## Camrose champs again

AS we went into the final weekend Republic of Ireland were leading the table, but they had to sit out, so it would be either England 167.5 vps, Scotland 136, or Wales 127 who would take home the

trophy.

England, who amazingly had not beaten Scotland in the Camrose this millennium, sent David Gold, Tom Townsend, Andrew Robson, David Bakhshi (making his debut), David Price and Colin Simpson to do the job under non-playing captain Richard Fleet. Scotland fielded the team they will be sending to the European championships, namely Liz McGowan, Ken Baxter, Douglas Piper, John Murdoch, Jim Patrick and John Matheson.

In the first match any pre-meeting superstitions England may have had were put to rest, England winning by 22-8vps. Remarkably this would be Scotland's best

result!

In the second match England played almost flawless bridge at both tables, while a luckless Scotland had to sit back and watch their rivals rack up 116imps to their 31. England took the second match 25-2 and the Camrose was to all intents and purposes over.

However, England had come for revenge and were still hungry to make the Scots pay for having beaten them so many times in recent years. Sure enough England continued to play excellent bridge at both tables to take the third match 25-2.

This is my favourite hand, taken from the final match:



At our table the bidding went:

The lead was ♣J, taken by dummy's ace. Tom Townsend played a heart to the queen, laid down the ♥A and, on learning the bad news, played ♣J. The Scottish defender ruffed and although he correctly returned a diamond declarer ruffed in dummy and claimed on a marked squeeze against North − 12 tricks and 1430 to England.


In the other room the contract was the

England hammer Scots to complete the job

ENGLAND have retained the Camrose Trophy and they clinched it in Dundee with a record victory over Scotland. Thus England won all four of their matches in the series and ran up a total of 239.5vps, which bettered their own record for the five nations format.

Wales, who put up sturdy resistance against England in the penultimate round, slipped into second place by beating Northern Ireland 56-34 in their final match. They finished just one point ahead of Republic of Ireland.

David Gold, newly risen out of the junior ranks, has made a big impression as a full international and was in the England team against both Scotland and Wales. Here is what he has to say about the experience:

same, as were the first three tricks. However, Andy Robson for England showed the correct defence by declining to ruff the first spade. Declarer found there was no longer a way home.

England had beaten Scotland by 72-12vps, a record victory against their

arch rivals.

While the England team played very well I think it is fair to say the Scots have some work to do if they wish to achieve a respectable result in the Europeans, but I am sure this weekend was good practice for them and they were excellent hosts and great sports. I look forward to playing there again. I would also like to say that it was good to see the match broadcast over the excellent Bridge Base website.

Earlier England went to Crawley for the fourth weekend of the Camrose Trophy in a strong position. Although actually lying third behind Republic of Ireland and Scotland, these countries had played one match more and Scotland, who were leading the table, were only 25.5vps

ahead.

In fact it was Wales, England's opponents in this round, who posed the biggest threat. They were hot on England's

tail, just 13.5vps behind.

The England team was Colin Simpson and David Price, Phil King and Andrew McIntosh, David Gold and Tom Townsend, with David Burn the non-playing captain. Lined up for the Welsh were Peter Goodman and Adam Dunn, Tim Rees and Philip Kubalija and Gary and Dafydd Jones, with Paul Denning the non-playing captain.

In the first 30 boards the England players, who had all reached the finals of the open trials, showed the kind of form they were in by annihilating Wales 25-5.

However, anyone who thought the match was over had failed to tell the Welsh. In the second match they fearlessly came back, taking the first 10-board stanza 25-13. In the second stanza England pulled back 7imps, so with 10 boards to play of the second match Wales clung to a slender lead of 5imps.

Then the real excitement started.

At Non Vul v Vul you pick up ♠A 5 4 3 ♥Q J 9 4 ♠- ♠K 10 6 5 3. You are playing against Peter Goodman on your right and Adam Dunn on your left. You are also on Vugraph, so any decision you make is followed avidly by quite a few spectators, the game being somewhat easier for them as they can see all four hands.

Peter deals and opens 1♥, playing fivecard majors. Adam raises to 4♥ and Peter,

after some thought, bids 6NT!

Realising that this auction is not really possible and looking at your own hand, you elect to double. After three passes you have to find a lead. At the table the player, who shall remain nameless (He's famous enough from this hand already!) led the ♣A and dummy tabled ♣7 6 ♥K 10 7 6 3 ♦10 5 4 ♣A 4 2. A spade continuation did not meet with success when declarer, who turned up with ♠K Q 8 2 ♥A ♦A K J 9 8 3 2 ♣7, won the trick, laid down the ♦A, unblocked the ♥A, crossed to dummy with the ♣A and claimed 12 tricks on the marked diamond finesse for +1680 to Wales!

Peter had intended to open 1, but being left-handed was struggling with the bidding boxes and accidentally opened 1. On realising his error 6NT seemed a fair shot. After this result I am sure he was

happy to continue 'struggling'!

Wales won the last 10 boards by 20 imps to take the second match 19-11 and keep the weekend very much alive. England would have to compose themselves to ensure victory over the weekend.

Sure enough a revived English team came out the next morning and played solid bridge at both tables to win the third match 21-9 and take the weekend 57-33.

The match was played in great spirit and I was most impressed by the number of spectators at the event.

#### INTO BATTLE FOR ENGLAND

THE EBU has named its teams for the World and European championships this year, as well as the women's team to represent England in the Lady Milne five nations event in Ballymena next month. The selections came at the end of a series of testing trials for all the players.

The England open team for the World Teams Olympiad in Istanbul, Turkey (October 23-November 6) will be John Armstrong and Danny Davies, David Gold and Tom Townsend, Jason and Justin Hackett. Raymond Brock will be non-playing captain and David Burn the coach. First reserve pair are David Bakhshi and Andrew Robson and second reserve pair David Price and Colin Simpson. Reserve non-playing captain is John Williams.

The open team for the European Teams Championship in Malmo, Sweden (June 19-July 3) is identical to that for the world event except that Price and Simpson are first reserves and Bakhshi and Robson second reserves.

For the women's world event the England line-up will be Sally Brock and Kitty Teltscher, Michelle Brunner and Rhona Goldenfield, Heather Dhondy and Nicola Smith. Alan Mould will be non-playing captain and Christine Duckworth the coach. Reserve pair are Catherine Jagger and Sarah Teshome and John Williams is the reserve non-playing captain.

The women's team for the European championships is also identical to that for

the world event, with the exception that the reserve pair is Tracy Capal and Catherine Draper.

An England seniors team has also been named and this will be John Collings and David Jones, Paul Hackett and Tony Waterlow, Derek Rue and Keith Stanley. Paul Hackett will captain the team, which is the same for both the world and European events and John Hassett and Bill Hirst will be the reserve pair on each occasion.

England's Lady Milne team to take on Wales, Scotland, Northern Ireland and Republic of Ireland is Sally Brock and Kitty Teltscher, Heather Dhondy and Nicola Smith, Tracy Capal and Catherine Draper.

## Top level double for juniors

ENGLAND's young players came through to win both the under 25 Junior Camrose and the under 20 Peggy Bayer titles in the five nations series, played this year in Cork.

The under 25 team of Ed Levy, Andrew Woodcock, Michael Byrne, Alex Morris, Leigh Chapman and Dave Cropper, led by non-playing captain Mel Starkings, comfortably topped the table with 155vps. They were followed by Wales 125, Northern Ireland 110, Scotland 108 and Republic of Ireland 102.

## Have a nice day ...

AFTER a devastatingly disappointing result in Monte Carlo (the England women's team failed to get to the quarter-final by a handful of matchpoints) I was keen to take a break. How? A complete rest from bridge? Don't be silly! With just three days to unpack, do the washing, ironing and stroke the cat I was up in the air again en route for New Orleans!

If you are a keen bridge player and enjoy travelling, a trip to a national tournament in the States is a must. They say that everything in America is bigger and better – and that is certainly true as far as the organisation of these events is concerned. (In New Orleans last November they

accommodated 12,400 tables over 11 days!). Nationals are held three times a year in well-chosen locations to encourage 'tourists' and I have to hand it to the ACBL – they know how to make a bridge event memorable, for all the right reasons.

