This warranty period covering parts/labour is 6 months from the date of purchase except where tools are hired out when the warranty period is 90 days from the date of purchase. This warranty does not apply to any consumable parts, any type of battery or normal wear and tear, nor does it cover any damage caused by misuse, careless or unsafe handling, alterations, accidents, or repairs attempted or made by any personnel other than the authorised Draper warranty repair agent.

Straight cutting or scroll cutting on mild steel up to 1.2mm thick. Any other use other than that it was designed for is considered misuse.

#### 5.1 GENERAL SAFETY INSTRUCTIONS FOR POWER TOOL USE

When using any type of power tool there are steps that should be taken to make sure that you, as the user, remain safe.

Common sense and a respect for the tool will help reduce the risk of injury.

**Read the instruction manual fully.** Do not attempt any operation until you have read and understood this manual.

Most important you must know how to safely start and stop this machine, especially in an emergency.

**Keep the work area tidy and clean.** Attempting to clear clutter from around the machine during use will reduce your concentration. Mess on the floor creates a trip hazard. Any liquid spilt on the floor could result in you slipping.

**Find a suitable location.** If the machine is bench mounted; the location should provide good natural light or artificial lighting as a replacement. Avoid damp and dust locations as it will have a negative effect on the machine's performance. If the machine is portable; do not expose the tool to rain. In all cases do not operate power tools near any flammable materials.

**Keep bystanders away.** Children, onlookers and passers by must be restricted from entering the work area for their own protection. The barrier must extend a suitable distance from the tool user.

**Disconnect and house all power tools that are not in use.** An air tool should never be left unattended while connected to the power supply. They must be housed in a suitable location, away locked up and from children.

**Do not overload or misuse the tool.** All tools are designed for a purpose and are limited to what they are capable of doing. Do not attempt to use a power tool (or adapt it in any way) for an application it is not designed for. Select a tool appropriate for the size of the job. Overloading a tool will result in tool failure and user injury: This covers the use of accessories.

**Dress properly.** Loose clothing, long hair and jewellery are all dangerous because they can become entangled in moving machinery: This can also result in parts of body being pulled into the machine. Clothing should be close fitted, with any long hair tired back and jewellery and neck ties removed. Footwear must be fully enclosed and have a non-slip sole.

Wear personal protective equipment (PPE). Dust, noise, vibration and swarf can all be dangerous if not suitably protected against. If the work involving the power tool creates dust or fumes; wear a dust mask. Vibration to the hand, caused by operating some tools for longer periods must be protected against. Wear vibration reducing gloves and allow long breaks between uses. Protect against dust and swarf by wearing approved safety goggles or a face shield. These are some of the more common hazards and preventions; however, always find out what hazards are associated with the machine/work process and wear the most suitable protective equipment available.

**Do not breathe contaminated air.** If the work creates dust or fumes; connect the machine (if possible) to an extraction system either locally or remotely. Working outdoors can also help if possible.

**Move the machine as instructed.** If the machine is hand held, do not carry it by the air line. If the product is heavy; employ a second or third person to help move it safely or use a mechanical device. Always refer to the instructions for the correct method.

**Do not overreach.** Extending your body too far can result in a loss of balance and you falling. This could be from a height or onto a machine and will result in injury.

**Maintain your tools correctly.** A well maintained tool will do the job safely. Replace any damaged or missing parts immediately with original parts from the manufacturer. As applicable; keep blades sharp; moving parts clean, oiled or greased; handles clean; and emergency devices working.

**Wait for the machine to stop.** Unless the machine is fitted with a safety brake; some parts may continue to move due to momentum. Wait for all parts to stop; then disconnect it from the air line before making any adjustments, carrying out maintenance operations or just finishing using the tool.

**Remove and check setting tools.** Some machinery requires the use of additional tools or keys to set, load or adjust the power tool. Before starting the power tool always check to make certain they have been removed and are safely away from the machine.

**Prevent unintentional starting.** Before connecting any machine in to the air supply, make sure the switch is in the OFF position. If the machine is portable; do not hold the machine near the switch and take care when putting the machine down; that nothing can operate the switch.

**Concentrate and stay alert.** Distractions are likely to cause an accident. Never operate a power tool if you are under the influence of drugs (prescription or otherwise), including alcohol or if you are feeling tired. Being disorientated will result in an accident.

