
5. No person under the age of 16 engaged in street trading shall enter any premises for the purpose of trading or delivering goods.
6. No child who is not exempt from School attendance shall be ~~employed~~ employed in or carry on street trading during school hours
7. A Licence to engage in street trading shall be granted by the Council to any person between the ages of 11 and 16 who applied for it and produces:-
 - a. A Certificate of Birth or other satisfactory evidence showing such person to be over the age of 11 years.
 - b. The consent of his or her parents or guardian to his or her engaging in such occupation.
 and such applicant shall not be refused except on the ground that the applicant is by reason of physical or mental deficiency or in the opinion of the Corporation otherwise unfit to trade in the streets.
8. Licences shall be granted for a period of one year only and shall expire on the first day of August in each year.
9. Every licensed person, while trading in the streets, shall wear upon the right arm the badge prescribed by the Council.
10. No charge shall be made by the Council for any Licence or Badge.
11. The Council may suspend or revoke any licence if the holder is convicted of any offence, or commits any breach of these bye-laws, or in any way defaces, lends or parts with his or her badge, or is in the opinion of the Corporation otherwise unfit to retain said licence.

Fortnightly Meeting of above Committee held in the Council Chamber Town Hall, on Wednesday evening the 14th day of October 1922, at the hour of 8.30 o'clock, p.m. immediately after the Meeting of the Fire Brigade, fighting in Committee which commenced at 7.30 o'clock -

The Minutes of the last meeting were read, confirmed, and signed.

By Post Bill amounting £80.14.11 were examined and passed for payment.

An application from W. Dan Donigan, Inspector of nuisances for discount on fines imposed by the Courts was deferred for information.

The Minutes of the Streets Committee were ordered to be laid up for particulars as to the disposal of four Grant offered by the Government towards road improvements.

Two Indentures were submitted for supply of Cuts and Bars to Carr R. Depot for the twelve months from 1st October 1922; and signed by the Mayor as follows, viz: -

Mr. J. J. Foley, Wickham St. quotes forty three shillings per Barrel for best coal and 24 shillings per 110 lbs for Brown. Mr. James H. Roche, Upper St. quotes twenty-one shillings per Barrel for best and nine shillings sixpence per 110 lbs for Brown. The order of Mr. Roche being breast it was decided to recommend it acceptance to the Council.

Storesaving Contract -

A Representative attended from the Transport Workers Union in reference to the Storesaving Contract which had been given to Mr. Welch. He stated Mr. Welch was not a fully pledged member of the Union & it was an error in the Union Books.

The City Surveyor states he received a letter from the Transport Workers Union on 26th September in which it was stated that Mr. Welch was a member of the Union and therefore eligible for the Contract.

CORPORATION AND POLITICAL PRISONERS.

Reply From General Brennan.

At the last meeting of the Corporation a resolution was passed calling for the abolition of the military authorities in Limerick, and the treatment of political prisoners in Limerick gaol and barracks. The resolution asked that facilities be given a committee of the Corporation, consisting of Mr. W. M. Nolan, Mr. J. O'Sullivan, Mr. J. Casey, and Mr. J. M. O'Sullivan, to investigate the conditions of the prison and to report to the Corporation.

The following reply to the resolution has been sent:-

13th October.

To W. M. Nolan, Esq., Town Clerk, Limerick.

A O'HARA.-I am in receipt of yours of the 10th inst. enclosing copy of Corporation resolution.

The resolution contains allegations about Limerick gaol which I propose setting you have some information. Limerick gaol was certainly overcrowded for a very obvious reason. When I was in the gaol I always had much trouble to get out of the country, I always had much more trouble than I desired, in fact at one period I spent some months there without a single complaint. It was an extraordinary fact that now the English are gone there are no complaints, and it is necessary to provide proper accommodation for them all. However, we are doing our best, and the congestion has been considerably relieved since Monday by the removal of 200 prisoners.

No prisoner is being ill-treated in Limerick gaol. The statement that they are is a deliberate and unfounded lie. The prisoners have never made a complaint of this nature.

Full information will be given to all interested parties in every instance where the prisoners possess this information in the hands of the prison authorities.

We haven't sufficient time at our disposal to send a man round through the streets of Limerick to try and find him for some interested friend or relative. If a man refuses to give his name surely he should have sufficient spirit to stand up to this attitude, and not to try to get by publicly or otherwise what he pretends to return.

All parcels of food and clothing have been, and will be, delivered, so long as this regulation is not altered.

Your Council will, I am sure, admit that the prisoners can obtain to be more or less an authority on prisoners and their complaints. I have too clear a recollection of all the old dodges in prison to take very much notice of all the insinuations about prisoners' treatment, which were commonly made by the prisoners in several jails, and my principal business was to liberating every petty little incident into a wild outbreak about cruelty to prisoners, etc.

I have been there myself, you see, so I am not likely to be misled by the insinuations of the conduct or ill-treatment, it is only necessary to report it to this H.Q. and it will be dealt with at once.

For your information I might add that the prisoners' mind is inactivity or idleness. It is because they prefer it that way. As a matter of fact I understand that at present the prisoners in Limerick keep their quarters peacefully clean and sanitary, but if they didn't it is a matter of course, not my business and disinterest.

In conclusion I might add that I spent four terms in Limerick jail and I never saw a representative of the Limerick Corporation there either as a "Visiting Justice," or as a "Keep order" party. That was before the British went through.

CORPORATION & POLITICAL PRISONERS.

Reply to General Brennan's Letter.

The following reply to General Brennan's letter on the above subject, which appeared in our Tuesday issue, has been sent out for publication:—

Town Clerk's Office, Town Hall, Limerick, 20th October, 1922. A CHAIRMAN—I am honoured to acknowledge your reply to my letter of 17th, instant, as follows:— "Your letter purporting to be a reply to the above subject, was received by me on the 17th inst. and I have read it with interest. It is a very interesting and important document, and I have no doubt that it will be of great value to the Corporation. I have no objection to its being published in your paper, and I am sure that it will be of great interest to your readers. I am, Sir, very truly yours, W. M. Nolan, Town Clerk."

For this purpose they have appointed his Worship Alderman S. O'Mara, Mayor, Alderman Casey and Councillor M. Griffin to act as a Committee of Enquiry, and they call upon the Corporation to give them the necessary facilities for holding and investigating complaints as were formerly accorded under British rule to the Visiting Justices.

You will see from the terms of the above resolution that the Board of Council made no allegations for the simple reason as stated, that they were not unanimous, however, in their opinion, and that they were not unanimous in their opinion as to the necessity of the Corporation to give them the necessary facilities for holding and investigating complaints as were formerly accorded under British rule to the Visiting Justices.

