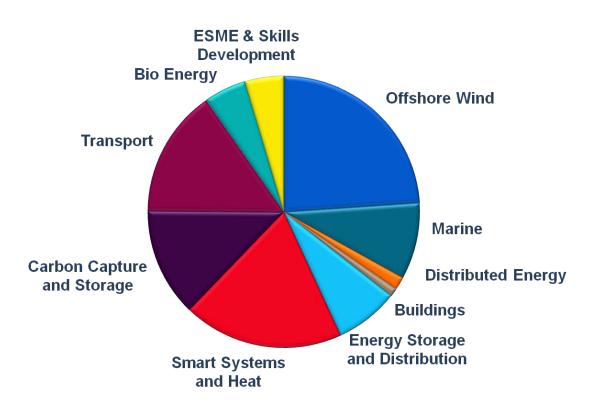

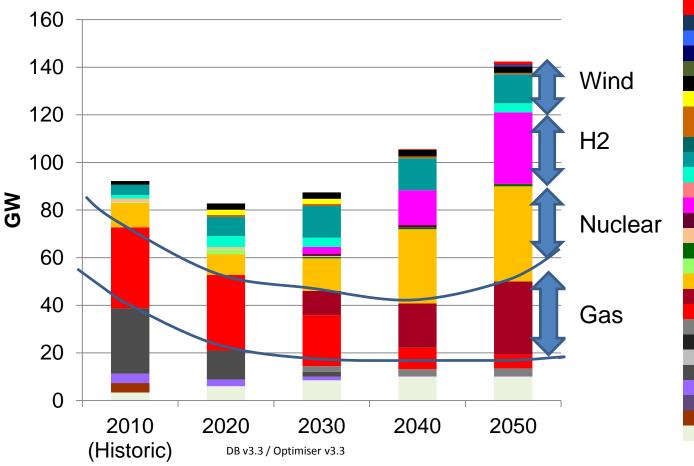

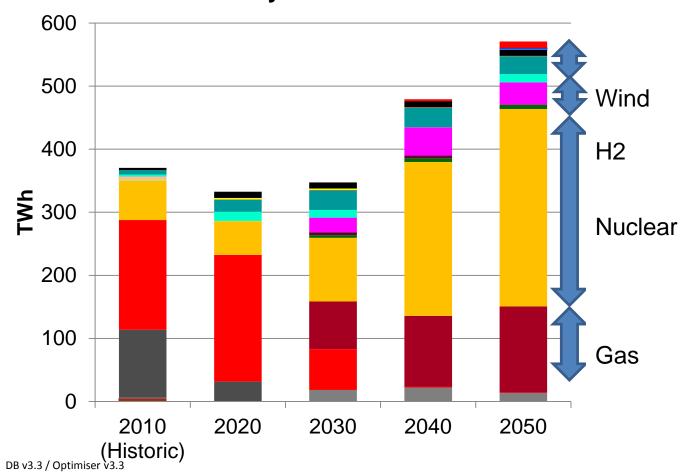


ESME - H2 role is not base load by 2040

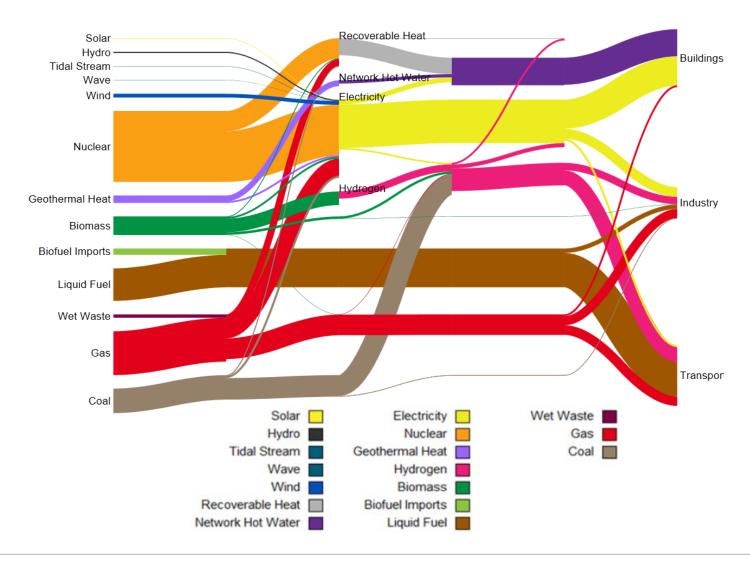

Recognising

- Superior costs of salt caverns compared to other bulk H2 storage options
- Already used for H2 in the UK (Teeside)
- Keyed into ETI work on CCS and H2 turbines

Purpose

- To improve the capital and operating costs used in ESME modelling
