# How your answers will help us to help you

# By Sally Bugden

THANK you, each and every one of the almost 5,000 of you who completed the first membership survey the English Bridge Union has undertaken.

For the EBU this is step one on the road to be truly representative of the majority of our members, so that we can provide the type of services required to make bridge in England enjoyable at every level.

So why did we decide to undertake such a huge task? Well, in order to ensure that we invest in the right activities it is necessary to be aware of all your likes and dislikes about the bridge service you currently receive.

We wanted to know your playing habits, so that the right balance can be struck in terms of the number of competitions that are organised.

We wanted to know your preferences in English Bridge, so that the magazine contains the items you want to read and to which you react and interact with. We wanted to know what makes bridge a great game for you, so that we can concentrate on improving these areas and remove those that you find unpalatable. This will also help us recruit new players to the game, because what attracted you is likely to attract others and what puts you off is likely to put off

We wanted to know how you would like us to communicate with you so that we can ensure you know what is happening in the bridge world.

We also wanted to know a little demographic information about you so that we are aware who we are talking to, where you come from, how old you are and what you do. This will help us to identify markets that we can target for new bridge players and members and assist us with

commercial matters such as advertising sales and possible sponsorship deals.

And finally we wanted to ensure that our membership had the opportunity to take part in further consultation exercises on our ideas and activities.

Our analysis took longer than we expected as only 45% of those who took part in the survey completed it online. This, of course, meant that we had to manually input 55% of the results, which was time consuming and interesting in that our survey shows that 75% of you have access to the Internet at home.

# No penalties this year folks

THE EBU Laws and Ethics Committee met recently to consider player reaction following changes made and published in the new Orange Book in 2006. The reaction has been mixed, in particular to annoucements and to the reduction in high-level alerts, and the committee decided to revisit these topics at its meeting in May to see if adjustments will bring a better experience for players. It will also be undertaking a consultation exercise on these issues among a small number of clubs and then the wider membership, which will be completed by September 2007. In the meantime the period when no penalties will be applied will be extended for a further year.

A large and mostly unfavourable correspondence has been received on the topic of what the minimum values are for an artificial two-level opening and it was decided to make some changes to this area to assist those players who are finding that they cannot open 24 or 24 on distributional hands that they consider strong.

The case for restricting what can be opened as an artificial two is the difficulty of defending against it when you don't know the suit. If relatively weak hands in terms of high card points are allowed then it is more likely that the opposition will want to intervene.

Most players confronted with, say, a natural strong 2♥ opener who have 15+ points with short hearts, will make a takeout double, but it is a lot less clear as to what to do if the opening bid is 2♣. Some protection for players is considered necessary by the L&E, but there was also acceptance that the minimum strength for a two-level opener may not have been set correctly.

The revised rule will apply to artificial two-

level openings and strong one-level openers such as a Precision Club.

To open an artificial bid of this sort you will need to satisfy ONE of the conditions that follow:

- A minimum of 16 high card points or
- A hand that conforms to the rule of 25 (you add your high card points to your two longest suits to see if you satisfy this condition) or
- The hand contains as a minimum the normal high card strength associated with a one-level opening bid and has a minimum of eight clear-cut tricks.

This change will come into force on August 1, as the L&E has committed to introduce changes to the *Orange Book* only once each year.

# Vhat the survey revealed

CLUB membership: Of the members who responded to the EBU survey 54% indicated that you belong to two or three bridge clubs and 34% to one club, with Master Points issued by 95% of the clubs. The majority of you, 56%, play at your clubs two or three times a week. Only 12% play online bridge, with Bridge Club Live and Bridge Base Online having an equal split of players.

Tournament play: We were extremely pleased to note that 68% of those who responded play in tournaments, with 44% of the tournament players taking part in one to five county events a year and another 41% playing in national EBU tournaments one to five times a year. National knockout tournaments are less popular, with only 20% competing in these. However, 46% of you contest local knockouts and league events.

National simultaneous pairs showed 55% participation and local sim pairs 45%.

Enjoyment of bridge: An impressive 90% rated their enjoyment of duplicate pairs 'high' or 'very high', with Swiss teams in second place at 54%. Only 10% of you gave a high rating to rubber bridge and Chicago bridge.

Merseyside, Warwickshire

More than 90% rate their enjoyment of duplicate bridge 'high' or 'very high'

The vast majority like bridge for its intellectual challenge, sociability and competitiveness

Bridge breaks/holidays at home and overseas are taken by nearly half of the respondents, and nearly a quarter sail away on bridge cruises each year.

Your likes and dislikes: Intellectual challenge is what the vast majority rate the most important attraction of bridge - 95% of you giving this aspect your vote. The opportunity to keep on learning is also high on your list, with 83% ticking the 'important' or 'very important' boxes.

As for your dislikes 96% go for bad behaviour as the number one in this category, with unwelcoming ambience also receiving a big thumbs down at 86%.

English Bridge: Not surprisingly, 97% of those who responded read English Bridge, the EBU members' magazine. But what do they make of the content? Well, David Bird's Beat Today's Experts is rated most popular at 49%, with readers' letters a close second on 46%. Your least favourite items are book reviews with 12%, Prize Play with 18% and results with 20%.

Of the respondents 65% read other

bridge magazines, with Bridge from Mr Bridge rated highest at 42%.

Communications: The majority of you still wish to receive English Bridge in hard copy, with only 20% stating they would like to receive the magazine electronically if it came with a discounted membership subscription. Only 22% would prefer an electronic newsletter to English Bridge if this, too, gave you a discount on membership payment.

We were told by 80% of you that you do not want to receive information about your tournament preferences by email.

Our thanks go to the 60% of you who want to take part in further research. We will be consulting you in the very near

About You: Of those who completed the survey 63% are retired, with 35% under the age of 61 and 65% over that age. It was interesting to see that 6% of the respondents were over 80 and only 2% under the age of 40.

Your occupation, including that of those of you who are retired, shows education to be highest, closely followed by accountancy and finance.

Another interesting - and surprising statistic is that 61% of respondents are male, against 39% female: surprising in that we know from our club research that the male/female ratio in clubs is the exact opposite.

# Your comments - our response

IN the comments section of the survey 15% of you decided to give us your views about aspects of our operations. Understandably these comments were varied and wide ranging and as such were in some cases difficult to analyse.

However, the majority of those comments were against Master Points, with a 50-50 split between them being irrelevant or too expensive. The EBU itself came in for criticism, but this was balanced by a similar amount of you complimenting us.

Substantial concern was voiced about announcements and alerts. We received more criticism than praise for our tournaments. Some of you commented on the EBU's perceived elitist attitudes to the detriment of 'ordinary players', while others mentioned the need to get young people involved.

What next? First, in response to your concerns on announcements and alerts, we have spoken with the laws and ethics committee and you will see from the item on page three that we will be delaying the implementation of penalties with reference to the new announcing and alert regulations and in the summer will be consulting you via another online survey to obtain your views on this subject so that we can resolve your worries.

