There were three actions that came out of the infection control audit, which included monitoring the water temperatures for legionella, replacing the floor in the reception area which had been stained. We saw that these had been actioned. The report mentioned cracked skirting boards, the practice reviewed the building and were unable to find such cracks.	
The practice also carried out an internal audit in July 2019 this noted the national shortage of the hepatitis B vaccination to immunise staff, so risk assessments were carried out and those at highest risk got priority.

Comments on systems in place:

The provider received the alerts and this was forwarded to the practice manager who emails to all clinical staff members. Searches were run on the clinical system to identify any patients, we saw an example of an alert relating to faulty epi-pens, 13 patients were found and each were issued with a spare epi-pen as suggested by the alert. This was discussed at the next clinical meeting so that all clinicians were aware of the new prescribing procedures until the issues with the device is corrected.

Significant events were recorded internally and centrally where learning was shared with all the providers practices. We saw minutes of meetings where significant events were discussed and actions agreed. The practice also had a six-monthly review of all significant events to ensure that any learning had been embedded.

Additional comments:

The practice carried out a six-monthly review of complaints to ensure that all learning had been embedded.

All complaints and their responses were reviewed centrally as well as internally so that learning could be shared across all the providers' practices.

Any additional evidence

We viewed three complaints to ensure they were appropriately handled, we saw a complaint from a patient that was not happy that they did not get antibiotics in their appointment, we saw that they received a full explanation as to the clinical reasons for not prescribing antibiotics. We also viewed a complaint from a patient who was booked as the wrong patient for their appointment even though there was an alert on the clinical system stating that there was a patient with a similar name. We saw minutes of meetings where this was discussed, and staff reminded them not to ignore patient alerts.

There was a practice manager who was supported onsite by the deputy practice manager. These managers were supported by the provider management team, which included attended the practice at least once a week. The provider GP partners attended the practice twice a week to support the clinical team and also carried out two days of week remotely including carrying out audits and notes review. These GPs were always on call and available to the practice.

The provider had a vision and strategy, which had altered due to the practice being dispersed in January 2020. The practice had the vision to address all concerns that had been identified prior to them receiving the practice contract and ensure ongoing safe clinical care whilst supporting and developing the practice staff.

Special allocation scheme	There were 26 patients on this register, four of whom were discharged following a review.
At risk patients	The practice reviewed the list of high-risk patients that was provided to them and completed any required actions.
Safeguarding	The practice now has extensive safeguarding registers and increased the number of vulnerable adults from seven to 71 all these patient records were reviewed and patients were invited for an appointment where required.

There was a patient engagement event where patients were invited but only one patient attended, there had been attempts to schedule meetings, but patients did not agree to a date due to being on holiday. The practice did manage to talk to patients over the phone where the practice was able to address concerns with appointment available by improving the number of appointments and the types of

appointments that were available.

Continuous improvement and innovation

Audit area	Impact
	The practice identified eight patients who were being prescribed these supplements, six of whom were being prescribed according to NICE guidelines and two appeared to have over misuse, which potentially reflected neglect. These two patients were reviewed and the appropriate action was taken. The practice had planned to repeat this audit in six months.