I chose to mix just the right amount of bridge with sightseeing, but for the real enthusiast there are organised pairs and team games every day for the duration from 10am until 2am! It's pay as you play in each session of every event, so if you don't qualify for the next stage of a major event you can opt out without feeling the pinch. There is air conditioning, an abundance of directors and administrators, spacious playing conditions, book stalls, on-site affordable refreshments, freebie snacks during play and substantial hot freebie snacks at night -

phew! No wonder I put on so much weight! Add to that the numerous attractions in the city itself, plus the friendly spirit of the occasion, and you can see why the nationals are so popular.

If you tire of playing, sightseeing, shopping or sunbathing you can relax by watching a glittering array of stars in action. Zia Mahmood, Paul Marston, Bob Hamman, Benito Garrozzo, Tony Forrester, plus many world champions past and present; the list is endless as top names from all around the world perennially meet up at these competitions.

I certainly had a wonderful time and would wholeheartedly recommend you try it at least once in your lifetime.

Of course, it takes some time to get accustomed to the different systems and regulations that are thrust upon you – with no notice! The ACBL convention card is designed to tell you what is alertable and when to tell your opponents your methods, whether or not they ask! If you alert Stayman they assume it must be something else. If you alert above 3NT they get the police in.

If you open 1NT your partner must verbally announce the point range immediately.

But, heaven forbid if you

play the multi 2 convention. You need to supply your opponents with a comprehensive defence to which they can both refer if necessary. When my partner John Holland and I came up against a pair who opened a Multi 2 against us they proffered us a handful of pages. 'Thanks very much,' we said, 'but we have our own defence'. Slightly taken aback by our confidence the auction continued as follows:

LHO	John	RHO	Me
20	Dbl	2♥	Pass
24	Dbl	Pass	Pass
Pass			

The first double showed either 13-15 balanced or any strong 19+ hand. The second double confirmed the latter. I held:

#### **≜**xxx ♥QJx ♦ Qxx **♣**KJxx

So I decided to pass the double and take the money.

After a small hiccup in the defence we emerged with only +1400!

Acknowledging their 'bottom' graciously our opponents commented that they had never before been taken for a large penalty at the two level. Unable to resist the temptation I said 'Hmm ... perhaps that's because they used your notes!'

## WHEN 2♦ WAS BETTER THAN A 7♥ SACRIFICE!

AT Durham Bridge Club (a club where at the last round each hand is shuffled separately before being replaced) the following hand

arrived:

KJ10xxx

AKQ10xxx

What do you lead against 24?

An unlikely situation, yes, but this is how it came about.

You are sitting fourth in hand gloating at this impressive collection (a two-loser hand) and wondering whether 64, 74 or 74 might make when the bidding is opened by dealer with 24 - explained as a very strong hand. Partner passes (not unexpectedly!) and a reply of 24 is heard from your right - described as a negative.

All the bridge books confirm that the auction will not die at this point and as you play various two-suited defence bids all you need is for opponents to bid a suit naturally and you can begin.

Dealer passes the 2\( \Dightarrow \text{bid! Partner, failing for some reason to work out that you have a 7-6 distribution, also passes and there you are.

Answer: Leading A K Q is likely to bring a trump promotion for partner, the full hand being:



East-West can make 5♥ as North cannot lead a club, but perhaps they realised that making 2♦ scored better than sacrificing in 7♥ over North-South's frigid 6♠ contract.



## The inner game of bridge

WHY is there so little emphasis on the psychology of bridge?

A contestant's state of mind plays a huge part in the outcome of most sporting confrontations. The tennis player finds the match-clinching game the hardest to win. The golfer sailing towards victory makes an uncharacteristic mistake on the final hole.

But if state of mind can impinge on a player's physical performance how much more important is it in a


mental, or intellectual game?

At the higher levels a few bridge teams do employ sports psychologists and at international level you could argue that this is part of the job of a non-playing captain or team coach. But for the average player very little seems to be available.

I recently rediscovered a book first published in the

1970s called *The Inner Game of Tennis* by W Timothy Gallwey, who makes the point that the player needs to be in the right frame of mind. One of the factors that makes this so important in bridge is that it is a partnership game. The way you react can seriously affect partner's frame of mind as well as your own and thus the outcome.

Here is an example from the 2003 EBU Autumn Simultaneous Pairs:




East opens a Benji 2♠ (I know, I know, but this is club bridge!). Partner, who is sitting South, in a bit of a quandary, goes for 3♥ and this is passed out. Ten tricks duly roll in and the recriminations start. You are still arguing, or at the very least thinking about this hand, as you pick up the next one. Neither of you is entirely focused on the job in hand and it goes badly, leading to further discussion.

Mentally you are in the wrong frame of mind. The downward spiral has begun. At the end of the evening, as you pick up the booklet for the event, you overhear your opponents talking about the above

hand.

'Had they bid 4 I would have bid 4, which is only one down.' Partner's bidding has turned what would have been a poor board for you into slightly better than average. And yet your reaction to this has resulted in several poor scores. A similar point is made in Andrew Kambites' excellent article in the February 2003 edition of English Bridge, which ought to be required reading for all budding partnerships.

I believe that anything you say about a hand during a session is likely to be detrimental to your success. Even if you say, 'Well played partner!' after they have

He has captained a Gloucester clubs league side through from division six to the top division, yet considers his main achievement in the game is that his wife still wants to partner him!

played a board brilliantly, the comment is likely to have them glowing with pride and still thinking about that hand as they pick up the next.

#### Be in focus

At any moment the hand you are playing should be the focus of your total concentration.

When we first started to play bridge my wife and I had an agreement that the perpetrator of any adverse comment would buy the other a bar of chocolate. We abandoned this amid concerns about my wallet and my wife's waistline. We now put 20p in a charity box for any comment about the hands made at the table. Of course, we do have an advantage over partners who go their separate ways at the end of an evening; we can discuss a hand later.

Only once has the system of fines failed us. We were playing rubber bridge with some friends when declarer led through partner, who trumped before I had, sadly, to contribute my ace. As I began an exposition on all that was wrong with the world she sat there sweetly totting up the comments.

'And it was obvious that I had ...'

20p'

'Then I could have...'

10p'

At about 80p I reached into my pocket and pulled out a fiver.

'I don't care, this time I am going to

have my say."

Hilarity all round and a thoroughly enjoyable social evening. But the point is that from a competitive point of view our team had completely lost the initiative. It is not just what you say, but the way it is said that can matter. I am told that some top partnerships do not even say 'Thank you partner,' when dummy goes down. Much better to say nothing, than to snarl out a thanks, giving partner the impression that you feel they have let you down.

#### Warm to it

Returning to the individual, not many of us would go straight into an important game of golf without a practice swing, or a tennis match without a knock-up. Yet virtually all club bridge is played straight in, with no practice time. Perhaps clubs should arrange for the first couple of hands of a session to be purely a warm up. Until that happens players need to get themselves in the right frame of mind for the very first board.

I would be interested to hear how the top players prepare so that they are immediately focussed. In the meantime here is another of Gallwey's tennis tips that I have found useful when transferred to the bridge table. Force yourself to suspend judgement on the last hand, your partner's efforts and, just as important, how you are playing, and this will help you concentrate on the job at hand and

improve your results.

Undoubtedly the secret of success in any game lies in not trying too hard. In this context nervous energy can be counter productive. When I first started playing club bridge I felt so wound up that I would get tired half way through an evening. Results were noticeably worse for the latter part of a session. This was even more marked at Green Point one day events, where about seven hours of concentration is required.

I have found that not discussing the hands means that you chat about other things. This makes it easier to relax between matches and to concentrate when

it matters

Finally I would like to return to Timothy Gallwey's book and attempt to translate the wisdom therein to our game of bridge. The way to play this game is with yourself and your partner in a state of relaxed concentration.

Hopefully this article may prompt some comments on the psychology of the sport from its toughest competitors. Then we may all really learn a thing or two!

## WINNERS AND LOSERS

## Putting on the squeeze

DO squeezes frighten you to death? There are huge numbers of them, with sophisticated and exotic names. Most of them have virtually no relevance to practical declarer play, but some of the simpler types occur over and over again. They do not require great technical sophistication and this chapter aims to explain, in a practical way, how you can squeeze opponents with very little effort or knowledge.

In the first hand you are in 7NT. North leads ♠J. How should you play?

