Newbury RFC has set-up a club based Track & Trace system as part of our Covid-19 protocols, in line with UK Govt requirements. It will be a mandatory requirement for all visitors to the Club (both inside the clubhouse and outside on the pitches), to use this simple system to register their attendance.

You will need to use a mobile phone (or similar camera-fitted device such as an ipad), to scan a dedicated QR code. Once the

QR code is scanned, a confirmation message will appear on your device. This will need to be done on every visit to the Club. The QR codes will be on display in multiple locations around the Club and the system fully adheres to GDPR regulations.

The club is now open and we are trying to organise events and get the club open as much as possible so we can enjoy our rugby. As you know, the Covid-19 regulations are constantly moving but we really are working extremely hard to make rugby safe and have it back at Monks Lane.

WHAT'S ON / SUPPORTING THE CLUB



Touch Rugby is described as a non contact form of Rugby which is a bit of a misnomer given the major attribute of the game is in the name touch. At Newbury we play a social form of the game for fun and fitness and pre Coronavirus games would vary from 5-aside in the cold winter months to full on 15-aside when the weather is more clement (not that any of our squad are fair weather players). In another misnomer, to play Touch at the club all you need to be is a non-playing social member which is currently £110 for the year and we are the only squad that plays 52 weeks of the year, twice a week, which equates to a little over a £1 a game - where else can you get such value for money?

We are totally non discriminatory: you can play unaccompanied between the ages of 16 and currently 61 and we play mixed squads. Younger players can also join in if their parents are playing. No prior experience of rugby is needed and we have players of all abilities, we even occasionally lower our standards to allow first team players to practise when they are off season.

Until this year we have played uninterrupted at Newbury since early 2004, originally set up by some South Africans who brought it over with them when they had children in the Minis and Juniors. I joined in the tail end of 2004 having played no contact since the age of 13, and some would argue that age hasn't improved my game.

Of course this year has been different and last week was our first outing since lockdown, when we were allowed to play with up to 10 a side. Our game is essentially the same as it has always been but keeping in mind precautions to ensure that we play as safely as possible in this Covid era. Still, anyone watching us start would have been reminded of cows exuberantly let loose in the field after a long winter in the shed, you could see people literally frolicking on the pitch and the first 15 minutes were conducted at a frenetic pace which thankfully for us older participants didn't last! But it was a reminder that once you start it is easy to become hooked on the sport as a great way of keeping fit whilst having fun. So if you would like to make more of your rugby membership and want to keep fit whilst making new friends, then come and join us on: Saturdays 10am - 12pm; Mondays 7pm to 8:30pm.

All you need at this time of year is a pair of trainers, though come September boots may be advisable. For further information simply email me at pnorman3@btinternet.com. I look forward to meeting some of you.

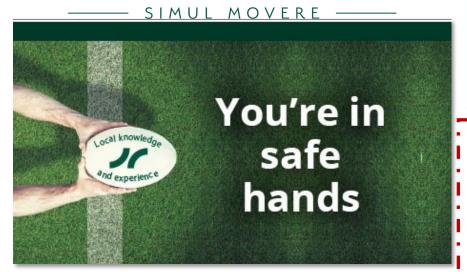

It might be they just fancy a change, particularly if they have been playing the game since they were seven years old. How encouraging then that in senior pre-season, for at least one of the sessions 50% of those training had played for NRFC Colts. We must be doing something right. However there's always ways to improve and suggestions are always welcome so we can retain even more of our Colts. Will Harwood here talks about the Colts season just finished. *BRIAN LEE*

Before the 2019/20 season was cut short, the Newbury RFC Colts were having a promising season for the future of the rugby club. Results may not have always gone our way but the Colts fielded two teams in the OBB Youth Leagues for a second consecutive season. All fixtures were fulfilled for both teams, a feat that can't always be replicated by others at this age-group. Over 40 young men represented the Colts, including a handful of new or returning players.