H. 304/59/1922, regarding the Commandeered Houses at Garryowen, stating the Minister would give favourable consideration to a proposal of the Corporation to borrow from a Bank or other local source such sums as may be necessary to finance a reasonable scheme of purchase under the Small Dwellings Acquisition Acts, 1899-1919, for these houses, if the owners, occupiers and Corporation are now willing to co-operate to that end.

There were present at this conference—The Deputy Mayor—Cr. Paul A. O'Brien, Councillors Gough and Hennessy, The Town Clerk, The Asst. Town Clerk, The Law Agent and The City Surveyor, on behalf of the Corporation. Mr. Charles Ebrill, Solr., on behalf of the Owners.

The Letter from the Local Government Housing Dept. was read. I am in receipt of yours of the 20th instant
in further reference to the question of Visiting Justices.

I notice that the point which is most stressed
by the Corporation is the fact that the British
Government gave them certain facilities and that I am
expected to "go and do likewise." The "privileges" or
"facilities" afforded by the British to either public
bodies or private individuals during their occupation
of this country are hardly matters for public parade now.
Because the British did a certain thing is no reason why
I should act similarly. I have had some experience of
another very important public body during the past three
years and I can assure you that hardly a single one of its
members would be alive when the English left the country
if it weren't for their "facility" in using their rifles.
That was the only "facility" they ever got from the
British.

I notice the charges of ill-treatment have now
fined down from "jails and barracks" to "barracks". As
there are so many barracks would it not be more to the
point if the particular barracks were mentioned.

The Corporation thinks these matters call for
an "impartial" investigation. So do I. If the Limerick
Corporation can submit the names of an impartial

Committee to me I will immediately admit them to any

Fortnightly Meeting of the Committee held in the Council Chamber, Town Hall, Limerick, on Wednesday the 15th day of November 1922, at the hour of 8 o'clock p.m. immediately after the Fire Brigade & fighting the Committee. After a discussion Councilor O'Brien proposed and Councilor Geary seconded a resolution

Cleaning - Stewards should attend the Committee in future and keep a diary of work done.

C.S. Councilor O'Brien considers that there should be some system of retaining or increasing the cleaning staff according to climatic conditions.

It was ordered that a special report be made to the next meeting on the cleaning of the Street.

Horses. The Const. Surveyor reported that one horse had been purchased for the Cleaning Dept. Two of the old horses were certified by the Vet. Surgeon as unfit for further work and he asked for and authority was granted to the Surveyor to sell off the old horses and to purchase two horses to replace them.

C.S. Councilor Kennedy commented on the shortage of Cart Horses for collecting mud off the Street. He suggested that it was agreed that only those streets from which the mud can be collected immediately be swept so that the mud would not have to remain in the Canal Gullies.

The question of buying a Motor for sweeping and collecting mud was noted and discussed. Councilor Griffin proposed and Councilor Flynn seconded the acceptance of the trust quotation (W. Boughlan) - He then said he considered the figure quoted by W. Boughlan very reasonable. The Chairman put the Resolution of S. Griffin from the Chair and declared it passed unanimously - the vote to commence immediately.

In reference to the Resolution W. Dawson, City
Surveyor, reported as follows:-

"The price 14/6 per cubic yard is very
reasonable and much lower than the offer
of W. Hartigan 15/- per ton or 18/6 per cub. yd.
W. Hartigan would, however, deliver to any
Street in the Borough. W. Dawson only deliver
to the Barr's Boundary at Blackboy Pike.

If W. Dawson could not guarantee a
delivery of a definite quantity all
the year round it would be almost
wiser to consider the offer."

In reply to members of the Committee W:
Dawson supplemented above report by
saying that the County Council offer may
not be a feasible proposition -
He would have to pay cartage from

Blackburn to the City Roads as well as loading expenses.

The cost of turning out stone out of Sprocket Quarry was 16/- per ton some months ago. It now cost him 13/- per ton.

In reference to objection raised by the Quarry Staff and Operative Employees Society against getting stone by Contract - Councillor Dan Griffin said it was not the Council's intention to dismiss any of the Quarry Staff and he referred to the feelings of the Spearhead and Quarry Committee as embodied in Minute of last year, which went into the question of procuring a Quarry but failed.

The sense of the Committee was that the men presently employed in the Quarry would not be dismissed. They would be absorbed into other departments in the Corporation and paid their wages.

Allderman Walsh contended that it was not economical to buy stone by contract and at the same time pay the wages of the present Quarry Staff.

It was again pointed out that if the Council was to take portion of Conig Road and Quarry that it would involve a capital expenditure of about £4,300, and if same was worked by the Corporation workmen the cost of the stone would be at least 30/- per ton.

After some further discussion it was decided to hear a deputation from the Operative Employees and Quarry workers Union who waited on the Committee in reference to this matter.

Mr. Coffey, secretary of the Union, said they objected to the Council getting stone by contract as it would mean dismissing the Quarry workers. Another member of the Deputation (Mr. McFalloran) said they would not allow any contract to be spread on the Street of Limerick.

It was pointed out to the Deputation that the Council did not intend to dismiss the Quarry workers at Sprocket - work would be found for them in other departments of the Corporation, such as the Cleaning Staff etc., or they would be paid their wages until such time as they could be absorbed into other employment.

In reference to this matter the Deputation pointed out that they had at present about 30 idle men in their Union, some of these men had not got employment from the Corporation for years (as a matter of fact some of them used in other employment outside the Corporation).

If the Quarry Staff was absorbed into the Cleaning Staff or other departments, the idle men above referred to would be shut out of Corporation employment.

Mr. Cronin suggested employing the Quarry Staff on some sort independently of the Cleaning Staff.

The Deputy Mayor and other members of the Council having explained the position of the Corporation

to the man - their difficulty in procuring a suitable quarry, and the necessity for any good stone on the roadways etc - Mr Coffey on behalf of the Deputation said they would consider the situation amongst themselves and would let the Council know their decision.

It was therefore decided to defer consideration of the whole matter until a communication is received from the Employers Union.

Letter from Roads Department - Local Government Board -

Letter dated 1st January was submitted from the Roads Department forwarding tracing of system of proposed trunk roads in former of City and requesting information as to total mileage of these roads which the City Surveyor was in a position to improve or reconstruct in a period of 12 months with cost of plant owned by the Council, the estimate of expenditure as approved by the Council for the current year, and estimate and quantities for improving or reconstructing the roads, etc.

