

PHASE 2 REPORT LAND OFF CUCKOO LANE EYNSHAM WITNEY OX29 4EE

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### **SUMMARY**

- 1. Lindsay Carrington Ecological Services Ltd were appointed by Grosvenor Group Ltd to conduct phase 2 surveys for breeding birds, bats, dormice and great crested newts on land at Cuckoo Lane, Eynsham, Witney, OX29 4EE. Surveys were conducted in relation to plans for a large residential development on the site.
- 2. The site at Cuckoo Lane, Eynsham is considered to provide moderate quality habitat for bats with mature hedgerows, stream corridor and arable and pasture fields. The bat activity and static monitoring surveys recorded nine species using the site including the annex II species barbastelle. The site is considered to be of county importance for bats and further recommendations have been provided in section 4.1.
- 3. During the breeding bird surveys fifty-nine species were recorded on the site, eleven of which are listed as red list species, and thirteen of which are listed as UKBAP priority species. Twenty-four species were confirmed as breeding on site with an additional five as probable breeding. This includes the arable species skylark and yellowhammer. The site is of local importance for the local bird populations and recommendations for enhancement are provided in section 4.2.
- 4. The mature hedgerows and small areas of woodland on the site provide potential habitat for dormice. The hedgerows connect into a wider network across the surrounding landscape. Full dormice surveys were conducted between May and September 2018 with no dormice recorded on the site. This species is therefore considered absent.
- 5. The mixture of grassland, scrub and hedgerows provide potential terrestrial habitat for great crested newts with a number of waterbodies in close proximity to the site. Surveys were conducted on all ponds where access was available within 500 metres of the site boundary with thirty-three ponds surveyed. Great crested newts were recorded as present within a collection of ponds within the south west corner of the site. Full aquatic surveys were conducted on these ponds.
- 6. The aquatic surveys recorded a medium population of great crested newts within these waterbodies with all other ponds surveyed recording great crested newts as absent. Any works to the ponds or within 500 metres of these ponds will require mitigation and further advice in regards to the masterplan for the development are provided in section 4.3.
- 7. Recommendations for ecological enhancements that can be included within the masterplan have been provided in section 4.4 including the creation of ponds and the provision of habitat for birds and bats.

### 1.0 INTRODUCTION

Lindsay Carrington Ecological Services Ltd were appointed by Grosvenor Group Ltd to conduct ecological surveys on land at Cuckoo Lane, Eynsham, Witney, OX29 4EE. (grid ordnance reference: SP 42361 10092). A plan showing the location of the site has been included as appendix I.

The following targeted protected species surveys were conducted due to the presence of suitable habitat on the site:

- Bat activity transects including static monitoring.
- Breeding bird surveys
- Dormouse (Muscardinus avellanarius) survey.
- Great crested newt (*Triturus cristatus*), HSI, eDNA and aquatic surveys.

All bat, dormice and great crested newts are legally protected under Annex IV of the EC Habitats and Species Directive which is transposed into UK law via the Conservation of Habitats and Species Regulations 2017. All species of bat, dormice and great crested newts are also protected under the Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981 (as amended). This legislation makes it an offence to:

- Deliberately kill, injure or capture these species;
- Deliberately disturb bats, dormice or great crested newts in such a way as to be likely to significantly affect: (i) the ability of any significant group to survive, breed or rear or nurture their young; or (ii) the local distribution or abundance of these species<sup>1</sup>;
- Intentionally or recklessly disturb any bat, dormice, or great crested newt whilst it is occupying a roost, nest, waterbody, or terrestrial habitat<sup>1</sup>;
- Damage or destroy their roost, nest, habitats; and
- Intentionally or recklessly obstruct access to their roost, nest, and habitats.

This legal protection means that where activities have the potential to impact on bats, dormice and great crested newts, the results of targeted surveys and an appropriate mitigation strategy must be submitted to Natural England.

In addition, species of birds, bats, dormice, and great crested newts are UK Biodiversity Action Plan (BAP) species. BAPs set out policy for protecting and restoring priority species and habitats as part of the UK's response as signatories to the Convention on Biological Diversity. BAPs operate at both a national and local level with priority species and habitats identified at a national level and a series of Local BAPs that identify ecological features of particular importance to a particular area of the country. The requirement to consider and contribute towards BAP targets was strengthened through the Countryside and Rights of Way Act 2000 and policy in the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF).

