Comments on systems in place:	

There was a protocol for dealing with safety alerts. Safety alerts were received by the practice manager and the GP prescribing lead. They were recorded on the computer system and information was cascaded to clinicians accordingly. Appropriate actions were taken by clinicians and fed back to the practice manager and prescribing lead. We saw evidence of four audits, and there was a clear system for recording the alerts, cascading the alerts, along with action plans and feedback. We saw clinical meeting minutes where alerts were discussed and progress reviewed. There was a specific agenda item on the clinical meetings for alerts.

Notes: CQC GP Insight

GP Insight assesses a practice's data against all the other practices in England. We assess relative performance for the majority of indicators using a z-score, a statistical tool which shows the deviation from the England average. It gives us a statistical measurement of a practice's performance in relation to the England average, and measures this in standard deviations. We calculate a z-score for each indicator, thereby highlighting the practices which significantly vary from the England average (in either a positive or negative direction). We consider that z-scores which are +2 or more or -2 or less are at significant levels, warranting further enquiry.

N.B. Not all indicators are part of the GP insight set and those that aren't will not have a variation band.