- To investigate the UK potential for storing H2 in salt caverns
- To understand the cost structure of such schemes in the UK, when focussed on power.
- To provide a storage cost model which could be used with other H2 sources and H2 usages

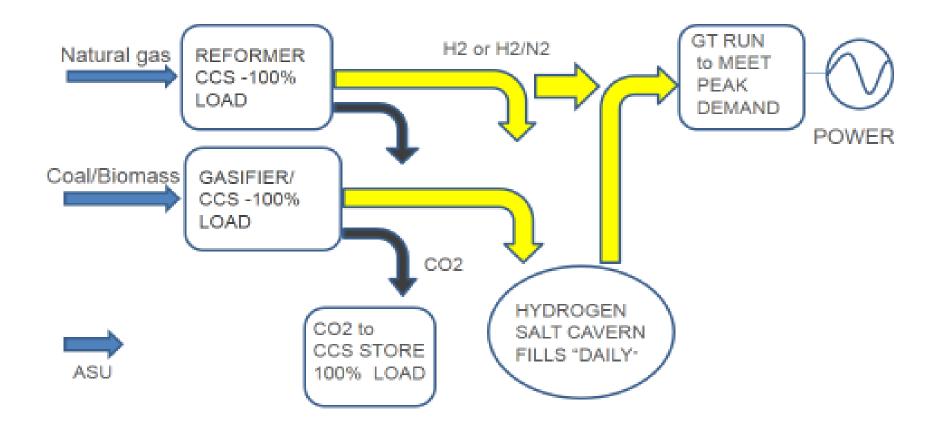






H2 Storage in Salt Caverns - Configurations

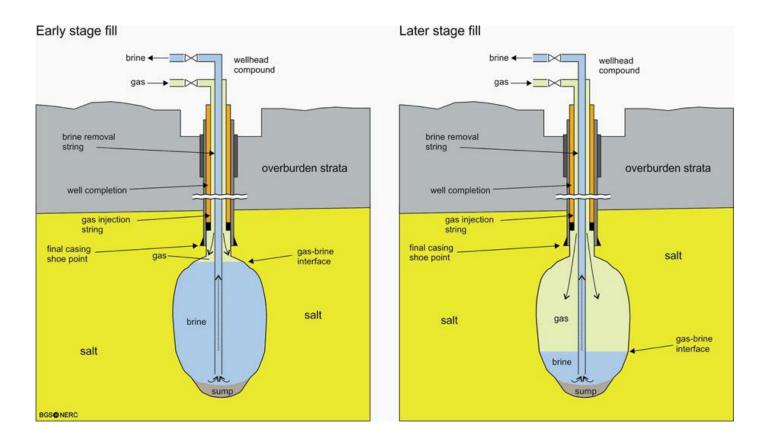

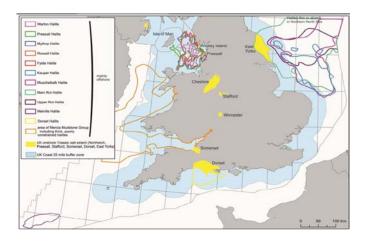
Initial Fill of a Cavern (BGS©NERC)