Players who do not behave properly at our congresses will be dealt with firmly – our TDs will be issuing penalties for infringements of the Best Behaviour at

# Great bridge shop

THE EBU Bridge Shop and its discounts are recognised by 89% of members. In a separate survey undertaken among clubs last year those who use it find the service and product range excellent.

# Who filled in the forms?

A LARGE percentage of those who responded to the survey are retired (63%) and of these 11% are retired from education. Interestingly most common occupation of the remainder is education (4%) and least common is customer service (0.19%).

Hinckley is the new venue for many of our national tournaments, replacing Kettering. This is already receiving good feedback, but we will not rest on our laurels. The tournament committee has started a review of all its operations to ensure it is meeting our players' needs.

New faces in the game are reliant on good teachers, welcoming clubs and accessible tournaments. I would like to mention our Partner Teacher initiative again. We hope to increase the number of new players to bridge clubs through this method of teaching *Bridge for All*. We still have places on our residential course at Hinckley on April 13-15 and on our non-residential course in Brighton on August 13-14. Go to

the website and click on Education then Partner Teachers for further details. Existing EBUTA teachers can attend part of the course to convert to Partner Teacher status if they wish.

Membership development activities include addressing the types of services we offer to our clubs and individual members. Publicity and communications within the realms of our membership and externally in the media will also be on our agenda.

Many of you have mentioned that you would like a national ranking scheme. This is a possibility and involves the development of software that will allow us to analyse all the results from our clubs and competitions. It is something for the future, but we are currently exploring its application.

As a national bridge organisation it is our duty to develop bridge in this country at every level and for every age group and that is something the EBU is passionate about. We are committed to making bridge playing in England more welcoming and user friendly.

Finally I would like to say thank you to Bridge Overseas for offering its £500 bridge holiday voucher as an incentive for you to complete the survey and leave you with this comment from Mrs J Whelen, who was one of our survey respondents: 'Bridge is a great game, the best. I just feel sorry for those who never had the chance to learn.'

The EBU is here to give people that chance.

The percentages in this survey have been rounded up or down to the nearest whole number to ensure ease of reading.

4,600 members completed the survey. Due to copy date requirements for *English Bridge* the survey statistics given here are based on 4,293 returns.

# Panel delivers reprimand

AN EBU Disciplinary Panel recently considered the imposition of sanctions against Michael Byrne, following a complaint from Sarah Teshome. This related to comments made by the operator Mr Byrne during the course of a BBO Vugraph commentary.

Mr Byrne had been charged by the EBU Laws and Ethics Committee with making insulting and offensive remarks, judged to be conduct or behaviour falling below the standards required of EBU members.

The panel took into account Mr Byrne's prompt admission of the charge and written apology to Ms Teshome; also his previously impressive and unblemished record in the service of the game – to which a number of players had drawn attention in writing. It considered that the only sanction imposed should be a formal admonition, such to stand on the record as a warning regarding future conduct. However, the panel also recognised that Mr Byrne's inappropriate words and behaviour had caused Ms Teshome considerable offence and distress. It took the view, therefore, that a published statement on the matter was imperative in order to re-emphasise Ms Teshome's acknowledged standing as a player and person of integrity.

# England beat all the other countries - but not the Holders!

# Colin Simpson's Camrose report


THE second and final weekend of the 2007 Camrose Trophy was hosted by the Northern District of the Scottish Bridge Union at the Thistle Hotel at Aberdeen Airport. A good number of spectators turned up for each of the sessions of play, whether to sit with the players in the open room or watch in the Vugraph Theatre. Also Bridge Base Online showed the action online.

England was represented by an entirely different team from the first Weekend: Tom Townsend and David Gold, Martin Jones and Neil Rosen, David Bakhshi and David Price, with Colin Simpson npc.

The last two pairs, although experienced Camrose campaigners, had not played before in the competition in these partnerships. It was also the npc's first, and many would say should be his only time as captain.


We started on Friday evening about half-a-match behind the Holders ie the Republic of Ireland, who most unfortunately had suffered withdrawals from their team due to family illness and the wife of one of the players producing a premature, but very healthy baby.

The first of five 32-board matches was against the auld enemy Scotland and in many ways set the tone for the whole weekend. All three pairs played well, but lacked a little sparkle. Neil Rosen produced a game swing by some enterprising bidding on the following exhibit:




As dealer South Neil opened 14; not a bid to be recommended to children or those of a nervous disposition. After spade interference and some game – forcing bidding from partner he wisely supressed his heart tolerance and ended in the ever popular 3NT. West naively led a spade and that wrapped up the contract.

The second and crucial encounter was against the Holders. We started in desperate fashion, conceding big swings in the first two boards, and it must be admitted



After this serious reverse everyone picked up their performance and we won the three remaining matches against Wales, the Republic of Ireland (remember as the Holders they had two teams to balance the numbers) and Northern Ireland. David Gold produced some fine card play to produce a slam swing against Northern Ireland.



With no interference the auction was  $1 \checkmark - 1 • - 3 •$  (game force)  $- 3 \checkmark - 3 • - 4 •$  (cue bid)  $- 4NT(RKCB) - 5 \checkmark - 6 •$  (club control?)  $- 6 \checkmark$  (No).

A diamond was led and declarer found the bad news in trumps, eventually giving West the fourth round. West returned another diamond and declarer took stock. Superficially the Law of Vacant Spaces would indicate that East would be more likely to hold the extstrengtharpoonup Q as he had only one heart to his partner's four. However, East had been discarding diamonds with abandon and also to play East for the critical card he would have to hold Q, Q x or Q x x.

The important extra chance was that West could have any of these holdings, but also Q x x x. Gold backed his judgement and gained a big swing.

The victory banquet and prize giving produced the anomaly that England won all the cups for the head-to-head matches over the two weekends against the other four countries but the Holders (Republic of Ireland) retained the Camrose Trophy for the third year running, a tremendous victory considering their severely reduced team.

Final standings: Holders 199vps, England 171vps, Wales 155vps Scotland 131vps, Republic of Ireland 127vps and Northern Ireland 109vps.






# The Tollemache ours at last

GLOUCESTERSHIRE had its first success in the Tollemache competition this year. It was a long wait – six of the 10 players also competed in Gloucestershire's first appearance in the final, back in 1991, and some of them played in qualifying rounds in the 1960s!

The team performed with remarkable consistency throughout, winning each match by at least 40 imps, before losing the last round to Middlesex. The biggest single gain came from collecting penalties at all four tables, and amounted to 41 imps. Next best were the four plus scores we obtained against Manchester on this hand:




All four tables played in spades – three of them in 4♠ and one Gloucestershire pair in 2♠. The auction usually started with a 1♠ opener from East and when the club lead drew the king against Joe Angseesing, he won, drew one trump and then led a heart. The ◆10 return was won by the king and by using the three dummy entries to lead up to the ◆A and to take two heart ruffs, Joe came to 10 tricks.