•	Q43	♠ AK6
Y	AKQ2	¥ 765
\$25 (c) (c)	743	AKQ2
B8002011	AKQ	♣ 842

With 12 top tricks you need to make either the ♥2 or ♦2. A 3-3 break in either suit will suffice. Even if both suits break 4-2 you can succeed if the same opponent has 4 cards in each red suit. You start by cashing six black suit tricks. Now each player has seven cards, so if the same defender started with four cards in each red suit he must have relinquished his hold on one of them.

How much mental effort is involved? Being lazy I would watch for discards of just one of the suits, maybe the hearts. Having cashed six black suit tricks I would continue with ♥A K Q. By this time I would know if \$2 was a winner. If not, I would cash the diamonds and hope for the best. If I had to play \$2 at trick 13 I wouldn't even need to know whether or not it is a winner. I rather enjoy the expressions on the defenders' faces when the \$2 turns out to be a winner and I innocently express surprise.

Suppose you cash your five black suit winners, ignoring South, who has retained his clubs, but otherwise hardly matters. The remaining cards are:

There has been no squeeze.

Now look at the same diagram with \$3 missing from West's hand and \$8 missing from East's hand. East and West have seven cards each. North has eight cards, clearly impossible. North will have already been squeezed. Indeed the position will be exactly the same as in our first 7NT contract. The squeeze works if you take \$A\$ at trick one and immediately duck a club.

This is not technically complicated. You just need general principles. You have 11 tricks. You need 12 tricks. You can afford to lose one trick. Any squeeze is more likely to work if you have already lost that trick. Therefore I give it up as soon as is convenient in order to tighten the noose around the unfortunate defender's neck. Ducking the club is called 'rectifying the count'.



Often running a long suit can produce unexpected results. In the next example West is in 3NT and North leads ★K. You allow the defenders to win the first two tricks and win ★A at trick three, discarding ♥6 from dummy. It looks as though you can just take seven more top winners and then sink under a barrage of spades, but look at the effect of running your clubs.

North needs to find four discards. Throwing two diamonds and \$\forall 3\$ causes no pain, but what then? If North discards a second heart your \$\forall 1\$ becomes a winner, so North can only discard a spade. Now it is safe for you to drive out \$\forall A\$.

Once again there is nothing advanced about this. When you are short of tricks it often pays to run your long suit, providing you have easy discards from your hand. You can comfortably discard two hearts and a diamond. Here it just falls into your lap, whether or not you understand what you are doing.

For the final hand again you are in 3NT, with North leading &K. You correctly allow this to hold and North switches to \$9. How should you play?



Do you think it is appropriate to run your clubs? What five discards do you intend to make from your hand?

Now I don't know whether or not you can succeed by running the clubs immediately. Experience warns me that with North discarding after you, the endgame will turn out to be very complicated. If I were conscientious I would provide you with a detailed analysis, but I have two reasons for not doing so.

(1) This article is meant to be practical and not too complicated.

(2) I am lazy and such an analysis would be a total waste of effort. You can make the contract trivially by driving out ♥A at trick two. I have no great interest in inflicting a suicide squeeze on my own hand and then seeing whether I can recover from my own incompetence.

So what is the purpose of this hand? Merely to show you that a little knowledge can be a dangerous thing. You should not imagine that you could mindlessly run a long suit without consequences. You need to understand the two vital differences between these last two hands:

In the first one there was no simple way of making my contract. In the second one, there was a very simple way.


In the first one I could easily find the necessary discards from my hand. In the second one I couldn't.

## CUE BIDDING ITALIAN ST

ALL the deals this time come from the 2003 Bermuda Bowl in Monaco. Will EBU members, practising their bidding by the fireside, be able to outbid potential world champions from Italy, USA and Sweden? Let's see!

The first deal is from a keen encounter between Sweden and Norway. Responder has to judge a powerful hand opposite a 1NT opening.

The usual meaning of West's 3♥ is to show six hearts and invite game. The Swedes, however, play it as forcing, setting the suit and inviting a cue bid. (In a standard system you can use 1NT – 3♥ to have this meaning.)

Over Morath's cue bid in diamonds Brogeland stepped in for Norway with a lead-directing double. When the opponents make such a move you can turn it to your advantage. Gustawsson would have redoubled if he held the \$A himself. Instead he passed, to allow partner to clarify the nature of his diamond control. Morath's redouble confirmed that he had first-round control. Since East held \$K Q J himself, it was reasonable to assume that West had cue-bid a void and North had doubled with the \$A.

After a spade cue bid from East, West bid Roman Key-card Blackwood (knowing that partner did not have the •A) and settled in 6. It was not a good slam and

duly went down. Even if the ♥Q had fallen in two rounds, declarer would still have needed to avoid two club losers. East should surely not have cue bid 4♠ with so many points wasted opposite partner's diamond void. At the other table Helgemo and Helness bid 1NT - 2♠ - 2♥ - 4♠ (splinter)

Awards: 4♥-10,5♥-8,3NT-7,6♥-5.

WE move swiftly on to another slam deal, this time from the encounter between USA 1 and Australia. The American pair produced an ugly, but instructive, sequence to a very poor spot.

2. East-West game. Dealer East.



Nickell's 2NT response showed around 8-11 points and a balanced hand. What should he bid next, would you say, when partner rebids 3\(\frac{1}{2}\)?

If you play ace-and-king (Italian) cue bidding, the answer is easy. You rebid 4, agreeing spades and showing the ace or king of diamonds. If partner continues with 4, you can go past game with a 5 cue bid. Nickell took the simple view that his partner had a big spade hand on which he had forced to game. So, two kings and two queens should produce the extra two tricks needed to bump 10 to 12. He leapt to 6 on the second round and Freeman raised to 7. The required miracle in the club suit did not materialise and the grand went one down.

The first time I looked at this deal. I thought 'What an absurd leap to 6. His

partner was certain to bid the grand, holding all five key cards and the trump queen.' When I looked again I still thought that 6 was a poor bid. However, I asked myself why West thought that a passed partner, with a balanced hand, could fill all five gaps in his own hand. I concluded that West, strange as it seems, should not have raised to the seven level.

At the other table Fruewirth and Del Monte conducted a seven-round, more dignified, auction that eventually crept into 6♠ for a big swing to Australia. Their auction was 2♠ - 2♦, 2NT - 3♠ (five-card Stayman), 3♠ - 4♦, 4♥ - 4♠, 5♠ - 5♥, 5♠ - 6♠. All the non-spade bids from the second round onwards were ace-or-king cue bids.

Awards: 6♠ - 10, 6NT - 6, games - 4, grands - 1.

THE third deal comes from the round robin clash between USA 1 and USA 2. Let's see how superstars Meckstroth and Rodwell cope with it.

Rodwell opened a 14-16 point 1NT and 24 was minor suit Texas. The 2NT rebid merely indicated a minimum hand and Meckstroth's 34 showed a long diamond suit. Rodwell agreed diamonds with his 44 bid and his partner's 44 was (of course!) a Roman Key-card Blackwood

The four-step 5 response showed two aces and the diamond queen. Meckstroth could tell that partner's ace of clubs would provide a discard for his heart loser. He now needed to know whether there would be a loser in spades. The familiar mechanism that he used to investigate this should act as a confidence booster to us all. He punted a grand and waited to see what spade holding would appear in the durant.

Did dummy have a useful A-x? No. Did dummy have an even more splendid A-Q-x? No. Did dummy at least have

## - WHY NOT GIVE IT A TRY?


◆A-J-x, giving declarer a finesse for the grand slam? No. Did dummy have a useless A-x-x in the spade suit, but the grand made anyway because the ◆Q J fell doubleton? Yes!

In fact, Bobby Wolff sat South, playing for USA 2, and led a deceptive ♠J from Q-J doubleton. Rodwell won with dummy's king, drew trumps and then dropped the spade queen with the ace. It was hardly possible that South would have led from J-9 doubleton (when the ♠10 would have pinned the nine on the second round).

Awards: 6 - 10, 6 - 7, 6 NT/games - 4, grands - 2.

WE move now to the semi-final contested between the two American teams. The next deal had a Mollo-esque touch to it, as you will see.

