## The greatest summer hits



The Ethicurean

Be honest, no one wants to spend a perfect summer's day inside a restaurant. Fortunately, these days there is no shortage of places that combine excellent food with a supercharged dose of vitamin D. At both Darsham Nurseries, in Suffolk, and the Ethicurean, a shortish drive from Bristol, gorgeous kitchen gardens provide bounty for the table and a welcome opportunity for a wander after lunch; the cooking is frequently as dazzling as the gorgeous (and, yes, highly Instagrammable) flora in bloom. Meanwhile, restaurant critics, including the Sunday Times's own Marina O'Loughlin, have been falling over each other to sing the praises of the Fordwich Arms, in Kent: not only does it do outdoor seating, its setting, on the bank of a river, makes for maximum babbling-brook quaintness. Just a few miles closer to the coast, of course, is the daddy of them all, the Sportsman at Whitstable, soon to enter its third decade as perhaps the best and most famous gastropub in the country. Don't let the bare tables and cheery, welcoming staff fool you this is serious, serious cooking, all the better for being enjoyed al fresco.

## The hotspot (for the metropolitan liberal elite)

Back in London, the centre of the universe over the past year or wedness (and only for a certain kind of east London hipster food nerd, ie me) has been P Franco, a no-reservations(!) natural wine bar(!!) in Lower Clapton(!!!), serving a daily changing menu of small plates cooked over an induction hob (! \*key snaps off from overuse\*). Now, though, the P Franco team are getting all grown-up, opening an actual bricks-and-mortar restaurant just off London Fields. It's called Bright and you can even reserve a table. Expect modern British /Italian small plates with more than the occasional influence from further afield. The team are seasoned and very charming pros; chef William Gleave is, pound for pound, perhaps the best young cook in the country. One to get very excited about and brave the trip east for, whatever your usual tastes.

The surprising foodie destination

Koks

Far-flung must-visit restaurants don't get more far-flung or must-visit than Koks in the Faroes. It's a region not known for its gastronomy, but which, for the 28-year-old chef Poul Andrias Ziska, serves as a many-splendoured larder/kitchen garden. Ever wanted to try gannet? Whale blubber? Or what about ræst, the local delicacy of fermented and wind-dried lamb? It may sound more like a northern European version of the I'm a Celebrity bushtucker trial, but everyone who has visited has had nothing but ecstatic things to say about the experience, and last year it was awarded a Michelin star — not least because of the stunning scenery that forms the backdrop (in more ways than one) to every bite.

## The hangover-free (ish) drinks

Day drinking is great, but after a while we all get bored with the headachey aftereffects of an Aperol spritz's cloying sweetness. Drier styles of all your warm-weather favourites are increasingly available, though. Try substituting prosecco or cava with pét-nat (a rawer, more rustic style of sparkling wine) to bring a welcome dose of acidity to the table. Served ice-cold, Cidre Breton is as crisp and tart as a Cox's apple, and if it just has to be rosé, at least go for one that doesn't taste like a bag of strawberry Starburst. Birgit Braunstein's Birgit Pur, from Burgenland in Austria, should do nicely.

## The new barbecue gurus

The Hidden Hut

Different schools of barbecue and/or open-fire cookery have seen something of a renaissance in the UK of late, but it's pretty hard to imitate the slow-and-low American style — let alone replicate a full Basque country asador — in your own backyard. Two books out this summer, though, may give a few tips on differentiating your barbecue from the usual fare. The Hidden Hut takes its name from the impossible-to-book restaurant in Cornwall, where Simon Stallard and his partner, Jemma Glass, prepare evening feasts, often over smouldering coals, for the lucky few who have managed to secure a ticket. Berber & Q, meanwhile, is the first book from the Haggerston Middle Eastern grill of the same name, where the chef, Josh Katz, uses fire and smoke to do indecent things to chunks of meat, merguez sausages and whole cauliflower heads. Both books feature recipes that are straightforward, unfussy and a doddle to execute, even with a beer or glass of wine in one hand.

## The return of the dinner party

Ottolenghi-inspired mezze fests have become the default setting for all home entertainers in recent years — in part because of how damn easy they are to turn out. But two big cookbooks devoted to the art of a carefully composed sequence of dishes look set to change the summer nights. Samin Nosrat's Salt, Fat, Acid, Heat is perhaps the most important home cookbook for decades and aims to reteach domestic cookery from the ground up (ie, the four essential building blocks of its title). While Thom Eagle's raved-about debut, First, Catch, focuses on the techniques that go into cooking a single springtime meal. Put it this way: if you get invited over for dinner and someone has either of these books in pride of place on their shelves, you're probably in safe hands.



The Wives by Lauren Weisberger (HarperCollins £12.99), out on July 12



The American novelist has earned comparisons to Jennifer Egan and Jonathan Franzen, and her first two novels were both nominated for the US National Book Award. Now she releases her third, which centres on 29-year-old Romy Hall, a woman serving two consecutive life sentences at a fictional correctional



facility in California. The story flits between flashbacks to her childhood (predictably bleak) and her sexual history (ditto), but makes for a brilliantly compelling read. Imagine a darker version of Orange Is the New Black.



Come August 24, The Innocents will be your new Netflix






her dad, so already we're into this. Plus, it was an audience favourite at SXSW and Sundance film festivals.