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>1</sup> The Conservation of Habitats and Species Regulations 2017 consolidates the numerous amendments that were made to the Conservation (Natural Habitats, &c.) Regulations 1994. Of particular relevance are amendments made in August 2007 and January 2009 which an increased the threshold of illegal levels of disturbance to European Protected Species (EPS). An offence is only committed if the deliberate disturbance would result in significant impacts to the EPS population. However, it should be noted that activities that cause low levels of disturbance to these species continue to constitute an offence under Section 9 of the Wildlife and Countryside Act

The NPPF sets out the Government's vision for biodiversity in England with the broad aim that planning, construction, development and regeneration should maintain and enhance, restore or add to biodiversity and geological conservation interests. NPPF includes sections on legally protected species and sites in section 15(2).

Section 2 of the report provides details of the methodologies adopted and section 3 provides an account of the survey results. Section 4 provides information on the relevance of the results to the proposed development and presents appropriate measures of best practice.

### 2.0 METHODOLOGY

### **2.1** Bats

### 2.1.1 Activity transects

A suite of bat activity surveys were undertaken in accordance with guidelines established by the Bat Conservation Trust (BCT) in their publication *Good Practice Guidelines* (Collins, 2016).

In general, bats are most active in the months March to September with the optimal months for undertaking transects being June to August. Activity transects were undertaken on the 26<sup>th</sup> April, 22<sup>nd</sup> May, 26<sup>th</sup> June, 17<sup>th</sup> July, 18<sup>th</sup> July, 21<sup>st</sup> August, 24<sup>th</sup> September and 10<sup>th</sup> October 2018. The dusk transect surveys began at or just before sunset and continued for approximately two hours afterwards in order to detect bats commuting from roost sites to foraging sites. The dawn surveys commenced two hours before sunrise and continued until sunrise.

Bat transect surveys involve walking pre-defined routes which incorporate key areas that are likely to be important for foraging and/or commuting bats. Such areas include scrub and grassland and linear features such as hedgerows and woodland / scrub edge. In this case the transect routes were walked by four pairs of surveyors. The routes were walked up to twice during any one survey at a steady speed and incorporated a number of listening station stops interspersed along the route. The surveyors paused at each listening stop for durations of three to five minutes. The transect routes for each survey are provided on the map in appendix II.

Bat activity was recorded by each pair of surveyors using a combination of EM3, Echometer touch and a heterodyne (Magenta MKII) bat detector. Visual observations were also used to record flight patterns and feeding behaviour. Notes on times, species and behaviour were also recorded to aid identification to species level. The recordings, which were analysed with Kaleidoscope software, were used to confirm where possible the species of bat observed during the survey.

#### **Limitations and constraints**

The site is an active cattle farm and the transect routes were altered depending on the location of young bullocks and the bull. The majority of the site was still covered during each activity survey and a good understanding of bat activity was still obtained.

#### 2.1.2 Static monitoring

Static monitoring devices were left on site monthly for a minimum period of five nights between April and October 2018 following the guidelines by the BCT (Collins, 2016). The recording devices consisted of SM2, SM4 and Anabat expresses. The recording devices were set up at the same strategically selected locations around the site on each occasion. Two static detectors were placed on each transect route. The location of the statics are shown in table 1 and shown in appendix II. All analysis of the static recording devices was conducted using Kaleidoscope pro software.

#### Limitations

On some occasions, the static monitor did not record for the necessary five nights per session, this was generally due to battery failure or failure of the static monitor. On a few occasions, the static monitors recorded more than five nights data. Table 2 below identifies the number of nights that recorded bat activity for each monitor per month.

In October one of the statics was stolen from the site and it was not possible to recover the data. There were a low number of technical faults which caused the statics to either not record for the full survey period or not at all. The majority of the statics recorded for the required amount of time. Recordings from these transects were considered sufficient to gauge local bat activity levels.

Long-eared (*Plecotus sp.*) bat species have very quiet calls and are likely underestimated through static monitoring with not all calls recorded. The Myotis species are difficult to separate to species level with static analysis alone and therefore these have been analysed to genus only.

### 2.1.3 Assessment of foraging and commuting habitat importance

A methodology for the ecological impact assessment of bats has been developed by Wray et al (2010). This uses a number of factors such as the species and number of bats involved, presence of roosts nearby and characteristics for foraging and commuting habitat to produce a score indicating level of importance. This scoring system has been applied to the foraging area and commuting routes for the site to assess their level of importance.

