Latest on the WBC proposal for a long-term lease on our NRFC property.

West Berkshire Council have put a proposal forward to NRFC for consideration, to take a long lease on an area of land including Pitch 5 to lay an all-weather pitch (suitable for football and rugby) and construct changing rooms, a function room, a stand and parking access. We understand this is subject to Public Consultation until the 28th February, Council approval at committee. Planning Permission also has to be approved.

For NRFC this is being managed by the Steering Group who will consider all questions and inputs raised by the members, before taking to the next stage. WBC are aware that any proposal must ensure that it enhances the long-term financial sustainability of the rugby club; rugby has access to the new all-weather pitch and does not lose pitch time, especially on Sunday morning. It must also not impact on the independence of the rugby club and the lease will be with WBC. The next stage is to agree a Heads of Terms (not agreed to date) and to support this with a Joint Use Agreement that will be negotiated to support operational activities, if the headline areas are agreed.

Members have been invited through the newsletter and on-line requests to raise queries and many have been received. To ensure wider engagement a webinar with members ran on Thursday 11th February, where an explanation as to why and how this had come about and the process we are now following. A Question and Answer document with feedback is being used to update all points raised. Further queries raised at the webinar will be discussed within the Steering group and added to an updated Q&A which will be distributed in due course. Thank you to all those who attended the webinar to discuss this very important matter which will steer the club's future one way or another. Positive feedback was received that the meeting was transparent and helpful by a number of the attendees.

The Steering Group is considering all options and aims to take into account all members' views who have kindly responded. The group has identified the three main cohorts which will be affected which is the senior players (men and women), the minis and juniors and the supporters. Any decision must reflect the interests of all these groups. The Steering group is charged with looking after the rugby club's long term interests as a community club and has no interest in the wider political agenda that has raised its head.

The due process is to discuss all the points raised, to decide if we have a proposal which might be acceptable to members, which the Steering Group will discuss. If the Steering Group consider this is not in the best interests of the club, they will advise accordingly. This will be subject to discussions continuing between WBC and the Steering Group. Any final decision will be made by the Trustees as the constitution states. However, a further webinar will be held with the members to

advise of the practical details of any proposal before and if anything is finally agreed.

The Women's section has a number of players on the team working for the NHS, and we're all grateful for treatment and services the NHS provides. We are also very aware that the NHS funds important mental health schemes such as talking therapies, are all the more important at the moment, when healthy outlets like rugby are unavailable. That's why our January challenge was to raise funds for the Berkshire NHS Foundation Trust. The Girls' section got involved too and helped us to reach both our distance and fundraising targets.

The challenge was initially, to cover the miles from Newbury to Paris and back, but that was completed within a few days, so was extended to also go to and from each city that hosts Six Nations matches – Rome, London, Edinburgh, Cardiff and Dublin – a total of 4,172 miles. We managed to beat that target by covering 4,451.25 miles. We've raised £1,675 so far.

We walked, ran, cycled and rowed, encouraging everyone to get outside and stay active. We had fantastic engagement and feedback on social media, in the NWN and from the RFU.







In the words of our Captain, Lizzie Harris: "Due to Covid regulations we obviously cannot train at the moment and a big part of being a Blues family is the camaraderie and working hard together.

"Putting together a January team challenge meant we were able to bring the team together even though we are apart, and still be competitive while doing so.

The Womens' and Girls' sections wanted to support the Berkshire NHS because of the support it has given to not only the rugby club, but the whole country.

The past year has shown that talking about mental health and checking up on those around you is so important, and we want to raise money and more awareness to battle the stigma of mental health, and to say that it is okay not to be okay and to reach out for help.

The feedback and success of this has been incredible and we are so proud and thankful for everyone who participated and donated.

It's been brilliant for the team to work towards a goal and it's really helped bring the team together and keep support going during these very difficult times.

We're now back to weekly Zoom workouts focusing on strength, mobility and high intensity interval training."