UK Salt fields



- Used for natural gas and hydrocarbons
- Offshore twice the cost of onshore
- Screening led us to focus in 3 areas



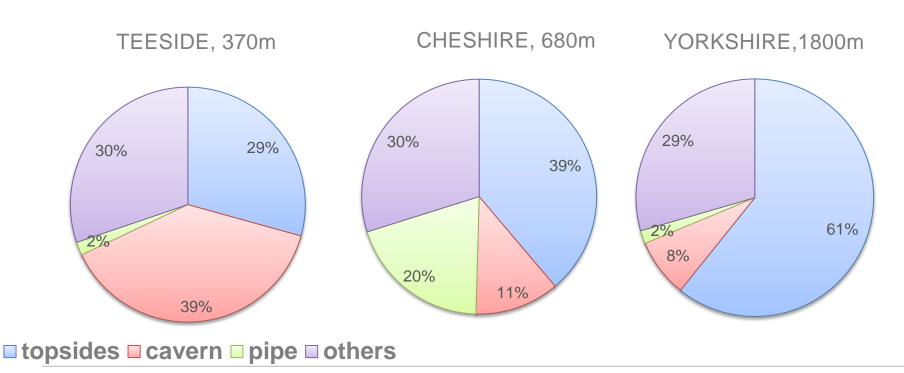
Region	Typical Depth, m	Bed Thickness, m	Cavern size, 000m3	Pressure bara
Teesside	300	35	70	45
E Yorkshire	1800	175	300	270
Cheshire	800	200	300	105



Cost structure varies with store depth



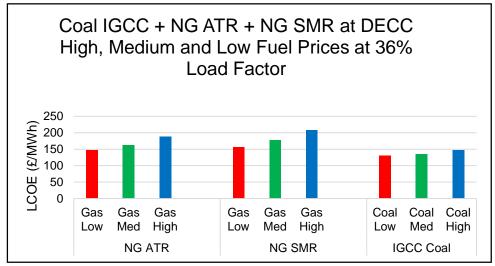
- Although the component costs change, overall costs are similar
- Deep stores have a round trip energy hit (2% points off an efficiency of 34% for Yorkshire)
- Shallow stores unlikely to provide strategic storage





Power complex cost structure

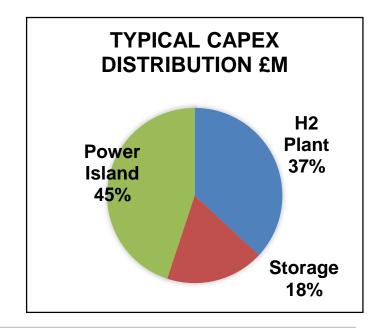




- Technology selection for H2 production not as important as primary fuel price
- Coal price less volatile, less impactful



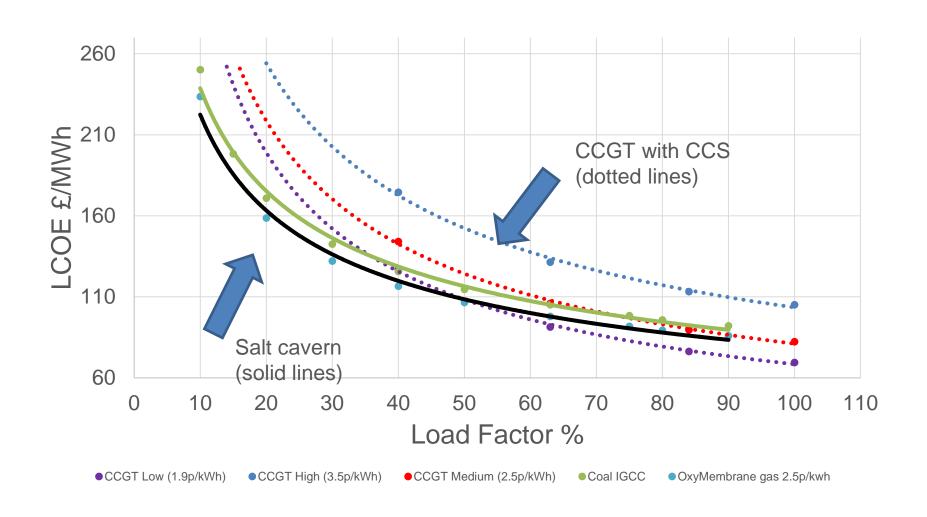
- CCS pipeline and storage costs are not included
- Often need to store N2 for large H2 Turbines