Have this tool repaired by a qualified person. This tool is designed to confirm to the relevant international and local standards and as such should be maintained and repaired by someone qualified; using only original parts supplied by the manufacturer: This will ensure the tool remains safe to use

#### 5.2 GENERAL SAFETY INSTRUCTIONS FOR COMPRESSED AIR

Following Safety instructions should be strictly followed. Failure to do so may result in accidents, equipment malfunctioning, serious personal Injury and / or loss of life.

Compressed air is a source of considerable energy. When handling products dealing with compressed air, the following precautions must be taken to prevent accidents.

- 1. Ensure that compressed air is not blocked or in contact with any part of your body.
- Before connecting any pneumatic equipment to the compressed air supply, all mounted fittings, piping assemblies and electrical connections should be checked for security. All plastic plugs in the equipment used for protection during shipping should be removed.
- 3. No piping alterations, removal of fittings, repairing of equipment etc. Should be attempted with air supplies connected. Air and electrical supplies must be disconnected before beginning any adjustment, maintenance or dismantling of equipment.
- 4. The maximum allowable operating pressures, temperature, flows etc. must be strictly observed. Failure to do so might result in catastrophic failure of equipment, and result in serious personal injury and / or death. Refer to individual catalogues for this information, and any other operating or application limitations.

#### **WARNING:**

- 1. Compatibility of pneumatic equipment
  - Ensuring the compatibility of the procured FRL equipment is the responsibility of the person who designs the Pneumatic system and/ or System specifications. This should be based on specifications or after analysis and / or tests to meet specific requirements.
- 2. Repair & Maintenance
  - Assembly, handling, or repair of pneumatic systems should be performed by only trained and experienced operators.
- 3. Safety First
  - Do not service machinery / equipment or attempt to remove any component until safety Is confirmed.
  - i. Inspection and maintenance of machinery / equipment should only be performed after confirmation that both compressed air and electrical supply have been positively disconnected and all residual compressed air in the system has been completely exhausted to the atmosphere.
- 4. Contact the manufacturer if equipment is to be used in any of the following conditions:

- Equipment is to be used in conditions beyond the given specifications, or if equipment is to be used outdoors.
- ii. Equipment is to be used in conjunction with atomic energy, railroad, air navigation, automobiles or related vehicles, medical equipment or safety equipment.
- iii.In applications that adversely effect humans, animals, or property requiring special safety analysis.

#### 5.3 SPECIFIC SAFETY INSTRUCTIONS FOR AIR BODY SAWS

- Air powered equipment and power tools are capable of propelling materials such as fasteners, metal chips and other debris at high speed which could result in serious eye injury.
- Compressed air can be hazardous. The air system can cause injury to soft tissue areas such as eyes, ears etc. Particles or objects propelled by the stream can cause injury.
- Tool attachments can become loose or break and fly apart propelling articles at the operator and others in the work area. Make sure that any attachments are securely assembled.
- Tools are capable of generating sparks, which could result in ignition of flammable materials.
   Never operate tools near flammable substances such as gasoline, cleaning solvents etc. Work in a clean and well ventilated area free of combustable materials. Never use oxygen, carbon dioxide or other bottled gases as a power source for air tools.
- Exceeding the maximum pressure rating of tools or accessories could cause an explosion resulting in serious injury. Use compressed air regulated to a maximum pressure at or below the rated pressure of any attachments. Never connect an air source that is capable of exceding 200psi.
- Long term exposure to noise produced from the operation of air tools can lead to permanent hearing loss. Always wear protection.
- Tools generate dust and abrasive materials, which can be harmful to human lungs and respiratory system. Always wear protection. Some materials such as adhesives and tar contain chemicals whose vapours could cause serious injury with prolonged exposure. Always work in a clean, dry, well ventilated area.
- A tool left unattended, or with the air hose attached, can be activated by unauthorized persons leading to their injury or injury to others. Remove air hose when tool is not in use and store tool in secure location away from reach of children and intrained users.
- Air tools can propel fasteners or other materails throughout the work area. Use only parts, fasteners and accessories recomended by the manufacturer. Keep the work area clean and free of clutter. Keep children and others away from tool while it is in operation.
- A wrench or a key that is left attached to a rotating part of the tool increases the risk of personal injury. Remove adjusting keys and wrenches before turning the tool on.
- Using inflator nozzles for duster applications can cause serious injury. DO NOT use inflator nozzles for duster applications.
- Air tools can become activated by accident during maintenance or tool changes. Remove air
  hose to lubricate or add grinding attachments, sanding discs, drills, etc. to the tool. Never carry
  the tool by hose. Avoid unintentional starting. Don't carry hook-up tool with finger on trigger.
  Only an authorized service representative should do repair servicing.
- Air tools can cause the workpiece to move upon contact, leading to injury. Use clamps or other devices to prevent movement.
- Loss of control of the tool can lead to injury to self or others. Never use tool while using drugs
  or alcohol. Don't overreach. Keep proper footing and balance. Keep handles dry, clean and
  free from oil/grease. Stay alert. Do not operate tool when you are tired.