Where the opening lead was the •Q



there were not as many entries available. Declarer won the king and played a heart, but when he used the •K entry to play clubs, he ended up leading the •A from his own hand and when that was ruffed he could not recover. Both of our defenders collected four tricks against 4•.

Another 4st contract, this time against Surrey, also offered scope to both defenders and declarer:



One of the opponents put forward the North cards – first in hand at favourable vulnerability – as a 1NT opener, purporting to show 9-11 points. The result was that Richard Butland got to play in 2. He was favoured by a diamond lead and

wrapped up 12 tricks. The weak opener had backfired. Richard's +230 was a very useful score as, with North silent, all the other East-Wests ended up in 4\*going down!

Against all three tables in 4♠ the lead was ♥J. Declarer won the king each time and played back a heart to the ♥9 and ♥A, and then ducked the diamond return to South's king. A second diamond left him in hand and he tried spades. North won the ♠K and led a club to South's king and that was one off. Three times!

The successful team was Joe Angseesing and Graham Sadie, John Atthey and Richard Butland, Richard Chamberlain and Andrew Kambites, Paul Denning and Patrick Shields, John Rookwood and Derek Rue, with Judy Sanis as npc and Anne Swannell as our faithful scorer. Keith Stanley was instrumental in helping us qualify, but could not play in the final.

# Next trials for England places

THE EBU selection committee has agreed a programme of trials for the Camrose Trophy, Lady Milne Trophy and the open and women's events in the 2008 European Championships as follows:

The open trials are for teams of four. Up to 12 teams will be selected, of which up to four will be exempted to stage two. Stage one will be on September 15-16 at West Midlands Bridge Club.

Eight teams, including the exempted teams, will contest stage two, which will be over two weekends, October 27-28 at Young Chelsea BC and November 10-11 at West Midlands BC, with the top four qualifying for a knockout weekend. At this stage the teams for the Camrose Trophy will be selected, with the top qualifiers guaranteed at least one match.

A single long weekend, February 23-25 at Young Chelsea BC, will be devoted to the semi-finals and final, with the winning team to represent England in the 2008 European

Championships, along with a third pair to be selected from among bona fide applicants to the trials.

Teams wishing to take part are invited to apply to Sandra Claridge at Aylesbury or by email to claridge31@tiscali.co.uk by June 30.

The women's contest for England places will comprise a pairs trial over two weekends, with no exemptions and the possibility of dropping some pairs after the first weekend. Otherwise scores over the two weekends will be cumulative, cross-imped. The first weekend will be January 5-6 (venue to be confirmed) and the second one February 16-18 at Young Chelsea BC.

The top two pairs will be selected for the Lady Milne Trophy, but no guarantees are made in regard to the European Championships.

Pairs wishing to play should send their entry to Sandra Claridge as above by October 31.

# Using the takeout double

LAST issue we discussed the sort of hand that could make an overcall. A simple overcall might be made on a strong hand, but often it will be a hand that would not open the bidding. If it's a weaker hand it shows at least a five-card suit with good high cards. The fewer the points, the better the suit should be.

This means that when your partner opens the bidding and the next hand overcalls, your right hand opponent may have made the bid with the intention of interfering in your auction. Sometimes you have a hand that can still make its natural response, but sometimes the overcall cuts out the bid you wanted to make. For example:

#### ♠854 VK 109 +QJ2 ♣Q973

Partner opens 1 and you plan a response of 1NT to show your 6-9 HCP without a four-card major. But what should you do when your right hand opponent (RHO) overcalls 1 ? This has not stopped you making a bid, since you were not planning to respond 1 . But should it change your 1NT response?

You could now pass, since partner must get another chance to bid. But with eight HCP you would like to say something. Even if partner has a minimum 13 HCP your side has more than half of the points.

You could bid 1NT, but it is unattractive when you know you are going to get a spade lead through partner's spade strength (if any) and coming up to your weak holding.

You could bid 24, showing the values for a two-level response and at least four clubs. But eight HCP is poor for a two-level response and the club suit is too weak to compensate for the lack of high cards.

You could raise partner to 2, normally showing four-card support and 6-9 points. Despite being one diamond short, this is now the best response. Partner should be aware that the overcall might have altered your response.

On the next hands the overcall of partner's 1 has definitely taken away your natural bid.

### ♠85 ♥ K 1094 ♦ Q J 2 ♠ Q 9 7 3

You were planning to respond 1♥, when RHO's 1♠ overcall stopped you.

You could still respond 2•, but now you have an alternative. A double of an overcall is for takeout. It shows the values for a response and at least two places to play. You will have one, usually both, unbid majors. So you can double 1• and partner will know you definitely have four hearts and somewhere else the hand can be played. If partner responds 1NT, 2•, 2• or 2• you will pass. But you have enough to raise 3• to 4• or 2NT to 3NT.

#### ♠Q973 ♥K1094 ♦QJ2 ♣85

You would have responded 1♥ to 1♠, but RHO overcalls 2♠. Now you can make your takeout double, which normally shows four cards in each major. If partner just rebids 2♠, 2♥ or 2♠ you will pass. But you have just enough to raise a response of 3♥ or 3♠ to game.

#### ♠ A Q 8 3 ♥ K 10 9 4 ♦ Q J 2 ♣ 8 5

You were planning to respond 1♥ when RHO's 1♠ overcall stopped you. So you double to show your hearts and partner responds 2♠. What now? You could put partner back to 2♠, but with 12 HCP and spades well stopped, you are strong enough to bid 2NT. With the ♥Q instead of the ♥4 you could bid 3NT.

Partner opens 1♣ and RHO overcalls 1♥. What do you bid with the following?

#### (a) ♠ J 1093 ♥ Q 74 ♦ K 8 6 2 ♠ Q 6

Double – Shows four spades, plus another place to play. Pass if 2♠ is partner's rebid

### (b) ♠QJ1032 ♥Q4 ♦ K862 ♠64

Bid 1♠ – Shows five spades, since double would show four

#### (c) \* K J 7 6 \* 5 \* K 10 8 4 \* Q 6 4 2

Double – Shows four spades. Raise clubs if partner rebids them

### (d) ♠ A Q J 10 6 ♥ 4 ♦ A J 10 ♠ K Q 6 4

Bid 2♠ – A jump in a new suit is game forcing; slam is possible


### (e) ♠ J 9 7 ♥ Q 10 8 6 ♦ A 6 4 ♣ K 9 8

Bid 1NT – Stronger over 1♥; say 7-10 HCP and hearts well stopped


#### (f) ♠7 V- ♦ A 8 6 4 3 2 ♣ K 10 9 6 5 4

Bid 5♣ – You have lots of tricks, but not much defence

Here are some hands my students played. In each case West opened and RHO overcalled 14:




Brenda doubled with her four hearts and when Linda showed 15-16 points with her 1NT rebid, she went to game.



Janet could only bid 2 vover the double, as she would have if John had responded 1 v. But John had extra points for his double and could bid game.



When Eddie doubled, Robert, with strong playing strength and only five losers, bid 4.



