**U13 GIRLS PITCH UP AND PLAY** 





#### QUEEN'S COMMUNITY CANOPY PROJECT TO CELEBRATE HER PLATINUM JUBILEE

As part of the QUEENS JUBILEE CANOPY PROJECT to plant 750,000 trees this year, Newbury RFC volunteers planted 150 trees along the club boundary, adjoining Pitch 2A, on Sunday 29<sup>th</sup> January.

To help the planet and the rugby club, there is the opportunity to sponsor a tree for £75 with an option to have a plaque with your family name; this will ensure you are part of the club's history. 





#### STAGS v BANBURY II - A hard fought match in dreadful conditions ends in defeat for Stags

The top pitches have a micro climate all of their own and whilst Blues had a relatively strong wind for their game on the main pitch, "up the top," it was exponentially worse. The flags never stood a chance of remaining in the ground for the duration of the game, umbrellas turned inside out and passing the posts on pitch three that had been blown down on Friday there was some discussion about the advantages of a global rugby calendar and summer rugby if World Rugby and all other stakeholders could just compromise a little bit. Thanks to those hardy souls who stayed to the end but to be fair to the weather it did improve as the afternoon wore on. An added bonus was that both teams agreed to keep the clock running when there was an injury stoppage and this meant the players had the opportunity to catch the last ten minutes or so of the Blues game and what an ending to that one. Standing on the banking by the score board on the way down from pitch four gave a great visual representation of the fantastic support Blues get for home games and the noise when Dan kicked the winning penalty was pretty loud to say the least. Great players, great supporters, great club.

High flying Banbury II, second in BBO 1, are a strong team and coming off the back of 13-64 defeat against them earlier in the season Stags knew they were were in for a tough game. Playing against the wind in the first half the defensive effort was first class. Try saving tackles, forcing mistakes and penalties, strong work on the floor around the breakdown and some excellent footwork from a number of players and Banbury knew they were in a game. The back row of Rory Jones, Ollie Keyse and Jamal Watson were prominent throughout and indicative of the effort were two instances. The first, a tackle made by Jonathan Drotskie only to be followed up almost immediately by another tackle to stop a promising Banbury attack, the second an outstanding run out of defence by Oscar Padden. As half time approached, with the match remaining scoreless and Banbury pushing hard Stags did their best to hold out but on the stroke of half time the pressure finally told and the visitors forced their way over to make the half time score 0-5. Not a bad half of rugby playing against such a strong wind.

Playing with the wind in the second half there was optimism Stags could come back and compete strongly to win the game. However Banbury ramped up their game at the start of the second period and within ten minutes they had scored two breakaway tries and even though the scoreline wasn't looking good, the ebb and flow of the game didn't make it feel Stags were facing a 17 point deficit. The team were soon rewarded for their efforts with a try of their own scored by Jamal Watson, crashing through after a tap and go penalty close to the Banbury line. The successful conversion by Mat Cox reduced the deficit to 10 points and now Stags had their best period of the match, exerting a lot of pressure on the Banbury line. Confidence was growing and there was every expectation of reducing the arrears even more but Banbury's defence held firm and coupled with a few errors Stags could not find their way over the line for their second try. As sometimes happens in sport a period of pressure, when relieved, is followed by a score from the team that has been under the cosh and so it proved on Saturday with Banbury racing over for their fourth try of the game in the closing stages to take the final score to 7-22.

Well done to all the players and a well deserved week off next weekend and then another home game on 5th March against Beaconsfield II. Blues make the trip to Beaconsfield that day and for those not travelling it would be great to see you at Monks Lane.

#### **BLUES TAME THE BULLS - SATURDAY 19TH FEBRUARY 2022**

Blues come out on top in a great game against league leaders Banbury, inflicting only their 2nd defeat of the season.

The rain had luckily stopped, but the pitch was very wet as Banbury kicked off with the strong wind behind them. Blues gathered the kick and cleared to touch. Blues conceded a penalty scrum in front of the posts on 7 minutes and Banbury took the lead, 0-3.

Several phases after the kick off Blues managed to steal the ball at the tackle and took play back into Banbury's half. Banbury regained the ball and kicked clear, the ball rolling deep into touch in Blues territory. Blues won the lineout and continued to put pressure on Banbury. After several phases Adam Neal successfully got over the line but the referee was the wrong side and deemed it was held up. Banbury took the try line kick, Blues gathered the ball and through some good passing took play back into Banbury's 22. After several phases of attacking play spent in Banbury's 22, Blues conceded a penalty. Banbury cleared to touch just in their own half, Blues knocked on at the lineout, giving Banbury a scrum. Banbury held the scrum under pressure, Blues infringed at the tackle, giving Banbury another penalty. They kicked to touch in Blues 22. Banbury made ground with pressure on Blues who conceded another penalty. From the lineout, Banbury forwards mauled up to the try line before popping the ball out to their winger to touch down; try converted - 0-10 (24 minutes).

