We want to work with residents to consider what the future options for Gilbeys Yard and Juniper Crescent might be.

Morrisons and Barratts are jointly proposing to redevelop the supermarket site between Juniper Crescent and Gilbeys Yard and have submitted a planning application. The London Borough of Camden is also thinking about the area. It has adopted a planning framework which sets out a highlevel strategic vision and objectives to guide any future development at the Goods Yard.

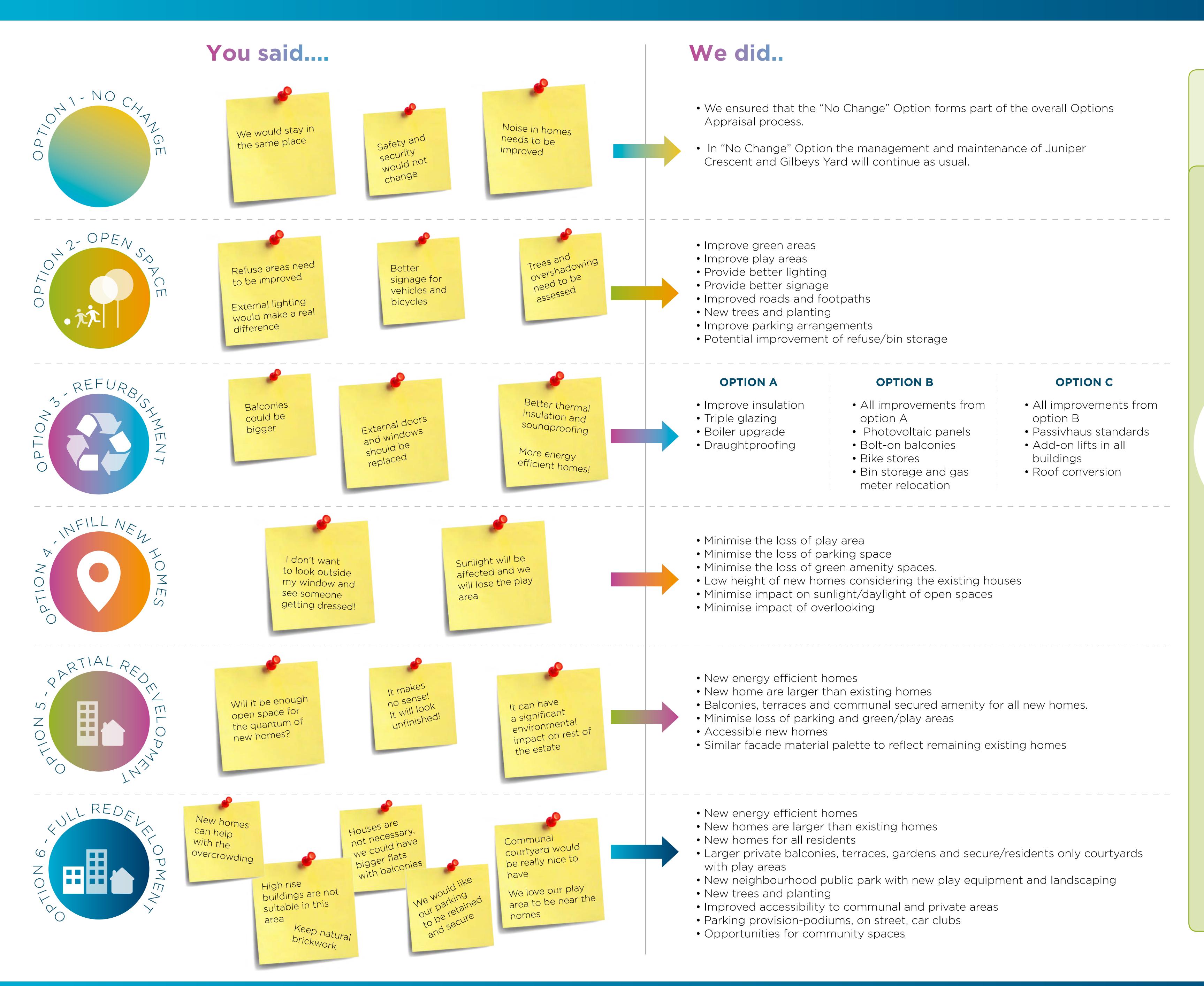

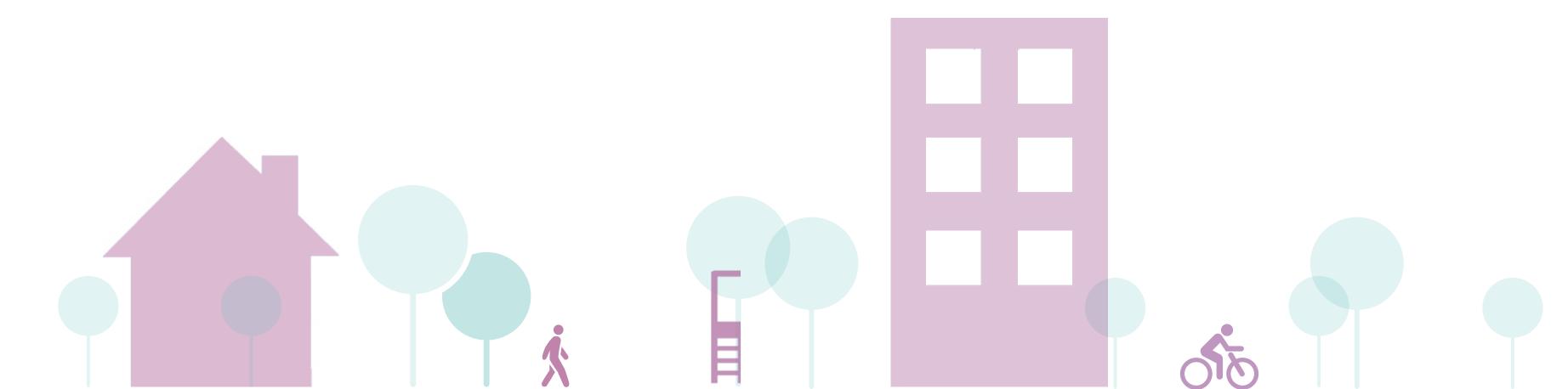

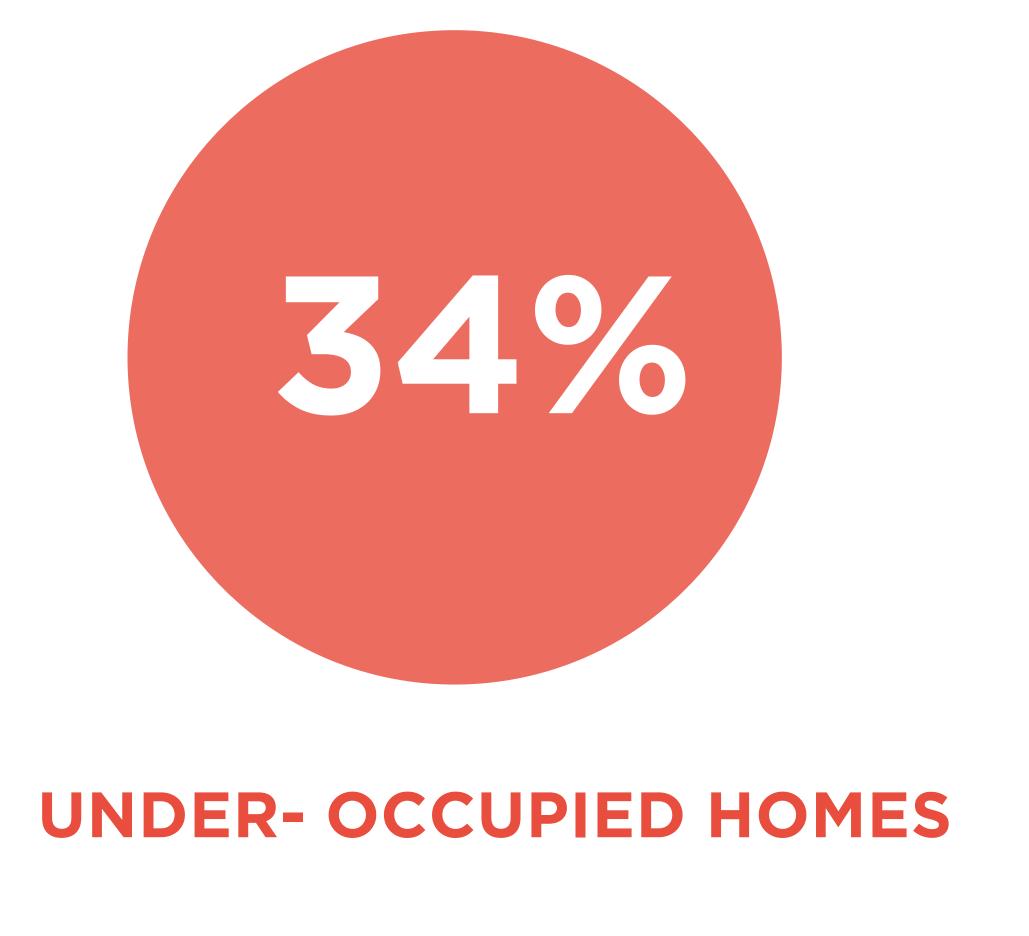
- The area is changing and we believe there is a possible opportunity to provide better homes and services for existing residents; new homes for future residents and new facilities for all.
- The Council's Camden Goods Yard Planning Framework encourages the exploration of a range of options for Juniper Crescent and Gilbeys Yard and expects that residents will be engaged from early stages and through the process.
- Consultation with residents and consideration of the priorities of the Council, Greater London Authority and One Housing Group has helped produce a set of objectives which guide what any option should seek to achieve.