- The best routes are (1) Pancha Cross to William St;
- and (2) Clere St (two lanes) to William St;

O'Donnell, Mr. Coxin, Mr. Joyce, Mr. O'Shea, and Mr. Joyce) was submitted and read.

On the motion of Mr. W. O'Donnell it was decided to state that the contents in the 3rd para. commencing "At the time of Mr. Joyce's appointment in the City etc."

I return enclosures in yours of this date. I have made certain slight verbal amendments in same. These Bye-Laws can be made under the Employment of Children Act 1902.

With regard to No 6, and the words "or in the opinion of the Corporation otherwise unfit to trade in the Streets". I think the phrasing of this is too vague and that this reservation of power should be rescinded in view of the fact that section 2 of the Act of 1902 provides "the granting of a licence to trade shall not be made subject to any conditions having reference to the poverty or general bad character of the Applicant".

I should also point out that under the Act mentioned these Bye-Laws are of no effect until confirmed by the Lord Lieutenant whose powers are now, presumably, exercisable by the Governor-General, and the Council will have to publish the Bye-Laws in such manner as the Act named shall direct for 30 days at least prior to confirmation. I think the proposed Bye-Laws should be submitted for preliminary sanction to the Local Govt Board for transmission, if necessary, to the Governor-General pursuant to Section 16 of the Employment of Children Act, 1902, Section VII, Chap 75.

No person under the age of 16 shall trade in the street unless while holding a license in accordance with these Bye-Laws.

No License shall be granted to any person under fourteen years of age.

No girl under the age of 16 shall be employed or engaged in Street Trading after 6 p.m., and no boy under the age of 16 shall be employed or engaged after 9:30 p.m. all the year round.

No person under the age of 16 shall be employed or engaged in Street Trading on Sundays except between the hours of 7 a.m. and 12 noon.

No person under the age of 16 engaged in Street Trading shall enter any premises licensed for the sale of intoxicating liquor for consumption on the premises for the purpose of trading or delivering goods.

A license to engage in Street Trading shall be granted by the Council to any person between the ages of 14 and 16 years who applies for it and produces:-

- (a) A certificate of birth or other satisfactory evidence showing such person to be over 14 years of age.
- (b) The consent of his or her parents or Guardian to his or her engaging in such occupation.
- (c) A certificate from Principal of School which applicant last attended, such certificate must show that the applicant has at least reached fifth standard.

And such application shall not be refused except on the ground that the applicant is by reason of physical or mental deficiency, or in the opinion of the Corporation otherwise unfit to trade in the streets. License shall be granted for a period of one year and shall expire on 30th day of June in each year.

Every licensed person while trading in the street shall wear upon the right arm the badge prescribed by the Council.

No charge shall be made by the Council for any license but a rent of one shilling for a badge shall be charged which must be paid before the annual issue of a license. Adverting to your letter of the 6th ultimo, regarding the position of Mr. O'Donnell as City Rate Collector, the Ministry of Local Government would explain that they have been approached on behalf of Mr. O'Donnell, who is concerned about his future position in the service of the Corporation.


The Ministry understand that Mr. O'Donnell's original terms of remuneration were 6d. in the £ on the collection of rates and water rents from the proceeds of which he in turn pays three assistants engaged by him. Allowing for these disbursements the Ministry gather that his personal emoluments averaged about £450 a year from 1915 to 1918. Subsequently they increased to over £900 in respect of the year ended March 1922.

It is understood that the Corporation imposed revised terms of remuneration at the end of 1921, debarring Mr. O'Donnell from commission on water rents, and reducing his poundage to 4d. on the rates. It appears that these terms would only admit of a maximum earning power by Mr. O'Donnell of £985 on foot of his warrant for the year ended March last, which, after payment of his assistants at the usual rate would reduce his personal emoluments to a possible amount of only £400. If the facts are as outlined and if the work necessitates employment of ~~the~~ three assistants by Mr. O'Donnell, the Ministry consider it somewhat unfair that his personal earnings should now be reduced to a figure substantially less than that received by him for a number of years when the cost of living had been increased to its present extent.

The

The Ministry, however, have informed Mr. O'Donnell that, unless he seeks their intervention by way of resignation of office, with their prior sanction for the purposes of section 8 of the Local Government Act of 1919, the Ministry could not interfere with the Corporation's discretion in the matter.

A SCHEME OF TENANT PURCHASE.

Dear Sir,

We are directed by the Executive Committee to forward the information of your Council particulars of a scheme of tenant-purchase for houses recently built by the Ardee Town Commissioners under the 1922 Housing Order.

The scheme has received the sanction of the Ministry of Local Government, and may be of interest to those Councils that have built or are about to build under the 1922 Housing Grant.

The Executive are aware that many Councils are desirous of selling, to the tenants thereof, the houses built under the various Housing Acts. The present scheme concerns only houses built under the 1922 Grant of the Irish Government. The Executive have under consideration, in conjunction with the Housing Department of the Ministry of Local Government, schemes of tenant-purchase which may suit houses built under the earlier Acts and Grants; and we hope to send suggestions later.

Memorandum of Scheme of Tenant Purchase adopted by Ardee Town Commissioners with the approval of the Ministry for Local Government.

These houses cost, including all charges, £670 each, of which the larger proportion was derived from the free grant made by the Irish Government. In order to arrive at a basis of valuation which may be fair to the purchasing tenant, having in view the probable decrease in cost of building hereafter, the present selling value of each house is fixed at 52½ per cent. of its cost, or £351 13s. 0d. If the tenant is not in a position to pay this money down, he shall deposit a sum amounting to 2½ per cent. of the cost, or £16 15s. 0d., which deducted from the aforesaid selling price of £351 13s. 0d., leaves £335 to be paid by weekly instalments. In the case of Ardee, the period for payment is 25½ years; and the amount to be paid yearly, calculating the interest on the loan at 5 per cent., and arranging for equal weekly payments by the purchaser (on the annuity system), is £23 7s. 9d. To this are added small sums for fire insurance and administration and £1 ground rent, making up the round sum of £26 per annum, or 10½ per week for the aforesaid period of 25½ years.

There are clauses against sub-letting in whole or part during the period of repayment of the loan, requiring the tenant-purchaser to keep the house in proper sanitary condition and to pay rates and taxes, forbidding their use as a shop, and providing for the redemption of the loan before the fixed period, if a tenant should be desirous of saving interest charges. The purchaser is permitted to at any time sell his interest in the premises to a bona-fide intending resident, to be approved by the Commissioners.

