At the previous inspection, the practice was rated as requires improvement for providing safe services because:

 Actions were not always taken to address the risk assessments recommended areas for improvement. This included recommendations from the fire risk assessment and the disability access audit.

At this inspection, we found improvements had been made and the practice was now rated good for providing safe services.

Explanation of any answers and additional evidence:

- At the previous inspection in June 2018, we found some actions from the fire risk assessment such as installing an automated fire risk assessment were not carried out. At this inspection, we found an automated fire alarm system had been installed.
- At the previous inspection in June 2018, we found some actions from the disability access audit such as, installation of an alarm pull cord in the patient toilet had not been completed. The practice told us that funding issues had delayed installation. At this inspection, we found the practice had recently been approved for building redevelopment works which would commence in January 2020 and completed in March 2020. They told us installation of the pull cord would take place with the redevelopment works.
- At the previous inspection, we also saw completed action plans were not always documented.
 This was in relation to ensuring the health and safety responsibilities were recorded. At this inspection, we found all action plans were documented.

Notes: CQC GP Insight

GP Insight assesses a practice's data against all the other practices in England. We assess relative performance for the majority of indicators using a "zscore" (this tells us the number of standard deviations from the mean the data point is), giving us a statistical measurement of a practice's performance in relation to the England average. We highlight practices which significantly vary from the England average (in either a positive or negative direction). We consider that z-scores which are higher than +2 or lower than -2 are at significant levels, warranting further enquiry. Using this technique we can be 95% confident that the practices performance is genuinely different from the average. It is important to note that a number of factors can affect the Z score for a practice, for example a small denominator or the distribution of the data. This means that there will be cases where a practice's data looks quite different to the average, but still shows as no statistical variation, as we do not have enough confidence that the difference is genuine. There may also be cases where a practice's data looks similar across two indicators, but they are in different variation bands.

The percentage of practices which show variation depends on the distribution of the data for each indicator, but is typically around 10-15% of practices. The practices which are not showing significant statistical variation are labelled as no statistical variation to other practices.

N.B. Not all indicators in the evidence table are part of the GP insight set and those that aren't will not have a variation band.

The following language is used for showing variation:

Variation Bands	Z-score threshold
Significant variation (positive)	≤-3
Variation (positive)	>-3 and ≤-2
Tending towards variation (positive)	>-2 and ≤-1.5
No statistical variation	<1.5 and >-1.5
Tending towards variation (negative)	≥1.5 and <2
Variation (negative)	≥2 and <3
Significant variation (negative)	≥3

Note: for the following indicators the variation bands are different:

- Child Immunisation indicators. These are scored against the World Health Organisation target of 95% rather than the England average. Note that practices that have "Met 90% minimum" have not met the WHO target of 95%.
- The percentage of respondents to the GP patient survey who responded positively to how easy it was to get through to someone at their GP practice on the phone uses a rules based approach for scoring, due to the distribution of the data. This indicator does not have a CCG average.
- The percentage of women eligible for cervical cancer screening at a given point in time who were screened adequately within a specified period (within 3.5 years for women aged 25 to 49, and within 5.5 years for women aged 50 to 64). This indicator does not have a CCG average and is scored against the national target of 80%.

It is important to note that z-scores are not a judgement in themselves, but will prompt further enquiry, as part of our ongoing monitoring of GP practices.
