#### dditional evidence or comments

The practice showed us unverified data for the year April 2017 to March 2018, which showed the percentage of women eligible for cervical cancer screening at a given point in time who were screened adequately within a specified period (within 3.5 years for women aged 25 to 49, and within 5.5 years for women aged 50 to 64) had increased to 82%. The practice told us they had had clinical discussions around this and were actively encouraging women to attend.

#### Any additional evidence or comments

The practice showed us unverified data for the year April 2017 to March 2018, which showed:

- The percentage of patients with schizophrenia, bipolar affective disorder and other psychoses who had a comprehensive, agreed care plan documented in the record, in the preceding 12 months was 92%.
- The percentage of patients with schizophrenia, bipolar affective disorder and other psychoses, whose alcohol consumption has been recorded in the preceding 12 months, was 91%.

The practice told us they had discussions in team meetings about the importance of discussing with patients their alcohol consumption.

For technical reasons, there was no comparative or exception reporting data available at the time of the inspection. The Quality Outcomes Framework (QOF) data relating to 2016/17 was prior to the practicing merging with two other local practices. The data therefore only relates to only one of the practices, previously known as Adcroft Surgery. On this inspection the practice was able to provide some unverified QOF data from the year April 2017 to March 2018. The data for this period includes approximately six months data for the single practice of Adcroft when they had approximately 14,000 patients and six months following the merger (and name change) when patient numbers increased to approximately 30,000. Note that the unverified data does not include exception reporting rates. (Exception reporting is the removal of patients from QOF calculations where, for example, the patients decline or do not respond to invitations to attend a review of their condition or when a medicine is not appropriate.)

#### Description of how the practice maintains adequate records in relation to persons employed and ensures that all staff receive the training the practice considers essential for their role.

The practice had a clear system for staff records which had been reviewed since our last inspection in February 2018. For example, each staff member had a file used to store paper records such as application forms and Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS) records. (DBS checks identify whether a person has a criminal record or is on an official list of people barred from working in roles where they may have contact with children or adults who may be vulnerable).

The practice had reviewed the training requirements for staff and had a clear set of mandatory training for all staff which included; fire safety, infection control and safeguarding. The practice had also considered what additional role-specific training should be mandatory. We saw evidence these issues had been discussed by the partners and in the nurses meetings. We saw a spreadsheet maintained by the practice which kept track of all the training requirements of staff and alerted management to training that needed to be completed, by way of an automatic flagging system. The spreadsheet should that all mandatory training had been completed, other than for new staff and those on sick leave. We saw evidence that a new member of staff in their first week of employment had started the mandatory training for their role.

The practice held audit meetings every six weeks and the practice told us they had included staff training as a standard item on this meeting's agenda and we looked at the minutes of two meetings which confirmed this.

#### Notes: CQC GP Insight

GP Insight assesses a practice's data against all the other practices in England. We assess relative performance for the majority of indicators using a "z-score" (this tells us the number of standard deviations from the mean the data point is), giving us a statistical measurement of a practice's performance in relation to the England average. We highlight practices which significantly vary from the England average (in either a positive or negative direction). We consider that z-scores which are higher than +2 or lower than -2 are at significant levels, warranting further enquiry. Using this technique we can be 95% confident that the practices performance is genuinely different from the average. It is important to note that a number of factors can affect the Z score for a practice, for example a small denominator or the distribution of the data. This means that there will be cases where a practice's data looks quite different to the average, but still shows as comparable, as we do not have enough confidence that the difference is genuine. There may also be cases where a practice's data looks similar across two indicators, but they are in different variation bands.

The percentage of practices which show variation depends on the distribution of the data for each indicator, but is typically around 10-15% of practices. The practices which are not showing significant statistical variation are labelled as comparable to other practices.

N.B. Not all indicators in the evidence table are part of the GP insight set and those that aren't will not have a variation band.

The following language is used for showing variation:

Child Immunisation indicators. These are scored against the World Health Organisation target of 95% rather than the England average.

It is important to note that z-scores are not a judgement in themselves, but will prompt further enquiry, as part of our ongoing monitoring of GP practices.