COACH'S CORNER - SAM HEWICK





Over the past few months this column has highlighted the different coaches at the club. This month the coach in the spotlight is Sam Hewick and this completes the coaches of the senior teams.

Sam could be described as player coach and he is always prepared to step in and play if needed. What is encouraging is that the strength of the squad is such that Sam was called on to play only one game last season, for the Stags away against Reading II. Starting on the bench Sam was very eager to get on and his early encounters went like this. Came on in the 28th minute, yellow carded in the 30th minute! To be fair to Sam it was for a technical offence at the breakdown and a little bit harsh. There is no doubt Richie McCaw would have

got away with it. What it did was make the decision of DoD very easy. In all seriousness though, what was noticeable was the help Sam gave to the on field captain during the game which can only be a positive.

Sam has been coaching at the club for three seasons although his time is limited due to his working schedule as Director of Sport and PE and Head of Rugby at Pangbourne College. Throw in some on call duties and more recently the arrival of a baby boy, makes it difficult for Sam to get to the club as often as he would like but life is all about priorities and just at this time of life it is understandable Sam's need to lie elsewhere. Notwithstanding this, some of Sam's coaching sessions have been top class and he is always looking to see how best the players can learn, calling on his teaching background to help in this respect.

Born in Salisbury and brought up just outside Andover, Sam attended Henry Beaufort School in Winchester and Pangbourne College before heading to the south coast to study for a teaching degree at the University of Brighton and then an MSc in Education at Bristol University. He is quite reflective on the impact of Covid on his job, saying, "I have enjoyed the process of coaching without the pressures/constraints of a competitive fixture card. It has enabled me to rethink our sporting curriculum and focus purely on the process behind everything." However, he is looking forward to the return of fixtures as, "everyone stands a little taller and acts a little sharper with it."

Sam played most of his adult rugby for Worthing Raiders as hooker or open side flanker in National 1 and National 2 South, making over 200 appearances at this level in the process, with a final playing year at Old Redcliffians in Bristol. His most admired player is that great Australian flanker George Smith, although Sam also admires Roger Federer because of the aesthetic look of his shots. Difficult to disagree with either of these choices and seeing the shape of the Federer backhand in particular is a thing of absolute beauty. Like most of us who have been involved in the game, the memories for Sam are almost too numerous to mention although he does say that he enjoyed a number of bus trips, with promotion with Worthing from National Division 2 South to National 1 being the highlight of his playing career.

When working at Worthing College, Sam had a very good mentor who helped him develop his coaching style and like his current job at Pangbourne College he helped young players to improve their game and he is proud of the fact that a lot of the Worthing students he taught at the College went on to play first team rugby at Worthing and at Pangbourne he has helped develop some young players who have gone on to win schoolboy international honours and gain premiership contracts.

When time permits it will be good to see Sam back more regularly at the club and as he says, "Unfortunately, Newbury has had to take a bit of a back seat whilst I balance career and a young family. Hopefully things will settle and I will be able to get back to some coaching as I have thoroughly enjoyed coaching at Newbury."

Seeing first hand the amount of effort that goes into planning training sessions, our coaches must sometimes feel as if it's a part time or in some cases a full time job. What is without question though is the desire of all the coaches to improve the skill sets of the players and to ensure all players feel part of the club. My thanks to all the senior coaches who have given of their time to meet with me on Zoom or to write responses to what might seem quite trite questions over the past year. They have done so with humour and a willingness to sometimes share quite personal information. Thank you.