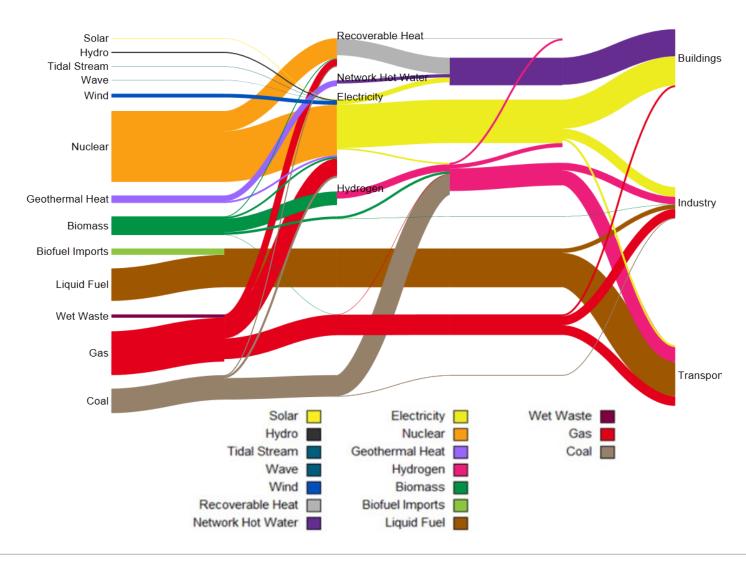

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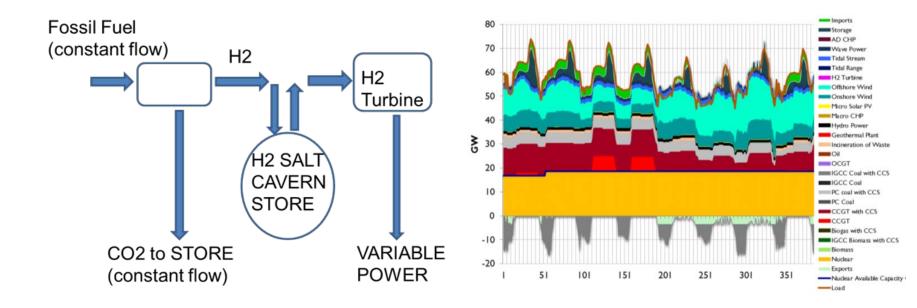

Purpose

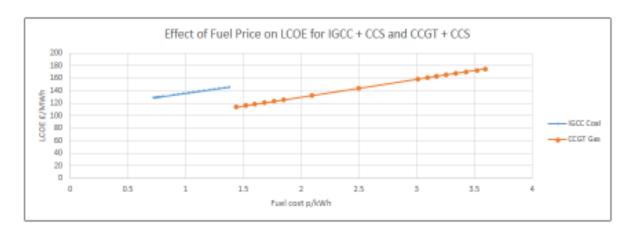
- Provide ESME with better numbers for scheme based on salt caverns
- Explore cost and UK availability of power schemes using salt caverns for storage.
- Identify any technology needs to lower cost







Effect of Fuel costs on LCOE for IGCC+CCS and CCGT+CCS



IGCC Load factor - 38% Co-storage Cavern Location—Yorkshire (Cavern depth 1800m, cavern storage 300,000 m3) CCGT Load factor -40%
