The gay movement in Ireland has made considerable progress over the last decade, since the first initiatives were taken to improve the lifestyle of gay people. Major organisations are actively campaigning for legal reform, and in addition to providing counselling and social facitities for the gay community, in devising an educational programme they are hoping to correct the varied misconceptions about homosexuality and consequently to alleviate prejudice. To fulfill an accepted need for a general assessment of our progress to date and to consider new initiatives for the future, a group of individual gay activists, based in Cork, have joined together, and with the enthusiastic support of the various organisations, this conference is being mounted.

Issues

I. Since the central unresolved issue is still the question of legal discrimination, and in the light of the European Commissions decision denouncing these laws in Northern Ireland, the Conference will develope the following enquiry;

What is the attidude to law reform of

- A. the major political parties.
- B. individual politicians.
- C. the Catholic Church.
- D. Trade Union organisations and associations.

In the light of the recent High Court judgement we would hope to break through the current conspiracy of silence by ensuring that the law reform issue becomes a matter of political debate before the General Election.

Did you know that out of a population of three and a half million people, at least 5% according to conservative statistical evidence, are gay. This means that, numerically, I65,000 males and females need to be represented as the largest minority in this country.

- 2. Speaking to and for gay women, Nell McCafferty and Kathy O'Driscoll and representatives of the Lesbian Movement will facilitate a series of workshops exploring and advancing situations for gay women in this country.
- 3. Ireland is a predominantly Christian country and many gay people find extreme difficulty reconciling Christian practice with the traditional Church teaching on Homosexuality. A delegate from the Gay Christian Movement will talk to the assembly and direct the Workshop.
- 4. Homosexuality and the Medical Profession. Did you know that until quite recently has been regarded as an illness, but that the American Medical Association has struck it from its register of illnesses. Did you know that, despite this decision, in some parts of Ireland psychiatrists are still administering aversion therapy? There will be a Workshop to discuss this issue of vital social concern.
- 5. Other Workshops will include discussions on;
 - A. The problems of "coming out" in a straight society.
 - B. The difficulties facing gay people at work and in securing housing
 - C. The maried gay, the gay experience and a re-evaluation of education systems.