The first point to note is that East's 1♥ response should be forcing. The modern style is to ignore the double, so 1♥ has exactly the same meaning that it would have if North had not doubled. The next point is that East's 3♠ does not promise four spades. West has denied four spades with his 3♠ rebid, so there cannot be a 4-4 spade fit. The 3♠ bid shows a spade stopper, but insufficient strength in clubs to bid 3NT. With a club stopper himself, Soloway was able to bid 3NT and the superb 22-point game had been reached.

Wildavsky led a club, won in the dummy, and a diamond to the ace revealed the 3-0 break. Soloway crossed to the VA, finessed in diamonds and had nine tricks. It's true that a heart lead would have beaten him, even if he was inspired enough to finesse in diamonds, but this was very unlikely after East had bid hearts.

Meckstroth went only one down and it was 5imps to USA 1. 'Strange hand,' said Oscar the Owl. 'USA 1 bid freely to 3NT at both tables!'

Awards: 3NT - 10, 5 ♦ - 6, part scores - 4.

We will end with two big deals from the final, between Italy and USA 1.

The key point of the auction was that the 2stresponse was forcing to game in the Italians' system. Just look at the huge amount of information that this allowed them to exchange. West had space to rebid his diamonds, East showed primary spade support and three (Italian, of course!) cue bids were exchanged below the game level.

Nunes then signed off in 4\(\psi\), leaving any further move to his partner. Fantoni judged that he was worth one further move and cue bid his second control in the diamond suit. That was enough to prompt Nunes into bidding the small slam. A fine exchange of values and controls, leading to a sound contract that was easily made when Meckstroth (North) led the \(\psi\)A.

At the other table Nickell opened 1♠ and Freeman responded 2NT to show a game raise hand in spades. After further exploratory bids (3♦ – 3♥ – 4♣) Freeman bid 4♠. The Vugraph commentators were confident that Nickell would bid on, as his Italian counterpart had done, but he passed and lost his team 11imps.

Awards: 6 - 10, 5 - 4 - 6, 3NT - 5.

Our final board is one of those that set the Americans on the road to recovery, eventually closing a big deficit to win on a nail-biting last board.

Paul Soloway opened with a weak 1NT (Yes, an American opened a weak no trump – it's not a misprint!). When Bob Hamman made a transfer response of 2. Soloway did not rate his hand as strong enough for a break. In standard bidding West would now continue with 3. game forcing, to show the second half of his two-suiter. Hamman preferred an artificial 2. which merely set up a game force. Soloway showed genuine heart support and a series of cue bids followed. 4NT was a general cue bid, not Blackwood, and West's 5. showed a second control in clubs.

The resultant heart slam was an excellent contract and was easily made when trumps broke 2-2. If the trumps divide 3-1 you need the clubs to be 3-3 or the diamond finesse to succeed.

At the other table Nunes and Fantoni, for Italy, missed the slam when Rodwell (South) intervened over the weak 1NT with a borderline ASTRO-type bid.

Awards: 6 - 10, 5 / 4 - 6, 7 / 3NT - 5.

Our experts end with three bulls-eyes, but score a total of only 38 points, giving you a solid chance to beat them. I'm sure we can extract some worthwhile tips from the deals.

#### Tips to Remember

\* The purpose of a splinter bid is to tell your partner 'I am not strong enough for a slam unless you have a suitable holding opposite my shortage'. Make such a bid when you have the values for game, but little extra (about 11-14 points facing a one-bid). If your hand is stronger, choose a different sequence to find out more about partner's hand.

\* When the opener has bid and rebid a minor suit, a second suit bid by the responder should be taken initially as showing a stopper rather than a genuine suit. For example, in the sequence 1♦ − 1♠, 3♦ − 3♥ the responder does not promise four hearts. He may be hoping to hear 3NT, or delayed spade support.

\* More and more players are adopting the Italian cue-bidding style, where you cue bid equally on aces and kings. Why not give it a try? One big advantage is that when your partner bypasses a suit in the cue bidding, you know he has two top losers there. Also, you don't waste space when one of you has to leap several bids to show his only ace, or to sign off with no ace.

\* When a cue bid is doubled, for a lead, you should make use of a redouble – either by the partner of the cue bidder, or (after a pass) by the cue bidder himself. A redouble by the cue bidder will confirm that he has first-round control.






#### Improve your defence with Brian Senior

THERE are many deals on which it is necessary for the defence to switch the point of attack in the hope that it will provide them with the winners they require to defeat a contract. There are also many deals on which the distribution is such that even when partner holds the high cards you are looking for it is best to play passively and wait for those tricks to come to you rather than make a switch that may work to declarer's advantage. Countless contracts are allowed to make when a defender fails to count out the distribution and gets too busy.



West led the ace and another club against 4. East petering to show an even number of clubs. When declarer played a heart, West won and cashed the second heart. Now he reasoned that the spades were dividing evenly for declarer so he had better switch to a diamond to get any defensive tricks that were available in that suit before they disappeared. Declarer decided that West would not have led away from the king of diamonds at this point so played low from dummy and East's king lost to the ace, destroying the defensive diamond trick.

The evidence of the first few tricks should have told West that declarer had started with five hearts and two clubs. That leaves him with six cards between spades and diamonds and however those cards are distributed between the two suits there can be no useful discards for declarer. The passive exit with a spade leaves declarer powerless to avoid an eventual diamond loser.



Despite the duplication and mirror distribution, 6\(\Delta\) appeared to be an excellent contract until the 3-0 trump split came to light. Declarer won the heart lead and cashed two top trumps, then the rest of the

#### To switch or not to switch?



hearts and clubs before exiting with a spade to the queen.

If West panics and switches to a diamond, he gives the contract. However, this is only a pseudo endplay. Declarer has given the defence an opportunity to make a mistake, but a little basic arithmetic should allow West to see the true situation. Declarer must be the same 5-2-4-2 distribution as dummy; otherwise he would have eliminated the clubs and hearts before exiting with the spade. In that case a ruff and discard will not help declarer and West can be assured of defeating the contract by playing either a club or a heart now and leaving declarer to pick up the diamonds - which he cannot do, of course.

Count signals can resolve some otherwise almost impossible decisions.




South opens 1NT (15-17) and is raised to game. West leads a low heart to the king and ace and declarer crosses to dummy by leading a spade to the queen, East following with the two. Now declarer runs \*Q, East playing the six, and West wins the king.

If West believes that declarer has nine tricks ready to run his only hope of defeating the contract is to switch to a low club, playing partner for king to three. On the layout above the club switch would solve all of declarer's problems. How is West to know what to do? If the partnership plays count signals on declarer's lead West can count declarer's winners. East showed an odd number of spades, and that is likely to be five, leaving declarer with three tricks

there. East appears to have begun a highlow signal in diamonds, showing four, and again leaving declarer with three winners. Declarer is known to hold \*Q to go with the ace he won at the first trick, but that only gives him eight winners. Accordingly, there is no need to make the desperation switch to a club at this stage and West should just clear the heart suit. Leave declarer to do his own work and he may well go down, though it is true that he can succeed via a squeeze and endplay against West if he reads the end position.

Now change the above hand slightly, so that declarer has a fifth diamond. He will play the same way, but this time East will play the two on the first round of diamonds, showing an odd number and suggesting that declarer has five cards. That would give declarer four diamond tricks, three spades and two hearts. Now it would be correct for West to win the diamond and try a low club. If declarer holds the king it is just an overtrick, while the contract is defeated if East holds king to three or four clubs.

When a switch is necessary a defender must make it, however unattractive it might appear to be.



West leads •A, East following with the two and declarer with the seven. Should West switch to a heart or play passively?

Declarer is marked with at least five-five in the black suits and the opening lead has established the king of diamonds in the dummy. If declarer has ace doubleton heart, the small card will be discarded on the king of diamonds anyway, so leading from the VK will not normally cost a trick. However, if declarer has two small hearts, as in the diagram, it is essential that West switches to a heart now to take the two defensive winners there before the discard can be taken. A low heart to the ace and a heart back to the king will defeat the contract when it is possible to do so.

## GET EVEN WITH THE ODDS

MANY declarer problems revolve around the location of a missing queen.

Consider the following hand.



You open 1NT, partner transfers to hearts and then bids 2NT. You jump to 4♥, the final contract, and receive \$3 lead to the king and ace. A pity, for without that lead you had the chance of leading twice up to clubs for a spade discard when the ace is onside. As there are two spades and a club to lose, you need to play trumps without loss.