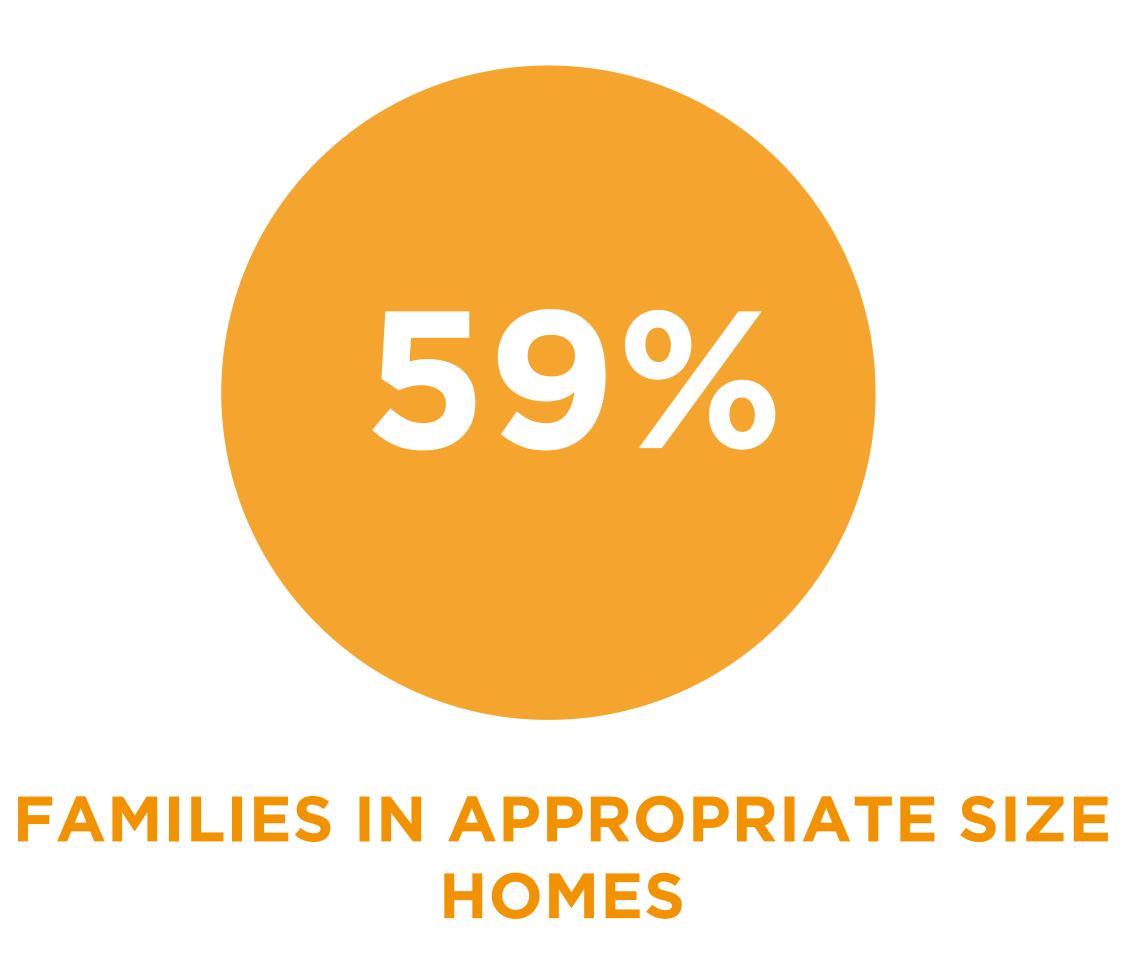
- The different options have been selected to cover the widest possible range of ways forward, extending from a base case of "Do nothing" or "Business as usual" through to the opposite extreme of fully redeveloping the estates. Between the two extremes a number of other options have been selected, these include more limited works around the buildings, refurbishment, smaller scale infill development and partial redevelopment.
- Selecting a range of options allows us to test which are best meets the objectives of residents and One Housing. Ideas on changes to the options or any alternative options are also welcome.

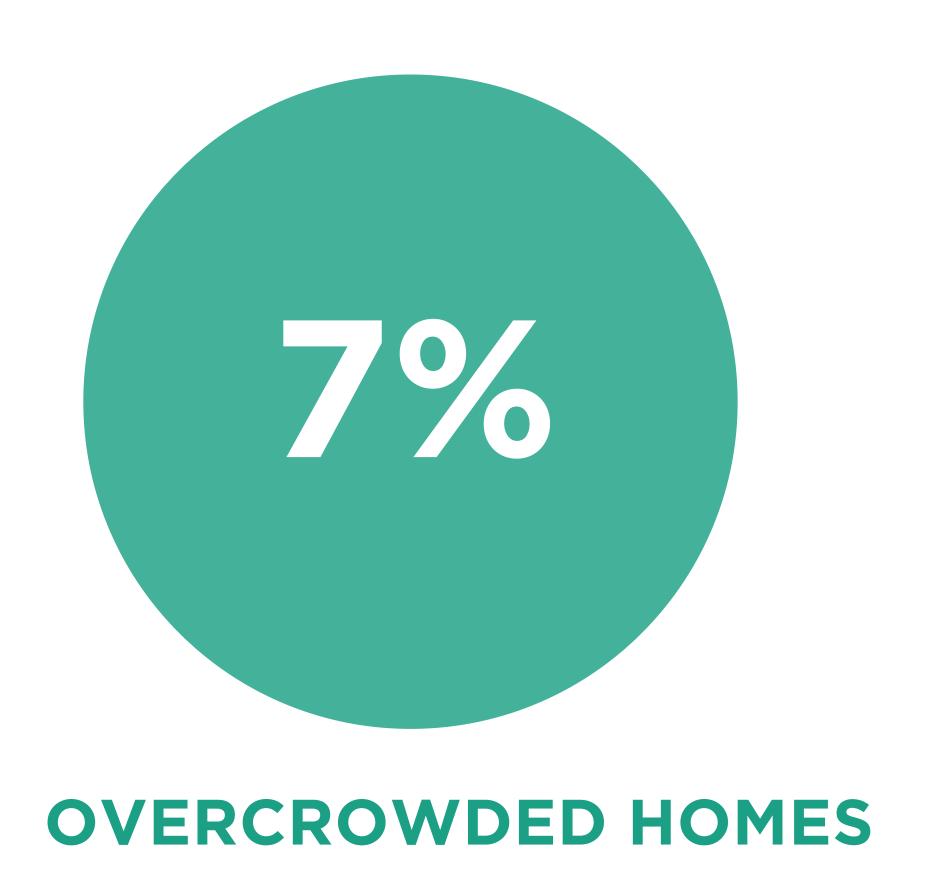


ABOUT THE EXISTING HOMES NOW...

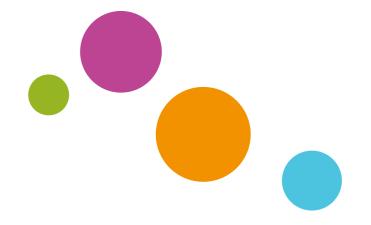




DRAFT RESIDENT'S CHARTER



What is a resident's charter?

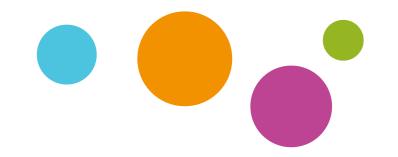


A residents' charter is a list of promises a landlord or developer makes to the people living in an area that is about to undergo major work – typically redevelopment or large scale refurbishment. These promises are written in collaboration with the residents. Once written the charter is published and made available to the public.

None of us will be in a position to agree a residents' charter for Gilbeys Yard and Juniper Crescent until we have decided which of the six options currently being considered will be adopted for the future of the two estates. This is because a charter for full redevelopment would need to include different things to one which relates to refurbishment for example. But we can give you an idea of the sort of things you could expect to see in a charter:

- We will actively listen and engage with residents to understand their values, concerns and aspirations; and ensure that these views inform our plans.
- We will provide an **independent** residents' advisor to support residents and offer independent advice on housing, financial and legal issues.
- Residents will keep their current tenancy rights and privileges.
- We will aim to work with tenants and residents, being as flexible as possible and taking account of their individual circumstances.
- Any resident who has to move to allow work to be completed has the right to return to a permanent home on the estate.
- If a resident has to temporarily move to allow work to be completed, we will find a suitable alternative property as close as possible to their current home.
- If a resident has to move, One Housing will cover all reasonable costs and help with removals, packing and relocation-related issues.

