Welcome to the October newsletter. Eight weeks into the season and how great to see so many familiar faces and friends back at the club. There was a very big crowd last Saturday as The Blues turned on a fabulous performance against Windsor. The previous week at Grove, our supporters outweighed the home team. We even had three match officials (two as linesman) to ensure a good game. The Women are as enthusiastic as ever as they rebuild their team and recently narrowly lost to London Irish (29-14), despite a spirited performance.

The Minis and Juniors are busy training on Sunday mornings, but matches are in short supply as COVID keeps numbers down. Unfortunately, we have also had to withdraw the third team from the leagues due to difficulty in getting enough players and last weekend also saw the Stags match have to be cancelled. However, they did have a great win recently over Reading Abbey (31-22).

Players, get your boots on and get back playing. You are a very long time retired!! Playing rugby and the camaraderie that goes with it, you will look back as one of the big highpoints of your life.

The club is currently above budget and at the moment is doing well financially, but it is the busy time of the year and we still have a huge amount to do. One problem solved usually means two more created, but we are working towards giving this club a clear structure so that it is sustainable and the best community sporting asset in West Berkshire. Your management team, rugby committee and the commercial team have been working very long hours to try and secure our future. If you attend the FAGM on 24th Nov, you will have a chance to find out and ask any questions you may have.

Staff recruitment as well as volunteer recruitment is always a challenge and has not changed. It is a problem shared by most clubs I have spoken to, but if you can help in any small way then please let us know. A big thanks to all the current volunteers who keep the club alive.

A brief mention of the commercial team here at Monks Lane, who work long hours during the week and don't always get recognised. They are responsible for bringing in 75% of the income into the club (rugby just 25%), allowing us to play rugby at these amazing facilities. Last month during weekdays they coordinated over 57 separate lettings at the club as well as weddings and parties every weekend since July. The income generated plays a huge role in reducing our debt at the club. Lettings vary from Martial Arts to Slimming World, and from Beavers and Cubs to Dance classes. Last Saturday due to quick thinking by the team, we housed the Mobile unit for the COVID Tests due to the problems at Chieveley. Thank you to all in the commercial team.

Nigel Thorne has been appointed as part of the Health & Safety team to tackle the compliance issues at the club, alongside Richard Deal, Richard Batley, Ian West and Hywel Price Richards. You will be hearing more from them, especially the team managers and coaches. Thank you to those volunteers.



Don't forget the **Big Weekend on 6th Nov** when **kick off will be 2.30pm** (NOT 3pm), for Blues v Beaconsfield. There will be real ale, international rugby, live music and hopefully lots of supporters staying on to enjoy a great club day. **Don't forget to book your tables for the two Christmas games on the 11th and 18th December, when again there will be live music and Christmas carols respectively.**

There has been much in the press regarding the WBC all-weather pitch. Rest assured we have been working on this on a daily basis and are in touch with West Berks Council, the RFU and Sport England. We cannot comment on the press reports because we can only deal with the areas relating to us as a rugby club. Our only interest is to preserve an amazing Community amateur rugby club at Monks Lane for the benefit of over 500 playing members, plus many more supporters, and our belief is this will be a great benefit to us achieving that. It also contributes and supports the ethos of a sports multi-use hub which is the way forward for Sport England. As soon as we are able to advise members of what is happening, we will do so, but we are not in control of the WBC discussions with other authorities. We are however, ready to sign the lease subject to confirmation that those discussions have been concluded.

Robin Varley has been doing a huge amount of work on Sponsorship, generating new leads and reorganising the boards around the pitch, with the help of Richard Purton. If you have any other potential leads you can pass to him, please do. A big thank you to all our sponsors as always. You are hugely appreciated and without you, we would not be here.

Thanks as usual to the ever reliable Sarah Thorne for coordinating this newsletter and to Brian Lee and Zea Daniels for their regular contributions. We always want to hear news from any section in the club so please contact us - we would like to hear from you.