You would not dream of taking a first round finesse of VJ, risking losing to sin-

gleton queen, so first you cash VA, both opponents following. Now you have the choice of laying down VK, playing for a 2-2 break, or returning to hand with A to finesse VJ.

Most players are familiar with the 'eight ever, nine never' rule, relating to whether to finesse against the queen when holding eight or nine cards in the combined hands, and this rule says play for the drop.


However, one should be aware that this decision is extremely close. It turns out that the odds are now a mere 11-10 in favour of the drop, rather than taking a second round

finesse, so other considerations may apply. For example, if North peters, suggesting three trumps to the queen, you might be tempted to finesse. Be warned, however, that a defender may well peter deceptively with a small doubleton trump. You need to weigh up opponents!

Once observing a top player taking the finesse in this situation, I asked him why he had gone against the odds. He replied that his team was well behind in the match, it was a close decision anyway, and he badly needed to create a swing! In a pairs event, desperate for a top, you should certainly consider finessing, contrary to what is likely to be the majority decision of the field.

In the next problem you have some information to guide you.

Love all. Dealer South. Pairs.

North leads \$10 to the queen and king. South continues with A and J, which you ruff, North following. You cash ♥A to which both opponents follow small, so 10 tricks are certain. You play a second heart, North following suit. Should you finesse or play for the drop? You know from the above example that the decision is very close. This is pairs, not teams, so the overtrick is important.

Are there any clues?

Well, there is only one other high card missing, the &Q. If you knew that South had that card you could be pretty sure that North has ♥Q, since South passed as dealer and has already turned up with eight points in diamonds. Unfortunately there is no convenient way of finding out about ♠Q, so is it just a guess?

Not quite. South can have ♥Q, ♠Q or neither - but cannot have both! As these three possibilities have approximately the same chance, it is about 2-1 against South holding VQ, so to finesse must be correct.



Turning the tables on declarer


A chronicle of wide-awake defending, by David Adelman, bridge teacher and writer



THIS is a hand from day one of the National Swiss teams at Leeds in January. It demonstrates what damage a wide-awake defender can do to foil a declarer intent on finding the most fiendish ways of making his contract. I'm happy to report that the wide awake defender in question was your correspondent, who sat East.

My partner led •J to 3NT, won by declarer's Q. Declarer now has eight top tricks and set about the clubs looking for trick nine. After cashing &Q and then playing \$6 towards dummy, declarer found out the bad news in that suit. He won this second club trick in dummy and ran the ♥9. Partner won with ♥10 and played a small diamond to clear dummy's A. Declarer was now getting desperate and I could sense him sizing me up for something downright nasty. He cashed dummy's A and came to hand with VA, dropping my ₩Q.

This left the following ending:



Declarer now cashes A and you play your \$5 to preserve your beautiful holding of AQJ 10, don't you? Well, if you do, you have fallen right into declarer's horrible little trap. He would now play a small spade and after cashing your precious ♠Q J 10 you would be conceding the last two tricks to dummy's carefully preserved \$A10. Declarer has you on lead just at the right moment for him and the wrong one for you.

Was I endplayed? Do you really think I would be writing this article if I had been? Oh, no. I carefully played my ♠Q under his ♠A and when he played ♠9 to my ♠10 I immediately returned the ♠5 to give him back the lead. A shell-shocked declarer now had to concede the last three tricks to partner's ♥K and ♦K 10. 3NT down one.

It's not often that defenders get the chance to beat declarer at his/her own endplay game. Scoring up with teammates I couldn't wait to regale them with tales of spiders caught in their own web or words to that effect.

'So the endplay worked then?' I asked team-mate declarer at the other table. What endplay?' he uttered, somewhat bemused. 'You don't need an endplay to make 4♥ - it's cold!'

I give up!

## Asking a question can help you find the best contract

#### Standard English by Sandra Landy

MY last article showed how the auction could be completed when a limit bid has been made. Simple limit bids include all no trump bids and the second time any suit is bid. But it's not quite as simple as that. Sometimes a question needs to be asked before the decision on the final contract can be made.

#### Questions after no trump limit bids

KQ953 32 A J 10

♣ KQ2

Partner opens 1NT. You are in charge partner has

made a limit bid. With your 15 HCP your side should definitely be going to game. But perhaps 44 would be better than 3NT, you can't tell. Bid 34. This asks partner to bid 3NT with only two spades, but to raise to 44 holding three or more.

KQ3 932 Q 10 7 5 ♣ KQ2

Partner opens 1NT, putting you charge. With 12 HCP

your side may only have a combined 24 HCP, a bit thin for game. On the other hand, partner may have 14 HCP and that extra couple of points make game a much better prospect. Bid 2NT, asking partner to bid 3NT with a maximum and pass with a minimum.

K10832 K932 ♣ K52

Partner opens 14, you respond 1 and partrebids ner

2NT - a strong limit bid showing 17-18 HCP. Now you are certainly going to game with nine HCP, but maybe 4♠ would be safer. Bid 34, showing an unbalanced hand with 5+ spades and 4+ diamonds. If partner shows you three-card spade support by bidding 34, choose to play in 44 rather than 3NT. Partner could have weak hearts, such as ♥Q32 for his 2NT rebid and the defence might cash lots of heart tricks.

KQ832 KQ1075 ♣ J2

Again you respond 1♠ to partner's 1♣ opening and he rebids

1NT. You have a good hand and want to go to game, but maybe 3NT is not best. A 24 bid would tell partner to pass if he preferred diamonds to spades, so you must rebid 34, showing a shapely game forcing hand. Even 5 might be a better contract than 3NT.

#### **Ouestions** after a suit limit bid

♠ KQ953 ₩ J2 ♦ K974 AK

You open 1♠ and partner bids 24. You have quite a good hand

and might choose just to bid 44 directly. But you can ask partner by bidding 34, saying go on to 44 if you are at the good end of your 6-9 range, pass otherwise.

Some people prefer to ask a more specific question in this auction. A bid of 3 says 'Game is possible. Bid 44 if you can help me with my diamond losers, either because you have shortage or because you have high cards in diamonds'. This 30 bid is called a 'trial bid' because you are trying for game by telling partner where you need help.

♠ K8, ♥ QJ432 A 495

Partner opens 14. You respond 1♥ and partner raises to

2♥. This limit bid puts you in charge. Should you go for game in hearts or play in a safe part score? Partner has shown an unbalanced hand, probably with five clubs and four hearts and about 12-14/15 HCP. With more distribution or points, partner would have made the stronger limit bid of 3 v or 4 v. You can try for game by bidding 37, asking for useful extra values, or by bidding 24, specifically asking for help in spades.

My beginners looked a bit dubious about this topic, most preferring to stop in safe part scores that would not test their card play too much. Still, they managed quite well with my practice hands.

#### Asking and answering questions

A864 Q9832 AK 107 10643 A5 QJ2 ♣ K54

Roy opened 1♥, the correct bid on a balanced hand with both majors, which is too good for 1NT. Sally raised to 27, a limit bid showing 6-9 HCP and 4+ hearts. Roy tried for game with 3♥, but Sally passed with only five points.

At the next table, when Peter raised Janet's 1♥ to 2♥, Janet tried for game with 2♠. Now Peter knew that, although his hand had minimum points, his singleton spade was just what partner wanted so he jumped to 4♥ and Janet made 10 tricks.

Russell, too, opened 1♥, but when Sylvia replied 27, he went straight to 4♥. With 18 HCP he thought game would be good. He made it, but he was lucky to find Sylvia with such a suitable dummy. She might have had a flatter hand, say ♠953 ♥QJ83 ♦K63 ♠854 and now 4♥ is bound to lose two spades and two clubs.

086 Q9832 AK7 ♦ KJ103 A52 ♣ K54 ♣ QJ108

Over Alex's 14, Jill responded 1♥ and Alex rebid 1NT, showing 15-16 HCP. Jill wasn't sure whether to go to game with nine HCP so she tried 2NT. Alex was a maximum, but he was worried that his spade and diamond stoppers were weak, so he made the excellent bid of 3V. It told Jill he was a maximum, but it also showed three-card heart support. Jill bid 4♥ with her fivecard suit. It proved to be a better contract than 3NT, which lost the first five spade tricks at another table.