- Residents will get the home loss and disturbance payments that they are legally entitled to.
- Any new or refurbished property provided for a tenant will take into account their housing need – to relieve overcrowding for example or adapted for residents with mobility issues.
- There will be **no change to rent levels** for current tenants as a consequence of any refurbishment or redevelopment work unless people choose to move to a smaller or larger home than the one they currently have. Rent payments and increases will operate in the same way that they do at the moment.
- We will provide extra support and guidance to vulnerable and disabled people.
- There will be no change to the 'day to day' management of the area during the project i.e. repairs will still be carried out and estate management will continue as normal.







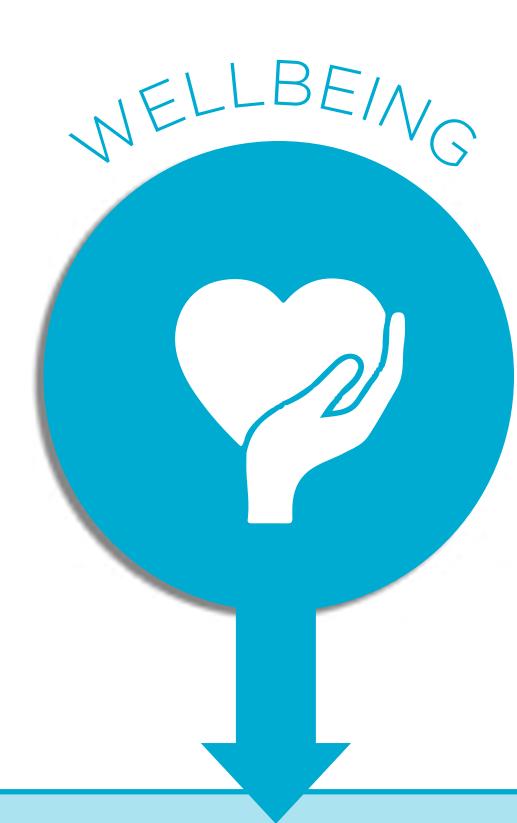
- Ensure no net loss of affordable housing floorspace.
- Deliver more homes including more affordable homes than currently provided.
- Provide homes that meet residents' housing need. This will include options for those who have current circumstances such as overcrowding, adult children living at home who require a home of their own and those wishing to downsize.
- Maintain current tenancy terms unless residents agree otherwise.
- Offer a wider choice of housing tenures, including intermediate housing and provide options for working households on low to average incomes including keyworkers.



- Improve private amenity space eg balconies, gardens.
- Improve communal amenity space eg child playspace, open space, public realm, community facilities
- Reduce anti-social behaviour problems and ensure safety and **security** onsite.
- Preserve a quiet, tranquil local environment.
- Improve sustainability and energy efficiency standards (lower bills for residents).
- Improve servicing facilities and noise insulation



- Improve connections and relationship to the surrounding communities eg. Oval Road linkages to Gilbeys Yard.
- Improve accessibility to the Canal where feasible.
- Improve car parking in line with current requirements.
- Improve cycling parking facilities in line with current requirements
- Improve accessibility for all homes.



- Improve health and wellbeing.
- Provide housing and care options for elderly people and those with specialist needs.
- Minimise any disruption, allow flexibility and choice, allow communities to stay together and ensure any temporary moves are in close proximity to the estates.



- Ensure residents have access to employment and training opportunities eg. apprenticeships to local young people arising from any works.
- Provide new commercial facilities eg shops and cafes or business space to enable economic growth.

The objectives have been reviewed in relation to the initial feedback from residents, planning policy requirements and One Housing's strategic objectives.

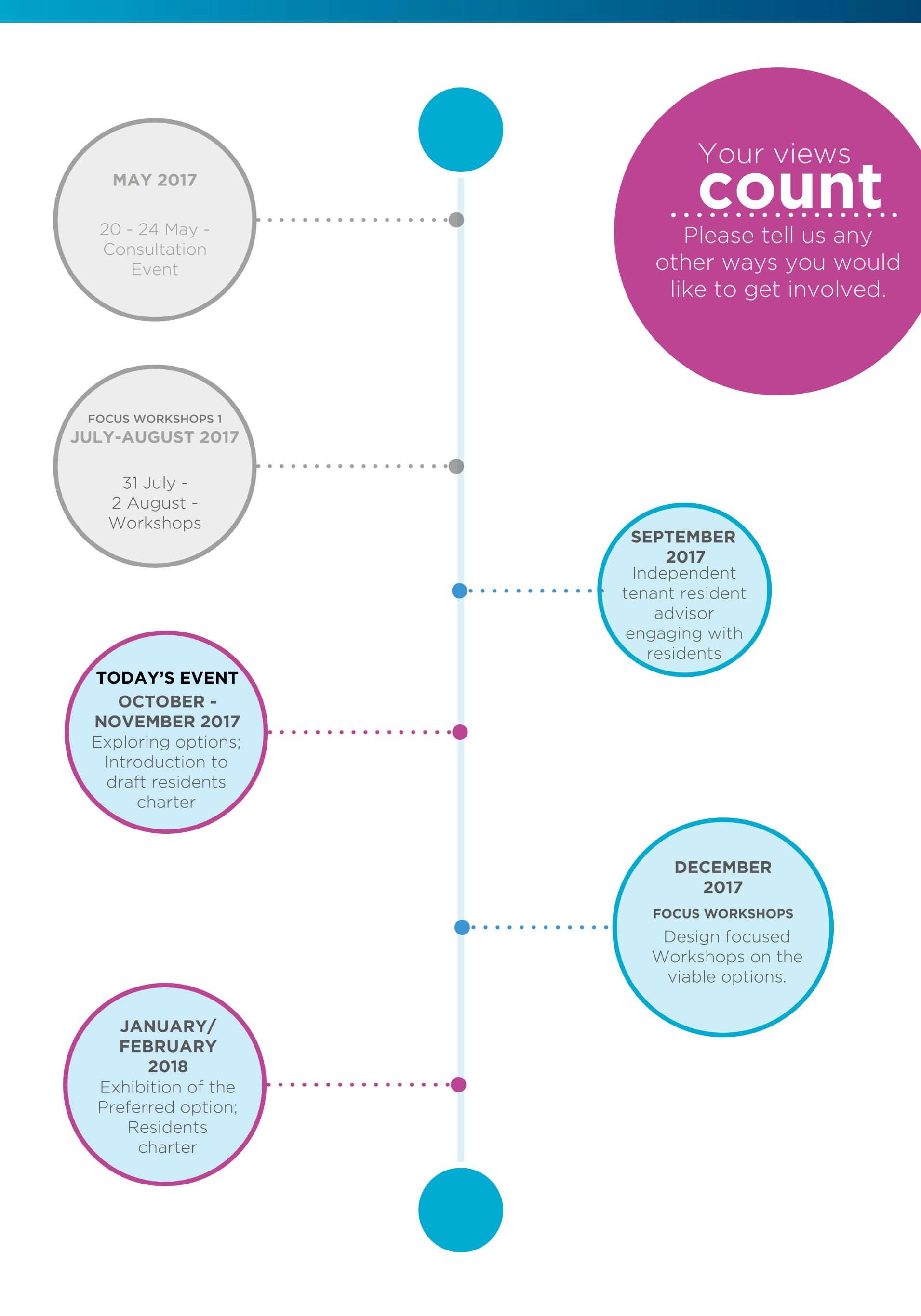

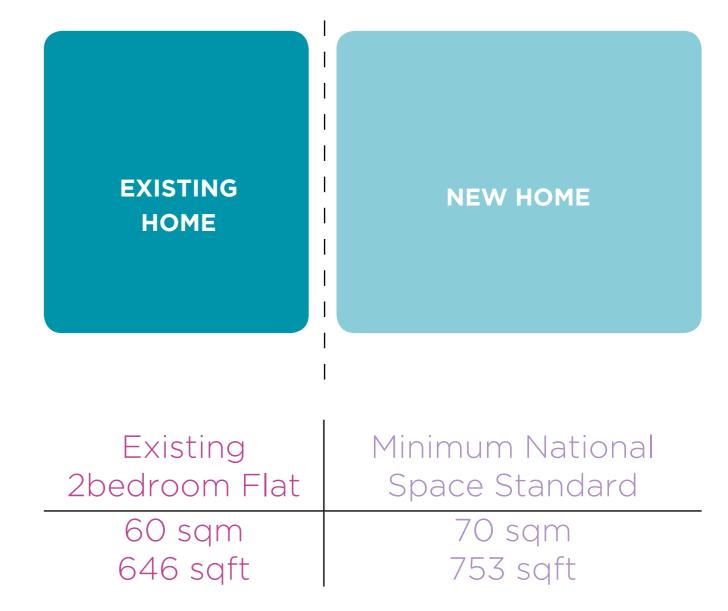

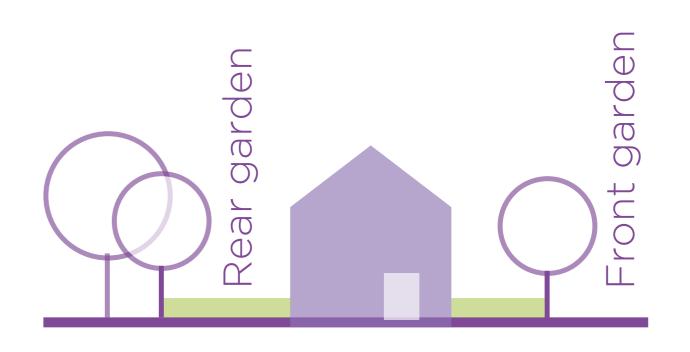

- 4 Bedroom house = 27.9 sqm

New homes should have balconies, terrace or garden space.