The value of the habitat can be assessed for each of the bat species recorded during the survey, but the highest score (normally obtained for the rarest species) is used when defining the value of the habitat. The scores relate to the following levels of importance:

- 0 10 = not valuable
- 11 20 = locally important
- 21 30 = important at county level
- 31 40 = important at regional level
- 41 50 = nationally important
- >50 = internationally important.

# 2.2 Breeding Birds

The standard Common Bird Census methodology as developed by Marchant (1983) for the British Trust for Ornithology (BTO) was adopted. A set route was followed on five occasions during May and June 2018. Visits to the site were made by experienced ornithologists Louisa Jones, Andrew Joyce and Alex Coggins on the 1<sup>st</sup> May, 16<sup>th</sup> May, 25<sup>th</sup> May, 14<sup>th</sup> June and 21<sup>st</sup> June 2018. Any birds encountered were identified either visually or from their vocalisations. Birds were noted with standard BTO codes and behaviour was mapped. Following the surveys territory mapping was conducted following the methodology set out in Bibby *et al.* (1992). Territories were determined using the criteria set out in table 3 below.

The breeding bird assemblage on the site was assessed using the criteria set out by Fuller (1980). The adapted scale outlined in the IEEM guidelines (2006) was used which reflects the decline in arable species since Fullers guidelines were originally published.

- Up to 24 breeding species = Local Importance
- 25 49 breeding species = District Importance
- 50 69 breeding species = County Importance
- 70 84 breeding species = Regional Importance
- 85+ breeding species = National Importance

### 2.3 Dormice

The habitat on the site was assessed for the potential to support dormice, which are found in habitats such as woodlands, scrub and hedgerows with good connectivity and suitable food plants. Satellite images were used to assess the connectivity of any suitable habitat present on the site to other areas of woodland and hedgerow networks.

A total of 275 tubes were installed in April 2018. The nest tubes were spaced at intervals of approximately 10-20 metres and positioned on trees or shrubs between 1 to 2 metres from the ground. Nest tubes were suspended by wire underneath horizontal branches or wedged into crevices between branches/ branches and the tree trunk so that the entrance to the tubes pointed slightly downwards (and therefore water would drain away from the nest chamber area).

The nest tubes were inspected on a monthly basis between May and September 2018. Each nest tube was inspected for characteristic signs of dormice, including the following:

- Presence of dormice themselves
- Presence of dormouse nests. Typically, these are grapefruit-sized and woven from strips of honeysuckle bark or similar material with whole fresh green leaves incorporated into the outer layers. The nests are spherical and lack an obvious entrance hole.
- Presence of droppings. Typically, these are larger and more crinkly compared to droppings of other small rodents. However, identification of faecal pellets is not fully reliable and should not be used to confirm presence of absence of dormice.
- Presence of characteristically gnawed nuts or other hard fruit. Dormice leave a smooth round hole with few tooth marks on the surface.

Any nests or dormice found within the tubes were recorded. Where possible dormice encountered were sexed and age, activity and breeding condition were recorded.

### **Limitations**

During the 2018 dormouse surveys general farm management was carried out and livestock were allowed to roam free on site. Several tubes were destroyed, either by being flailed or were chewed by cows. However due to the low number of tubes destroyed, it is unlikely that this affected the survey results in any way.

### 2.4 Great crested newts

Suitable breeding ponds are essential to support populations of great crested newt although they actually only spend a relatively short period of the year in the ponds during the spring for breeding. The remainder of the year is spent in suitable 'foraging' habitat such as tall grassland and woodland. During the winter great crested newts hibernate, often amongst the roots of trees and scrub or in places such as piles of rubble, amongst foundations of buildings or under fallen trees and logs.

Great crested newts are known to forage up to at least 500 metres from their breeding sites and suitable habitats that fall within 500 metres must be considered even in situations where the breeding site itself will not be affected. Suitable breeding habitat, and the presence of suitable terrestrial habitat within the development site were assessed during this survey.

### 2.4.1 Habitat Suitability Index

A Habitat Suitability Index (HSI) assessment was carried out to determine the suitability of the ponds within 500 metres of the site to support great crested newts. The assessment uses criteria and values as provided by Oldham et al. (2000, 2008). HSI cannot be used to predict the presence of great crested newts.