- Poor quality, improper or damaged tools such as grinding wheels, chisels, sockets, drills, nailers, staplers, etc., can fly apart during operation, propelling particles throughout the work area causing serious injury. Never point discharge of tool at self or others. Do not pull trigger unless tool contact safety device is against work surface. Never attempt to drive fasteners into hard surfaces such as steel, concrete, or tile. Avoid driving a fastener on top of another fastener. Position tool carefully so that fasteners will be delivered to the proper location.
- Improperly maintained tools and accessories can cause serious injury. Maintain the tool with care. Keep a cutting tool sharp and clean. A properly maintained tool, with sharp cutting edges, reduces the risk of binding and is easier to control.
- Use only accessories identified by the manufacturer to be used with specific tools. Use of an accessory not intended for use with the specific tools increase the risk of injury to persons.
- This tool is not provided with an insulated gripping surface. Contact with a "live" wire will also make exposed metal parts of the tool "live" and can result in electrocution or death. Avoid body contact with grounded surfaces such as pipes, radiators, ranges and refrigerators. There is an increased risk of electric shock if your body is grounded.
- Fasteners coming in contact with hidden electrical wiring could cause electrocution or death.
   Thoroughly investigate the workpiece for possible hidden wiring before performing work.
- Tools that cut, shear, drill, staple, punch, chisel, etc. are capable of causing serious injury.
   Keep the working part of the tool away from hands and body.

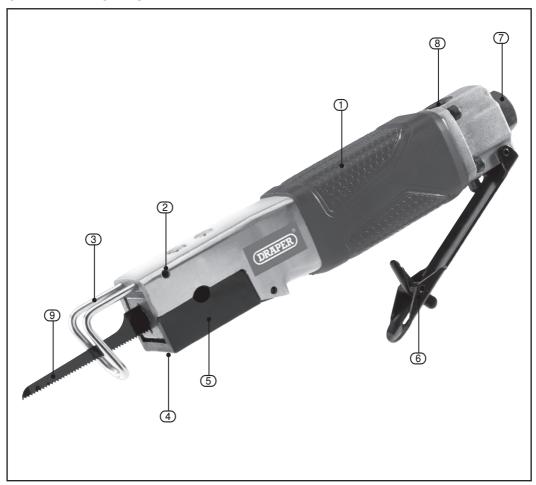
# 5.4 RESIDUAL RISK

#### 7.1 PACKAGING

The packaging material should be retained at least during the guarantee period: in case the saw needs to be returned for repair.





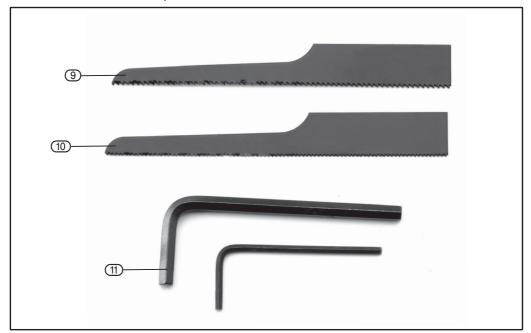

# 8. AIR SUPPLY

#### 8.1 AIR TOOL OIL SPECIFICATION

Air tool oil viscosity refers to it's properties to flow and how it reacts with heat. A low viscosity is thinner than a high viscosity.

Air tool oil becomes thinner as it heats so choosing the right viscosity is essential. If the viscosity is too low it may provide insufficient lubrication when heated. Equally, if it is too high, the fluid may provide excessive resistance to move through the lines when cold.