♠ Q98 ♥ Q32 K64 AKJ10 J10642 A9 ♣ QJ108 ♣ K5

Having just heard about the idea of showing three-card support for partner on the second round, Emily found an Having interesting bid. responded 1NT to Dick's 19 opening and been raised to 2NT, she tried 3♥ to show her three-card support. Dick only had four hearts, so he signed off in 3NT. But had his \$4 been the ¥4 he would have played in the safer contract of 4.

▲ AQ973 V 098 WAKJ10 10643 A 9 ♣ QJ32

To reinforce that point Dick and Emily bid this hand next. The auction started 1♥-14-2NT. Now Emily bid 37, showing her three-card heart support. Dick only had four hearts, but he also had three-card spade support, so he bid 34, which Emily was pleased to raise to

#### Some key points

- After a limit opening or rebid, the other hand should consider investigating alternative contracts. particularly in a major suit.
- II If you haven't raised partner's major at the first opportunity, any subsequent bid in that major shows three-card support.
- If partner raises your major, you can try for game by re-raising to the three level. But this bid won't tell partner where you need help. A trial bid, identifying the suit with losers, may be more helpful.

On the road with Ron Klinger (Part 2)



## Foot down for Burnham!

RON Klinger, the renowned Australian bridge teacher and player, continues the story of his master class tour round the bridge clubs of England. He recalls some of the friends he met and talks over a few of the hands that his eager students found most interesting. The tale of his 15-day 22-lecture tour last autumn is the subject of a book to be published in July

by Cassell at £7.99. In an agreement with the publisher, the EBU will have advance copies of the book and will be selling it through the EBU Bridge Shop from April at 20% discount.

LATE on a Tuesday afternoon, after the class at Marches *Bridge-for-All* Club at Bartestree, I put the foot to the floor to reach Burnham by 8.30pm for a dinner date with Laurie Champniss, Elena and Giorgio Jeronimidis and Julian Pottage. Well, not to the floor for very long, because most of the trip was in driving rain.

We reached the turn-off in good time, but a call from Laurie (thank heavens for mobile phones) told us that the road to his place had been closed. Ignoring the barricade on the road we had almost made it to Laurie's when we were turned back by a workman who was dealing with the burst water main.

We turned round, circled a very large block and finally made it to Laurie's from the other end of the street around 9.15pm. A superb dinner at a nearby pub, plus the company, made up for the dismal drive and we spent the night at Laurie's.

The class next morning at South Bucks Bridge Club started with Hand Evaluation and Constructive Bidding. After a break for lunch, the session concluded with Competitive Bidding. (i) With 23 HCP West is worth a 2♣ opening. Equally, West has roughly a three-loser hand, again worth a 2♣ opening.

(ii) Negative or waiting reply (iii) Forcing to game, 5+ hearts

(iv) Splinter raise of hearts. Since 2♥ was forcing to game, the 4♣ splinter does not promise high card values, just 4+ trumps

and a shortage in clubs

(v) Artificial inquiry (this 'scroll' approach was explained at the start of the session) (vi) Void in clubs and none or three key cards – obviously none. With a club singleton East's rebid would have been 4♥.

When West learns of the club void, West can jump to 7♥ without further ado.

Leaving South Bucks at 3.30pm we managed to reach Bletchingley in two hours, despite setting off on the M4 in the wrong direction for a little way. At Bletchingley we met Jean and Michael Virley, our hosts for the evening. There was enough time to set up the bridge room and have a meal before the evening session on Competitive Doubles and High-level Bidding. We stayed overnight at Jean's and she was kind enough also to invite Alison and Norman Nicolson to stay. Alison is one of the three EBU representatives who attended the sessions on the tour, the others being Terry Collier, EBU general manager, and John Pain, development manager.

On the Thursday afternoon we were the guests of Ron and Vi Webb, who organised the session at the Brevion Bridge Club, Danbury. Pat Husband and Terry Collier also joined us at the Webbs, where we had a delightful dinner. The bridge session that evening was on Constructive

and Competitive Bidding.



'This was very annoying, as even 4\( \phi \) would have been a good score. Of course, the defence should have played a third spade to beat the contract anyway, but I'm sure some opponents do this just to tease me!'

## Wild hands and five suit bridge

Richard Holland from Daventry writes about this hand:

North AQXXX KJ10xxxxx South A Q AQJxx

ON this wild distribution the opposition bidding at his table stopped in 40, whereas most tables managed to get to 5. As the hearts broke 3-3, 6 would make as the cards lie. What is a reasonable sequence and what is the best contract?

Well, to start I would not mind missing 6♥ as a 3-3 heart break is only about 36% and even if the hearts were kind something nasty may happen in diamonds. Assuming the opposition are silent then a possible sequence might be:

1 → -1 ♠, 2 ♦ (i)-3 ♠ (ii), 3 ♥ -3 NT, 5 ♦
(i) I suppose 2 ♦ could be passed out but in my experience that never happens and to reverse on this sort of hand is going to give a false picture about high cards. Try persuading South to stop short of a slam if you reverse here.

(ii) Natural and game forcing

An alternative is for North to guess to open 5. If the opponents have a lot of black cards this is going to give them a big problem.

East-West duly got a good score, but reported what they saw as a psyche by North and asked for it to be recorded as the very light 1. opening had been used against them several times over the last year. What should happen?

If East-West have been on the receiving end of this several times then they are well within their rights to ask for the psyche to be recorded. If the club committee becomes aware that this is constituting an understanding then I think the committee chairman should have a quiet word with the North-South pair to say that while there is nothing wrong with the occasional psyche, if it happens in the same sequence with the same pair then the pattern may lead to problems.

Psyches are usually recorded using a traffic light principle. This one would be green because South has taken the appropriate action throughout the auction. If South had not taken enough action so that one might suspect he knew what was going on from previous experience then it is open to the director to record it as amber (do it again and you are in trouble) or red (a score adjustment is required).

PS: Why did West pass at his second turn to bid? Is four card support for his partner's overcall and a nine count not enough to raise?

M D from Banstead, Surrey asks:

MY partner and I play traditional leads, signals and discards. We have no desire to start learning the rules of 10 and 12 or have to play all our cards upside down, but we have found that after the first card we are not totally sure what the message of any subsequent cards is. Can you help?

When you continue a suit you should try to give partner some more information so if, for example, you lead fourth highest and you have five, then your next card should be the bottom one to let him know what is happening. Similarly if you have led the seven from 9 7 5 because you play MUD, then your next card should be the nine so he knows you have three rather than two or four.

A common position that is undiscussed is what card you play next if you have led from four small cards. So if you lead the seven from 9742 and when you get in you decide to continue the suit, which card should you play next? Traditionally you continue with your original fourth highest. Occasionally this may look like a doubleton so some players have taken to playing their third highest next which means that declarer will have to be very cunning to hide the smallest card twice to confuse you. In addition there are hands where suit preference becomes desperately important and if you normally play second then third you will have the extreme cards to use as suit preference signals. Probably the difference is so small that all that really matters here is that you agree.

One thing that distinguishes experts from run-of-the-mill players is their attention to the spot cards, so in defence there are lots of suit preference signals. Suppose partner leads a top card and you have 9 7 3. You play the three to mean 'I don't like the suit' or perhaps 'I have an odd number". Which card do you play next? You might play the seven just because you are playing them up the line or you might play the nine because that is current remaining count. Whichever you do the other card can now have a suit preference message.

In all this, of course, you are going to have to give yourself a headache watching spot cards much more carefully!



Eddie Oldham of Ashford, Kent says: I AM writing the history of Ashford Bridge Club and have come across a reference in 1938 to 'the five suit bridge rule'. Have you any information as to this rule?

It was a game devised in the mid 1930s, which involved a 65 card pack. There were five suits of 13 cards (the fifth suit being green) and each player was dealt 16 cards, leaving the one remaining card known as 'the widow' in the middle. Whoever became declarer could exchange this card for one of dummy's cards. It featured in Life Magazine of March 1938, but it did not really catch on as a game. A quick look at www3.telus.net/Simulacrum/market.ht m showed I could buy a twin pack of Waddington's special advance five suit cards in mint condition for the princely sum of \$300, but that seemed a bit much, even at current exchange rates, especially when regular correspondent KB of Ealing tells me that the 'lovely ladies twin pack' is selling on EBay for £1.99.

