Newbury RFC has set-up a club based Track & Trace system as part of our Covid-19 protocols, in line with UK Govt requirements. It will be a mandatory requirement for all visitors to the Club (both inside the clubhouse and outside on the pitches), to use this simple **TRACE** system to register their attendance.

You will need to use a mobile phone (or similar camera-fitted device such as an ipad), to scan a dedicated QR code. Once the QR code is scanned, a confirmation message will appear on your device. This will need to be done on every visit to the Club. The QR codes will be on display in multiple locations around the Club and the system fully adheres to GDPR regulations. 

COACH'S CORNER - PAUL ARCHER



PAUL ARCHER

The Head Coach. Often no in-between. Team plays well it's down to the players, team plays badly it's down to the coach. Clive Woodward after the 2003 World Cup, Stuart Lancaster after the 2015 World Cup. One gets a Knighthood, one steps down, before in all likelihood he was going to be pushed. That's the extreme. The reality of course for most coaches lies somewhere in between. For NRFC, Paul Archer has now been Head Coach for two seasons and as he starts his third season he reflects on his playing and coaching career.

Early promise at Whitgift School in Croydon led to English schoolboy caps whilst on the books at Saracens. Playing alongside players the calibre of Nick Duncombe, who tragically died at an early age, was very exciting for Arch although he seemed to know from his time at Saracens he was not going to make a living professionally from playing rugby. In fact being brutally honest he describes himself as a, 'semi-pro journeyman', like many thousands of others worldwide. There was clearly sufficient emotional intelligence to know his individual prospects in the game were limited and he decided to look elsewhere for a career. This started when he completed his degree at Sheffield University and gained a job, firstly at Halifax banking Group and later at Nationwide Building Society.

A move to Swindon Head Office in 2009 resulted in him joining NRFC when we were in National 1. He refers to this playing period as, 'the last roll of the dice', to play at such a level and with work and family commitments, so it proved. However, before his move back south, Arch coached Sheffield University Women's rugby team and played for Rotherham and Derby. It was with the latter, he says, he had his most memorable rugby moments, playing for Derby 2nd XV. At the time he felt the club were too stratified, you were either a first team player or a second team player. Perhaps because of this the second team was the most tightly knit group of players he ever played with and winning the NCA League against National League opposition remains one of his most cherished rugby memories, doing it with his mates - he remains friends with a number of this team. The experience at Derby has influenced the way he approaches coaching and team selection at Newbury, emphasising that clubs must give opportunities for all players to achieve what they can to the best of their abilities. At NRFC he insists players are not first team, Stags or A's players, they are first and foremost brothers in the Blues family. Laudable and it works in practice, reflected by the number of players who have represented Blues over the past two seasons.

Another strong commitment held by Arch is his desire not to typecast players into any one position. This again comes from his experiences as a youngster where he was given the opportunity to play a number of different positions. If players are typecast into a certain position, he contends, schools and clubs may well miss the opportunity to unearth a real gem of a player and limit the skill that player acquires at a critical age. Coaches should be concentrating on helping players become as skilful as possible by engendering an environment that does not only see success as winning games. Player development is equally important.

As assistant coach to Lee Goodall for a number of seasons, Arch was very pleased to have been asked to become Head Coach and was more than comfortable stepping up. His only concern was that he had only recently played with a number of the players and the move from one of the lads to Head Coach could well have been fraught with problems. Thankfully this has not transpired. Arch has recently achieved his Level 3 RFU Coaching Award and as to Level 4? He is scathing of those who aspire to a Level 4 Award simply to say they've got it. It has to mean something in terms of being able to add even more value to individuals and teams. Then more philosophy when asked about advice for young players. "Outcome goals are never the route to happiness, you'll be disappointed. Do what feels good and what makes you happy and in the end your achievements are down to you." This can apply to rugby and to life and that's not such a bad philosophy to live by.

THROUGH THE EYES OF THE PLAYERS



ROSIE GOLBY - WOMEN'S RUGBY



Best five rugby players in England? Places two to five up for debate. First place, no discussion, no argument, no question. You don't get to be named World Player of the Year 2019 for being a bit of a duffer on the rugby field. Emily Scarratt, first place, a shoe in. However, Emily like the rest of her contemporaries would be the first to give praise to a group of earlier women who paved the way for the current crop of elite and community players. One of these was our own Rosie Golby, who started playing rugby in 1983 for Oxford Old Belles and then for Old Leamingtonians. At the time very few Women's teams existed and those that did tended to be centred on Universities. In fact, Rosie says there were so few teams to play against that often two clubs would team up and play as one simply to get a game.

Whilst captaining Oxford, Rosie was asked to organise a national seven's tournament and

as a result of its success, Carol Isherwood, who was at the time the Secretary of the WRFU asked Rosie to become Assistant Secretary. Like many Assistant Secretaries it is only a matter of time before the request comes in to become Secretary. In 1989 just six years after starting her playing career this is exactly what happened and Rosie took up the position of Secretary of the WRFU. Lots of meetings, lots of travelling but very enjoyable and for Rosie it was an opportunity to be involved in something close to her heart to afford young girls and women the opportunity to play rugby.

The first World Cup was organised to take place in 1991 in Wales and came about because of four determined English women! Few of us have a claim to fame in being able to say, "I presented the first Women's World Cup to the winners, the USA." Not bad going Rosie.

In 1994 after England won the World Cup held in Scotland the WRFU devolved and Rosie became the first President of the Rugby Football Union for Women (RFUW). The same year Rosie attended a Board meeting of World Rugby where the women's game became recognised by the organisation. Since then the women's game has gone from strength to strength.