Tony Lloyd



THROUGH THE EYES OF THE PLAYERS - COLIN GASPER





Elvis Chapels, Beach Life and Chicken Wings

California. Laid back West Coast vibe. Surfing dudes. Highway 1. Golden Gate Bridge. Hollywood. Monterey. Summer of Love. Santa Monica Pier, end of Route 66, the Mother Road. The list is almost exhaustive and from afar California has a huge appeal but there's another, less favourable list. Fault lines. Earthquakes. Horrific forest fires. Devastating mud slides. Massive homelessness problem. Gang crime. Harsh outdoor working conditions in unbearable desert temperatures. Political unrest in some northern cities in the State. To be fair some of these are not limited to the Golden State but none the less they exist. On a visit a few years back we marvelled at the scenery along the coast driving through Pebble Beach with its world renowned golf course; we marvelled at the vast expanse of sand at Santa Barbara, the glorious Spanish feel of the city; we marvelled at the cable cars in San Francisco, almost defying gravity. But a detour took us inland 20 miles or so and it was a very different picture, not the glamourised view we had of the

state but a reality of the harshness of making a living as an outdoor worker, harvesting crops in fields almost too big to imagine. The coastal belt is absolutely fantastic but inland, in the searing temperatures of the central valley that make up much of the coastal hinterland, life can be harsh.

It's not everyday a Californian lad turns up at Monks Lane wanting to play rugby but that is what happened last summer, preseason. Colin Gasper was born in Los Alamitos in Orange County and moved as a teenager to Long Beach, Los Angeles, heading to Seal Beach and bodyboarding at every available opportunity. That sounds like a pretty cool way to spend your teenage years. At least in Newbury we have the Skate Park....

Colin met his wife, who is from Thatcham, when they were both working abroad in Dubai and after spending some time living together in America where their two children were born, they decided to move to Newbury and settle in West Berkshire. In a sobering comment Colin recounts an INSET day on first aid at the school in Clovis, about 200 miles south of San Francisco, where he was working at the time. "The training at school included how to barricade your classroom from an active shooter and treat gunshot wounds." This, along with the fact that, "free healthcare for everyone at the point of use is pretty awesome," were two of the reasons the family decided to move to Newbury. Of the town he says, "I don't know of any other town that offers what Newbury has in regards to rail access, proximity to Wales, Oxford, London and the coast and a very pleasant hight street (still disappointed about Ginsters closing though)." It's easy to complain about the town if you have lived here for many years and sometimes it takes a new resident to reaffirm some of the positive aspects about living in this part of West Berkshire.

In terms of differences between living in USA and UK Colin says there are a few nuances but no major differences. Becoming an Oxford United fan has helped him settle as was going to watch a Bristol Bears game back in 2019. However he does miss In and Out Burger, "and being able to drive to Las Vegas for an overnight trip." Another world.

Back home, after High School, Colin attended Chapman University in Orange County where he played in goal for the university water polo team. At the end of his four years he became the record holder for most saves in a season and played in the team that for the first time beat a Top Twenty ranked university water polo team. After Chapman, Colin gained his MSc in Physical Education from Eastern New Mexico University. Taking up a job at Covis High School as Director of Sport for a water polo programme Colin also coached the women's team at Fresno University where they became the fourth ranked team in the country. He is currently working to develop the water polo programme at Oxford High School and has played for Swindon Dolphins although the mid week travelling as far away as Plymouth made this a less than appealing prospect.

As for rugby, Colin was not really exposed to the game as a lad, but is absolutely loving the training at NRFC, even if there is a certain frustration that he has yet to play a competitive game for the club. He enjoyed the inter club game just before Christmas even though he, "felt like a deer caught in the headlights, going from touch rugby to full on contact." What stood out for Colin was the support he received from his team mates throughout the game and also the social life of the club, limited though this has been this season, where he has been made to feel very welcome, particularly the golf fund raiser and being introduced to G's Ghost Chilli Chicken wings which made him, 'feel very much at home."

So a huge welcome to Colin and his family. Speaking to him on the side of the U6 training pitch on Sunday mornings, there is no question that California's loss is Newbury's gain and for all its downsides, I wouldn't mind going back for a visit and having another drink at the end of Santa Monica Pier, dreaming of that road trip and wondering, just wondering if I could emulate Peter Fonda and Dennis Hopper in that 1969 classic film Easy Rider, Harley-Davidson and all.................. Fat chance.


There is also a Blues Family Strava group set up so all can see what others are doing with their own personal fitness sessions; a weekly leader board gives it a touch of competition.