Rather more interesting was a Swedish invention of the 1950s called Rex Bridge, where there were the customary number of cards, but in the bidding the Rex suit came between spades and no trumps. The Rex denomination was exactly as no trumps except for the fact that the ace was low and the king now the highest card. I imagine it led to some interesting problems of changing hand evaluation.

# No hope for the friendly duplicate club to be taken seriously?

TWO letters in the last issue of English Bridge depict very well a basic issue for duplicate bridge. Wendy English doesn't understand the 'expert's' bidding. Michael Grounds wants to carry pocketfuls of notes at Green Point events to cover the variety of level four conventions he hopes to encounter. Two worlds, or just one journey to the green pastures of the promised land?

Peter Stocken echoed my own observations some while ago when he said that the EBU was run by tournament players, for tournament players, ie experts. A belief in the one true goal of all bridge players to be duplicate tournament experts seems to be reflected in the editor's reply to Ms English. '... Don't worry ... the more you read ... the more you will learn'. When chairman of my county I attended the EBU annual conference and heard a very senior officer of the EBU refer to a lesser player as a 'rabbit' (laughter all round).

It is not surprising that the EBU can be accused of institutional elitism, since virtually nobody outside of the tournament playing elite has any real voice in the organisation. And from that standpoint, another world of duplicate bridge, the 'friendly' duplicate club, can never command serious attention. (Well, they'll grow up to be proper bridge players one day,

won't they?)

I see these clubs as an essential element of a growing membership of our game, but they will only develop within the umbrella of the EBU if they are seen by the EBU as having the same importance as the 'serious' clubs, and its national competitions. As it exists at present, elitist and dominated by the county associations, I cannot see the EBU getting this right, and those of us teaching the game still won't have any reason to tell our students about the EBU. – Mike Fisher, Woodbridge, Suffolk

Editor's note: The EBU is currently striving to provide a much wider range of services to members. The top end of the game surely warrants attention, but today the well-being of the 'ordinary' club and the 'ordinary' member has equally high priority on the organising body's agenda and hopefully that is reflected in the content of English Bridge, which endeavours to cover the whole spectrum of the game. As for the EBU being run by tournament players for tournament players the editor is not one of that group and the general manager of the EBU does not play bridge at all. New blood on county committees at Council and even on the Board of the EBU is always appreciated.

Thinking particularly of players at club


level, a regular item in English Bridge detailing some of the more common misunderstandings and changes would be useful.

#### Dhondy family double

HUSBAND and wife Jeremy and Heather Dhondy, two of the country's leading players, carried the Middlesex flag high in scoring an outstanding double in the National men's and women's pairs at Coventry.

Jeremy partnered Oxfordshire's Keith Bennett to win the men's title, fighting off the efforts of 66 rival partnerships, and Heather teamed with Nora Smith (London) to take top spot in the women's contest, ahead of 72 other pairs.

It was a fairly close call for Jeremy and Keith, but Heather and Nora finished nearly four percentage points clear of the field.

Ben Green (Warwickshire) and Glyn Preece (Worcestershire) were second in the men's pairs, with David Kendrick and Victor Milman (Cambs and Hunts) third.

Chris Duckworth and Agnes Wesseling (both London) were second in the women's pairs, with Nicola Smith (Middlesex) and Kitty Teltscher third.

Top spot in the National Swiss teams, played at Leeds, went to Peter Kaufmann, Dick Shek (both Middlesex), Peter Czerniewski and Marc Smith (both London), whose score of 185 put them 10vps ahead of second-placed Alan Oddie, Jon Williams (both Bedfordshire), Matthew Hoskins and Southwell (both Andrew Sussex). Third place went to Giles Foster (Yorkshire), John Armstrong (Derbyshire), Willy Crook (Nottinghamshire) and Tony McNiff (Yorkshire).

The National women's teams, played at Bromsgrove, saw the Somerset quartet of Caroline Macpherson, Jackie Waters, Sheila Coda and Gina Howard carry off the Whitelaw Cup. In the final they beat Hedy Brown, Pat Dowdeswell (both Berks and Bucks), Valery Austwick (Avon) and Lynne Hayes (Oxfordshire) 75-36.

#### NON-STOP BRIDGE CLAIMS POUR IN

## I played without sleep for 92 hours


MY world record was set in October 1964, playing rubber bridge during rag week in a car showroom in the centre of Newcastle. I was a second-year undergraduate at Newcastle University and the event was organised by the university bridge club.

Play began at 5pm on a Thursday evening, with 20 contenders in action at five tables. Three players outlasted the others – Eric Bell, Colin Bowen and me. Eric lasted until Saturday afternoon (about 46 hours) and Colin until Sunday morning (about 62 hours).

By 7pm that Sunday I reached 74 hours and had broken the existing record by an hour. At this point we considered stopping, but as I felt fine we carried on and continued until 1pm the following day. I had played constantly without sleep for 92 hours and was awake in total for 10l hours. For food I had the odd takeaway, eaten at the table, plus snacks.

It all seems so crazy now, but I suffered no ill effects and afterwards I slept solidly for 15 hours.

The event was properly organised. There were four in play at all times and the play and procedure was supervised throughout by members of the club. The club later presented me with a pewter tankard, suitably inscribed, which I still

have, but have never used for fear of being carried away by those men in white coats.

I did not realise that in John Williams's Bristol account all four players did the record. In Newcastle it was just me, so I suppose the two records are not the same.

As to other attempts I remember the Guinness Book of Records stating that four students in Edinburgh had done 114 hours in 1965 or 1966, but I don't know any details. – Mike Gourley, Wakefield

# Our 1963 effort extended the world record by two hours

AT 1pm on Friday March 22 1963 four students from the North Polytechnic, London, studying for degrees in rubber technology, chemistry and physics, claimed a new world record of 92 hours of non-stop bridge. They reckoned to have extended the previous record by two hours.

Taking part were Roderick Anderson, 19, Ronald Frost, 20, Richard Connor, 20, and Ian Kerr, 19. They played in a shop window belonging to British Relay Wireless Ltd, whose manager carried on normal business throughout the week.

At the finish the record breakers were in excellent spirits and looked remarkably fresh. This, they said, was due to the excellent food that the girls of the domestic science department of the college had supplied and to regular washing and shaving. Apparently in other attempts on the record the participants had emerged bedraggled, with cobwebs and beards.

The money collected by the enthusiastic young bridge players went to the Northern Group of Hospitals. – Peter Hasenson, Brent Street, London NW4 1PB

## We played for 140 hours in 1965

I WAS very interested to read your account of the achievement of the St John's Wood Bridge Club in setting up an official world record for the longest game of cards. Way back in 1965 I was one of a group of five sixth formers from St Bede's Grammar School in Bradford that played a charity match in the window of a disused shop in the middle of Bradford, in full view of all the Christmas shoppers.

We managed the planned 140 hours without any real problem and as we were only five players we each played for 20

hours and then took five hours break in turn, so there were always four of us playing. By the end we had settled into something like a routine and could probably have gone on for weeks. But then we were only 18 and 19 years old ...

In the street outside volunteers from the sixth form union collected more than £500 for Dr Barnardo's (In 1965 that amount would have bought a house in Bradford). We also had the support of the town council and various other organisations, with a local restaurant giving us all

a square meal every day.

I have all this in a report from the Bradford Telegraph and Argus of December 1965, complete with a photo of the Lord Mayor presenting us with a plaque to mark the record. I wonder what happened to that?

I play my bridge these days at the very friendly Wakefield club, but four hours at a time is enough now. I very much enjoy reading the excellent magazine. Keep up the good work. – Stephen Hanslip, EBU member 116800



#### Camrose trials only

THERE is no European teams championship or other major championship in 2005 and the EBU selection committee has decided not to hold trials for the purpose of sending an official team to the European Open Championship.

Accordingly open trials in 2004-05 will be held solely for the purpose of selecting teams to represent England in the Camrose Trophy.

From 2004-05 the format of the Camrose Trophy has been changed. Instead of each country playing each other country in a one weekend head-to-head match, the number of weekends will be reduced from five to two.