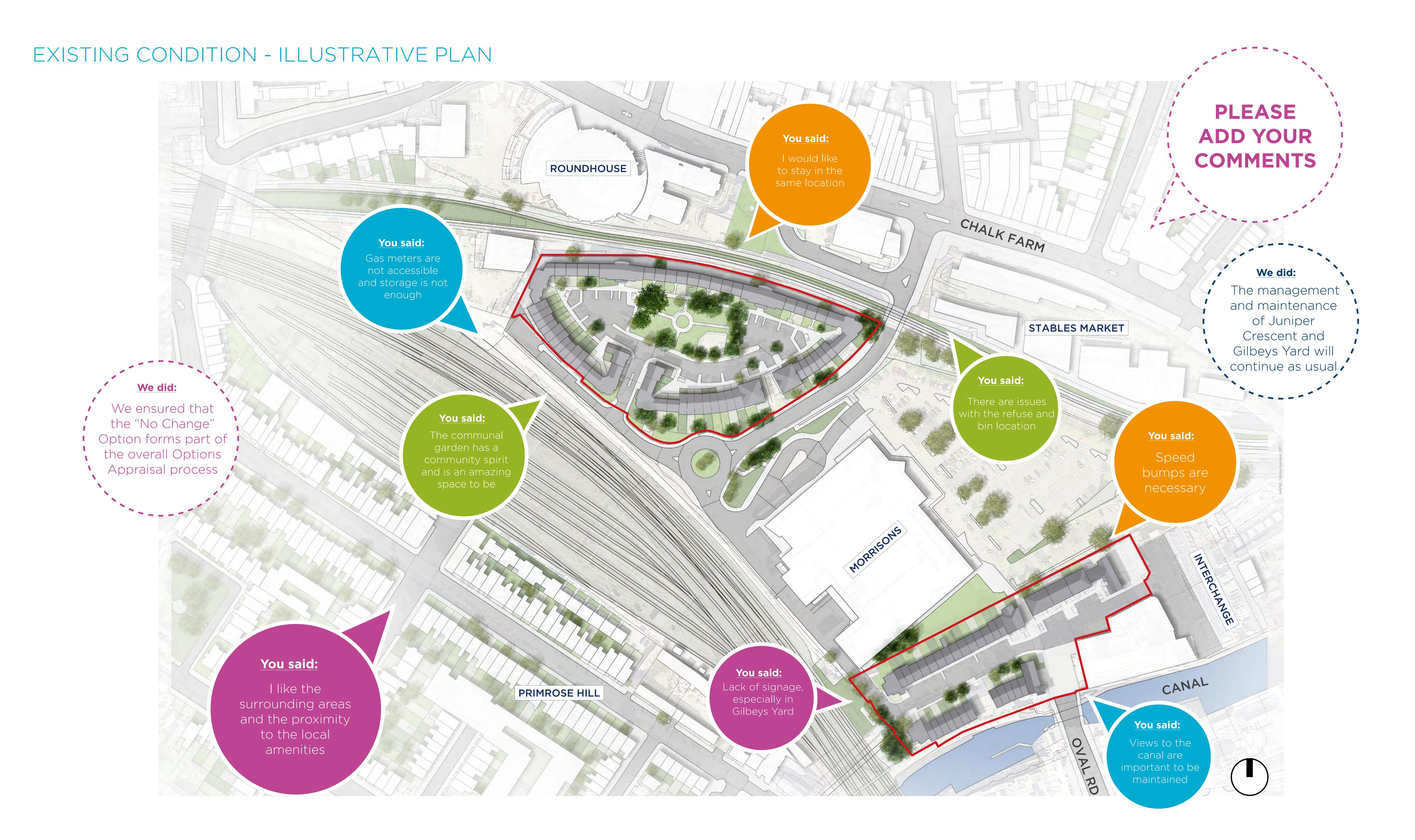


EXISTING HOMES

- The overall size of dwellings, rooms and storage spaces is slightly smaller than the recommended minimum standards.
- Bathrooms are generally smaller than the required minimum, with no turning space or ease of access to the WC, basin and bath.
- In general, principal double bedrooms do not provide a clear access zone of a minimum 750mm wide to both sides and the foot of the bed.
- The minimum depth and width for all balconies and other private external spaces does not follow current standards.
- The majority of residents have to carry their refuse a long distance. This is difficult for many older and frail people and anyone with a mobility impairment, or wheelchair users.
- Play location does not enable informal supervision because it is located beside deep gardens with high walls facing it.
- There is no seating for parents or carers in the Gilbeys Yard play area.