A feature of the scheme is the ultimate creation of a fund (representing the proportion of the Dail's grant which the tenant-purchaser will repay and the proceeds of the special rate of 1922-3) which may be used in aid of future housing schemes.

As the Committee were very anxious to facilitate landlords who wished to purchase their dwellings under the Act, it was unanimously decided to apply to the Trusts Finance Dept for the advance required viz. about £200, and arrangements being made left in the hands of the Town & Dublin Committee.

Prising out of 1/2 acre at Lot 1054, re application of Mr. Murphy of 13 Ryan's Cottage for permission to erect a wooden hut 12' x 6' on space of ground at end of Prospect (Limerick) Cottages, the City Surveyors reported that the space was left so as to reduce the number of houses to the acre and he did not think the Committee should allow it to be built on.

After some discussion it was decided on the motion of Councillor Cronin to grant the permission sought, subject to a yearly rent of five shillings - and provided Mr. Murphy submit a sketch of what he proposes to do.

LIMERICK COUNTY BOROUGH.

Extract from the report of Mr. Strahan, Inspector, on his inspection on the 18th May, 1923.

Generally the work at this housing scheme is not neatly executed. The concrete window cills should have been of finer finish and the filling underneath done in sharply cut brickwork and not partly in brick spalls and mortar. This work should be redone. The plaster reveals to external eyes have not been finished to a straight edge and are unsightly.

The concrete Apex, Kneller and Corbel blocks and barge courses require finishing in fine material where left too rough.

Preparations had been made to build the breeze concrete partitions specified for the ground floors with timber studs at 15" centres. I pointed out that not only was the studding not specified but it was also unnecessary and undesirable.

Although omitted from the specification, a disconnecting trap should be provided at the junction of town sewer and last manholes at each site.

The Minister for Local Government has had under consideration the report of Mr. N. O'Dwyer, Engineering Inspector, on the Inquiry held by him in the Town Hall, Limerick, on the 25th ultimo in connection with the application of the Corporation of Limerick for sanction to a loan of 255,000 for the purpose of effecting road improvements in the County Borough and to a further loan of 20000 for the purpose of acquiring a quarry of basalt stone and for certain road machinery.

From the evidence tendered at the Inquiry three material facts emerge in regard to the loan for street improvements, viz.,

- (1) That in the opinion of the City Surveyor the estimate prepared in January 1923 might, in view of subsequent reduction of prices, be reduced by 10%.
- (2) That it has not yet been finally decided whether the works are to be carried out by contract, or by direct labour.
- (3) That the carrying out of the works will, likely, extend over a period of three years.

It would appear to be the intention of the Corporation to proceed by way of contract, and, in that event, it would seem desirable to divide the scheme into sections, and to invite tenders forthwith for the several sections so arranged. Further the period of the loan should compare favourably with the probable duration of the work, and as it is understood that the major portion of the loan is to be expended in laying concrete roads, which would not have an easily renewable wearing surface, the Minister considers that, in such circumstances, the period of the loan should not exceed fifteen years. If reinforced concrete were to be used throughout the Scheme, the period resolved upon by the Corporation, viz., twenty years, would be agreed to.

The Minister is satisfied as to the general utility of the proposed Scheme, and, subject to the views herein expressed will be prepared to consider favourably the application for loan. In view of the length of time likely to be involved in the carrying out of the works, instalments of the loan will be sanctioned from time to time as required. For this purpose the tenders received from contractors for the several sections of the work, and the specifications, should be submitted to this Ministry. In connection with the proposed acquisition of stone quarry and certain road machinery, I am to inform you that the Minister sanctions the proposal to obtain

a loan of £6,000 for the purpose, the amount to be obtained from the Bank and to be repayable in ten years.

This Lorry whilst suitable for haulage would not suit if used for collecting refuse from house to house owing to continuous stopping and starting.

When in Dublin on my way back I called on some garages and saw an Albion 3 to 4 tonner, British built. This was stronger than Peerless and not so highly geared. If the Council decides on giving a trial to a Petrol driven lorry for removing refuse I would consider this more suitable and better value than the Peerless which I saw at Slough. If placed in the hands of a good driver it would give good service. The price of this complete with Telescopic handscrew tipping gear would be £325. Approx. cost delivery to Limerick £5.

As I had business in Birmingham I called there on my way home. I am directed by the Minister for Local Government
to refer to the Damage to Property (Compensation) Act,
1923, and to invite your special attention to the terms
of Section 10 which provides for the attachment of
reinstatement conditions to decrees in respect of buildings
damaged or destroyed.

I am to point out that the question of restoring
buildings is largely one of local interest and the matter
is therefore one which directly concerns your Council. It
will be observed that Section 10(12) provides for the
representation of local authorities at the hearing of any
application to which the section applies and local authorities
are empowered to provide for the cost of so appearing and
of producing witnesses and other evidence.

I am to explain that having regard to the general
housing shortage it is the Minister's view that your
Council should take steps to be represented at the hearing
of all cases of this nature and should press for the
attachment of a reinstatement condition. While it may not,
as a general rule, be necessary of desirable that a full
reinstatement condition should be attached to a decree in
respect of a large mansion, it must not be forgotten that
the section also provides that the Judge may attach a
condition under which compensation shall be applied in or
towards the erection of a "substituted building".

I am to add that State Solicitors have been instructed
to consult local authorities in connection with these cases
and the Minister will be glad if your Council will instruct
its officers to co-operate with State Solicitors to the
fullest extent possible in this matter.

Malicious Injury Claim

Letters submitted from the Ministry of Local Government of 24th Oct. 1921-1923 forwarding a list of Secret. obtained against the County Borough under the Criminal Injury Act in respect of damages in injury sustained before the 2nd January 1919. The British Government had paid these out of the Local Taxation Board.

When the Irish Government assumed control of administration full credit was given to local bodies for the amount paid into the Local Taxation 1919 during the years 1920-21-1921-22. The amount being stopped in respect of of liabilities under the Criminal Injury Act. The liability assumed by the State in respect of such claims does not extend beyond the 2nd January 1919, and in the few cases that occurred prior to that date it will be necessary that the amount of the award be met by the Local Body concerned. They asked that payment of the award be set out be omitted to the Ministry of Finance - The awards are as follows:

Being out of Minute application from the Limerick Workers Union, on behalf of the quinquennial employees at Ipswich Quarry, for a wage of 50% per week, was again submitted, and after some discussion same was adjourned for a further fortnight.