If you want to make a penalty double of the overcall, you can't! Double is for takeout, so what you must do is pass and wait for partner to reopen with a takeout double. Peter argued about this, but in the end he passed and Margaret reopened with a takeout double. Peter led the &K, Margaret played her &A and led her &2. Declarer was unlucky that dummy had no points and only one spade, but the penalty conceded was 800. Overcalling isn't always profitable!



# Beat today's experts

### 1. E-W game, dealer West



WE start with a deal from the first Camrose weekend, with England facing Scotland. What should you open on that big East hand? With strong Acol two bids gradually vanishing into the mists of history, the choice lies between a simple 1 and a full-blooded 2.

Holland opted for a one bid and conjured a force on the next round by reversing into his three-card heart suit. 2NT by responder would have been artificial now, covering all weak hands (a method known as Blackout). Armstrong's actual 3 was therefore forcing. Over the valueshowing 34 Armstrong had an obvious 3NT bid with his powerful stopper in the unbid suit.

Was the action over? Not at all! Holding excellent trumps and a wealth of controls, Holland went all the way to the excellent 6 at his next turn. Well bid.

At the other table Walker, for Scotland, opened 2NT on the East cards. What do you make of that choice? I don't like the look of it. It is not so much the singleton club that offends me, but the huge playing strength. If partner sees fit to bid opposite a 2NT opening, he will usually respond to a 1 opening, so you are not gaining much by opening with the stronger bid. West went through the fit-finding machinery before ending lamely in 3NT. Eleven tricks were made and England picked up a well-deserved 12imps. After the second weekend's play, they eventually finished second to the strong team from the Irish Republic (heading for the Bermuda Bowl), which was a big improvement on previous vears.

This deal comes from an encounter between Japan and China in the 2006 Pacific-Asian championships, held in Shanghai. East's 2 was the new 'minor forcing' convention, similar to our use of 2♠ as Crowhurst over here. It asked for further information about the opener's hand. When Imakura showed his heart support, Ino took a surprisingly pessimistic view of his two doubleton queens, signing off in game.

What East needed to do was to pass the message 'I have strong hearts and there is a chance of a slam.' A few decades ago this would have been simply achieved via an original jump shift to 2. A few players would still make a jump shift, even nowadays, on that East hand.


Even if the strong jump shift is not part of your methods, you can issue the same message with a jump to 3 vover the 1NT rebid. Since you would employ 2♣ or 2♦ to look for a three-card fit for your fivecard major, a jump to the three level shows a hand more like that held by East

Once there is a sniff of a slam in the air oxen and wainropes would not keep West from the six level. He has heart support, a hand rich in controls and a ruffing value.

Aided by a substantial swing on this board, China eventually won the open championship, with Japan in second place. In the women's event China started as a heavy favourite, but New Zealand finished first, just ahead of Australia.

### 3. Love all, dealer North




This is another deal from the 2006 PABF championship, with China facing Chinese Taipei. The two East players took greatly different views of the potential of their hand.


Fu Zhong opened 3♥ for Chinese Taipei and the Chinese East had nothing sensible to bid over this. What should East do, however, when his partner protects with 3♠? Jess Sun looked at his impressive double stopper in hearts and thought '3NT might be a good idea here.' Unfortunately, Zhao Jie (South for China) looked at his six clubs to the ace-10 and thought 'A club lead might be a good idea here?

North was not averse to a lead of tha suit and 3NT went three down.

The time to risk 3NT, when you have support for partner's long major, is when you think that there might be nine trick available, but not 10. East had sufficien support for spades here to expect at leas 10 tricks to be available in 4. There wa no need to bid 3NT, risking the club sit uation.

At the other table, after the same start Yang (East for China) cue-bid 4♥ ove 3♠, to suggest a spade slam. His partne signed off in 44 and 11 tricks were made ■ Awards: 4 - 10, 5 - 6, 5 / 3NT - 3





We move next to the Norwegian Premier League, with two strong teams in opposition. Grotheim's 24 opening was natural and Tundal spurned a negative double, deeming it more important to show his five-card spade suit. How should he react when partner gives him a game raise in spades?


It was possible that East held the four missing key cards in the black suits. Since he had chosen to bid 4 instead of 4, it was also quite likely that East held a useful singleton diamond. Taking a rosy view of the prospects, Tundal opted for RKCB. When he heard of two aces and the trump queen opposite, he duly bid 6. It was a very poor slam. North cashed a heart trick and switched to a trump. Declarer drew

trumps and ran the AQ to the singleton king, ending two down. (He needed six club tricks to provide four diamond discards, so dropping the singleton king of clubs would not have been good enough.)

Who should we blame for straying so high? Had East bid 4\* instead of 4\*, West might have diagnosed the duplication in hearts. Still, I assign most of the blame to West. He was guilty of hoping that partner held the perfect cards. At the very most West should have suggested a slam with a cue-bid of 5\*. A continuation of 5\* - 5\* might have brought the auction to a slightly safer halt.

Awards: 4 - 10, 5 - 7, 5 - 6, slams - 3.

### 5. Game all, dealer North



The Netherlands faced a team containing Polish and Russian players in the final of the 12th NEC Cup contested in Yokohama.

Bertens, for the Netherlands, opened 24 on the North cards. This could be either very strong, as in Acol, or a weak two bid in diamonds. The Russian East, Gromov, passed for the moment.

When the 2• response was passed by North he knew that he was competing against a weak two bid.

Gromov doubled for take-out and the bidding continued as it would have done after a more normal start of 2• – Dbl. What interpretation should be put on 3•? You hear players saying 'it shows a very strong raise of spades'.

With such a hand you could raise to 4.


or perhaps cue-bid 4. The 3. bid should indicate a very strong hand that does not include primary spade support.

When Gromov subsequently bid 4, Dubinin noted that his partner had not made this call on the previous round and therefore must hold a very strong hand. His raise to 5, was a finely judged effort and allowed Gromov to raise to the slam. It had been an impressive auction.

At the other table the Dutch East-West, Jacobs and Schollard, had a clear run. They stopped in 4\*, nevertheless, and had to enter minus 13imps on their scorecard.

**Awards:** 6 - 10, 5 / 4 - 6, 3NT - 4.

#### 6. N-S game, dealer East



We end our round-the-world trip at the final of the 2007 Bergen Grand Tournament, with the Norwegians Rasmussen and Charlsen facing Popov and Nenov of Bulgaria.

After a straightforward start to the auction Rasmussen uses 'fouth suit forcing' on the second round to inject some pace into the auction. Holding a useful five-loser hand, Charlsen prefers to rebid his diamonds, rather than bid a sterile 2NT. West's 3 continuation is forcing via the fourth suit. Had he bid 3 on the previous round, this would have been a limit bid in many systems (including Acol, although not Standard American).

East cue-bids the spade ace and West shows his important club control. This is enough to persuade East to bid the slam via Blackwood to complete an excellent auction!

■ Awards: 6 • -10, 5 • /5 • /4 • -5, 6 • -4, 3NT -3.

