

The Hospital was established in 1812, and now comprises:

Maternity Wards to which Patients in Labour are admitted at all hours, beds being available for their reception.

**Gynæcological Department** for treatment of women suffering from diseases peculiar to their sex.

Ante-natal Department for treatment of expectant mothers.

Extern Maternity Nursing Service with a qualified Maternity

The Hospital is intended primarily for the relief of the destitute poor and secondarily for those who, although not destitute, are not in a financial position to pay for treatment either in their own homes or in a Nursing Home.

No charge is made to the destitute poor, but those patients who are insured and whose husbands are employed, contribute half their maternity benefit, that is, one pound.

The Hospital is situated in Bedford Row, Limerick, in the heart of the City, and is readily accessible to those patients who avail of its services.

There is a resident Matron and a staff of qualified Nurses.

### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE FOR 1944.

It is now almost six years since the Belfield site on the Ennis Road was purchased by the Committee as a site for the proposed new Maternity Hospital. At that time it had been hoped to begin the erection of the new building in a few months. Before the year was out, however, the world had been plunged into a war which is still with us and which has meant that all ideas of proceeding with the new Hospital have had to be postponed.

Now that the clouds appear to be lifting from the horizon, it may not be too much to revive the hopes that within a few years there will be erected on the Belfield site, an up-to-date, well appointed, modern Hospital, which will be an adornment to the City, and a source of incalculable benefits to its patients. The sooner such hopes are realised the better. For many years now the Hospital has had to carry on its work in the old building in Bedford Row, under circumstances which considerably hinder its efficiency.

In every recent report, emphasis has been laid on the fact, that the Hospital suffers from severe over-crowding. It will be seen in this year's Medical Report, that often during the year under review, the accommodation was over-taxed and that several times extra beds and stretchers had to be provided at short notice. It is regretable that there should be need for such a statement, but the fact that there is need, shows clearly how necessary it is to provide extra Maternity Hospital accommodation for the poor of Limerick at as early as possible a date.

It is a source of considerable pleasure to the Committee to realise that notwithstanding the difficulties of overcrowding, the work of the Hospital has been carried out so efficiently and satisfactorily during the year. They would like to place on record their high appreciation of the splendid work of the medical and nursing staffs, and to congratulate them on the excellent results that have been achieved.

During the year almost the entire interior of the Hospital was repainted and decorated in cheery practical colours. A new blood transfusion instrument was acquired for the operating theatre. As a result of a visit from the City Manager and the Chief of the Limerick Fire Brigade, steps were taken to implement their request that an exterior fire escape be fitted to the building. Plans were prepared and

submitted to the Hospital Commission, which has now approved of them and the work will shortly be started. At the request of the Chief of the Fire Brigade arrangements were made whereby the Hospital Staff would be made familiar with fire fighting in the Hospital. The Hospital also arranged for its representation by the Matron on the Fire Watching Committee which includes the block on which the Hospital building stands.

In June the Hospital was visited by Miss Brooke Tyrrell of the Hospitals' Commission.

During the year the system of appointing two members of the Committee to act as visitors to the Hospital for the ensuing month was continued, and the visitors thus appointed attended regularly to their duties.

The Urban District Nursing Scheme was continued during the year and Nurse Gilligan was again in charge. There was a decrease in the number of cases treated in their own homes, the figure being 75 against 89 for the previous year. These 75 cases necessitated 1,035 visits. The scheme is a very useful one to many of the City's poor, and the Hospital is very pleased to be participating in it.

### MEDICAL REPORT FOR 1944.

During the year 1944 there were 565 admissions to the Maternity Department and of these 438 were delivered in the Hospital as against 426 in 1943, and 420 in 1942. Thus again showing an increase in the number of patients delivered in the Hospital. There were 75 patients delivered in their own homes and approximately 1,036 visits were paid.

The Hospital was therefore responsible for 513 Confinements

Out patients at beginning of year	 15

The abnormal cases were as follows:-

Five cases required Caesarian Section and were transferred to other hospitals. Three of them had contracted Pelvis and two were aged Primapara. All had live babies and all the mothers recovered had normal Puerperiums.

Forceps cases, 24 (Incidence less than 5%)
Breech cases, 17
Adherent Placenta, 12
Brow Presentation, 4
Placenta Praevia, 13, with 8 babies living.

Twins—11 cases of these; 9 sets were born alive and 2 sets were premature and only survived birth a short time.

26 Cases of Abortion and Haemorrhage, 18 required operative treatment.

There were two deaths during the year.

The first was admitted as a case of Threatened Ecclampsia and was safely delivered. Her baby was born alive and she died on the 9th day from Renal failure. The second was admitted as a case of failed Forceps outside. Her condition on admission was poor; delivery was difficult, due to abnormal size of baby and a Hydracephalic head. She died on the 8th day. None of these patients, in my opinion, could have been saved.

This was again a most successful year for the Hospital, with an increase in the number of deliveries. The Matron and the Nursing Staff were most assiduous in the discharge of their onerous duties and our best thanks are due to them for their highly efficient and courteous manner in which they carried on in spite of numerous difficulties such as overcrowding. The Hospital accommodation was often overtaxed and several times during the year extra beds and stretchers had to be provided, often at short notice and at night time.