The ISO (International Standards Organisation) viscosity grading system measures the kinematic viscosity in centistokes (cSt) at 40° which is todays accepted standard. The SAE (Society of Automotive Engineers) viscosity grade value is based on a scale.

This equipment is suited to an ISO grade 22 - 32 (SAE grade 5W - 15W) monograde oil.

The oil must be constantly supplied to the equipment during use to ensure complete lubrication and optimum performance is achieved. It also acts as a rust inhibitor when the equipment is not in use. We recommend the use of Draper Air Tool Oil:

250ml	Stock No.34679
500ml	Stock No.34681
1Litre	Stock No.34682

This air tool operates at a working pressure of 90psi and must be controlled via a combination pressure regulator, in-line lubricator and moisture filter such as the Draper range (see you local Draper stockist) which with proper maintenance will ensure a constant supply of dry air and lubricating oil at all times (see illustration below). Always check machine operating pressure before use.

Water in the compressor tank will cause serious corrosion to your air tools and should be drained daily to avoid excessive water in your air supply. Dirty wet air rapidly shortens the life of your air tool.

If you are using an air tool on a hose over 25ft long it is advisable to increase the bore of the hose to the next larger size available, i.e., 1/4" increases 3/8". This will ensure adequate pressure and volume of air to power the machine.

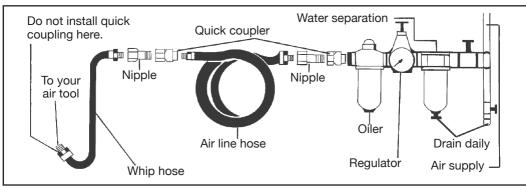

# 9. ASSEMBLY

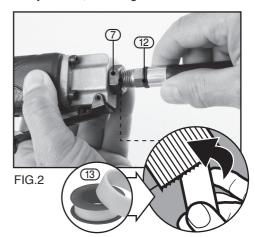

# 9.1 CONNECTION TO THE AIR SUPPLY – FIG. 2

To connect the body saw to an air line, a 1/4"BSP male thread whip hose (12)\* will be required.

- Wind a length of PTFE tape (13)\*\* around the thread of the whip hose.
- Attatch the hose via the 1/4" BSP (female) air inlet (7). The connection must be tight for an airtight union.

# 9.2 REPLACEMENT OF SAW BLADE - FIG. 3

- Loosen the chuck cover release screw 4 with a screwdriver (not supplied) allowing you to open the chuck cover 5.
- Loosen the rolling pins both sides using a hex key (supplied).
- Insert a blade.
- Tighten the two rolling pins to fix the blade in place. Make sure that it is secure.
- Replace the chuck cover and tighten the screw.



The work guard functions as a guide for cutting depth. You can control the depth of cut by adjusting the height of work guide as intended.

- Loosen the two work guard adjustment screws
   2) on each side using the supplied hex key.
- Pull the work guard to the required depth and retighten screws.

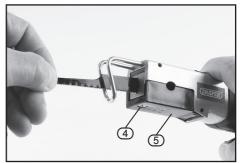

# 10. OPERATION

#### 10.1 OPERATION - FIG. 5

Push the safety trigger switch and then press

the trigger 6.
The tool speed can be adjusted by rotating the valve speed adjustment screw (8) with a screwdriver (not supplied).

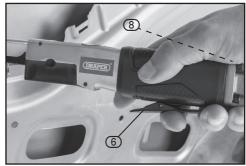

# 11. MAINTENANCE



#### Warning!

- Disconnect from the air supply before carrying out any adjustments, servicing or maintenance.
- Never use any sockets or accessories that are not hardened for impact use.

#### 11.1 EVERY-DAY MAINTENANCE CHECKS

Before connection to the air supply:

- Drain the compressor reservoir of condensate.
- · Drain the air lines of condensate.
- Drain the combined separator filter, regulator, water trap.
- Fill up the combined separator filter, regulator, lubricant reservoir.
- · Check the line pressure is correct for the tool.

#### 11.2 AFTER USE MAINTENANCE CHECKS

- Repeat the above procedures.
- Lubricate the tool with approximately 1.5ml of oil directly down the air inlet.