#### 2.4.2 eDNA

A technique for surveying great crested newts known as environmental DNA testing (eDNA) was undertaken on the 6<sup>th</sup> June 2018 by Pete Duffy (Natural England Class Licence number: 2016-22153-CLS-CLS), Alex Hannam (Natural England Class Licence number: 2018-33236-CLS-CLS) and Matt Tennent and on the 26<sup>th</sup> June 2018 by Louisa Jones (Natural England Class Licence number:2015-19216-CLS-CLS) and Elen Lesourd. This involved taking water samples from ponds for DNA analysis which can confirm presence or absence of great crested newt. Water samples were sent to SureScreen Scientific for analysis.

# 2.4.3 Presence/absence survey

Great crested newt surveys were conducted in accordance with the Great Crested Newt Mitigation Guidelines (English Nature 2001) on ponds where presence was established which recommends that a minimum of three survey techniques are employed, ideally bottle trapping, torch survey and egg search. A description of the survey techniques adopted is provided below:

- Bottle trapping: Bottle traps were set approximately one metre apart around the margins
  of the pond in the early evening and were collected the following morning. The contents
  of the traps were recorded.
- Torch counts: The water bodies were visited approximately one hour after dark and a torch shone into the water. All species of fauna observed were recorded.
- Egg search: Newts lay their eggs in marginal or pond-side vegetation. Where present such vegetation was thoroughly searched. Once great crested newt eggs are found searching will cease.

Presence/absence surveys were carried out on site on the 3<sup>rd</sup> April, 8<sup>th</sup> May, 9<sup>th</sup> May, 23<sup>rd</sup> May, 5<sup>th</sup> June and 6<sup>th</sup> June 2018 by licenced ecologists: Jenny Sutch (Natural England Class Licence number: 2015-19218-CLS-CLS), Louisa Jones (Natural England Class Licence number: 2015-

19216-CLS-CLS), Katie Ford (Natural England Class Licence number: 2015-13027-CLS-CLS), Pete Duffy (Natural England Class Licence number: 2016-22153-CLS-CLS) and Alex Hannam (Natural England Class Licence number: 2018-33236-CLS-CLS). Licenced ecologists were assisted by Matt Tennent, Chris Jackson, Stuart Woodley and Joe Marcroft.

### 3.0 RESULTS

#### 3.1 Bats

#### Foraging habitat

The site predominantly comprises arable and pasture fields, with areas of broad-leaved woodland, scrub, hedges and a small stream running along the northern boundary of the site. The area is considered to be of at least moderate quality, according to the BCT Guidelines (Collins *et al.*, 2016).

### 3.1.1 Activity Surveys

A series of monthly bat transect surveys were started in April 2018 alongside static monitoring. The survey results for all transects undertaken and a map of the transect route has been provided in appendices II and III whilst a summary has been provided below in table 5.

The majority of activity was of common pipistrelle (*Pipistrellus pipistrellus*) and soprano pipistrelle (*Pipistrellus pygmaeus*) with low numbers of passes of serotine (*Eptesicus serotinus*), *Myotis species*, long-eared, barbastelle (*Barbastella barbastellus*) and noctule (*Nyctalus noctula*) bats. The bats were recorded mainly along the northern edge along the stream corridor and also along mature hedge lines.

The barbastelle was only recorded on a single occasion commuting along a hedge line which is not typical habitat for this species. This species is wide ranging and was therefore likely a single individual travelling between sites rather than using the site itself for foraging. The site is not considered important for this species or linked to an important roost in the area.

# 3.1.2 Static monitoring

A total of seven species of bat were recorded during the static monitoring survey including Leisler's (*Nyctalus leisleri*), common pipistrelle, soprano pipistrelle, noctule, serotine, longeared and Myotis sp. The full results of the static monitoring are presented in tables 6-13 below.

The majority of the activity recorded was from common and soprano pipistrelle which were recorded at every static monitor location on every month.

Noctule were also recorded across the site on a regular basis with calls detected on the majority of months and across the site. The peak average pass for this species was at static monitor 6 in September with an average pass of 155 calls.

Leisler's are considered to be a "rarer" bat with a population between 10,000 and 100,000 nationally. These bats were recorded at low activity levels through the western half of the site with activity predominantly in the summer and autumn months. The peak average count was recorded at static monitor 3 in September with an average of 28.17.

All other bats were recorded with low levels of activity throughout the site.

# 3.1.3 Value of the habitat for foraging and commuting bats

The value of the habitat for foraging and commuting bats was assessed. The scores in table 14 and 15 assume small numbers of Leisler's bats as found by the static monitoring survey.