Rosie said it took a lot of work by a lot of determined women to get the game off the ground both domestically and internationally and it is testimony to this hard work the game is now played in more than 60 countries. As a predominantly amateur game, even elite players in the early World Cups had to pay for their own travel and accommodation, a situation which now seems ludicrous. We are talking elite sport here, individuals who are representing their country. Whilst saying this, there has been outside support along the way and Rosie says that Stephen Jones, rugby correspondent of the Sunday Times has championed the game for a long time which has gone some way to it being recognised around the world.

If Rosie has a pride in what she has helped achieve it is not primarily about herself, it is about the group of women with whom she worked to develop the game. She recognises the good fortune that came her way when she was asked to be involved at such a high level in a sport in its infancy and it is testament to her abilities that she was so instrumental in seeing it grow into what it is today.

The future? Who knows? On the playing side, Rosie comments that teams now kick a lot more than was the case "back in the day" and it has become a much more sophisticated game. Off the field? The game is going to be affected significantly by the current crisis. England elite 7's contracts have been terminated and for both 7's and 15's teams who are partially if not fully funded, financial constraints might well hit them hard. But, the base is strong and Rosie is optimistic of the long term health of the game both in England and elsewhere.

Rosie also helped to develop the game for girls and women at NRFC and what gives her most pleasure is seeing young women running out in a Blues shirt or an English shirt or any shirt for that matter and giving it their all for their clubs or country. It must be a very satisfying feeling.

What a legacy.....!

UPDATED SEPTEMBER 2020

When you first arrive



Newbury RFC has set-up The NHS Track & Trace system as part of our Covid-19 protocols in line with UK Govt requirements. This replaces the previous QR Code system

As of Friday 18th September 2020 there is now a legal requirement for all venues to have Track & Trace systems (for both attending Rugby-related activities and / or any other type of visitor / user)

It is a mandatory requirement for **ALL** visitors to the Club (both inside the clubhouse & outside on the pitches) to use this simple system to register their attendance.

You will need to download the NHS track and trace app before you can scan the QR codes, this can be done from the APP Store or Google Play (see our updated Using Track & Trace guide)

This will need to be done on EVERY visit to the Club.

The QR codes will be on display in multiple locations around the Club and the system fully adheres to GDPR regulations.

Rule of Six requirements

Since Monday 14th September 2020 you must not assemble with people from other households socially in groups of more than six (unless exempted, as detailed in: https://www.gov.uk/government/publications/coronavirus-covid-19-meeting-with-others-safely-social-distancing)

Team sports will still be able to proceed subject to abiding by these rules

This means parent/spectators must not congregate in groups which will exceed six (including when their children come off the pitch for drink breaks) and musn't mingle

Once in a group of six you cannot join another group of six, this includes;

- § On the pitch side
- § After training
- § In the bar, on the patio or in the car park

The food on offer is take away service only, please collect your food and condiments if required and move away from the collection point.

These rules are set out in law and the police and other enforcement officers are able to issue penalties to those that don't comply. These start at fixed penalty notices of £100 doubling for further breaches up to a maximum of £3,200

UPDATED GUIDANCE ON USING NRFC FACILITIES



UPDATED SEPTEMBER 2020

We are all legally and morally responsible for adhering to the UK Government Guidelines. Failure to comply with the 'Rule of Six' will at best jeopardise our offering, at worst it will result in us having to cease all Rugby operations at Monks Lane.

We urge you in the strongest terms to assist each other, the club and the community in which we live, to act responsibly. You are asked to 'self-regulate' these measures and adhere to directions given by marshals, staff or officers of the club. Members and patrons who do not respect these rules will be asked to leave the premises.

Main Reception and Foyer

- Masks to be worn by everyone entering the building
- One-way system in place with clear floor markings
- Stand alone and wall-mounted hand sanitiser stations installed
- Notices in place to adhere to social distancing

Toilets

Downstairs toilets only available (Mens, Ladies and Disabled) with restrictions of maximum two users at any one time.

Kickers Bar

- One-way system marked out to set serving points together with clear floor markings.
- Notices in place to adhere to social distancing
- Wall-mounted hand sanitiser stations installed
- Masks to be worn by all users when ordering drinks and food
- Sneeze screens installed at serving points
- Grab and Go service
- Contactless payments only.
- In time limited number of tables to meet social distancing and table service requirements



In Newsletter 6 we outlined the fund-raising appeals for this season and how we are making very good use of Greenham Common Trust's fund-raising platform the Good Exchange and it's match-funding scheme for community-benefit projects.

£8,600 successful fund-raising for repair / refurbishment of the Balcony

Over the course of the summer we raised £4,300 from a combination of donations and the Golf day held in August. With GCT match-funding this covers the full £8,600 cost of the balcony work which will take place in early October

Latest Project - £4,020 for further LED lighting up-grading of the building

GCT have approved with match-funding the next stage in our LED lighting re-fit around the building. The benefits of this work are immediate in the form of significant savings in utility costs and improved efficiency

Our target is to raise £2,010 - GCT will automatically match-fund the balance

All schemes must have a community element and each year the Good Exchange will match fund approved projects to a £10k maximum, with individual projects capped at £5k.

We have two further projects earmarked for approval as per below

We hope to go live with these over the coming one to two months

Fundraising is crucial to achieving the above and will require yet again contributions across the Club – from members and supporters/companies/charitable foundations.