The 2020/21 season is going to be different for all rugby lovers. However, plans were in place to start training on 29th July, with a longer pre-season likely, coaches have had to be creative in session planning to challenge players and keep them engaged. Once social distancing measures are eased, the plan is for the colts to move training

nights from Wednesday to Thursday so as to warm-up with the senior men. This is to help bridge the gap between colts and senior rugby and help build relationships with peers and coaches alike. What's promising is that a number of last year's colts have already been seen training with the men this season.

The last count was at least 15 colts from the previous 3 seasons involved in senior preseason already. The future looks blue.



WILL HARWOOD

THROUGH THE EYES OF THE PLAYERS



Dan Thorne (Captain, Senior Men)

Stags players don't normally get the chance to see Blues in action but the one time they did last season was certainly worth the wait. After an early kick off away at Oxford Harlequins, Stags were back at Monks Lane in time to watch the second half of Blues vs Brixham. The score was 14-20 going into the last minute of the game when Toby Holland scored to make it 19-20. One of the qualities of a good captain is that he or she steps up when the team needs them and we can all remember what happens after Toby's try. With the last kick of the game, captain Dan Thorne kicks a very difficult conversion to make the final score 21-20 to Blues. One of the highlights of the season!

Dan grew up primarily playing soccer for Thatcham Tornadoes and AFC Newbury and cricket for Falkland. It wasn't until he started sixth form that he decided he wanted to give rugby a go, playing for his school first XV and then a gap year which saw him play for Newbury for the first time, as an U19 Colts player. A course at St Mary's University to study Sports Science and Nutrition followed school and in 2010/11 Dan started pre-season training with the senior Newbury squad. Unfortunately, a knee injury against Bath in pre-season ruled him out of the first half of the season and he made his debut for Blues in January 2011 against Lydney at home, coming on as a replacement.



Since 2011 Dan has been a Blues regular, gaining 210 Blues caps and captaining the side on 139 occasions. Dan says that he has been very proud to lead the team and has been fortunate that what he calls his "big" games, (his 150th and 200th caps) have been at home against teams from near the top of the league, both of which have been victories. Great memories.

As a teacher Dan tries to implement teaching skills into his captaincy, none as important as treating players as individuals and reacting appropriately to different personalities. He tries to imbue a spirit of continuous improvement into the team, whether they are winning or losing.

Dan comes across as a keen student of the game having gained his RFU Level 2 Coaching Award and he feels this helps him analyse games in real time,

spotting how opposition teams play, seeing if there are obvious weaknesses and adapting Blues game accordingly. This is all done with the help of a few senior players on the field, which Dan finds invaluable, particularly those who lead certain aspects of the game such as line outs.

Obviously disappointed at the team's relegation last season, Dan reflects on the difference between Level 5 and Level 6 rugby and says, "At Level 5 teams that do not play at their best are likely to lose which is not the case at Level 6."

Making a push for promotion next season is important and Dan says there is a confidence within the team that they are good enough to get to and remain at Level 5 and he hopes the experience of playing at Level 5 will hold them in good stead for the coming seasons.

Dan says that all too often in sport we get transfixed with what players can't do rather than what they're good at. The key he says is to appreciate player weaknesses and work on them. In his own case he cites kicking off his right foot. A natural left foot kicker, Dan has worked hard on improving his weaker foot and is now more confident with his right footed field kicking, although whether he will ever attempt a kick at goal off his right foot remains to be seen!

And advice to young players? Work on your weaknesses but don't forget about your strengths because it's those strengths that will give individuals a point of difference, will get players noticed and try to become the best in your team at doing something. "A bit like Jonny Wilkinson who dropped the goal to win the world cup with his weaker foot."

The future for Dan? He would like to go into coaching although he is far more likely to continue playing for a number of seasons, injuries permitting and who knows, in a few years time we might see him playing for the Stags or A's when he finally decides to step down from first team rugby. Now that would be worth a trip to Oxford Harlequins to watch.