Using the scoring system above, the foraging and commuting routes across the site are considered to be of county importance for bats. This is largely due to the size and complexity of the habitats on site and the presence of small numbers of the rarer Leisler's bat species.

Further recommendations have been made in section 4.1.

# 3.2 Breeding birds

The results of the breeding bird surveys are provided below in table 16 with territories shown in appendix IV. Fifty-nine species were recorded on site, eleven of which are listed as red list species, and thirteen of which are listed as UKBAP priority species. Twenty-four species were confirmed as breeding on site with an additional five as probable breeding. The areas with the highest density of breeding birds were predominantly around the residential buildings and the small area of woodland along the south eastern boundary. The hedgerows along the northern boundary were also more frequently used. The boundary along the southern boundary adjacent to the A40 was sparse in bird activity, presumably due to the presence of the busy A road.

A total of five confirmed skylark (*Alauda arvensis*) territories and two probable territories are located within the site boundary. This species was breeding within the areas of rough grassland and open arable fields on the site. This species is closely associated with arable landscapes and is a red list bird of conservation concern and a UKBAP.

Another arable species breeding on the site was the yellowhammer (*Emberiza citronella*) with two confirmed territories and six probable territories. This species nests at the bases of hedgerows and the majority of territories were located in the central area of the site. This species is also a red list bird of conservation concern and a UKBAP.

Other arable species recorded on the site include linnet (*Carduelis cannabina*) and grey partridge (*Perdix perdix*), however these species are not considered to be breeding on the site. The site likely provides foraging habitat for these species.

The other notable species recorded on site, dunnock (*Prunella modularis*), house sparrow (*Passer domesticus*), song thrush (*Turdus philomelos*) and bullfinch (*Pyrrhula pyrrhula*), are relatively common and widespread and are also associated with residential landscapes as well as arable. These species were associated with the hedgerow networks and small areas of woodland and are widespread across the site.

A total of twenty-four species were confirmed as breeding on the site. The site is therefore considered to be of local importance for birds in the area.

Further recommendations have been made in section 4.2.

#### 3.3 Dormice

The hedgerows and woodland patches across the site provide suitable foraging opportunities for dormice with the presence of hazel (*Corylus avellana*), a favoured food source. The hedgerows are maintained and form a network across working dairy farms. The hedgerows connect into surrounding areas of woodland and therefore dormice may be present within the site.

The full results of the dormice survey have been provided below in table 17. The locations of the tubes are shown in appendix V. To summarise, no dormice or evidence of dormice has been

recorded on site. Wood mice (*Apodemus sylvaticus*) nests were present within a number of the tubes.

No evidence of dormice was recorded on site and this species is considered absent. No further action is required.

### 3.4 Great crested newt

A total of twenty-one ponds were identified during the initial walkover survey, with a further twelve ponds identified within 500 metres of the site. The locations of these ponds are indicated on the plan provided as appendix VI.

# 3.4.1 Habitat suitability index (HSI)

HSI assessment was conducted on the twenty-one waterbodies, and the twelve additional ponds within 500 metres where access was available. The results of the HSI are provided in table 18 below.

Ponds 6, 7, 8, 9, 24 and 25 are considered to be confirmed for great crested newts due to the presence of eggs recorded during the HSI survey. Pond 5 is considered to have excellent suitability to support great crested newts. Ponds 1, 3, 14, 16, 17, 23, 26 and 29 are considered to have good suitability to support great crested newts. Ponds 2, 15, 18, 19, 27 and 33 are considered to hold average suitability to support great crested newts. Ponds 4, 10, 22 and 32 are considered to hold below average suitability to support great crested newts. Ponds 12, 21, 28 and 31 are considered to hold poor suitability to support great crested newts.

#### 3.4.2 eDNA

The eDNA surveys were undertaken on ponds 12, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 29, 32, and 33. Although pond 32 was considered to hold below average suitability to support great crested newts, due to the claims of great crested newt presence by the home owners an eDNA survey

was considered prudent. The eDNA results from all the ponds surveyed came back as negative and therefore great crested newts are not considered to be present in these waterbodies.