OUR experts finish strongly, with two 10s, scoring a respectable 46 out of 60. Let's look for some worthwhile tips.

# Tips to remember

- Do not hope that partner will hold 'perfect cards'. This is rarely the case.
- When you follow a take-out double with a cue bid this denies a primary fit for partner's major suit.
- Support by responder at the three level, for either of the opener's suits, is a limit bid. To show a stronger hand with good support, bid fourth-suit forcing on the way.


# BRIAN SENIOR ALL ABOUT TRUMPS

# The coup en passant



ONE of our main aims in the auction is to locate our side's best trump fit, so it may seem strange that sometimes during the play we find we have too many trumps and need to shorten them. It happens surprisingly often and occurs when an opponent has an awkward trump holding that cannot be picked up by straightforward play. Once the situation is recognised, it is time to see if there is a possible play to resolve the problem via a trump coup.


Perhaps the most straightforward of the trump reduction plays occurs when declarer attempts a coup en passant. The fancy name hides a pretty simple technique. Declarer attempts to make his small trumps by leading a side suit through an opponent who has a bigger trump than the one with which declarer hopes to ruff. Take this example:



South plays in 49 and West leads out the three top spades. Declarer ruffs and cashes the ace, king and queen of trumps. An even break would have provided 10 tricks, but the four-two break creates a small problem. No matter, declarer continues by cashing two top clubs then the three diamond winners. Next he leads dummy's fourth diamond. Though East has the high trump there is nothing he can do to prevent declarer from making his small trump en passant. If East ruffs high, declarer discards and makes his small heart later, while if East discards declarer ruffs the diamond.

Note the importance of cashing the top clubs before playing out the diamonds. If declarer fails to do this, East can throw a club on the fourth diamond and is now in a position to ruff the second club winner, leaving declarer a trick short.


The coup en passant (in passing) is a special kind of trump coup. The play normally covered by that term sees declarer with a tenace over a defender's holding, but no trump opposite to lead for the finesse.



South plays in 44 after West has overcalled 2♣. West cashes the top three hearts, then switches to the ♣K, won in dummy.


If declarer plays a spade to the queen at trick five, then a spade to the ace, he has just gone down in a cold contract. For a successful trump coup he would need to be able to shorten his trumps twice to come down to the same length as East, then get to dummy a third time after cashing his winners to lead through East at trick 12. Alas, there is only one entry remaining in dummy. Good technique would be to ruff a club at trick five, just in case. Now play the A and a spade to the queen. A second club ruff completes the trump reduction and now declarer can cash the diamonds, ending in dummy. A heart or a club at trick 12 completes the trump coup.

If at trick 12 declarer has ♠K 10 sitting over East's \$J 9, any lead from dummy will allow him to pick up the spades without loss. But give declarer ♠K 10 7 and he is forced to ruff whatever is led from dummy at trick eleven, so can no longer pick up East's trump holding. That is the point of the trump reduction play.



After the ◆O lead, 7 is an excellent contract - until West shows out on the second spade. But there is still the possibility of a trump coup if declarer can shorten his trumps sufficiently and lead from dummy at trick 12.

Declarer will need to ruff twice if the coup is to succeed. He cashes the second top diamond then plays two club winners, discarding his remaining diamond. A diamond ruff is followed by a heart to dummy and a club ruff. Now a second heart is led to dummy and declarer plays the winning club. If East ruffs, there is no further problem. If East discards, declarer pitches the ♥A and plays anything from dummy. Again, East's trump holding is nullified.



South plays the excellent contract of 64 and West leads two top spades. Declarer ruffs the second spade, cashes two top clubs and scowls when West shows out on the second round. All is not lost, however, though some good fortune will be required.

If declarer could come down to nothing but the ♠Q10 and have the lead in dummy at trick 12, it would not matter what suit he now led from dummy. The effect would be to take the necessary finesse against East's ♣J.

Prospects are not that good, as declarer needs East to have just the right shape for the coup to succeed. He needs three rounds of each red suit to stand up. After seeing the awkward trump split, declarer plays three rounds of diamonds, ending in dummy. If East turns up with four diamonds, he will have to be 2-3-4-4 for declarer to succeed. Declarer now ruffs the fourth diamond, plays three rounds of hearts, ending in dummy, and leads a spade at trick 12 to coup his opponent. If East turns up with only three diamonds, declarer needs him to be 3-3-3-4 shape. Now the winning play is to ruff a spade before playing the hearts, again ending in dummy.

# PRACTICAL NO TRUMP BIDDING:



# Clarity after Stayman and transfers

THE common themes to almost all our responses to 1NT are Stayman and red suit transfers. We all have our own opinions about how the 24 and 2NT responses should be used. My intention in this article is not to interfere on these private matters, but to ensure that your partnership has clarity after Stayman and transfers.

How do you interpret the 4NT bid in each of these sequences?

If you play that 4NT is always Blackwood you will have no problem. Equally if you play that 4♣ is always Gerber then presumably 4NT are natural, quantitative bids here. However, the rest of us need to know if our partnership is not to hit the rocks.

# Red suit transfer bids in one-suited hands

How do you play 4• and 4• opposite a 1NT opening? In particular 4• seems to have no particular meaning. Why not play them as red suit transfers? Now, if partner opens 1NT and you jump to 4• you are telling partner you definitely want to play in hearts. He must bid 4•. He cannot break the transfer. You can pass this, or bid on towards a slam.

Therefore in (3), 4NT is whatever sort of Blackwood you play. You no longer need 4NT as Blackwood in auction (1) so there it is quantitative. In (4) 5♣ is a cue bid.

Now consider the implications of hands that start with a two-level transfer. You have removed two hand types from the equation: those that want to play in 4♥/♠ whatever opener has and those that want to force agreement and move on beyond 4♥/♠. So how about sequence (5)?

I would suggest that this should be a mild slam try with no singleton or void. Since East must have six hearts the shape must be exactly 3-6-2-2.

So how about these next sequences?

(6) is a totally natural auction. 3♦ is a new suit at the three level (because 2♦ was a transfer) and is game forcing. Responder has five hearts and at least four diamonds.

In (7) 4• is clearly a cue bid agreeing hearts (new suit at the four level). However, since there is only one hand shape with six hearts that doesn't have a singleton (3-6-2-2) and that shape has already been well dealt with, then 4• should be a splinter bid, showing a singleton diamond. This can allow you to reach a slam by diagnosing no wasted values, as in hand (a) where West is aware that there are no wasted values in diamonds.

# Two-suited hands

What do you think 4♥ means in auction (8)?

You can easily show a major two-suiter (at least 5-5 shape) by bidding slower, as in (9), so there is no need to depart from our principle that a new suit at the four level is a cue bid (in this case forcing spades as trumps). But look at these next two hands.

With (b) you simply want to play in game. With (c) you equally want to show 5-5 shape, but are worth a slam try. Since it may take you to the four level to show your 5-5 shape how can you distinguish? The answer lies in auction (10).

