
We would like to share our new programme with you which is designed to be accessible for all. HeadGuard is the first initiative of its kind in the North West, and possibly UK-wide, that focuses on young players, coaches and families.

We are excited to share that we are now a partnered Club with Sale Sharks, working with the mental health team, and also an official partner with Looseheadz. You may have seen media coverage of the Looseheadz campaign to #Tacklethestigma and this is a message we are really behind. We want to help break down the barrier and allow conversations to take place that will be of a benefit to everyone.

*In a survey of 11-17 years old boys, 67% reported they have negative mental health feeling.

These are worrying statistics, and whilst we are not medical professionals, we are a rugby family and being able to support and help each other is key.

The M&J Exec Committee recognise that our players and coaches are at their happiest, and best, when they are fit and well physically and mentally. We have been developing a mental health support scheme that will signpost people to the resources and professional support they may need. Just like a player may need a physio to help with fitness, a player may need to know that their feelings are justified and in cases, shared, especially in these strange times.

The relationship formed between team-mates, coaches, squads and support from the side line goes such a long way to helping the players to feel able to ask for help or raise concerns. As a committee, we want to make sure that families feel comfortable in asking for help and also know that there is access to 'productive guidance' where needed.

We are pleased to announce that our Mental Health programme 'HeadGuard' has taken a giant step forward with the appointment of two mental health leads to support the Mini and Junior section and the Women and Girls sections. They help us reach our ambition to support the physical and mental wellbeing of all our players, coaches and families.



We have **two** mental health leads:



Mark Bunnell, our head coach of the U8's, is a NHS Mental Health professional with over 15 years experience in adult and childrens mental health.



Andy Wheeler is a coach in the Women's and Girl's section, and a trained mental health first aider.

Both are at the club on Sundays, should you wish to discuss anything that you may want some guidance on. We are going to get email addresses set up so if you wish to talk confidentially or get some guidance on an issue.

What are we looking to do?

Our combined Mental Health support is based upon 4 principles,

- *Recognise
- *Understand
- *Reassure
- *Signpost



Coaches are not mental health experts, but they are dedicated to helping your child. If there is an issue that is bothering your child, a brief chat with the coach could make the wold of difference, Coaches can also point you in the direction of Mark and Andy who have a wealth of experience that could be of help. There is no such thing as a stupid question - so if there is something we can do to help, please ask.

Once the Covid regulations ease we will be looking to host Looseheadz at the club for some mental health awareness events. We are also in discussion with Young Minds Charity regarding getting information readily available at the club too. We are looking to host some in-house mental health awareness groups in an informal and helpful environment. These will be available for parents as well and will provide you with the tools to know where to access help and guidance.