A letter was submitted from the fired Carlos Swift Bank Place, explaining that a cargo of cement which arrived here about the previous week for Mr. Nelson, Sainsbury & Co. was carted by the firm of Sam. Lippin & Co. which they considered unfair, as they claimed such work as theirs.

The Committee considered they had no voice in this matter and took no action thereon - it being a matter of the Contractor.

Applications submitted from the Corporation Employees Society requesting that two of its employees named James O'Connor and John O'Brien be put on pension - the former of whom had twenty years service and the latter forty years - After a discussion therein it was decided to adjourn the application for information to be got from the Ex Agent regarding pension scheme which he was asked to draw up some time ago, and the Deputy Mayor was asked to interview Mr. O'Brien in the matter of giving the man a temporary pension.

Letters read from the Corporation Employees Society requesting that a Regulation be made in reference to working out some of their men to the Ipswich Quarry to break the men in preparation for the Section

and pointing out that a large number of their men were idle - this matter was left in the hands of the City Surveyor.

Board went from Dist. Government.

Letter (Ref. S.H.A. 201) was read from the Roads Department, Ministry of Local Government, Dublin, dated 17th February stating that a sum of £10,000 had been provisionally allocated to the Corporation of Limerick as a grant for the improvement of Bank Road.

The selection of the Road to be improved, specifications, and methods by which it is proposed to carry out the work would be subject to the approval of the Ministry's Engineer.

A letter was also read from the Town Clerk of Cork stating that he had received notification of a grant of £21,000 - the rate of wages fixed was 50p per week. The matter had not yet been considered by his Council.

A further letter was read from the Ministry of Local Government, Dublin, in reply to representation made to increase the

maximum rate of wages - (S.H.A./54) dated 5th March, stating that the Ministry cannot authorise payment of wages to labourers employed on the work in Limerick City at a higher rate than that already notified namely 40p per week.

After a discussion on the matter it was agreed that the City Surveyor should draw up a scheme for the spending of the money - he was also asked to submit the approximate cost of the necessary appliances he would require for carrying out the work. Unemployment - Letter read from the Secretary of the Irish Transport Workers Union, Limerick Branch, reporting that a Deputation from that Union, or body of the unemployed members be heard at the next meeting. It was decided to hear what the Deputation had to say.

The Spokesman Mr. O'Brien said the Case for the unemployed before the Meeting -

Mr. O'Brien pointed out to him that it was not a fact that the Corporation had received £100,000 - that the amount of £100,000 - neither had they received a grant of £100,000.

The amount of Mr. Dillon's contract for Road works was £10,000 and not as stated by the Spokesman. The City Surveyor states there are about 20 men employed by Mr. Dillon on his contract - The Deputation are of the opinion that the Contract should be pushed along and work expedited, in view of the amount of unemployment.

It was pointed out to the Deputation that although the Corporation provides one shilling in the pound for houses - they only secured a grant of the equivalent of 10 pence in the pound from the Government - which would then be enough to complete a scheme for 64 houses only.

A note as to a proposal for 100 houses for ex-servicemen was noted by the Deputation, and it was explained to them that they were not being undertaken by the Corporation but by the British Government - through their Irish Representation in Dublin - The Corporation had offered to facilitate the latter in every way and the Chairman, Mr. O'Brien had already printed out invitations to their representatives.

The Deputation referred to the fact that there were men working at Cartmanned Waterworks, and were paid a wage under the City Rate - They had no objection to men from either the District or City working there but they understood that the City Rate of wages should apply there - as there was a rate of wages in the City.

The Deputation also referred to the wages being paid under the Road Board to roadworkers and criticised the method of employing the men.

They intended that at a previous meeting of the Corporation it was understood the Corporation would not proceed with the work until the situation of wages was fixed up.

Mr. Wall explained the other which had been taken to try and get a higher rate of wages as a condition. It was pointed out that Corporation gave no undertaking that the work would be stopped & such a course would in all probability prejudice their claim for the Road Grant which amounted to 40,000. It was understood that the Union would take action in this matter.

The Deputation stated they considered that the City should be re-valued for Rating purposes - as it was too low in valuation in certain cases - and with the same rate the proceeds should be much higher thereby making the Corporation to increase the number of men on the cleaning staff - They stated that Galway town employed 80 scavengers - the City Scavenger said he did not consider the latter a fact.

The question of land-rising contracts was referred to but Mr. Wall intimated that no guarantee would be given if this were done.

After a prolonged discussion it was decided at the suggestion of Mr. Boyd to appoint a small Deputation to interview Mr. Dill, Contractor, with a view to opening up more work on the Road. A Deputation was also invited from the Union to attend the Conference which was fixed for Jan 14th the next evening - Mr. Moran, Mr. Wall and Mr. Long were nominated on the Conference.

conference re Unemployment in the City -

The conference referred to in the foregoing Minute
of the Improvement Committee was held in the
Council Chamber, Town Hall, on Thursday afternoon,
the 15th day of May, 1924, at the hour of 4.00.

Those were Present - Ald. Walsh, Mr. Mayor, in the
Chair - Alderman Conroy - Councillors Cronin and
Dow Griffin -

Mr. J. Dillon, Contractor for paving and concreting
of the Road, and a Deputation from the Limerick
Branch of the Irish Transport and General Workers
Union.

With the Assistant Town Clerk -

Ald. Walsh having explained the business
of the meeting a prolonged discussion ensued -
Mr. Dillon pointed out the difficulties he had to
contend with in reference to the Road Contract -
he was unable to procure good sett dressings - he
had to accommodate the Trades as far as
the ripping up of Road was concerned - the laying
down of the concrete beds was held up every day
owing to weather conditions - With favorable weather
he would be able to finish the Contract in six
months - If he got about two good days he
would be able to finish off his work on the Dock
Road - he recommended that subject to the City
Surveyor's approval, starting two parties of Council
Road concreting work - viz. - parties from Bernemore St. to
17th Street and from 17th St. to James St. in this way
he could afford to have a double gang of men
employed as he stated the mixer was about to
blow out double the amount of concrete he was
laying down at the present time -

Conference decided to recommend the proposal to the City Surveyor.

A decision then ensued as to mixing concrete by hand it being then stated by Mr. Dillon that he could - subject to facilitating matters in that locality - start the rapping up of the Clyde Road (I apprehend) - and laying down the foundation for the Stone Set. If, however, Mr. Peacock was satisfied to allow him to mix the concrete foundation by hand for the Road - the feeling of the members of the Council in the regard was that if the City Surveyor approved of making the foundation in this manner they would raise no objection. In this way Mr. Dillon hoped to employ a further lot of men.

