119 volunteers.


1,100 Sausages cooked and sold from the BBQ. 527 cars parked, 17 coaches.

The Story of the Harrogate RUFC Touchline Internationals



Every club has its 'touchline experts' who are easily identified, and you may be one yourself without realising it. They always know best how the game should be played. Advice is freely given to players and officials both during and after the game and in the bar. Harrogate has always had more than its fair share of such expertise and at the end of the 1987/1988 season a crescendo was reached when these mature supporters, who had long ago hung up their boots and jockstraps, became 'organised'. This happened when the late, great, John Tinker, following a rather disappointing Harrogate performance, was the recipient of a torrent of hindsight advice from a

Yorkshireman of Dewsbury extraction and a Welshman from the Pontypool area. The normally patient and tolerant John could stand no more and exploded with the now famous remark, "you're nothing but a bunch of (expletive) Touchline Internationals." The two mature experts totally agreed and the term stuck. Within a short space of time the Harrogate Touchline Internationals became an organised group of true rugby supporters who loved the game and the social camaraderie which goes with it.



Among the founder members were Gordon Ogilvie, Glyn Smith, John Dalton, Malcolm Spark, Wyn Davies, Gordon Keeley, Graham Keightley, David Brook, Leo Niemic, John Englefield, John Henry, Richard Whitfield, Barry Timmis, Phil Eggleston, Idwal Thomas, Jim Riley, David Bowen, Hamish Robertson, Brian Croft and John Elshaw. The main objectives were to ensure that new supporters and visitors were made welcome and to promote social activities within the club. At the inaugural dinner twenty two T.I.'s consumed twenty one bottles of port.

Match sponsorship, dinners, Christmas lunches, Golf Days, Burns Night suppers, and running the Pub Sevens have all helped to add several thousand pounds to the club coffers over the years. Some of you may remember the video evenings especially the one showing 100 Welsh Tries (but that was a long time ago).

A Touchline International of the Year Trophy was presented at the annual dinner in the form of a silver cockerel. The first holder of this prestigious award was Idwal Thomas, followed by John Dalton, Glyn Smith, Barrie Timmis and Rodney Spragg. All clubs have their equivalent of the Touchline Internationals but at Harrogate they are something special.

When the club moved to Rudding Lane in 2016 the TIs purchased two cupboards for storing the club's archives. These are located in the the ladies and the men's toilets. How disrespectful! We have a collection of match programmes stored in the cupboards dating back to 1949 when the club first printed a match programme.

The Touchline Internationals - The Beginning (1988) (A poem by Glyn Smith)

Once upon a time at Claro Road, A rugby story did unfold. Twas a tale of rugby folk of mature ages, Who considered themselves to be rugby sages.

As the players sidled in to get to their tea, They knew what sort of comments there would be. You would have scored that try you know, If you hadn't let the ruddy ball go.


You shouldn't have passed the ball in that position, Especially to one of the opposition. You should have kicked not passed, You were behind your own line, you silly ass.

At that, both men were stopped in their tracks, And looked at each other, quite taken aback. But then both men smiled as realisation did dawn, They both agreed with John, and the TIs were born.