From the re-start Blues managed to steal the ball but a knock on gave Banbury a scrum. Banbury won the scrum, despite pressure from the Blues, and kicked clear up field. Blues gathered the ball and ran back at Banbury who conceded a penalty at the tackle. Tom Cole kicked to touch just outside Banbury's 22. Pressure from both sides forced errors, resulting in Blues receiving a yellow card near the end of the first half. Although Blues nearly made a breakthrough from a cross-field kick, the ball was knocked on. Despite continued pressure from Banbury, Blues kept them to 0-10 at the half time whistle. All to play for in the second half.

Blues kicked off the second half with the advantage of the strong wind. Banbury took the catch and under pressure, kicked to touch. Blues won the lineout but a forward pass gave Banbury a scrum. Blues pack had the upper hand and Banbury just held the scrum on the retreat. Blues get a scrum when Banbury knock on at the lineout. A big Blues scrum earnt them another penalty; Dan Thorne kicked to touch in Banbury's 22. Blues won the lineout and the forwards mauled before using the pick and drive to get to the line. After several drives, Josh Winfield went over the line to score for the Blues; try converted by Dan Thorne (7-10)

From the restart, the ball was fed to Dan Thorne who kicked it high and long. A good chase by Blues was rewarded when Banbury knocked on. Blues' pack were dominant in the scrum, they spread play wide through hands before sending a grubber kick into Banbury's 22. Banbury tried to run out of defence before putting up a high kick. Jamie Futcher caught the ball and was tackled in the air, giving Blues a penalty. The lineout was won by Blues who took play across the pitch before a knock on halted their progress. Banbury had the scrum but conceded a penalty which allowed Dan Thorne to slot a kick between the uprights on 52 minutes (10-10).

From the restart, Banbury soon had a penalty when Blues' clearance kick was charged down and Blues were caught offside. Banbury kicked to the posts, 10-13.

Blues' kick was taken by the wind and rolled through the try area, resulting in a Banbury scrum on halfway. Banbury again won their scrum going backwards but soon coughed up the ball in the tackle. Blues put up a high kick, Banbury gather and ran the ball but Blues defence managed to steal the ball in the tackle and a good Tom Cole run took play up to Banbury's 22. Blues continued to put pressure on Banbury who conceded another penalty and a resulting yellow card. Dan Thorne kicked the penalty on 59 minutes (13-13).

From a Banbury knock on, Blues had a penalty scrum and shoved Banbury backwards and over the try line but the ball was called out and Banbury 9 touched it down to give them a goal line drop out. Blues gathered the ball and were rewarded with a penalty in front of the posts. Dan Thorne successfully kicked between the posts to give Blues the lead for the first time in the match on 73 minutes (16-13).

In the final minutes Blues kicked to touch deep in Banbury's 22. From the resulting lineout, a mistake from Banbury brought the final whistle and a victory for Blues.

A big credit to both sides who produced a great close game of rugby under difficult conditions, a wet muddy pitch and a very strong wind from the aftermath of storm Eunice. A game of two halves. All the best to Banbury for the remainder of the season - good luck and hope you remain top of the league.

But, after strong carries from the forwards pulled the visiting defence into the centre of the pitch, the space was made out wide. The opening try was scored after a great run by Krzyzanowska, who evaded multiple defenders before being stopped short by Valkyries defenders. Two quick phases and more strong forward carries later, C. Smith crashed over the line to open the score for Newbury. Hunt added the extra's with her trusty boot to make it 7-0.

Portsmouth came back strong from the restart, creating pressure and forcing a mistake off the back of the scrum. This proved costly for Newbury, gaining Portsmouth an unconverted try. Huge hits and a vicious defence from Newbury's small-but-mighty pack kept the Valkyries from scoring further. Half time saw Newbury with a narrow 7-5 lead on the visitors.

The second half was again dominated by both defences, with both forward packs firing in at the rucks to force the turnover. With the half drawing to a close, excellent attacking pressure and quick ball from both Rothwell and Holt caught the visitors offside. Two penalties right in front of the sticks made it an easy decision for captain Harris. With Hunt on form, Newbury chose to kick both penalties, pushing Newbury into a 13-5 lead. Less than 10 minutes later the whistle was blown and the home side had secured their second win in a row.

In the words of Head Coach Darran Brown, "Sunday's win was a great result. It was a truly unified team effort and I am excited to see how we can build on this heading into Sunday's game against Wasps."