I reply to a member of the Deputation as to employment of men from the Union they represented only - Mr. Dillon would not give any undertaking in this respect - It would employ trade Union labour in accordance with terms of his contract.

I refer to the wages stipulated by the Local Government Dept., to be paid for work done under the Road Grant namely 107/- forty-five shillings per week - it was decided at the report of the Deputation - pending their taking action in the matter - that the number of hours to be worked per week should be forty-four so as to allow Trade Unions to accept the wages - They noted the question of employing more but trade Union men on the work and also noted points out that this was done by the Council Fair Wages Resolution.

In reference to the Stone required for the Malgrave Street Road it was advised that pending Mr. Peacock settling up his books in Liverpool, he might be able to get to Stone broken by hand.

It was stated that he was at the Quarry on the two days (Tuesday & Wednesday) but did not work. After some discussion it was decided on the motion of Councillor Dan. Bourke seconded by Cr. Reddan to grant the application.

Rs Overtime for Quarrymen Application submitted from the Corporation Employees Society for a half-hour overtime for the six days of the week for each of the men employed at the new Quarry, caused by the Peter Lorry not being sent out for the men. The City Surveyor said that the order of the Committee was that the men should start from the City at 8 o'clock in the morning and leave off work at 5.50 in the evening. This order was being carried out. The Committee considered the men had no cause for complaint and made no order on the application.

This had not been carried out and he asked that the matter would be looked into. The City Surveyor said he had these men employed and he thought they were satisfied. The City Surveyor mentioned that the agreement re the leasing of the quarry had not yet been completed. It was ordered that the Law Agent's attention be called to the matter.

Houses for ex-servicemen-

Arising out of Minutes read letter from Inspector Murphy, Soldiers & Sailors Dept., Dublin, saying he would give the Corporation a few days notice when next time in Limerick so as to hear Deputation from them re the erection of houses under the Scheme for ex-servicemen.

Re Guide for Limerick.

Read letter from the Kilmath Press, Dundee, saying that owing to the very small amount realised in advertisements they would be unable to publish the Limerick Guide Book except in a very moderate form. They wished to know if the Council would be pleased with this. No action was taken hereon.

Re Arbitration on Salaries---

Arising out of Minutes read letter from the Ministry of Local Government saying they could not agree to the proposed arbitration on salaries of the Officials by Mr. Wynn. They stated they were sending down their Inspector Mr. Lyssight to inquire into the whole question.

Wages of Road Workers under Road Grant Increased.

As regards the employees (workmen) no objection is seen to arbitration by the Ministry of Industry and Commerce. The Committee took no action in regard to the latter portion of the letter, as they considered it did not arise.

Read letter from the Roads Dept. Ministry of Local Government, Ref. R/SR/37, saying that arising out of representations made to them a maximum wage of 47/6d per week instead of 45/-, as previously notified, had now been authorised to be paid to labourers employed under the Road Grant in Limerick Borough.

Arising hereon an application was submitted on behalf of the men employed on work under the grant for the increase pay allowed, also requesting that the payment would be made retrospectively to the commencement of the work.

The application was granted on the motion of Councillor Reddan and agreed to unanimously.

Holidays for Road Stewards

Application submitted from the Road Stewards for their annual holidays. Same was granted subject to the City Surveyor making the necessary arrangements.

Road Construction Lectures-

Letter read from the Royal Dublin Society saying that they had arranged for a lecture by Mr. J.S. Killick, M.Inst.C.E., on the subject of Road Construction etc., to take place on the 26th June at the Theatre Royal, Dublin, and inviting the Corporation to send Delegates to same. It was decided that the City Surveyor would attend the lecture.

Steps at Sarsfield Bridge.

The City Surveyor having complained of the state of the steps and railing at the Sarsfield Bridge it was decided to authorise him to get necessary repairs carried out there as he thinks best. By *Direct Order* Mr. Peacock's attention was directed to the state of the passage under the bridge which required cleansing.

New Steam Roller-

The City Surveyor in reply to inquiries stated that the new Steam Roller had not yet arrived. A discussion took place as to the feasibility of opening up Mulgrave Street for repairs to roadway under the Road Grant. The City Surveyor said he favoured concentrating on one road at a time and getting it done quickly. The feeling of the Committee was that he should open up a second Road and thereby employ more labour.

Tenders for Drawers for Mayor's Staff.

Three quotations were submitted for Drawers for the Mayor's Staff, viz:- from Messrs. J. O'Connell & Co., Messrs. Cannon & Co., and Messrs. Todd & Co. After a discussion hereon it was decided on the motion of Alderman Wainman to allow the men 15/- each to purchase the Drawers themselves.

Stick in Hut permission granted to D. Byrnes.

Personal Application was made by Mr. D. Byrnes who was recently evicted from his house in Assembly Hall, for permission to erect a Kiosk (or Hut) on the site of the old urinal at Leek Quay, corner of Balla Bridge, for the purpose of carrying on his business in the same locality. (Hairdressing & Shaving). The Hut would not interfere in any way with traffic. After a discussion on the matter and having regard to the very exceptional circumstances of the case it was unanimously decided to grant the permission sought, subject to a plan of the erection being submitted to the City Surveyor for his approval, and also subject to the usual way-leave agreement being entered into by Mr. Byrnes, to be drawn up by the Law Agent. A nominal rent of one shilling per annum was fixed for the facility.

TECHNICAL EDUCATION Pensions to Ex Staff---

Arising out of Minutes Ald. Walsh referred to the Deputation which waited on the Minister for Local Government in Dublin in reference to payment of Pensions &c to the ex-Staff of the Technical Institute and other matters arising out of the recent Auditor's report on the Accounts of the School. He said the Members of the Deputation, after having a long discussion on the matter, were left under the impression that the City would not be called upon to pay these Pensions out of the Rates. They were told that the other matters would be suitably fixed up. It was decided to call a special meeting of the small Committee who have the matter under discussion and the following letters which were submitted at this meeting were referred to them for consideration, viz:-

Case of Mr. A. O'Riordan.

Letter from the Local Govt. Dept., No. G. 23901/1924, of 4th June, in reference to case of Mr. A. O'Riordan, Caretaker of the Schools for compensation for loss of employment.

Case of Mr. Ed. FitzGibbon

Letter from Mr. Ed. FitzGibbon, employed as Instructor in Painting and Decorating at the Institute, for the compensation for loss of employment owing to the closing down of the School during the trouble with the old Department of Agriculture & Tech. Instruction.

Report on a/s on Audit.