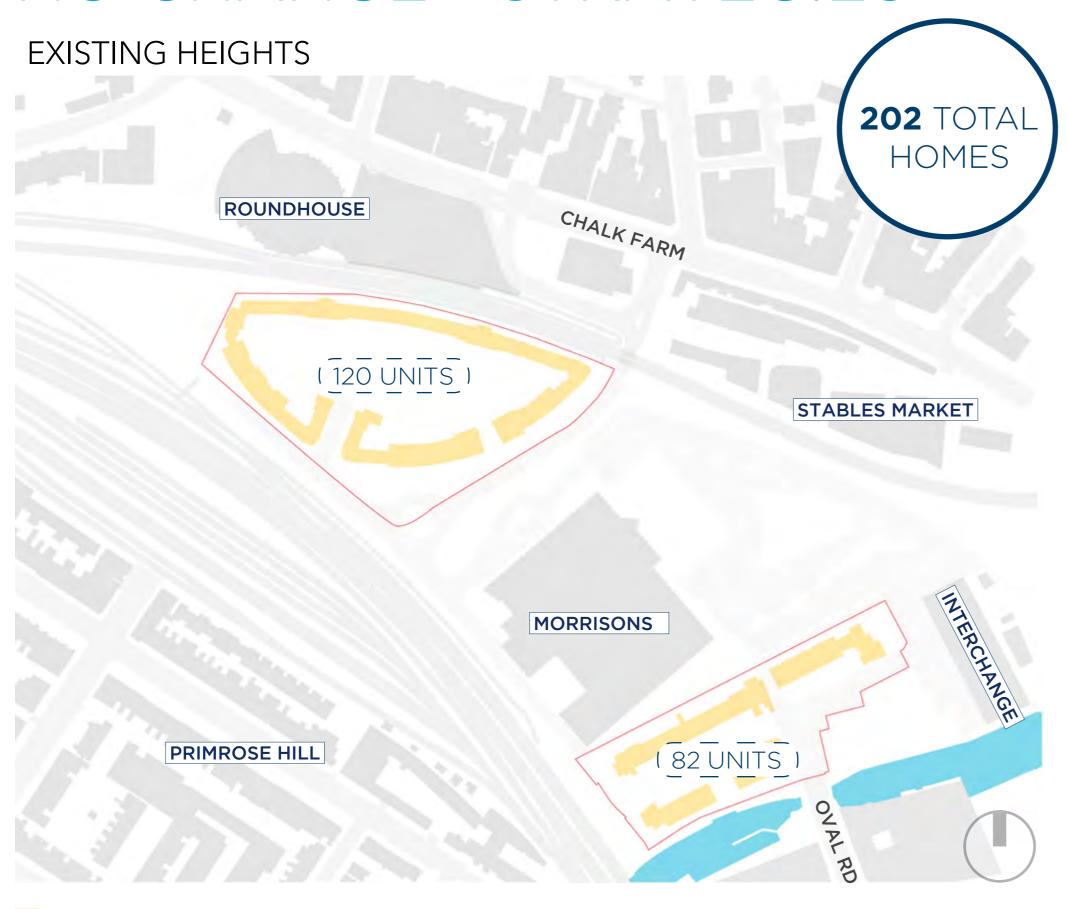

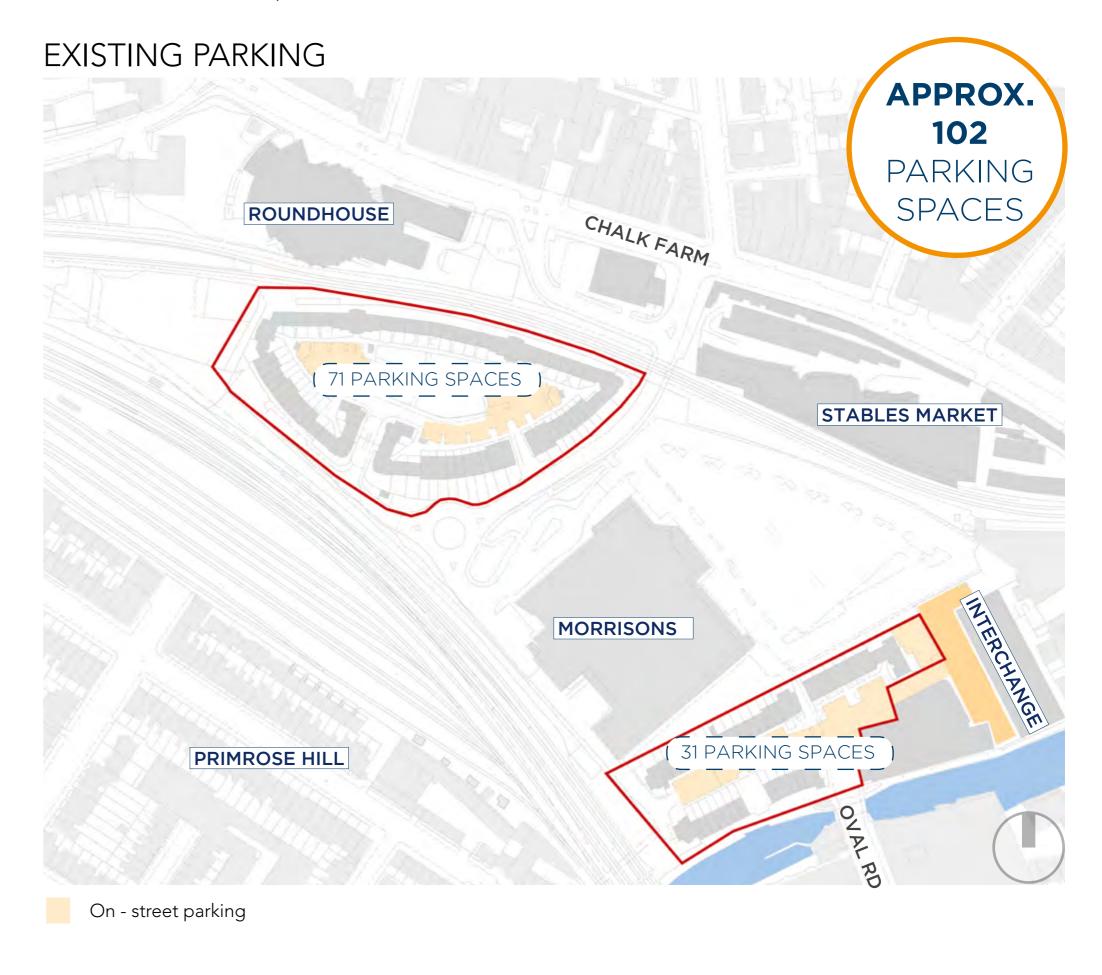
EXISTING MOVEMENT

- Both sites are pedestrian accessible

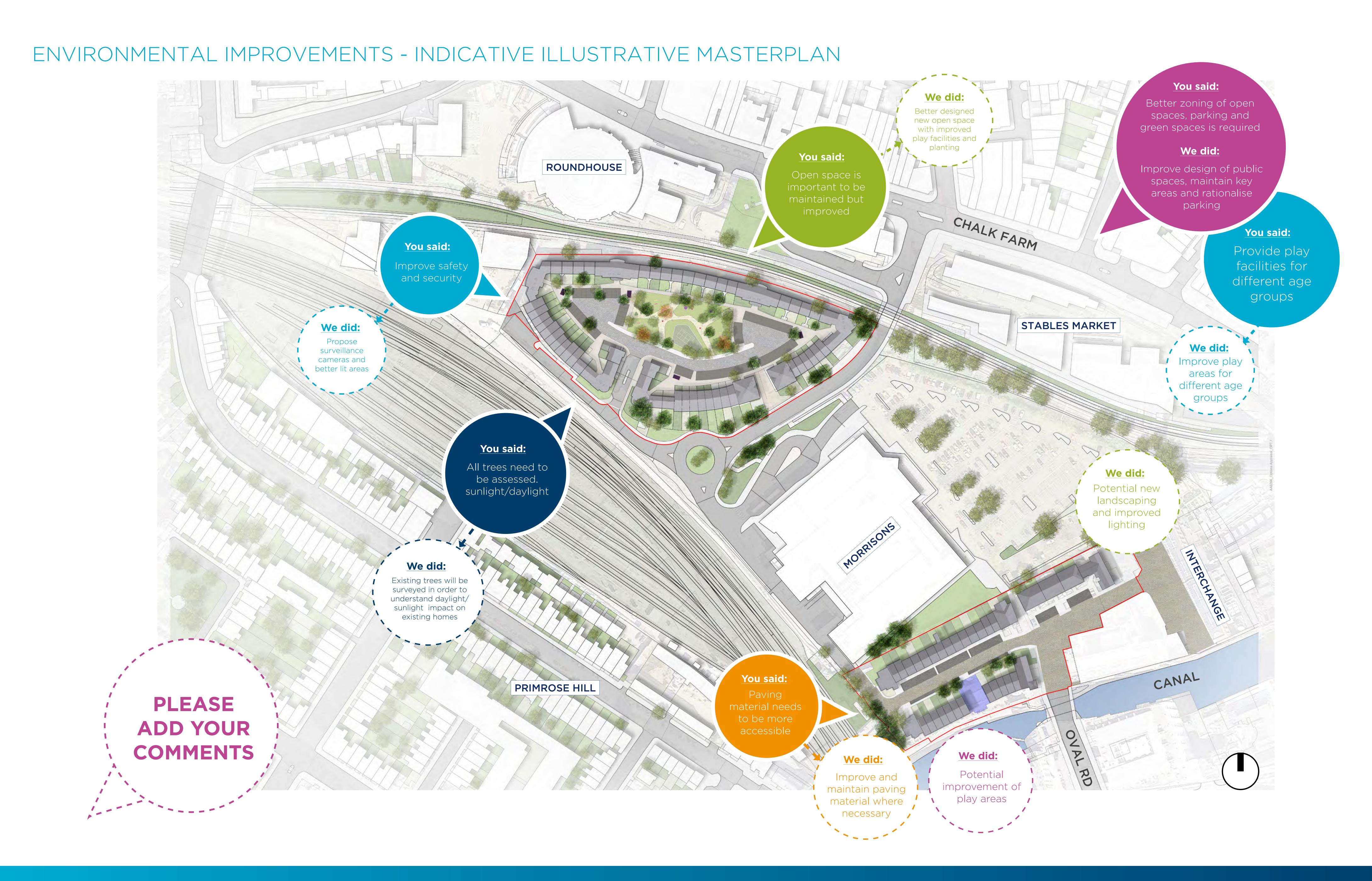


- All house have private gardens
- Not all homes have private balconies
- There is one play area in Gilbeys Yard
- There is one communal green space in Juniper Crescent with a play area and a play court.
- Both the play areas are located away from traffic, and easily accessed on pedestrian routes.



- There are approximately 71 parking spaces for 120 dwellings in Juniper Crescent. This is equivalent to 59% provision.
- 31 car parking spaces are provided perpendicular to the footway in front of the homes facing into Gilbeys Yard. They serve 82 dwellings at a rate of 37%.

- Bolt-on balconies (with external support) in all flats

- Relocation of gas meters
- Bike stores

OPTION C - Best Practice

Good practice standard, plus Environmental works:

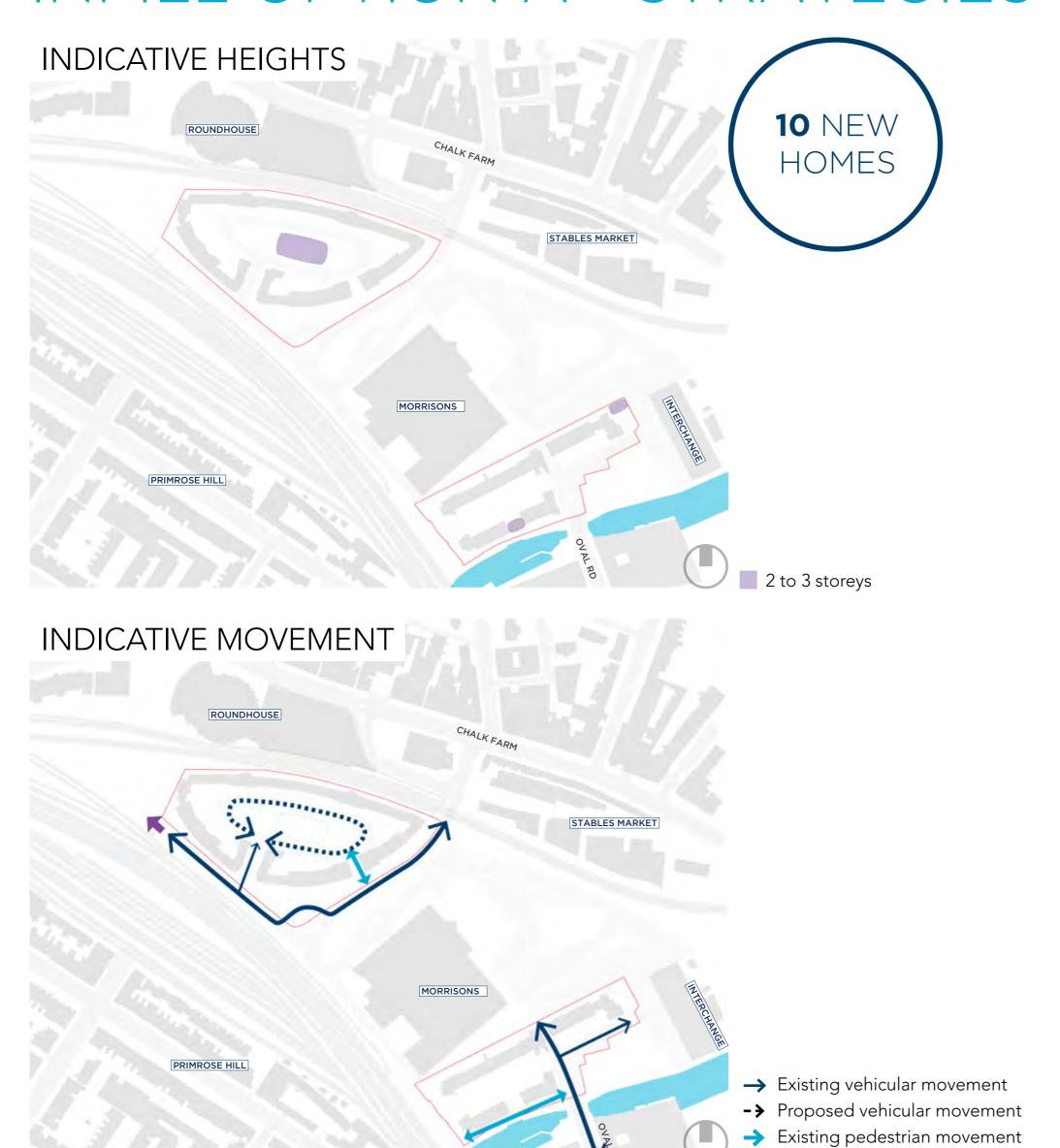
- Mechanical ventilation with heat recovery (MVHR)