East starts by using Stayman. If that uncovers a 5-4 major fit then the problem is solved. If the response to 2♠ is 2♠ responder jumps to 4♥ to show 5-5 shape. I play that auction (10) shows a hand that just wants to play in game, whereas (9) is a mild slam try.

All this is certainly a great improvement, but beware. Your partner opens 1NT and you hold 13 HCP and six hearts. You dreamily bid 2• and then realise that your intended next bid will be an unwanted slam try. I am not a great believer in great complexity, but this system does satisfy all the necessary criteria for a really good conventional idea. It is theoretically excellent and comes up quite frequently.

### Stayman

I still haven't answered the question of whether the 4NT in auction (2) is Blackwood or not. It might depend on other parts of your system, for example if you play a 24 response to 1NT as including balanced hands worth a slam try then 4NT has no use as Blackwood. However, if it is not clear in your system consider auctions (11) and (12).

In (11) 3♣ should be natural and forcing. Yes, I know that traditionally 3♣ was a sign off, but that is rarely played nowadays. You need a way to investigate a 4-4 major fit and show good clubs if no major fit is found. In (12) 4♠ is a cue bid agreeing hearts (new suit at the four level). If you want to agree hearts you can always start with such a cue bid and bid Blackwood later. Therefore 4NT in (2) should be natural.

I hope that by now you agree with the view I stated in previous articles that 1NT is a very helpful start to the auction. It is possible to bid very accurately over a 1NT opening bid.

I have just one titbit to finish with. It is normal to abandon Stayman and transfers if opponents double your no trump, because the priority shifts from constructive bidding to being able to sign off in any suit.

# Some slam troubles, but England's excellent young players win through

# By Michael Byrne

THIS year the annual competition between the home nations for the under 20s (Peggy Bayer) and the under 25s (Junior Camrose) was held in Shannon in the Republic of Ireland.

Although in theory the countries take it in turns to host the event Ireland seems to hold it more often that once every five years (the last time was in 2004) and everyone is all the more grateful for that, since the hospitality is always top notch.

This year was no exception and everyone was welcomed with open arms.

If only the quality of the bridge was as good as the hospitality – but sadly the England under 20s seemed to misinterpret my instruction of 'be great ambassadors for your country' into 'ship loads of imps the way of the opposition'.

This overly generous attitude was particularly evident on slam deals, of which there were eight over the course of the weekend.

Here are a few of the more interesting ones:

Our boys bid: 2♠ (game forcing) - 2♠ (negative); 2♠ (good start) - 3♠ (positive); 4♠ (cue bid) - 4♥ (cue bid); 4♠

At this point North thought his partner had denied a control in diamonds and passed, but of course South would only cue bid 5. (going past game) with extra playing strength. North should clearly have bid on, although it's not that clear with what, since the hand was unsuitable for Blackwood with so many top losers. Oh well, another victim for the cue-bidding roundabout.

Terence Reese once famously said he would rather have an ocean liner than a rusty tug boat. He was referring, of course, to having a long strong suit as trumps rather than a straggly one with lots of holes in it. That maxim would have been useful on this hand:

England under 20s bid to 6, a fair contract requiring trumps 3-2. When trumps were 4-1 the contract soon went four off on a diamond lead.

South might have given thought to play-

ing in his ocean liner (spades), because the quality of the trump pips means that you can cope with a variety of 4-1 breaks, and even on the actual hand, where clubs and hearts broke badly and the spade finesse was wrong, 64 would make on most

This hand was one of the few bid to a slam, but when dummy went down it appeared to be almost hopeless:

With South the dealer the sequence was: 1 - 2 + 3 (slam try in their methods); 4 (cue bid) - 4 NT; 5 - 6.

South's cue bid of 4 should have alerted North to the fact that he had no control in the minors, (even a singleton would have been a cue bid if he had held one) and thus North should have applied the brakes and passed. Oh no, making up for a good slam missed (see two hands earlier) North powered his way to 6.

If this contract looked terrible that's because it was, but declarer had a think and set about it. He won the diamond lead and drew two rounds of trumps with the aid of the finesse. He then cashed four hearts tricks, throwing two diamonds from dummy, and ruffed a diamond with

dummy's last trump. He returned to his hand via the A and drew the last trump, giving up a club.

A contract has little chance that requires the spade finesse to work, spades to break 3-2 and the hand with the third spade to hold four hearts, but at least Ben Paske managed to keep his nerve and find the winning line.

This hand occurred in the crucial match against Scotland, who had led throughout, and with one match to go England crushed them by 39 imps to reach the top of the table.

A steady performance in the final match against the home nation meant that England retained the trophy.

In the Junior Camrose the England under 25s started well and led the way until two matches from the end, when they were beaten by Scotland. However, they too took control with a steady win in their final match to lift the trophy.

It was nice to see also that 10 of the 12 players sent out had never played in a Junior Camrose event before and for some of them it was their last chance.

Although it's easy to be critical of some of the mistakes made at the bridge table, we must not forget that behaviour is far more important, and from the moment the plane touched down until the moment the competition ended, every member of the under 20 and under 25 teams was a credit to English bridge and behaved in a manner befitting young international players.

# GET EVEN WITH THE ODDS

# A 2% edge is not always worth having



WEST opened 2NT and declared 3NT.

The lead of \*J round to his queen gave declarer his eighth trick, but he had to look somewhere for a ninth. Playing for a three-three club break was a possibility, but he knew the odds of this were low, at around 36%. Moreover, East had played the \*8 on the opening lead to show an even number, suggesting that spades were five-two.

In that case it would not be possible to set up a long club before the defence had five tricks. No, playing on clubs did not look attractive.

Turning his attention to diamonds declarer observed the possibility of a double finesse. At about 75% this offered an excellent chance, and there were the two necessary entries in dummy.

However, to do this would mean overtaking the VJ and there would then be only three certain heart tricks, unless that suit broke three-three. Declarer calculated the odds of this line succeeding:

A three-three heart break at 36%, together with a double diamond finesse at

75% gave a combined chance of 36% x 75% = 27%. Not very good.

Was there a better line? How about first playing the \*J from hand, before finessing the 10 on the second round? That line needed only one heart entry in dummy, so that four heart tricks could be guaranteed. Unfortunately, for that to work South would need to hold both diamond honours, otherwise South could win the first diamond, with North winning the second.


As the chance of South holding both diamond honours was only 25% this play looked slightly inferior to the previous one.

Yet it was the line declarer took, as he had spotted a significant extra chance.

It had occurred to him that North might be tempted to go up with the queen if he started with •Q x x: he shouldn't, of course, but defenders sometimes err.

More cogent, though, was the thought that North might have started with a doubleton honour. It would take a really good defender to duck the jack when holding Ox, or even Kx.

Overall then, declarer believed this to be a superior line, although one could not attach precise odds. He was duly rewarded when the full hand turned out to be:



North had indeed started with five spades and both clubs and hearts broke the expected 4-2.