### 3.4.3 Aquatic Surveys

Full aquatic surveys were conducted on ponds 1 to 9 and 22 to 27 due to the proximity of the ponds and the presence of great crested newt eggs within some of the ponds. These ponds are all located in the south west corner of the site within a field which appears to be used intermittently as a trackway. The results of these surveys can be seen in appendix VII and summarised in table 19 below. However, to summarise the area holds a medium metapopulation of great crested newts with a maximum total count of 34 great crested newts recorded on 8<sup>th</sup> May 2018. The area also supports a medium metapopulation of smooth newts and a low population of palmate newts.

A medium population of great crested newts has been confirmed within the track area in the south western corner of the site. Therefore, a licence from Natural England will be required before any works can be undertaken that may impact upon this population of great crested newts. This area would incorporate the ponds themselves and an area of 500 metres around the ponds. Further recommendations have been made in section 4.3.

### 4.0 CONCLUSIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

The site at Eynsham is considered to hold moderate ecological value from the initial protected species survey work. The site has a confirmed medium population of great crested newts with populations of local importance for breeding birds and county importance for bats. Recommendations for further survey work and recommendations for mitigation have been provided below. Mitigation measures have been provided based on the absence of plans and detailed strategies will be required once full plans are available.

#### 4.1 Bats

### 4.1.1 Summary of findings

During the activity surveys and static monitoring, a total of eight species of bat were recorded on the site. Species included common and soprano pipistrelle, noctule, Leisler's, serotine, long-eared sp, Myotis sp and barbastelle. The annex II species barbastelle was recorded on a single activity survey and the site is not considered to be regularly used with none detected during the static monitoring.

The site was assessed as being of county importance for the local bat populations with the key areas in the site being the area along the northern stream corridor and areas of mature hedgerows. These surveys only covered the activity levels on the site and none of the buildings or trees were assessed for any potential roost locations on the site.

Recommendations have been provided below to incorporate into any masterplan for the site. Further survey work will be required for any buildings or trees which may be impacted by the proposed development to identify if any roosts are present on site.

### 4.1.1 Recommendations for further mitigation and surveys

### Foraging and commuting

Development of the site could have a significant negative effect on bats using the area in terms of loss of foraging habitat, reduced landscape connectivity and disturbance from light pollution.

The magnitude and significance of any impact would depend on the nature and extent of the development proposals. Site and landscape design should seek to minimise impacts and provide mitigation where impacts are unavoidable. Some general principles for impact avoidance and mitigation are outlined below.

The development footprint should seek to minimise the amount of good quality habitat lost, particularly the connecting species rich hedgerows.

A suitably large area with connectivity to retained good-quality habitats should be set aside for habitat enhancement to offset any loss of hedgerows and lower quality foraging habitat. Habitat enhancement measures could include:

• Reversion of arable land to species rich grassland.

- Gapping up and strengthening existing hedgerows.
- Planting additional hedgerows and new areas of woodland and scrub.
- Provision of additional habitat features such as ponds (as well as providing a good source of invertebrate prey, ponds can also form part of Sustainable Urban Drainage design (SUDS)).

Site design should ensure that connectivity across and around the site is maintained so that foraging or commuting bats are able to cross the site. 'Dark corridors' of woodland or scrub planting where no lighting is permitted would provide suitable foraging and commuting routes for bats. Connectivity to retained woodland habitat should be maintained and where possible enhanced through planting additional hedgerows.

Land around the development should be screened from light pollution by a mixture of landscape planting (e.g. tree belts or dense hedgerow planting) or other screening options such as bunds and fencing. Landscape planting such as tree belts would also provide additional foraging habitat for bats.

Light pollution should also be minimised by the use of modern lighting schemes and restrictions on private security lighting on properties adjacent to hedgerows or other bat foraging / commuting habitat (e.g. through planning measures such as covenants or similar enforceable restrictions).

Lighting of residential roads should only be installed where it is explicitly needed for road or pedestrian safety or security reasons, such as at road junctions or pedestrian crossings. Lighting should comprise low UV lighting fitted with baffles and short column heights to reduce light overspill when in use. Timers or sensors could also be used to reduce the amount of time the lights are in use during quiet periods.

Further enhancement opportunities for bats could include installation of bat boxes to suitable mature retained trees and installation of bat tubes and bat boxes in new housing.