Letter from the Local Govt. Dept., S. 23, 311/1924, of 28th May, in reference to certain matters arising out of the Auditor's Report on the Accounts of the Institute.

Special Matters:-

The following Special Matters were submitted, viz:-

Premium for Third Party Insurance

Submitted letter from the Law Agent saying he had looked into the New Policy re Motor Insurance - Third Party Risk, of the Irish National Assurance Co., and as far as he could see same was in order. The Asst. Town Clerk asked for an order to pay the premium due on same, namely £34.18.2d, and this was recommended to Council on the following evening accordingly.

£1,500 for Housing Contractor.

Certificate submitted from the City Surveyor requesting the Finance Committee to pass a cheque in favour of Mr. W. Flynn, Housing Contractor, on foot of his Contract for Dwelling. At the request of the City Surveyor it was decided to recommend Council next evening to pay the amount.

Advance of Registration Expenses.

Submitted letter from the Town Clerk for an advance on foot of Registration Expenses for the current Period of elections, namely £100 (one hundred). The Asst. Town Clerk stated the matter was in order and it was decided to recommend payment to the next evening's Council, on the motion of Mr. D. Griffin.

Quotations for Fidelity Bonds

Four quotations were submitted for Fidelity Bonds, as recommended by the Finance Committee for the following Officials, viz:-

The City Treasurer £2,000; The Asst. Treasurer £1,000; P. Merrifacey, Clerk, £500; M. P. Donnellan, Sec. Water Committee £500; and Jas. Neiland, Clerk, £250.

The quotations were as follows, viz:-

Irish National Assurance Co. 7/6d per cent.
The General Accident Co. 9/-
The Ocean Accident Co. 10/-
The Hibernian Insurance Co. 10/-

Mr. Dunden, Law Agent reported that he saw no material difference in the several guarantee forms except that if the quotation of one of the English Companies was accepted and litigation should ensue the company would probably have to be sued in England. It should be specially provided that Arbitration should be held in Sacriston Stream. He considered the Hibernian Co. a much stronger Co. than the Irish National, the latter never having paid a dividend. He pointed out that great care should be exercised in giving full information to the Company, and no alteration of duties should be made without notice to and the consent of the Co. After some discussion it was decided to refer these quotations to the Council for consideration.

This concluded the business of these Committees.

CLEANSING, REPAIRING, IMPROVEMENT, & ARTISANS DWELLINGS COMMITTEES:-

Meeting of these Committees was held in the Council Chamber Town Hall, on Wednesday evening, 25th JUNE, 1924, immediately after the Meetings of the Fire Brigade, Lighting etc. Committee which commenced at 7:30 o'clock, and in the Minutes of which the Names of the members present are recorded.

Alderman Walsh, L.T. Mayor, presided. The Officials present being:- The Asst. Town Clerk, and the Asst. City Surveyor.

The Minutes of the previous Meeting held on the 11th June were read, confirmed, and signed.

On folio-895- re repairs to flight of steps at Sarsfield Bridge - this was corrected to read that the City Surveyor was authorised to get the work done by direct labour.

Sick Pay cases were submitted to the Chairman and passed as follows, Medical evidence being produced in each case, viz:- week ended 18th June-£7. 4. 11, and week ended 25th June-£6. 13. 6d.

Pay Sheet Bills amounting to £29. 2. 2d for fortnight ended this date were submitted to the Chairman and passed for payment.

Finance Sheet Bills amounting to £454. 9. 5d were submitted to the Chairman and referred to the Finance Committee for payment.

An application from the Asst. City Surveyor for his annual month's leave of absence was submitted and granted subject to the necessary arrangements being made.

Attention was called to the following places requiring repairs and the City Surveyor was ordered to attend to them, viz:-

- 1. Glass in area light broken outside premises occupied lately by Messrs. P. D. Bourke, William St.
- 2. Footpath recently opened up in Parnell Street for Electric Cables, and also crossing at head of Roches St.
- 3. Flagging smashed outside St. Michael's Church - the Asst. Surveyor was asked to have that portion of the pathway outside the church gate, opposite Messrs. Boyds gate concreted, so as to prevent a re-currence of the flags being broken.
- 4. Channel course at Watengate from Jones Lane to Cantrells.
- 5. Roadway in Upper Henry St. from Messrs. McMahon's timber yard to Newenham St.

A general discussion took place on the state of the City roadways and footpaths and it was considered that everything possible should be done to put them in condition, even to the extent of taking on extra hands, or extra masons for the footpaths. It was suggested that when the footpaths are being opened up for the purpose of laying down cables or mains, masons should be employed at the same time to replace the flagging properly.

Report of City High Constable of this date to the Improvement Committee was read, arising out of which the following orders were made, viz:-

- 1. In reference to bill-posting on Electric Pillar Boxes etc., Mr. Forrest was ordered to warn Billposter and if necessary prosecute - and also to call the attention of the printers of the posters to the practice.
- 2. In reference to the use of the O'Connell Monument as a car stand - Mr. Forrest was given permission to put up

up a warning notice there and to prosecute offenders. it was also decided to call the Civic Guards attention to the matter.

3. The Asst. Surveyor was ordered to have Fountain in St John's Square cleaned down and repaired.

4. The two other monuments referred to in Mr. Forrest's report were ordered to be looked after.

Councillor Cronin called attention and it was ordered that the stone work of the Tait Memorial Clock be cleaned and pointed, also roof cleaned.

Alderman Casey called attention to one of the lamp post on the O'Connell Monument which was out of place.

Complaint of Residents in and around Lord Edward St. re Ice Factory.

A letter was submitted, signed by 26 of the Residents in and around Lord Edward Street, complaining of the continued annoyance caused in that vicinity by the machinery attached to Mr. I. Brennan's Ice Factory, often in motion from daybreak to the small hours of the morning. They asked the Council to take some action in the matter.

Councillor Cronin stated a deputation of the residents had called on him in reference to the matter, as also on other members of the Council.

After some discussion it was ordered that Mr. Brennan be written to and asked to confine the working of the place from 7 o'clock a.m. to 10 o'clock p.m. on week days and from 9 a.m. to 10 p.m. on Sundays, and also to point out to him that his cars must be loaded on the Street and not taken down the narrow laneway near the Factory. Several members were in favour of erecting a pillar at the head of this laneway so as to prevent cars going down there. In addition to above it was also decided that a Deputation from the Committee consisting of Alderman Walsh, Councillors O'Flynn, and Cronin, should wait on Mr. Brennan in reference to the matter.

Report from Chamber of Commerce re Traffic.