- Roof conversion

- Hybrid boiler systems: +solar thermal or +heat pump
- Ground source heat pumps for groups of houses or blocks of flats
- Add-on lifts in all flat buildings

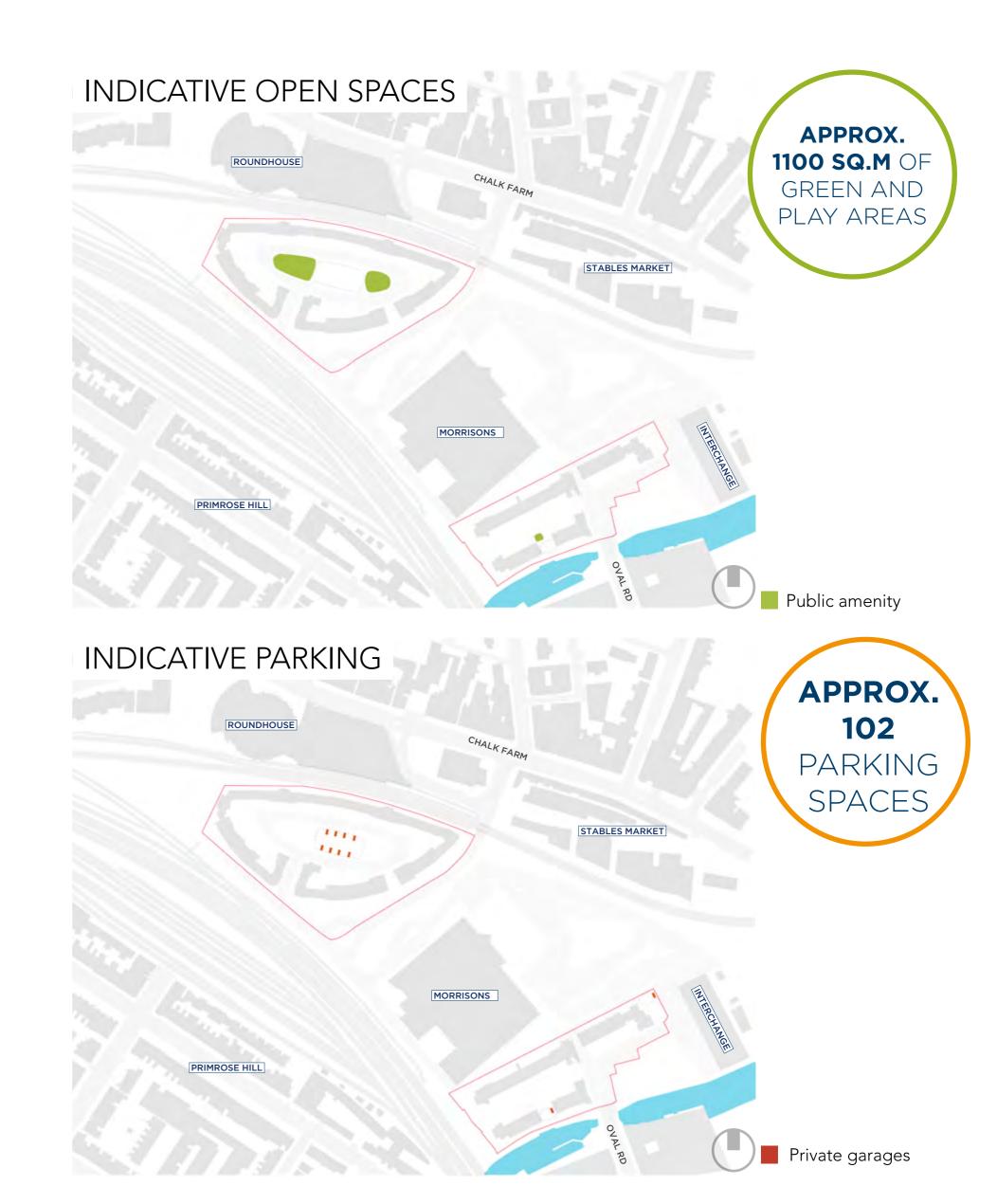






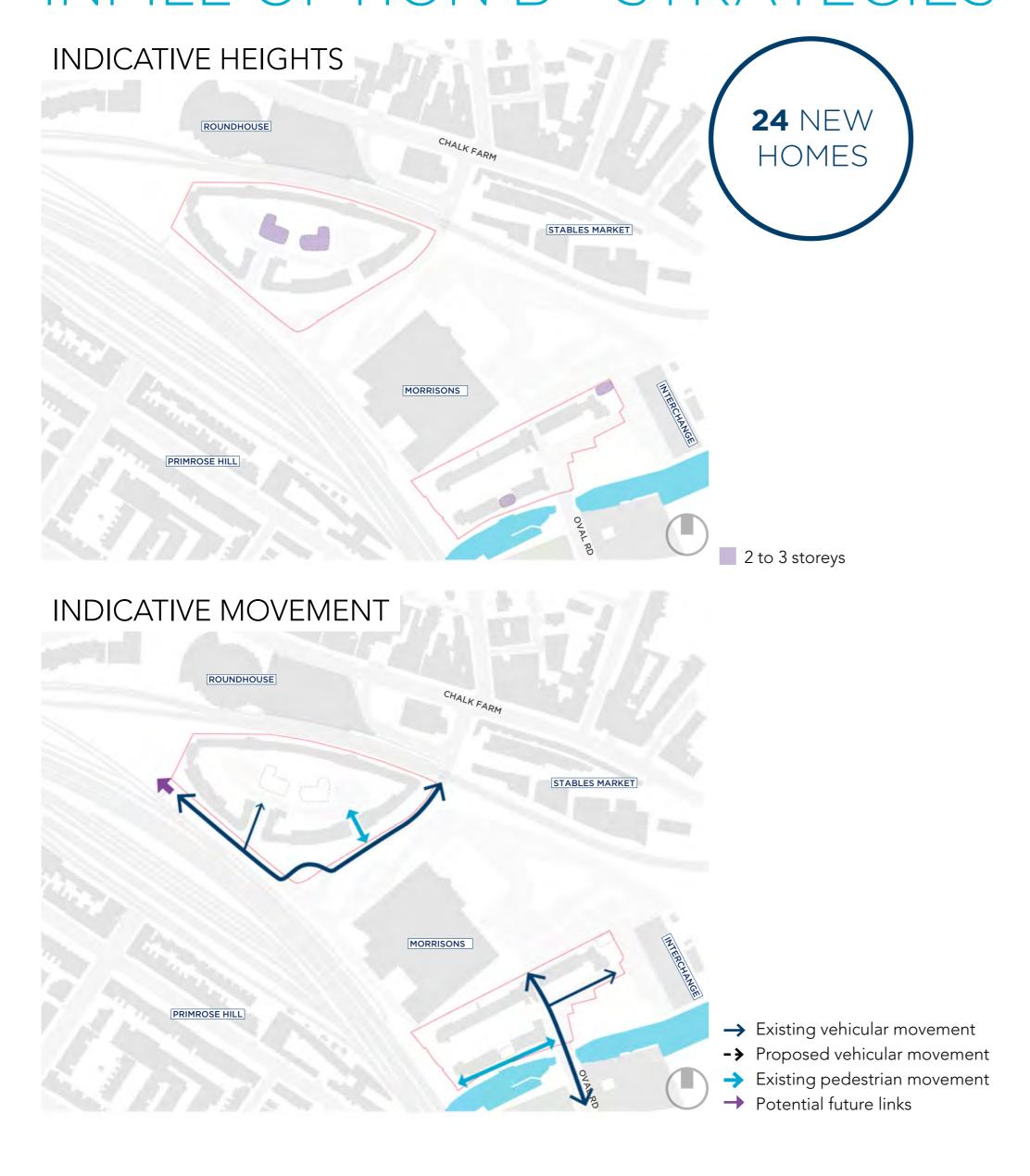

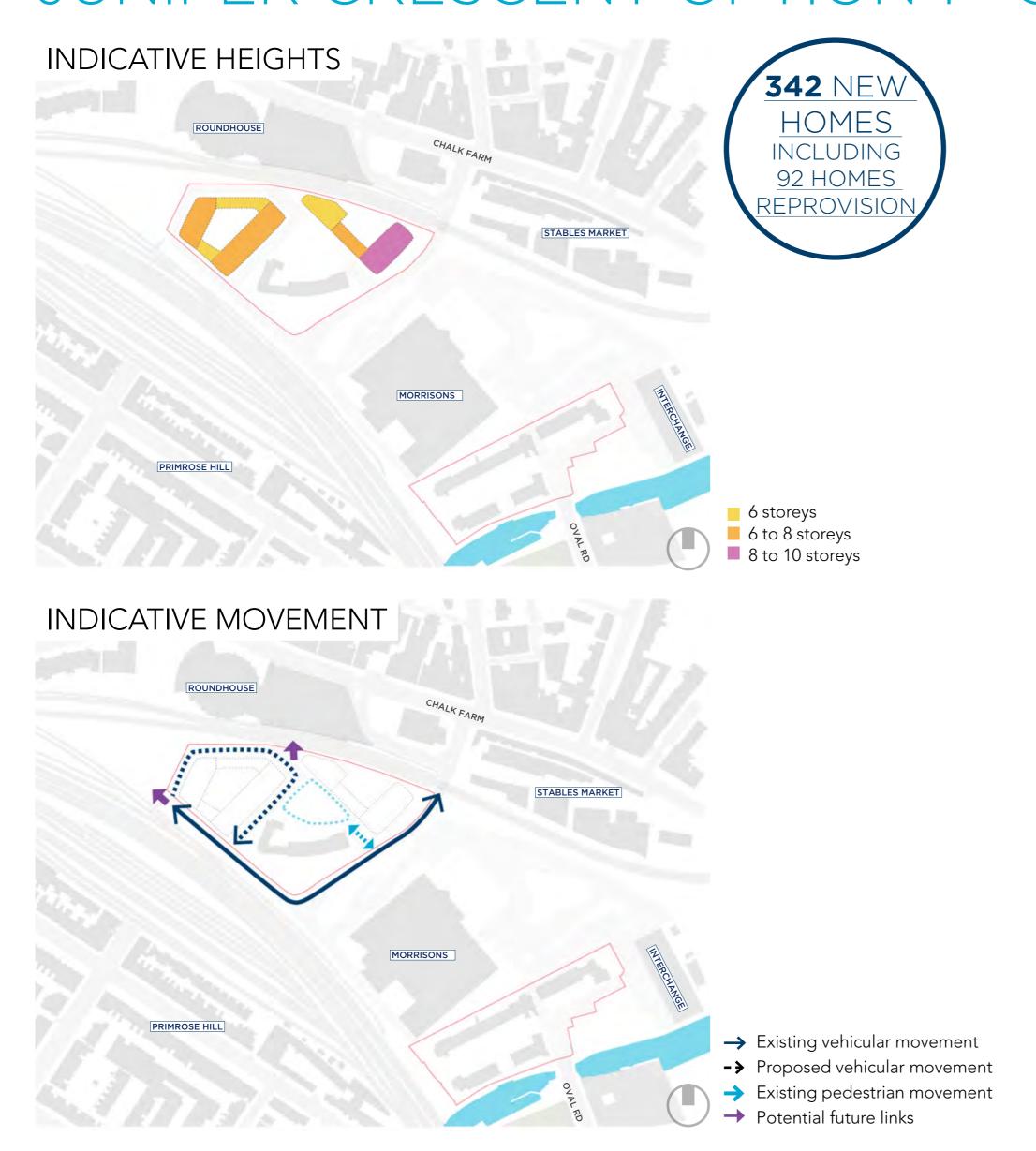
JUNIPER CRESCENT - INDICATIVE ILLUSTRATIVE MASTERPLAN

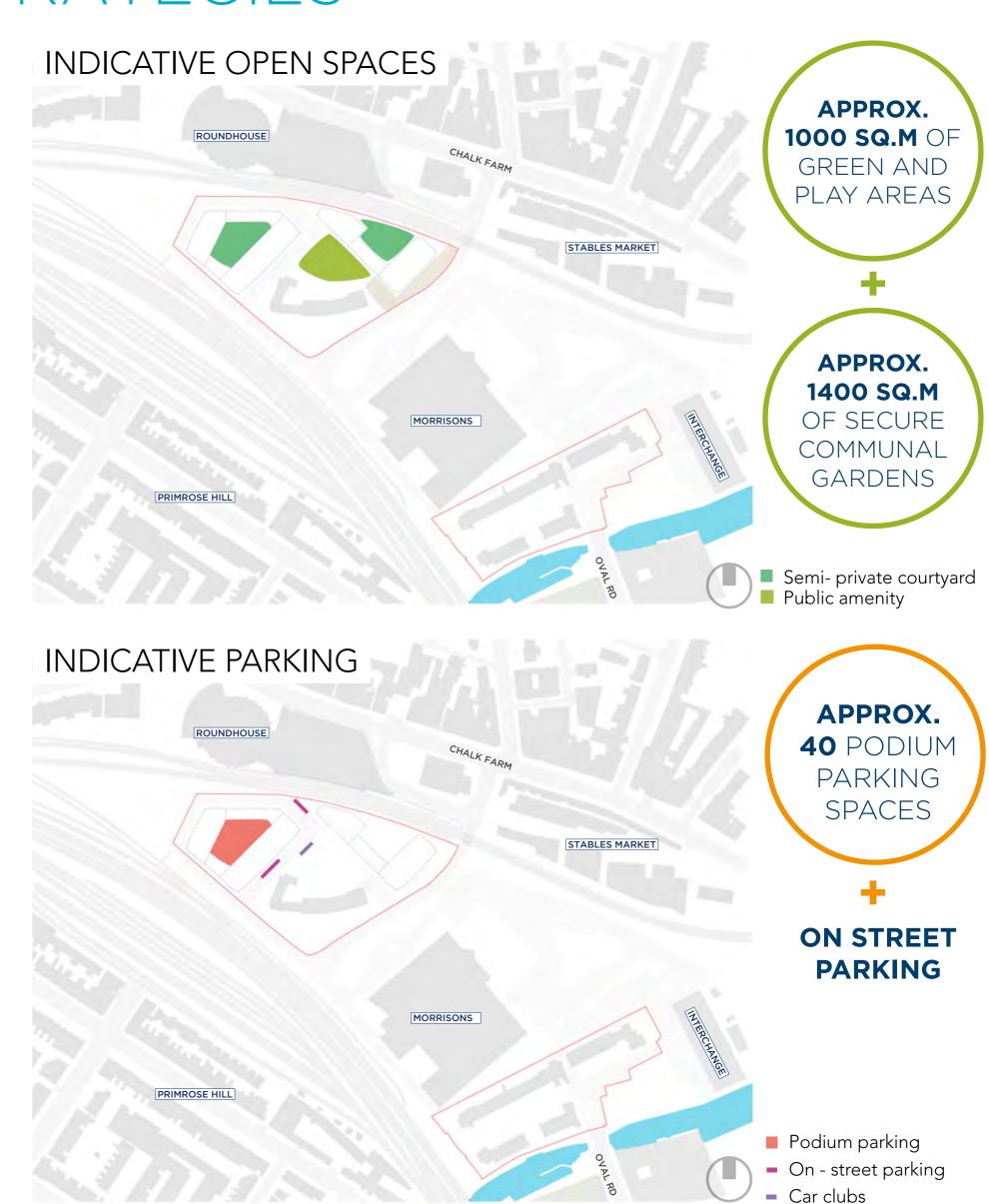

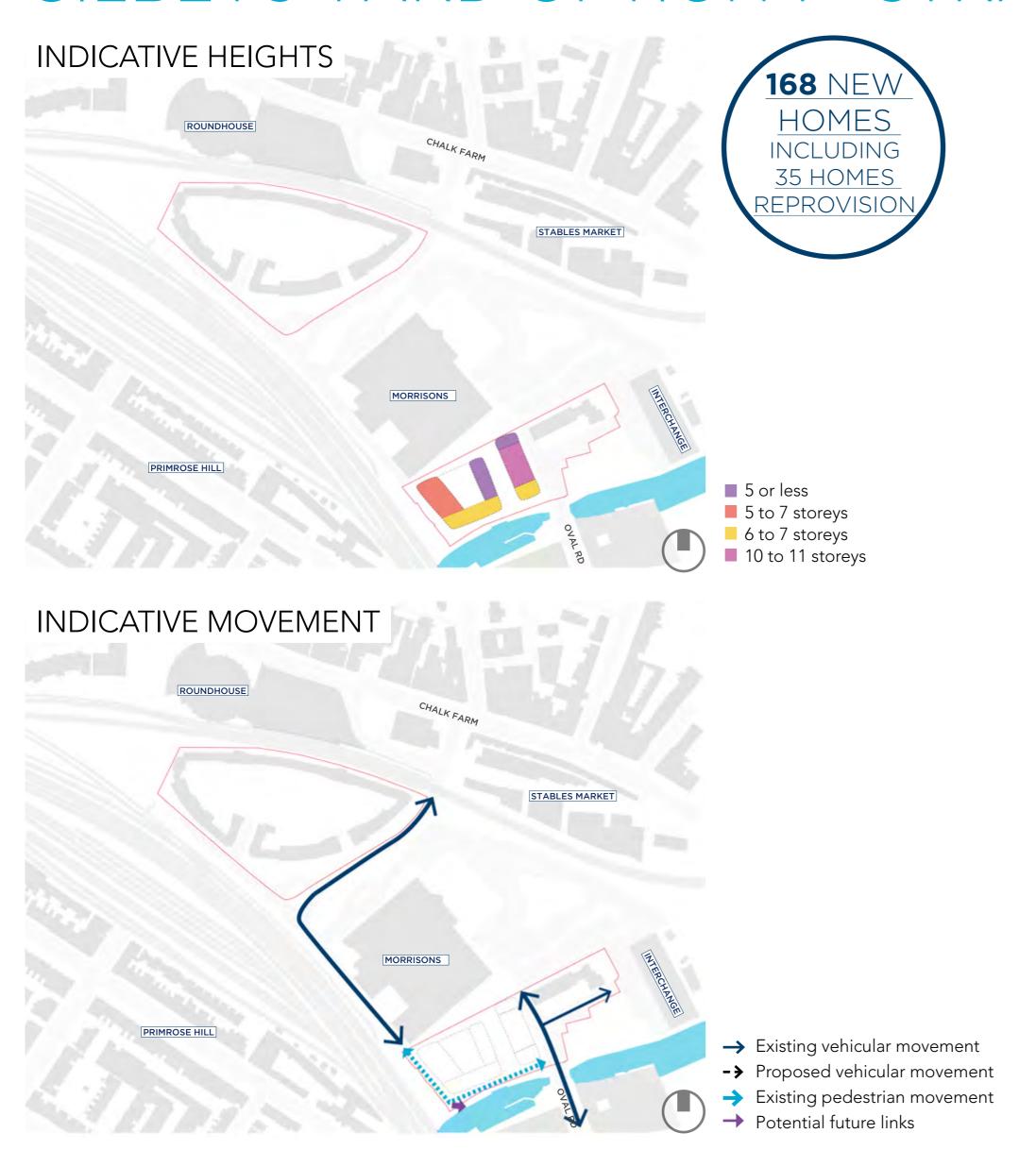

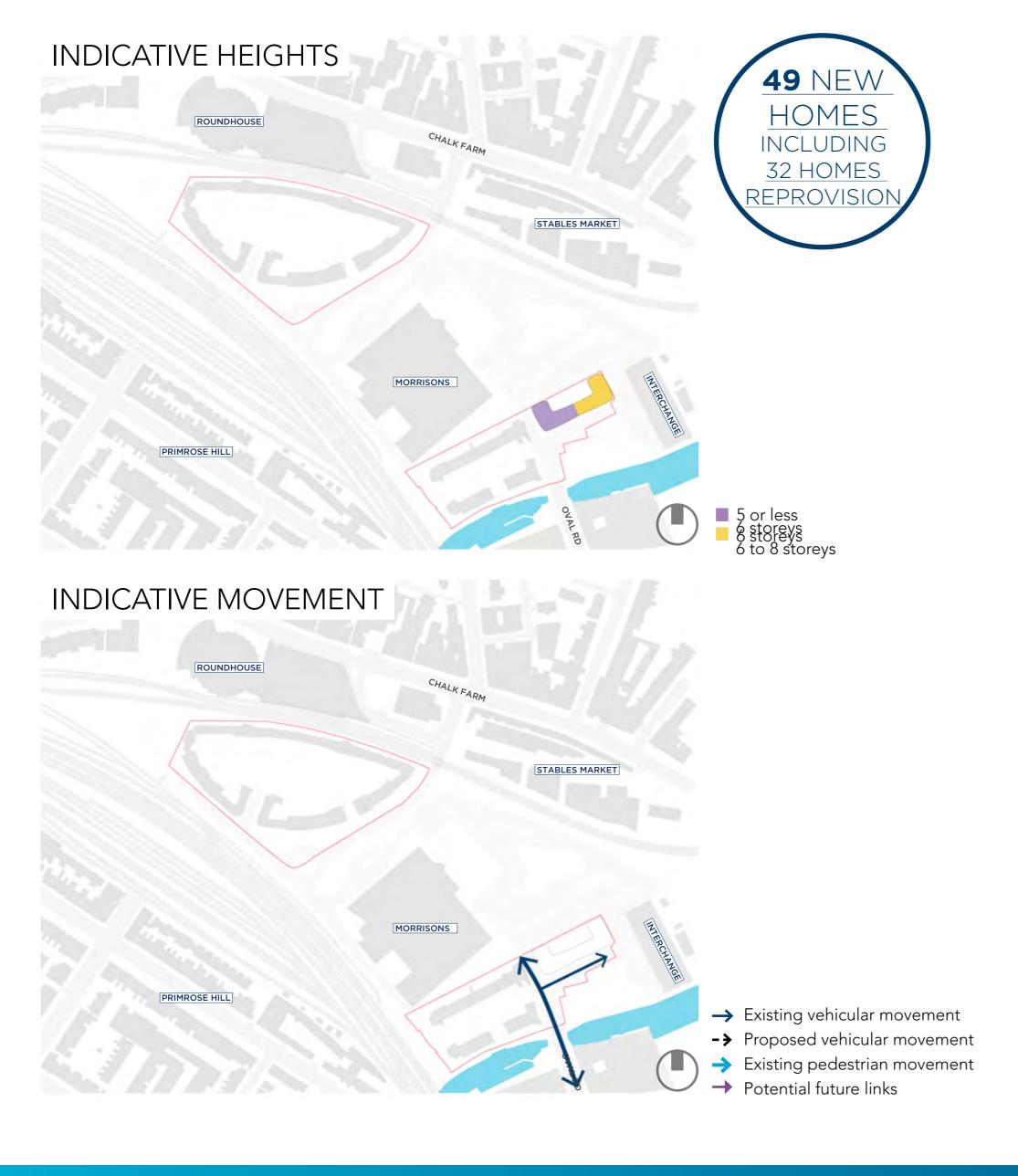

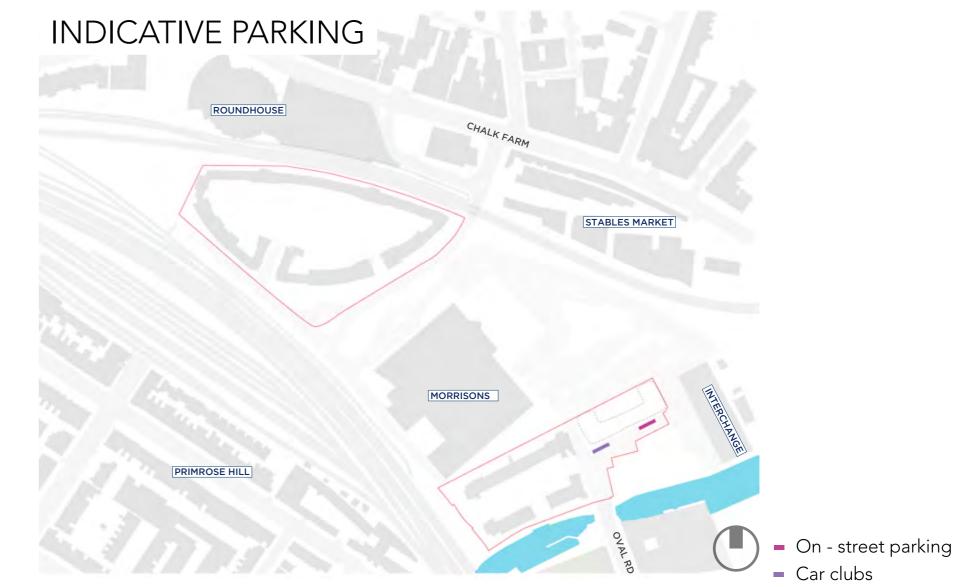

FINANCIAL OUTPUT

- Income is unchanged as rents remain the same and there are no additional homes

DELIVERABILITY

- No disruption to existing residents
- No new works are undertaken so there are no barriers to delivery
- Minimal disruption to residents eg. temporary loss of open space while this is improved
- Can be delivered in a short period of time.
- Lack of funding to deliver more extensive environmental works may render these unviable
- Some disruption to residents, especially if extensive refurbishment involves the need for residents to move out temporarily
- May be able to be delivered quickly if minimal refurbishment, more extensive refurbishment would take a number of months or years to deliver
- Lack of funding to deliver refurbishment may make this option unviable

- Some disruption to local residents
- Concern over daylight/sunlight and privacy
- Development programme of c.1 year following grant of planning permission.
- Potentially not acceptable under the Council's planning policies given impact on surrounding properties
- Some disruption to residents whilst new homes are built
- Some residents would need to move temporarily to allow the works
- Development programme would take 2-3 years to deliver following planning consent dependent on the type of partial redevelopment
- Disruption to residents whilst new homes are built