#### **Trees**

The mature trees across the site should be retained as these may contain bat roosts. If areas of potential development incorporate trees which will require felling the following will be required:

- **Ground inspection:** Features such as old woodpecker holes, splits, cavities and rot holes, loose or flaking bark and ivy creepers will be exploited by bats to roost. Any trees present on site are assessed for their potential to support roosting bats by searching for such features. The presence of roosting bats can be spotted through signs such as accumulations of moth or butterfly wings, staining, bat droppings, or bats themselves
- **Tree climbing surveys:** This survey will involve a licensed bat worker and tree climber to undertake a more thorough inspection of any trees with bat potential using an endoscope to identify any evidence of bats, if present.

• Phase 2 emergence/re-entry surveys: Any trees identified as holding evidence of bats or unsafe for climbing will require dusk and/or dawn surveys to identify the type of bat roost, numbers and species. The number of visits varies depending on the potential of the tree (Confirmed roosts and high potential trees require three dusk/dawn surveys, moderate potential trees require two dusk/dawn surveys). Where bat roosts are confirmed a European Protected Species (EPS) licence will be required, along with mitigation which will include replacement roosting opportunities and a clerk of works for felling.

#### **Buildings**

If any of the buildings across the site are impacted by the development further surveys will be required to establish if roosts are present. An initial phase 1 survey should be conducted looking for evidence of any bats on the interior and exterior of the building and assessing the potential to support roosting bats. If buildings have evidence or potential for bats then further emergence and re-entry surveys will be required with the peak season falling between May and August.

# 4.2 Breeding Birds

# 4.2.1 Summary of findings

Fifty-nine species were recorded on site, eleven of which are listed as red list species, and thirteen of which are listed as UKBAP priority species. Twenty-four species were confirmed as breeding on site with additional five as probable breeding. The areas with the highest density of breeding birds were predominantly around the residential buildings and the small area of woodland along the south eastern boundary. The hedgerows along the northern boundary were also more frequently used.

# 4.2.1 Recommendations for further mitigation

Features which have been identified as important habitat features for birds will likely be lost to the proposals. The proposed development will not only result in a direct impact to these birds' habitat from land-take but indirect effects on the breeding success of these species are also likely from increased disturbance. The following will be implemented:

- Initial ground clearance, tree or scrub removal and site preparation works will take
  place strictly outside of the bird nesting season which is considered to run between 1<sup>st</sup>
  March and 31st August.
- Woodland on the site should be retained as far as possible and managed to ensure the areas maintain an understorey to support breeding woodland species that preferentially breed in scrub.
- Rotational hedge management will provide dense cover for nesting and abundant fruit production for foraging, with the cutting of hedges in January and February, after most of the berries have been eaten by birds. This will maintain the hedgerow habitat favoured by the breeding birds present on site including the yellowhammer.
- If possible, long sward grass buffer strips should be created along the length of the hedgerows to encourage important species such as butterflies and invertebrates, which

- provide food for birds that may be nesting within the hedgerows including house sparrow and song thrush.
- A series of bird boxes should be erected within any new SANG areas. Suitable designs include 1B, 2M and 1S Schwegler bird boxes.
- Integral bird boxes should be incorporated in the housing within the new development.
   This will provide additional nesting habitat for species such as house sparrow and starlings.
- Arable areas should incorporate skylark plots or wildflower meadows should be sown within public open spaces which can also be used by breeding skylark. Where possible these should be spread across the site to allow the current spread of skylark territories to persist. No ground clearance during breeding season should take place.

### 4.3 Great crested newts

### 4.3.1 Summary of findings

A medium metapopulation of great crested newts is present within the trackway area of the site. Should plans impact upon this area and the surrounding 500 metres, a licence from Natural England will be required prior to any works taking place on site. Mitigation and enhancement will depend on site plans; however, it is likely that an exclusion/translocation exercise will be required.

### 4.3.2 Recommendations for further mitigation

The design of the masterplan should avoid impacts to great crested newts where possible by retaining the ponds within the south west corner and habitats within 500 metres of these breeding ponds. The area around these ponds should incorporate the area of public open space for the masterplan to minimise the impacts to this area and retain the ponds within the scheme design. Where it is not possible to avoid impacts the following mitigation will be required and a licence from Natural England will need to be obtained. The general mitigation strategy below is based on ponds being retained within the final design, additional mitigation measures will be required if the ponds are to be directly impacted.

#### Exclusion / translocation exercise

An exclusion exercise will be adopted with the use of specialist drift fencing, whereby specialist drift fencing will be erected to form a barrier between the retained great crested newt habitat and the main construction site. The fence will be left in place throughout the construction period. The construction area will be trapped and cleared of newts (see below), and translocated to the newly created habitat features. Once the translocation is finished, the fencing will be removed to allow newts to recolonise.