A report was submitted from the Chamber of Commerce, Limerick, in reference to their futile efforts to obtain for the trading community of Limerick all the advantages which they enjoyed before the war, and the opposition which appears to come from the Gt. S. & W. Railway Co. in the matter. They stated it was their intention to apply for a Court of Arbitration to decide the matter, or as an alternative to ask the Ministry of Industry and Commerce to have the matter referred to the Railway Rates Tribunal which it is proposed to set up.

On the motion of Councillor O'Dwyer, seconded by Councillor Barry it was decided to endorse the action taken in the matter by the Chamber of Commerce.

Case of family of late Mrs. Hayes, Laundress in late Limerick Union.

The following Resolution as forwarded by the Committee of the City Home and Hospital was adopted and it was decided to ask for sanction of the Minister in the matter, viz:-

"That in view of the pitiful conditions occasioned by the death of Mrs. Hayes, Laundress in the late Limerick Union, that the Limerick Borough Council be asked to request the Minister for Local Government to sanction the payment of the pension (£111.3.5) of the deceased for a further 12 months so as to help to provide for her helpless and destitute family".

Councillor Cronin called attention to the necessity of cleaning the Chutes on the Prospect Cottages. Ordered to be done.

HOUSING:-

At the request of Ald. Doyle, the L.T. Mayor informed him as to the number of new houses that he had promised to let, and the class of people they were being let to. A question was raised as to a promise of house be made to a Mr. Hayes, and the L.T. Mayor said he would keep up to the promise made herein by Councillor T. Burke.

HOUSING:-
Letting of Cottages

Ald. Doyle raised a question in reference to the powers of the Corporation to take derelict buildings, as housing sites; and Cr. Dan. Griffin as to hording in of such areas, and it was decided to ask the Law Agent to report on the matter.

Sites:-

Comment was made on the fact that the City Surveyor had not yet reported on the conversion of certain buildings in the Union premises into flats so as to relieve the housing shortage. It was considered that Mr. Peacocke should have carried out the order which was made at the Meeting on the 30th April.

Union Flats:-

Councillor Dan. Griffin here proposed a vote of sympathy and condolence with Councillor James A. Hennessy, on the death of his sister - to whom he was so much attached, and asked that all further business of the Committee be adjourned as a mark of respect. The Chairman put the resolution to the meeting and declared it passed.

Sympathy:-

A vote of sympathy was also passed with Mr. Alphonsus Kivlehan, on the death of his mother, on the motion of Councillor Dan. Griffin.

Both votes were ordered to be conveyed by the Town Clerk.

Meeting of these Committees was held in the Council Chamber, Town Hall, Limerick, on Wednesday evening, 9th July, 1924, immediately after the Meetings of the other standing Committees, the same members of the Council being present. Alderman Joseph McInerney, presided.

MINUTES:-----
The Minutes of the previous Meeting were read, confirmed by the meeting and signed by the Chairman.

Sick Pay:-
Sick Pay was passed as follows, Medical evidence being produced in each case, viz:- week ended 25/6/24-£13.5 week ended 2/7/24-£5.0.1d - Total £11.13. 7d.

Bills:-
Pay Sheet Bills amounting to £67.13. 6d were examined and passed for payment.

Ice Factory-
Arising out of Minutes read letter from Mr. L. Brennan, Lord Edward St., saying that it would not be possible for him to confine the working of his Ice Factory between the hours mentioned by the Committee, owing to the temperature rising during the closed hours; he would not be able to keep up with local competition and this would mean a complete loss of invested capital to him. He was making improvements to eliminate the noise complained of and would point out same to the Deputation from the Council when they called on him. As regards the loading of his cars in the passage near his factory, he would comply with the wishes of the Council in this respect.
It was decided that the Deputation, appointed at last meeting, should meet again and visit the Factory.

Bill-posting-
Arising out of Minutes Councillor Dan Griffin complained of indiscriminate posting of Rates Notices on shop fronts etc. and the resentment of Citizens to the practice. It was ordered that the printer of the notices be written to in the matter.

Sexton St. Repairs--
Councillor Thos. Burke referred to a request made to have the street opposite the Christian Bros. Schools in St. Michael's Place (Sexton St) repaired, and on his motion, seconded by Cr. O'Brien, the Surveyor was ordered to have same rolled and coated with tar.

Road Grant Employment-
The Surveyor stated he would shortly be finished with the repairs to the Emis Road, under the Road Grant, and he asked for instructions as to whether the same gang of men should be kept on for repairs to other trunk-roads, or whether he would take on a new gang. It was decided to continue the employment of the men presently engaged on the Emis Road. The City Surveyor notified his intention of opening up Malgrave Street, and O'Connell Av. should he get delivery of the new Steam-Roller.

Footpath at Mt. Kennett-
On the representations of Alderman Casey and Cr. O'Flynn on behalf of the residents there, it was ordered on the motion of the latter that the footpath at south side of Mt. Kennett Hill be concreted - about 6 feet width.

Councillor O'Dwyer complained of state of footway in O'Curry Lane - off Broad Street, and the matter was referred to the City Surveyor for his attention.

Four quotations for Fidelity Bonds as submitted at the meeting of these Committees on the 11th June, se folio-897 this book, were again submitted for consideration, and having regard to the Law Agent's advice in the matter, which pointed out that the Hibernian Insurance Co. was a much stronger Company than the Irish National, it was decided on the motion of Councillor O'Dwyer, seconded by Alderman Casey to accept the quotation of the Hibernian Insurance Co., at rate of 10/- per-cent.

Dwellings-
Application was submitted from Mr. M. Clancy, Tenant of Corporation Dwelling No. 7 Nicholas Street, to have a doorway cut in the concrete wall adjoining the house, as he was greatly inconvenienced by the want of same - any traffic with the back premises having to be done through the house.

On the motion of Councillor T. Burke, seconded by Councillor O'Dwyer it was decided to grant the application and the City Surveyor was instructed to have the doorway erected.

*At the Public Health Committee on the 16th July 1924
Mr. Casey made the question of the nuisance caused by the Machinery of Mr. Brennan's Ice Factory for Edgewood St. and it having been reported that the Sub-Committee (consisting of Mr. Mayor and Cr. Brennan) who visited the place on the previous Saturday afternoon and who took the view of the President of the locality, had recommended that Mr. Brennan be only allowed to keep the machinery in use between the hours of 8.30 am. and 10.30 pm. it was ordered that he be written to conveying the decision of the Committee that the machinery should be checked off between the hours of 10.30 pm and 4.30 am.*

It was also ordered that the post address opinion be obtained as to the same powers herein.
