### Further information about how the practice is responding to the needs of their population

Extended access appointments were available to patients until 8pm, this was provided by Tyne Health who operate within the Primary Care Network.

Patients had a named GP who supported them in whatever setting they lived.

The practice was responsive to the needs of older patients and offered home visits and urgent appointments for those with enhanced needs and complex medical issues.

The practice liaised regularly with the community services to discuss and manage the needs of patients with complex medical issues.

All parents or guardians calling with concerns about a child were offered a same day appointment when necessary.

The practice held a register of patients living in vulnerable circumstances including homeless people, those with a learning disability and carers.

The practice adjusted the delivery of its services to meet the needs of patients with a learning disability.

The practice had introduced a 'one stop shop' approached to new mother and baby appointments which enabled women to access services at one appointment rather than attend numerous.

The Practice employ a range of professionals to improve patient experience this ensured patients were treated holistically.

The practice regularly sought patient feedback in relation to how patients felt these professionals and the services they offered had improved the practice.

The practice demonstrated having 'champions' who were trained in ensuring vulnerable groups were able to access services where required.

Explanation of any answers and additional evidence:

The practice demonstrated a flexible approach to how patients could book appointments, this included both online and face to face.

Practice staff had flexibility in booking appointments for patients where needed.

Staff were able to add alerts to patient records where it was deemed patients needed a longer appointment time.

The practice had implemented an improvement plan as a result of patient feedback and an audit carried out which looked at the way in which appointments were distributed. The Practice continuously looked at appointment type and where this benefited patient need. This was reviewed by management on a regular basis and schedules were amended where necessary to ensure long term condition reviews or other planned appointment needs were being met.

The practice used a 'traffic light' approach in relation to appointments we saw evidence that all admin staff had been trained on this and the outcomes of the system had produced positive results.