Pitfall traps will be placed within the area from which the great crested newts are to be excluded (i.e. the construction site). Pitfall traps will comprise plastic buckets installed flush with the barrier fence with their tops just below ground level, with a minimum of 80 traps per hectare. Pitfall traps will be spaced every five metres along the fence and will be interspersed with rubber-backed carpet tiles (measuring fifty centimetres by fifty centimetres) in order to increase the capture rate.

Pitfall trapping will be a continuous process with the traps left open overnight unless the weather is unsuitable and will be undertaken during the period March to October. The pitfall traps will be visited by a licensed newt ecologist daily before 11:00 during suitable weather conditions and any amphibians encountered will be caught and placed within the receptor site. Visits to the exclusion area need to be repeated until it can be demonstrated that no further individuals can be caught. A minimum of sixty trapping visits will be required and if great crested newts are still being caught following this period, visits must be continued until there are five trapping visits where no great crested newts are caught before works can begin.

#### **Ecological Watching Brief**

Once the translocation exercise is complete an ecological watching brief will be maintained during any site clearance. A licensed great crested newt handler will work alongside a mechanical digger, stripping any tree roots, log and rubble piles, burrows and other habitat favoured by the great crested newts, searching each bucket for any individuals and safely relocating any animals encountered.

#### Receptor site and ecological enhancements

Any newts encountered will be relocated to a wildlife dedicated area within the site boundary. This area will be enhanced for great crested newt prior to the translocation exercise commencing and will include at least two hibernacula, seeding with an Emorsgate grassland seed mix and native scrub mosaic and the construction of additional suitable breeding ponds.

A review of newt numbers will be undertaken during the translocation process by the licensed ecologist, should it be deemed necessary to enhanced the habitat used as a receptor site.

#### Pond creation

In the event that any ponds are lost as part of the development these will require replacement ponds ideally at a 1:2 ratio. The replacement ponds will need to have good connectivity to surrounding habitat and have the following dynamics –

- Surface area between 100-300 m<sup>2</sup>
- Ponds can be shallow or up to 4metres deep, with at least one side shallow sloping.
- Substantial cover of submerged and marginal vegetation and can be seeded with an EP1 seed mix.
- Good populations of invertebrates and an absence of fish and waterfowl.

These ponds will need to be constructed in advance of the translocation so they are established once the translocation begins. The ponds will need to be constructed at least 6 months prior to the start of the translocation to allow the establishment of plant species and invertebrate populations required to support great crested newt breeding. SuDs could potentially be designed to provide newt breeding habitat within the development area.

# 4.4 Ecological enhancement

A few suggestions for ecological enhancements across the site have been made:

- Provision of bat boxes and nest boxes for bird species such as swift (*Apus apus*), house martin (*Delichon urbica*) and house sparrow (*Passer domesticus*) on trees. Bird boxes can be purchased from websites such as Jacobi Jayne <a href="www.jacobijayne.co.uk">www.jacobijayne.co.uk</a>, and their provision on site would enhance the habitat for the local bird population.
- Use of native shrubs and trees for landscaping schemes provides foraging habitat for a range of bird species. Suitable species include hazel, ash (*Fraxinus excelsior*), dog-rose (*Rosa canina*), elder (*Sambucus nigra*), blackthorn (*Prunus spinosa*), hawthorn and field maple (*Acer campestre*).
- Flowering grassland seed mixes from a supplier of seeds of local provenance can be used to seed the new lawn within the design of the development (such as Emorsgate EL1). Such grassland provides better nectar sources for invertebrates and hence is of greater value for foraging birds, reptiles and amphibians.
- Provision of hedgehog houses will provide potential hibernation sites for hedgehogs.
  Hedgehog houses can be bought from <a href="http://www.wildcareshop.com">http://www.wildcareshop.com</a>. Small holes will be left in any fences separating the gardens of the development to allow hedgehogs to move freely throughout the site.
- The inclusion of wildlife ponds within the design of any proposals would enhance the area for local amphibians and invertebrate populations. The pond should be kept free of fish and planted with native British plant species such as water-plantain (*Alisma plantago-aquatica*), reed sweet-grass (*Glyceria maxima*) and yellow flag (*Iris pseudacorus*).

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
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
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# **APPENDIX I: Location map**






# **APPENDIX IV: Notable breeding bird territory map**