WEEKENDS, DONKEYS AND VOLUNTEERS

Without wishing to give too much away about my personal life, one of my favourite times of the week is Sunday morning, reading the rugby reports in the Sunday Times. Stephen Jones is an exceptionally good journalist, opinionated yes but I guess that's what Rupert Murdoch pays him to be. His journalistic spats with Stuart Barnes is worth the price of the paper alone. In his book Endless Winter, published in 1993, Jones describes the inevitable road to professionalism in the sport and like many people he wasn't wrong about this. At elite level rugby governing bodies were asking increasingly more from players yet denying them the opportunity to make any financial gain from the game. Unsustainable, as events on 27th August 1995 proved when the game officially became professional. Many clubs, us included, decided to have a crack at the big time. We all know how that ended and on a continuum along the way to financial purgatory as a club, we were well down that particular road. That's not to say there weren't fantastic moments along the way. Newbury against Western Samoa in 1996 for goodness sake and losing by only 21-35. On that tour they beat Bath by a greater margin. Under 21 six nations matches, Under 21 Rugby World Championships at Monks Lane. Heady days. Was it all worth it? That's not for me to answer here.

For all the great rugby played around that time, the overriding thing that stands out for me is the number of people who volunteered to help at the club. Car parking was always an issue and needed what seemed like thousands of stewards on pitches two, three and four to assemble the cars so they could at least leave in an orderly fashion. As a club we made a pretty good fist of it and the point is we made a good fist of it because a lot of people decided they wanted to help. Volunteers, rugby clubs up and down the country would be absolutely stuffed without them. To quote from Endless Winter, "Rugby has a roll of honour of supremely dedicated amateur officials with which you could wallpaper the pyramids. There are millions of the lovely little beaverers: club secretaries and treasurers and chairmen (and chairwomen) and boot blackeners and line markers and bottle washers, mini rugby coaches and tea ladies and tea men who vividly demonstrate their affection for the game and its ambience by spending every leisure minute in the exhausting process of providing the fitting backdrop for players at all levels to come out on the rugby field and play. They still do, these heroes. Every week. For nothing." Great writing.....

There are a whole host of people at the club in this category, who have been helping year on year on year and if it wan't for the dread of missing someone out I would name check them. Without this help the club would have gone under. Ok, in many ways we were lucky to have land to sell off to keep us afloat; we had a debenture scheme to help out and there was revenue from the bar and conferencing which alone was not enough to keep us going. The club house is a huge fixed cost and hopefully the leasing arrangement with the council will enable us to move forward with a certain amount of financial security, so my grandson who is currently in the U7 has the opportunity to play at senior level for Blues and for his children to do likewise. What will this take, well continued strict financial management, which was not always the case in the past, but also for more, "little beaverers" to appear to help the club in the brave new world we will hopefully move into if and when the leasing arrangement with the council is sorted.

Some will argue that in the good old days at Pinchington Lane there were always volunteers on hand to help out serving beer and making food but the move to Monks Lane and the failed attempt at professionalism has led to volunteers being kept at arms length. Whilst there may have been a grain of truth in this at the time of the move, its not that straightforward. The Catering Department at the club has conferences, weddings, meetings and all sorts of activities to prepare food for and whilst this persists it's not a question of any of us simply turning up to pull a few pints of beer or make a few portions of sausage and chips. There are regulations and rules as long as a donkey's penis to satisfy (not that I'm an expert in either of these matters) before a "non trained" person is allowed to peel a few spuds or make a coffee or even get near a ring pull on a can of fizzy drink. Crazy, perhaps, but it is the world in which we currently live. Whilst some things are different to back in the day what has not changed however is the need for the club to attract more help, for more people to give of their time, for more





people to contribute their knowledge, experience and know how for the benefit of the club, for the benefit of players of all ages to be able to go out and represent Newbury on the rugby pitch. Helping out gives a good feeling and generates friendships, a feeling of togetherness, of camaraderie, of working towards a common goal which can only be bettered by the bonds between team mates actually playing a match. For those who have retired from the game this is impossible but it's good to get the next best thing.

And so the point of this article? Its not to extol the virtues of Stephen Jones. He is after all associated with Maidenhead RFC. It's not about the good old days, whatever that means, it's not about lamenting the fact that Western Samoa or even Samoa would now beat Blues by a considerably bigger margin. It's not about any of these things. It's about people, us, club members, wanting to help to make sure we still have great rugby days at the club. Remember the Clevedon game and more recently the Marlborough and Sherborne games. Who needs international rugby at Monks Lane anyway? What is so great are local young men and women turning out on a Saturday or Sunday afternoon with their teammates, playing as well as they can and having a few drinks after the game to continue the great amateur ethos that surrounds much of rugby at community level. For all of rugby's flaws, this is the essential goodness of the game and we can all make sure it continues well into the future by giving a bit of our time.

If you haven't already, try helping out. You will not be disappointed.