The diamond honours were split, but North did have the hoped-for doubleton honour and, as predicted, could not resist taking his queen when the jack was played. Even had he ducked, he would have had to do this smoothly, otherwise declarer could get the position right.

Sometimes it is worth sacrificing a small statistical edge in favour of exerting pressure on the opponents – or even simply hoping that they will go wrong!

Here the sacrifice was a mere 2%, so it was really no contest.

# Ethics code works

ABOUT five years ago we became increasingly aware of how much emotion and intensity goes into every hand. We worked with some of our members from several different countries to evolve a code of conduct and an ethics code that would do two things:

1. Give clear guidelines of the expectations we have of all our members (club rules) and show what to do in specific situations.

2. Show clearly the action the club ethics administrators would take if the rules were broken and outline what members should then do.

Our club rules cover rudeness, quitting (whether deliberate or accidental), psyching, the use of unauthorised information and score adjustments where appropriate.

Then we set up a reporting system that the members use to register complaints. This is administered by dedicated personnel who can forward bridge and ethics issues to top tournament directors or apply the rules for good behaviour. Every incident is researched carefully and emails will be sent to any member who has caused a problem. So far, more than 3,200 reports have been handled in this way.

Of course, this is done with great care and never assumes guilt without proof. We give the benefit of the doubt wherever possible, because, after all, everyone simply wants to play bridge in a friendly and secure club, not get into a protracted dialogue over something trivial.

We want our guests to be comfortable and our members to know that accidents can happen, but repeated 'fortuitous' accidents are looked upon with scepticism.

This unique and personal approach gives our members the confidence to let us know of any problems and to be secure in the knowledge that we expect and maintain high standards from all players in Bridge Club Live.

When – and sadly it happens – players refuse to accept the club rulings (we may have asked for an apology or a pledge towards future behaviour) we do our best to persuade them to change their minds. But if that fails, we cannot accept their membership and we part ways.

The result of this vigilance is that the club is growing a solid centre of friendliness and ethical behaviour. The competitions schedule, packed with activity is attracting sometimes a 50% increase in participants. The beginners and improvers who now have their own competitions, as well as supervised practice sessions, are gaining in confidence and our guest rooms are buzzing.

# It should have been all 13 tricks

I WAS interested to read Peter Carbutt's letter in the last issue, which referred to a massive hand on which one declarer tabled his cards, claimed his 6NT contract and then had his amended claim for 13 tricks rejected by the defenders.

This was the hand: ♠A K Q 2 VAKQ ◆AK AKQ J. The cards put down by dummy included four spades to the jack.

It seems to me that with 13 tricks so clearly guaranteed declarer should have been credited with them all.

Surely it is for the director and not opponents to decide the outcome.

Under law 71c (implausible concession) the director should cancel the concession of a trick that could not be lost by any normal play of the cards, as was the case here. obviously - Jeremy Child, Exeter

Similarly I also belong to a very informal, and nonaffiliated, bridge club. We can play duplicate bridge up to three times a week; we enjoy it.

We play for fun; we play competitively; and we stick to the rules.

And that's what games and sports are for. The rules are well known and anybody can play.

I don't encounter either in bridge or in tennis, either the tampering with the rules, or the bad behaviour that John Cattanach seems to imply is an inevitable product of non-affiliation. In fact I venture to suggest the latter affliction might be more characteristic of the more serious, affiliated clubs.

As for the international team argument, what has that to do with us? We play tennis for fun; we don't necessarily associate ourselves with the exploits of the professionals playing Davis Cup.

I don't go to the LTA to buy tennis shoes; equally I can buy bidding boxes from several commercial sources. So EBU for equipment either.

Thus I find Mr Cattanach's arg unconvincing.

# Time to abandon the STOP

IT was holiday bridge and I was paired with a man of about my own (elderly) age. We were joined by our two lady opponents and at just about the same time the boards were our table placed on instructions to deal and play.

On the first hand the ladies had the bidding all to themselves and it went 1 • - 1 •; 2 • - 3 •; 4 • - 4 •; 6 • -Pass.

There seemed nothing untoward about the bidding except that the West lady, who had opened, became very agitated, fidgeting increasingly as the auction progressed and emitting sounds of distress.

My partner turned out to be a kindly and considerate man and he asked the lady what was wrong. The gist of her babbled reply was that she was concerned that her partner had

not used the STOP card before her bid of 3♠, nor produced the ALERT card after the 44 Gerber bid.

My partner pointed out that players do sometimes forget the STOP card and that it was now no longer necessary to alert bids above the three level.

The lady went on to explain that her partner's failure to use the STOP card had made her unsure that she actually had a jump bid in spades and the failure to alert Gerber made her unsure that her partner understood the bid. Also, her partner's 44 was confusing in that she thought it might be simply a repeat of her suit or it might possibly be a Gerber response showing two aces,

She finished by saying that in all the confusion she was guessing when she made her final bid of 6. We were speechless, especially on learning that the ladies were one of only two pairs to bid and make the

This all makes for an amusing, if wry tale, but it does confirm my long-held opinion that more than a few players, albeit subconsciously, were using the STOP and ALERT pass and receive to information, confirming to each other that that they understood each other's bidding and that they were both 'on the same page'.

The new limited use of the ALERT card will go some way to knocking this process on the head, but I do feel that it would be even better if we were to abandon the STOP card and do away with the abuse completely. - J Connolly, Norwich




# It's North East versus South West in youth final

THIS is the time of year when up-and-coming young players compete in local heats to qualify for a national final to be held over the Easter weekend in London.

In the northern heat of the G W Arnott Davidson inter-regional teams of eight the North East team of James Thrower, Rob Myers, Mark Dessain, Liam Jones, Chris Knight, Alasdair Frater and Alex and Jacub Gembicki beat the North West's Amy Stout, Jennie Marvin, Jonathan King, Adam Hickman, Ruth Franklin, David Barrett, Daniel Evans and Daniel Caton by 86imps. The following hand contributed to the North East's large win:



At the two tables where the North East were North-South both declarers made nine tricks in 3NT with the South cards after a diamond lead; the two tables where the North East were East-West also brought back positive scores. At one table West led the \*J against South's 3NT and declarer went two down. At the final table East (Mark Dessain) opened 2, showing 5-4 or better in hearts and spades, South doubled and West (Liam Jones) jumped to 4, which made by way of five spade and five diamond tricks.

Altogether that was +400+400+100+620 = +1520 to the North East, which was 17 imps.

In the southern heat all four regions were represented, with the South West beating the three other teams. The South West's team was Dan McIntosh, Katy Lee, Fred Pitch, Seb Bunyan, Rob Sassoon, Giles Ip, Damian Bell and Sam Hunt.

The Eastern team, which had two wins, was Graeme Robertson, Justin Bell, Jamie Findlay, Michael Green, Ming Ming Mei, Weiye Yang, Kieran Tilley and Arthur Wolstenholme.

