



FEEDBACK FROM THE RECENT FAGM

The FAGM was held at the club on Wed 24th November to approve the accounts for FYE 20/21, together with giving an update on the first four months of trading in FYE 2021/22.

FYE 2020/21 resulted in a pre-tax loss of £50k which in the context of a 'full' COVID-affected year, with only three rugby events all year and the majority of commercial events heavily affected, was considered a tremendous achievement. The original budget for the year anticipated a loss of £200k+. This outturn was achieved in part due to the ability to claim UK Govt furlough support, obtain grants and reliefs from West Berks Council and the RFU, as well as maximise the limited trading that was able to occur, coupled with very careful management of the business.

Four months into FYE 2021/22 and the club has achieved a Ytd pre-depreciation profit of £55k (against budget of £16k), due mainly to a very strong Commercial performance (lots of weddings, parties and room hire!!), more than covering lower than anticipated Rugby membership revenues. Costs continue to be well-maintained.

However, we are still budgeting for a full year loss as COVID is still prevalent and remains a threat to all revenue-generating activities, and we remain limited by a shortage of staff as experienced across the entire UK hospitality sector.

More than ever the club needs support from across its membership base and all commercial sources.



BLUES NEWS - KEEPING IN TOUCH OFFA'S DYKE, EAST LONDON AND HADRIAN'S WALL



Nationality. One of the things that binds us together. Middle Saturday of the 2012 London Olympics. Six golds in total that day but three that particularly resonate. Super Saturday. Absolutely. We all know the names of these three athletes competing for Team GB. They were all one of us, one of our own. What it must have been like to have been in the stadium that night with the noise and excitement who knows. It was exciting enough at home watching on the TV. Sydney, November 22nd 2003. That drop goal in the dying minutes of extra time. Another sporting hero anointed. Four English elite athletes, three of whom I regarded as one of us. The fourth, in Sydney was not representing me, was not "one of my boys." I was delighted England had won the World Cup. However I was delighted not for myself, but for the English friends I have knowing how much it meant to them and the thousands of other decent, honest, hard working people involved with English rugby. And then a British Lions tour and there I was regarding Jonny as one of my own, from my country.

Nationality in Great Britain is a strange thing. I have tried to explain the subtle cultural, political, social and religious differences between the Welsh and the English to my American daughter-in-law. She struggles to understand. Sometimes I do. "But you all have the same passport don't you, you all generally speak the same language don't you? She's right of course and many people you hear speaking say they are both British and English or British and Welsh or British and Scottish. Some people would change the order of this listing and some would disagree entirely but it does not negate the fact that the things that bind all three countries together are stronger than the differences. OK so the Scottish anthem sung at rugby games talks about packing the English back home, the second verse of God Save the Queen talks about scattering enemies, making them fall and confounding their politics but all anthems provide a feeling of evoking national pride and this is positive so long as national pride doesn't tip over into rampant nationalism and the excesses this brings.

We all have a national identity and for some elite rugby players this culminates in being chosen to represent their country. But for some, what does "their country" mean? Mako and Billy, Tongan by heritage, born in New Zealand and Australia respectively, brought up in Wales, moving to the South West due to their mother's job and choosing to play for England. (I'm over this now.....almost); Nick Tompkins, born in Sidcup in Kent, successful product of Saracens Academy choosing to play for Wales due to a Welsh grandmother; Duhan van de Merve, born in George in South Africa, moved to play for Worcester via Montpellier and Edinburgh and made his Scottish debut in 2020. Residency rules, dontcha just love 'em. There was a story going round a few years back of a player who played for a Midlands club who chose to live over the border in Wales knowing he had a better chance of winning a cap with Wales than with his native England. He did win a few caps but I can't help wondering how he must have felt when the English anthem was being played and he was dressed in red. Perhaps he didn't care. Perhaps none of us would care if we were winning our debut international cap.

What is clear is that once a player has played for one country at senior level he or she is barred from playing for another country. Or is it? The news broke last week that the regulations on international representation are changing and now players like All Black Charles Piutau, Tongan by heritage, New Zealand by birth are able to play for a country in which a parent or grandparent was born even if they have played for a different country so long as it has been three years since their last international cap. He gave a fascinating insight into his feelings on these changes to the BBC and cynics like myself who have always claimed that players cannot have that strong an emotive intrinsic feeling for more than one country, the country of their birth or their heritage, are left wondering if this point of view needs to be thought through with a bit more subtlety. Perhaps it's not that black and white.

It will be interesting to see how these new regulations pan out and as the experts say there are likely to be some unintended consequences, like Alex Lozowski being eligible to play for Italy or Alex Goode being eligible to play for Wales. However if it all leads to the Pacific Island teams becoming stronger and being able to compete on a more equal footing with the tier one nations then what can be bad with that? Couple this with the formation of the Fijian Drua or to be more precise the Swire Shipping Fijian Drua, to compete in the Super Rugby Championship and who knows what impact all this will have on the World rugby order.

That's for way into the future. For the more immediate future, I'm just about to write to Eddie with a plea not to bring Billy and Mako back into the English set up for the next three years, and whilst he's at it to drop Henry Slade for the next three years as well and come to that Maro, Freddie Steward and Marcus Smith. Who knows there may be a Welsh grandparent lurking somewhere in their background. Fantasy world? Mmmm.......

The boys have been training incredibly hard through covid restrictions and the coaching staff were very excited to see in action for the first time in 20 months. 