## BLUES NEWS - KEEPING IN TOUCH MILESTONE CAPS, RUGBY COMMUNITY & VOLUNTEERS

#### THE VIEW FROM SOUTH AFRICA - MICHAEL KLICHOWICZ

Between 1892 and 1954, Ellis Island in the Port of New York and New Jersey processed nearly 12 million immigrants to the USA. Between 1945 and 1982, Australia welcomed more than one million migrants from the British Isles under the so called "Ten Pound Pom" scheme. This assisted passage scheme ended in 1982. Huge numbers in both cases and a visit to Ellis Island or the Migration Museum in Adelaide explains in great detail the numbers involved, how the migrants were processed and the conditions during the passage over. It must have felt like an irreversible decision back then with limited communication links and limited transport options to return home. They did it for the promise of a better life for their family and their descendants but what it must have felt like waking up the morning of boarding a liner at Southampton docks, knowing you may never see home again, who knows? Many families made a great fist of it, settling and developing strong roots in the New World.

That was then, but what of now? Transport and communication links are much improved, it's relatively easy to get back home, Face Time or Zoom to name but two video calling systems make it easy to see family and friends living abroad and moving to another country doesn't seem irreversible at all. That's not to say it's a piece of cake though and good luck to anyone who chooses to move to another country for a short or a long stay, you are still leaving family and friends behind, all those familiar places you know, all those Friday nights you are going to miss with mates. But there's always a silver lining.

Michael (Klicki) Klichowicz appeared at pre season training last summer. He had moved from South Africa in March 2020 to spend some time in the UK. What a time to move, having to spend a lot of his early time here in lockdown. That was tough, but joining NRFC has been one of the highlights of Michael's time in the UK. Why Newbury, easy, his Godmother lives in the town so he had a ready made place to stay in the early days of his arrival. He says, "With all that is going on in South Africa, it doesn't take much to move away but it definitely has a place in my heart either way." And so it should, it's home. Hailing from Port Elizabeth in the Eastern Cape, Michael attended Grey High School and then Varsity College where he studied software development and programming. He says, "I grew up along the coast. The weather is amazing as you can imagine. I was fortunate enough to go to a really good school, made great friends for life and can't imagine growing up anywhere else." Rugby seems to have come naturally to a young Michael. He started playing at about 6 years old and played school rugby right up until matriculation, the equivalent of our A levels, and then went on to play for a couple of local clubs. The photograph shows Michael at awards night at his local club Crusaders. He had just been awarded the most versatile player of the season award. His favourite South African rugby players are Butch James, Cheslin

Kolbe and Siya Kolisi. James was a World Cup winner in 2007 who then joined Bath Rugby before returning home and rejoining the Sharks in 2012. I don't think anything needs to be said about Cheslin Kolbe except that he'd be in a current World XV. Kolisi is a favourite of Michael's, not only because of his exploits on the rugby field but also because they went to the same school. Michael follows South African cricket, a game he also plays, along with golf and basketball. He also enjoys going to the gym, running and cycling. Working full time in the construction industry, the main challenge is fitting all these things in.

Development pathways are clearly important to South African rugby and it appears to be much like the English pathway system, with the better school boys representing their provincial teams, culminating in Craven Week, the stand out competition for all schoolboy rugby players where the majority of those selected for South Africa Schools come

from. Clearly the system is working, you don't get to win three rugby world cups without something being right. They are the only country to have won every world cup final in which they have appeared. We hear a lot in UK about how rugby has brought South Africa together and there is no doubt some of the most iconic images of any rugby world cup is Nelson Mandela holding the trophy aloft in 1995 and Siya Kolisi doing similarly in 2019. Michael says, "The support and the way the whole country gets behind the Springboks is just phenomenal, particularly in this last world cup and in 1995. The country was going through a lot and when they won the final, it just felt like the whole country came to a standstill in celebration and forgot about everything going on."

At Blues' more humble level, Michael has already had some outstanding performances. He has made a number of effective runs and tackles above his weight. His ability to change direction at speed is one of the most exciting aspects of his play. He particularly enjoyed the Marlborough game, his first home game for the club, with Dylan Stewart scoring in Blues Corner in the final minutes of the game to secure a victory.

So, what did Michael think Britain was going to be like before he came over? "Didn't have a clue to be honest. At the time I was 21 years old so I think Geordie Shore was something similar to what I had in mind." Whether he was disappointed or not, Newbury is not exactly like Newcastle. The market square doesn't really equate to the Big Market and a few more night clubs would suit Michael, as would better weather.

And what about English rugby? He names three players he would not want to see playing for England when they play South Africa, Marcus Smith, Maro Itoje and Freddie Steward. For those who are not English there would be little disagreement with this list of players as they certainly seem to be the future of the international game in England. And Newbury Blues? Michael says joining the club has been one of the highlights of his time in England, lots of friends, lots of laughs and lots of good rugby. A silver lining indeed and long may this continue for this personable young man so very far away from home.




