This week we welcome Sarah, the new resource centre supervisor, who introduces herself formally inside.





The Nature of Coming Out

No concept is so crucial to the understanding of the lesbian and gay population than the coming out process. This process is unique to lesbians and gays; there is no counterpart experience in the heterosexual world, and many health problems can be linked to this The individual stages of coming out have varying lengths and are experienced to different degrees by each individual.

For example, some persons never get out of stage two or will take 25 years going from stage 1 to 3 while others will go through the entire process in a year.

Coming out is defined here as the process by which a gay or lesbian individual identifies themselves as gay or lesbian, changes any previously held negative notions of gays, lesbians, or homosexuality, accepts being gay or lesbian as a positive state of being, and acts on the assumption that being gay or lesbian is a positive state of being (*1).

Stage 1: Identification

Most gays and lesbians do not recognise their identity until the teenage years. By age 19, 84% of gay men know their sexual orientation. Upon recognising this, they often experience overwhelming feelings of being completely alone in their situations and isolated from everyone who cares for them.

Many gays and lesbians report hating their sexual orientation at this stage. They experience deep and intense guilt, diminished selfesteem, stress, loneliness, inability to focus on school or work, and depression. Suicidal ideation, occurring in 40% of the gay population is often seen here (*2).

Stage 2: Cognitive Changes

The criterion for stage 2 is changing one's negative notions about homosexuality. This stage does not entail fully accepting being gay or lesbian as a positive state of being. Most often, gays and lesbians pass as being straight. This is done out of fear - fear of rejection, violence,

The stress of a 24 hour-a-day job of acting straight can lead to a multitude of physical and health problems associated with stress. As one begins to shed negative notions about gays and lesbians, it becomes difficult to 'act' straight. To continue to act straight becomes an assault on one's integrity, self-esteem and one's sensibilities.

Stage 2 lesbians and gays begin giving clues to their identities, such as objecting to lesbian gay jokes, or refusing to make up fictitious accounts of dates with the opposite sex.

Stage 3: Acceptance

Here, persons see their sexual orientations as good news rather than bad. As a result, they can move towards self-actualisation, as selfesteem is raised to new heights and one is now longer struggling with one's true feelings.

Stage 4: Action

Action that includes coming out to friends and family, becoming involved with the gay community. Even though the possibility of rejection can lead to setbacks in the progress of the individual, it can mean personal growth and have a positive effect on one's health.



'U2' were playing there. So was 'The Artist Formerly known as Prince'. And 'Tina Turner'. Not to mention the 'Cubs' (who?!!). But the biggest event to happen in Chicago on the last weekend of June was the 28th Gay & Lesbian Pride Parade. It is the second biggest of the annual parades, the biggest being the St. Patrick's Day Parade. No wonder I feel at home in Chicago - gay and Irish.

Surprisingly, ILGO were not represented, despite their annual March 17th battles with the New York AOH. However, practically every other aspect of life in Chicago was: Chicago Transport Authority issued the invitation to "Come Ride with Us"; there was the Lesbian & Gay Police Association, LesBiGay Radio, and the Human Rights Commission. There were the health care organisations and local community groups. And of course, there were the commercial bodies (dominated by bars, clubs, and health studios!). The parade took 21/2 hours to pass a given point. Police estimated the attendance at 200,000, which included many straight people appreciating the spirit of fun, joy and celebration permeating Chicago's "most colourful, wacky and tacky" annual parade.

There was a surprising number of religious groups represented, e.g. AGLO-Catholic, Gay & Proud and the Metropolitan Community Church. A great reception was accorded PFLAG Parents, Families and Friends of Lesbians and Gays. And it was heartening to see groups like the Military Veterans and GLSTN the Gay, Lesbian and Straight Teachers Network.

Like most big cities, Chicago has its special areas, e.g. Greektown, Little Italy, Chinatown. And it also has its Boys' Town - the gay area located around the Halsted St. and Belmont Ave. areas. It is a wonderful place to be. Being gay, in or out, is not an issue. This is the place to get on with it, in whatever way you wish. There are numerous bars and clubs, but real life is also catered for in a totally gay-positive manner. There is the 'Magic Closet Cleaners', the wonderful 'People Like Us' bookshop, the fabulous Anne Sather Restaurant - and there is always the possibility of meeting Chris O'Donnell, who lives here. (I wonder....?!).

And then there is the weekly 'Windy City Times' (almost as good as GCN). But there is no 'Other Place'. And in Boys' Town, Chicago, Illinois, there is no need for it.