## You do not have the right to remain silent



Terry Dwyer, who runs a small club near Loughborough, has this offering for players tempted to pass when it is the last thing they should do!

EXPERTS pass on - there is nothing here for you. It is for learners, improvers and some, perhaps, of that vast army of seasoned players who might sometimes admit to making mistakes.

'I couldn't bid, partner, I didn't have enough points.' How many times have you offered this excuse when partner goes down in a bad contract? And are you sure

you were right to say this?

The thing about having a 'too-weak' hand is that you shouldn't volunteer a bid that might mislead partner into thinking you have some strength. But many, many times a bid from you is obligatory even without strength. For example, I am sure you know to give a 24 negative response to an opening 24 from partner, even with zero points - and to keep bidding till game is reached. He can see game in his own hand and simply wants your help in arriving at the best place to play it. Indeed, it may occasionally take a mere queen and jack in your hand to turn his game-going hand into a slam. But let's take some more mundane situations first.

#### Bidding after a double

Example 1: 1 - Dbl - Pass - ?

Only a raw beginner would not realise that a pass here shows a hand with lots of trumps, expecting 14 to go down. Otherwise you must bid something even on the poorest values (sometimes even a three-card suit).

Example 2: 1♠ - Dbl - 2♣ - ?

Here we all know that the intervening 24 bid lets us off the hook and we can safely pass on a weak hand. Bidding here is voluntary and shows a bit of strength.

Example 3: 1 - Dbl - Rdbl - ?

You know that in the first example the weaker you are the more important it is for you to bid and here it is even more important, because responder's call is not a new contract, but a magnification of the opening bid. Yet I have seen many a player believe that this situation is the same as Example 2. It isn't, it's like Example 1 only more so. What if you pass and so does opener? He is now playing in a safe 14 redoubled (equals game!) and probably plus redoubled overtricks (Ever worked out what they cost?). You have put partner on the spot. He needs your longest suit; you must bid so that he doesn't guess wrongly. If your only suit is spades you

#### Rescuing

Example 4: 1NT - Dbl - ?

Assuming the double to be for penalties, partner could be in trouble, especially if playing the weak no trump. Maybe you have to pass, but not if you hold a five-card suit, however weak. Take him out into two of your suit; don't try 'I couldn't bid, partner, I didn't have enough points.' The weaker you are, the more crucial it is to bid, provided you have a five-card suit or longer. Yes, this could go down, but usually not as many as 1NT would. It's called damage limitation. In fact, with a five-plus suit and a weak hand you should take him out even if he isn't doubled.

#### Showing preference

Perhaps you are bored by this article so

Example 5: 1 - Pass - 1NT - Pass 24 - Pass - ?

Whenever partner offers two suits (and you are minimal) you are supposed to show preference, and if in fact you prefer hearts, you have to go 3♥! (Or preferably 3NT, if you can see it). No use saying couldn't bid at the three level, partner, I didn't have enough points.' You have left partner in the wrong contract (Well, you haven't got four spades, have you?) The crux is that your partner has enough points for both of you (normally 16+), else he has bid badly. By making a high reverse bid, he is promising safety at the three level. So go there!

What do you make of this one? (This is an actual hand that I suffered from once,

my partner passing throughout):

Example 6: 14 -44 - 44 -3♠ -Pass - 5♣ - Pass - Pass Dbl - Pass - Pass - ?

XXXX Axxxx XXX

Both sides vulnerable, by the way. You had better see your hand at this point: Well? You are not strong,

are you? Are you not entitled to pass? At the five level? Partner has been bidding like a madman and asking for trouble and now he has got it, eh?

Let us stop treating partner like an enemy and give him a bit of help. What has he shown you? It's five clubs and at least five diamonds, isn't it? Well, he needs preference, so give it. It costs nothing to go 50, which may not even be doubled. In fact, when you think about it, your third pass was wrong, wasn't it?

AKQXX

Your partner's hand: Analysis - 4♠ should make for -620; if you pass, 5♠ doubled goes four down for -1100; if

you bid, 50 doubled goes two down for -500; 5♦ if not doubled goes two down for

Makes you think, doesn't it? Well, I hope so.

#### Strange bids

Now let us put you in a different category: You and your partner, probably at his instigation, are trying to play some bidding techniques that go a bit beyond the beginners' stage. And we will suppose that partner has a sound grasp of these techniques and you don't, either because they are a bit new to you or you can't quite remember them, or for any other reason you like.

But the main point is this: partner is coming up with a bid you don't understand, or can't remember how to treat.

I bet your first instinct in these cases is to say mentally 'I don't know what this is about; I've bid my hand correctly and I'm pretty weak. I had better pass.' Believe me, a pass is the last thing you should do. Try these examples:

Example 7: 1 - Pass - 4 - Pass

Example 8: 1 → - Pass - 2 → - Pass 34 - Pass - ? Example 9: 1♥ - 2♥ - Pass - ?

Example 10: Pass - 1 → - Pass - 2♣ 2NT - Pass -?

In every case a pass from you would be fatal. I'm not going to explain what your partner means in these examples; the main point is that you are in doubt about his meaning.

But surely the one obvious thing about all these bids is that partner cannot possibly want to play in the contract concerned. So don't leave him there. Go to a safe bid. Even a guess is probably better than nothing.

#### Summary

It may be helpful to recognise four common situations where we should think deeply before passing:

1) Preference. Partner has bid two suits. Am I leaving him in the wrong one?

2) Rescue. Partner is in a dangerous contract. Would my long suit be better?

3) Convention. That bid doesn't make sense as it is. Is he asking me something?

4) Forcing bids. Of course we never

pass those, do we?

To keep out of trouble we must beware of tunnel vision: seeing only our own hand. Look across the table with imagination and logic and try to visualise partner's hand as well as your own. Looking again at that perennial excuse, we can derive two valuable principles from it, to guide us in future:

1) 'I didn't have the points' should

become 'Have WE got the points?' 2) 'I couldn't bid, partner...' should be replaced by 'There is perhaps something I should do.


Clutch this precept firmly to your

Pass' ALWAYS means 'There is nothing I can do to improve the situation'.

Now the only excuse left is 'Sorry, partner, I should have bid'.

SET to make 3NT you receive a heart lead, which you win in dummy with the queen. Both opponents duck the first diamond and, after your left hand opponent shows out on the second round, his partner ducks again.

If you did not anticipate at trick one what might happen you have missed your way. You should have put the ▼10 on dummy's queen. After you discover the nasty diamond break you lead a club to the ace and, when you have lost a diamond, you want them to take ▼A, on which go the jack and king. And then, you hope, they lead another heart, chortling awhile. You wanted them to think that your hearts were 2-2, so that they can put their snouts in the trough straight away. When you win the trick with the sneaky nine and make your contract, the look of horror on their faces is like a sunny day by the seaside.



#### SOLUTION TO THE FEBRUARY COMPETITION

Nowadays life is not so simple. A plain raise of 1NT to 2NT is not possible for those who use  $2 \triangleq$  as a transfer to diamonds (called four-suited transfers). For them the only way of raising to 2NT is via Stayman, whether or not they hold a four-card major. The implication is that  $1NT - 2 \triangleq -2 \triangleq -2NT$  does not guarantee a four-card major, but  $1NT - 2 \triangleq -2 \triangleq -3NT$  does show a four-card major. This is called non-promissory Stayman.

Playing non-promissory Stayman (b) is correct. This should be forcing at least for one round and perhaps to game. That depends on partnership agreement.

AS a general principle, a new suit at the four level in an uncontested auction after an opening bid at the one level, should be a cue bid. Therefore with (a) your second bid should be 3. Nowadays this is played as unconditionally game forcing, showing a four-card major and at least four clubs.

With (c) you want to reassure partner that hearts are trumps and then use Blackwood. An immediate 4NT would be quantitative, so start with 3\(\text{\Lambda}\), a cue bid agreeing hearts. 3\(\text{\Lambda}\) cannot be natural because with five spades you would have started with a transfer,

Note that if East has three hearts that could be three heart stoppers, while if East has four small hearts there may be no heart

With (c) you should jump to 3NT without using Stayman. You have plenty of points for game, but the most likely thing to defeat you is finding a grotty 4-4 spade fit and running into a bad trump break.

No difference if playing non-promissory Stayman.






