Women's Place in the Co-Op.

- Women in the Co-Op have taken a seperate place for ourselves and other women to use and to develop our own identity. From the Co-ops point of view this development is seen as a definate and distinctive fact of the overall venture, giving practical expression to the theory of positive discrimination in favour of oppressed groupings.
- From the women's view, it presents us with a very definiate challenge to articulate and focus on women's perspectives at all levels and as they relate to all aspects of the Score and the link up with other groupings struggling for social change.
 - Accordingly influences should permeate all the operations of the Co-op.
 - The women's right to nominate the female administrator should also be seen in this light.
 - While the women's place is in this structural relationship with the Co-op, individual women or groups of women in the W. Place will wish to pursue their feminist perspectives in a way which does not include specific involvement in other facets of the Co-ops the Co-ops view, participarion/involvement in the Women's Place is taken as participation in the overall Co-op.

Some Agreed Directives for the operation of the Women's Place. 1-5

- There is an uneven distribution of resources, as between people, groupings, and classes in Cork. Accordingly the needs of the applicants (to use the space) should be considered and the building reserved for those who are in most need of it.
- The work/activities/projects should be consonant with the current activities of the Women's Place and the people using it. No activity should be encouraged within the place which would conflict with another already going on.
- Where women intend to make money for themselves throughusing the Women's Place, their fees/prices should not be such AS

 TO EXCLUDE VNEMPLOYED WOMEN.

4 Finances

- (a) In the case of 'outside' autonomous groups using 'The Women's Place'; wage earners pay 50p per person per night and non wage earners 25p.
- (b) Where funds are raised by the Womes's Place, 40% of the weekly neems to the overall Co-op, and -60% towards developing the Women's Place.
- (c) A kettle & Coffee & Cups etc will be available for use in the Women's Place, for payments equivalent to those operating in the cafe.
- (d) The decoration of 2nd back room in Women's Place is seen as the responsibility of the overall Co-op.
- 5 A Co-ordinator has been agreed by the Women, for a given period.
 -) to liase between individuals and co-ordinators of groups, using space.
 - N To liase between Women's Place and the committee structure
 - (a) decisions taken/intended that have a bearing on the whole Co-op.
 - (b) on forthcoming events.

It is understood by the Co-Op and the Women's Place, that the co-ordinator is a member of the overall Co-op.

THE FOLLOWING ITEMS WEED TO BE ABREED ON

- 6 One of the Aims of the Wom's Place is to encourage different approaches, relationships and structures which challenge existing power arrangements.
 - (1) Accordingly all women using the place are invited to share responsibily for its running, thus beginning the process of gaining more control over our own lives.
 - Likewise applicants wishing to use the space for projects, should work in such a way as to promote the transfer and development of skills and greater self awareness among the participants.

Bearing in mind Women's exploited role in the world of work, and the high rates of unemployment, projects with a job 'creation element' for unemployed women will be given priority, in the allocation of space.

Internal Structure, in Women's Place.

Bearing in mind the action orientation of the Women's Place

(as well as of the hole Co-op) action groups assed on tasks,
will replace the usual committee structures, that can foster

cliques, elitism, and non participation.

Some of the tasks that currently need to be undertaken

by work groups include:

- Day to day administration;
- A plan of Action for future work/Programmes;
- Development of Resoures/Library ---

Regular meetings open to all women developing the place take place regularly; some, of a 'closed' administrative nature others of an open educational nature.