London (one win) was represented by Sarah O'Connor, Nick Mock, Tony Nonnermacher, Felix Laurie von Massenbach; Alastair Gartenberg, Anthony Martinelli, Jack Sheard and Phillipe Ayache and the South East team was Bryan Chu, Mark Luk, Justin So, Sam Chan, Calvin Cherry, Archie Gammell, Trevor Fry and Robert Doffern.


The North East and the South West will contest the final on Good Friday at the Royal National Hotel, London as part of the London Easter Festival of Bridge.







# YOU QUESTION – JEREMY DHONDY ANSWERS



# All a matter of ethical practice

IRVINE Caplan by email makes a number of points about announcements. Included among them he asks why there is not an onus on each pair to announce their basic system and no trump range when they arrive at the table.

I couldn't agree with this more. It comes on page two of the 'How to be a human being at the table' manual. It's a fact of life that at many clubs pairs do not have fully completed convention cards. Maybe they should, but they don't! This may be because they don't play together that often or because they have arrived at the club hot and bothered at the last minute and not really had the time to fill in a card

The truth is that for the most part the opponents will rarely care what you are doing, but it is helpful and avoids questions if they have a basic idea of your system. When I sit down at a table in an EBU event or on a club evening then I tell my opponents what system I am playing (something like weak NT, five-card majors and three weak twos). That is usually enough to avoid any questions. It may also draw attention to anything that needs a special defence. In my view if you sit down and are playing a curious 2+ opening that the opponents might not expect and you don't tell them, you are not being as actively ethical as you should be. It is not mandatory, but I think it is good practice and clubs where the majority do not have convention cards may like to insist that this is done.

Brian Kingsley of Ledbury asks via email about movements. In his club when there are 15 tables they play 11 two-board rounds and four one-board rounds, so all pairs are played against. This leads to a different top on some boards. Is this a reasonable approach?

When there are too many pairs to play all during the course of an evening (and not many clubs will play more than about 26 boards) what should be done? My solution would be to avoid great complication, to avoid very unfair movements and to avoid Howell movements, although the last is just my personal prejudice.

I don't think it is very satisfactory to have a different top on boards. For example, it is possible if you have 16 tables to break it into two eight-table sections, but that means two sets of boards and possible duplication problems.

At most clubs that I frequent they would just have 12 or 13 two-board rounds, with a bit of arrow switching near the end to produce a single winner. It is as good as anything. I suppose that very occasionally players will try to manipulate this by sitting in a position where they won't play against someone considered strong, but most people can't be bothered with this.

Victor Savage of Bourne End picks me up on an answer I made in a column some time ago, which was about actions following hesitations. In it I talked about the law (16A) and the test applied to whether actions are to be allowed, which is usually that the action taken must be clear-cut. This is often interpreted as being an action which at least 70% of the player's peers would find. Victor is not keen on this interpretation and goes into verse to make his point.

Art thou alert?

When a hesitation occurs in an auction, over and above that which might happen following a STOP card being produced, it is possible that the hesitator's partner may take some action that is not normal. If you call the director he will, as Victor says, turn to Law 16A,

which says in part 'the partner may not choose from amongst logical alternatives actions which have been suggested over another by the extraneous information'.

A classic example is an auction that starts with 1NT, followed by a very slow pass, often accompanied by some questions. When the next hand passes and it is fourth seat's turn to bid, what can he do? Anything is the simple answer, but if he chooses to bid on a four count, or double on an 11 count, then the question may arise as to whether he was taking advantage of his partner's out of tempo action.

It's quite easy when the actions are as extreme as the ones above, but many are more marginal and what directors and appeal committees usually do is to allow an action in such circumstances if they consider that a clear majority of equivalent players would take an identical or similar action. This is what is often colloquially known as the '70% rule'. When directors look at the laws they also look at the advice for their region. In England this is contained in a publication called the White Book and this provides guidance as to what may or may not be allowed. It's on the EBU website and on page 39 if you are very keen.

I got told off, says DLB of North London, for answering a question about my partner's bid by saying 'I'm taking it as forcing'. I was just trying to be helpful. What is the problem?

When an opponent asks a question he is seeking to know what your agreement is. He isn't entitled to know what is in your hand and you must not use your answer to give partner information and that is what you do when you use the phrase 'I'm taking it as ... 'If you don't have an agreement then you should say just that, although you may be helpful by pointing out parallel positions where you do have an agreement. When you say, for example, 'I'm taking it as Blackwood' nobody will be in any doubt as to what your next bid means, whereas if you said, because it was a correct statement 'no agreement' then partner must guess rather than use your answer.






# PRIZE DEFENCE ANSWERS

QUESTION master Andrew Kambites gives his view of the best line of defence in our February competition and awards prizes in three categories:




When an opponent shows a two-suited hand it is quite common that his partner has reasonable support in one of the suits, but shortage in the other. It is often right to protect your side's assets by leading a trump.

You can see on this layout that provided the defenders lead trumps at every possible opportunity declarer is denied a heart ruff in his hand and held to seven tricks.



Your partner leads the ♠2, taken by dummy's .J. Declarer then calls for a heart from dummy.

Partner has done very well in leading a trump, cutting down ruffs in dummy. However, if he has led from a holding like ♠K 8 2 he cannot lead another trump without giving away his trump trick. You must rise with your VK and play your last trump.




West leads the \$2. This is clearly a singleton because your methods are to lead second best from suits without an honour.

It all looked so easy at the table: •A, diamond ruff and the A. If partner happens to lead a club after ruffing a diamond, then a second diamond ruff might lead to two off. Dream on! When you give partner his diamond ruff you can only do so with a high diamond. It will appear to partner that you want a spade switch, particularly as you bid spades! If partner returns a spade declarer's two clubs are discarded on dummy's &K and dummy's fifth diamond. Be kind to partner! Cash the ♣A before giving him the diamond ruff!

# And the winners are:

Partner's \$10 lead is covered by dummy's ♠K and taken by your ♣A.

Declarer has shown at least five-five shape in the majors. It doesn't look as though declarer will have any heart losers apart from the ace. In the unlikely event of partner having two trump tricks the contract will be defeated whatever you do. Otherwise you must hope that he has the A. Suppose you switch to the 2. Partner wins the •A, but if he continues diamonds your king is forced and will be ruffed, allowing declarer to make his contract.

Better defence is to switch to the •K at trick two, followed by a low diamond. Declarer must ruff, otherwise he has four losers. However, when he forces out the \*A you can persevere with your last diamond, promoting a length trump winner for your partner.

(b) ♠ A 6 ♥ Q J 10 8 5 ♦ Q J 10 8 5 ♣ 3 2NT - Showing at least 5-5 in the two lowest unbid suits. If East-West bid on you hope partner can contest with three-card support or better in either red suit and moderate values.

(c) ♠ K 7 5 3 ♥ A | 2 ♦ K Q | 9 7 ♣ 8 Double - Safer to offer a choice of suits than put all your eggs in one basket with a 2 overcall.

(d) ♠A5 ♥Q8 ♦Q9753 ♣KJ32 Pass – A 2♦ overcall might work, but it is better to pass. If West passes, North, who is short in clubs, will probably reopen.






