

Bootle Football Club



The original Bootle F.C. were formed in 1880 and played at Hawthorne Road. In 1889–90 Bootle became founder members of the Football Alliance. That season was the most successful as we finished league runners-up, reached the quarter-finals of the FA Cup,

where we lost to Blackburn Rovers (0-7). When the Alliance merged with the Football League in 1892, Bootle became founder members of the new Second Division. However, despite a respectable 8th place final position, the club dropped out after one season (and were replaced by neighbours Liverpool) and seemingly disappeared due to financial problems. Football returned to Hawthorne Road when a new club, Bootle Athletic. was later formed with the new team initially playing in the Liverpool Leagues. In 1948 when the club were elected to the Lancashire Combination 2, which was won at the first attempt. However, Bootle struggled in the top-flight and after several tough seasons withdrew and folded during the 1953–54 campaign.

In 1953, the current club was formed as Langton and played in the local leagues. After a very successful spell in the Liverpool County Combination (which we won on numerous occasions) the club reverted back to it's



It's better known identity of Bootle F.C. in 1973; and a year later joined the Lancashire Combination, which we won in 1976 and 1977. Bootle then joined the Second Division of the Cheshire County League, which was won in our first season, and we were promoted to the First Division. In 1982 the Cheshire County League was one of the leagues that merged to form the North West Counties League, which Bootle duly joined, becoming a member of the First Division. The club spent most of their time in the First Division until 2000 when we unfortunately dropped into the Second Division. However, despite finishing 6th in 2002, the club dropped into the Liverpool County Combination. In 2006 the club, with a new ground, were elected back into Division 2 of the North West Counties League. In 2009 Bootle won promotion to the NWCL Premier Division and also won the Championship. In 2009/10, our first season back in the Vodkat Premier League Bootle finished a NWCFL highest placing of 3rd. In 2010/11 despite a shaky start Bootle finished a respectable 6th place.

With the club continuing to grow off the field, all eyes are on what can be produced on the field this season, with the NWCFL Premier Division a firm goal in what could be another success for this fast growing club looking to progress again.






my notes on Tuesday, if we can get to top spot, we will be hard to budge.

WHERE

'Barlick' is a town in the West Craven area of the borough of Pendle in Lancashire, just outside the Yorkshire Dales National Park. The Town is approximately 30 miles from Leeds, Manchester and Preston.

WHEN?

The History of our quests:

Formed in 1972 and named Barnoldswick United (1972), - so called due to being canny Yorkshiremen - had there had been a previous club named Barnoldswick United and they had outstanding debts the new club would have been liable for them. The field started out as a grazing meadow for cattle, after a lot of hard work, it is now the pitch we play on. The club had 2 teams playing in the Craven & District Football League in the early 1990's we joined the East Lancashire Football League again with 2 teams. The 2003/2004 season brought the amalgamation of Barnoldswick

United (1972), Barnoldswick Park Rovers and Salterforth Juniors and we changed our name to Barnoldswick Town Football Club. We then ran 3 senior teams. In the late 1990's our 1st and 2nd teams joined The West Lancashire Football League, our 3rds staying in The East Lancashire Football League.

It has always been in the club's constitution to get our ground up to the minimum standards of The North West Counties Football League and the 2009/2010 season has seen us accepted into The North West Counties Football League, for our 1st and 2nd teams.

We started last season 2009/10 with 3 managers and they took a lot of stick especially from Radio Lancashire that 3 managers cannot possibly run a successful football team. Well they proved them all wrong by finishing Runners up in the league and finalists in the prestigious West Riding County Cup beating Guiseley who won promotion to the Conference




Tales From The Northwest Counties Bootie F.C.

Looking out from the top of Shear Brow, the Hole in the Wall tavern looks like any normal public house in Blackburn. However, this unpretentious location was, in 1883, the scene of a wild celebration never before witnessed in the North of England. The building was once the headquarters of the first football team, from the Red Rose County, to bring home the F. A. Cup from London. Their name was Blackburn Olympic.

The club was formed around 1878 and immediately started to play their matches behind the Hole in the Wall tayern. However, they had strong rivals in Blackburn Rovers who, in 1882, had become the first team from the North, to reach the final of the F.A.Cup. Nevertheless, the Old Etonians had beaten them by 1 goal to nil. Sydney Yeats, who owned a local foundry, had noted the publicity generated by the occasion and decided to throw his financial muscle behind Blackburn Olympic, Jack Hunter, an English International, was brought over from Sheffield and made Landlord of a public house in Blackburn. The ground at Hole in the Wall was greatly improved and several new players joined the Olympians in readiness for the forthcoming F. A. Cup campaign. Jack Hunter took on the role of player/coach and drilled the team for action. The Olympians easily won their way through the regional rounds while Darwen had eliminated their neighbours, Blackburn Rovers. They then beat the Welsh Druids to set up a semi-final tie with the Old Carthusians. The game, played in Manchester, was won by the Blackburn side by 4 goals to 0. They would now play the Old Etonians in the F.A. Cup final. The Olympic team then spent the following week taking in the sea air at Blackpool before returning to Blackburn from where, accompanied by around 300 of their supporters, they caught the train to London. The final took place on the Kennington Oval Cricket Ground in front of a crowd of about 3,000 people many of who were wellappointed Gentlemen. The match began well for the Collegians who took a first half lead with a goal from Chester Goodheart. They then lost the services of Arthur Dunn shortly after an equalising goal, scored by Arthur Matthews, had taken the game in to extra time. The Etonians, during the extension of play, struggled to contain their opponents and a goal from Jimmy Costley (who had been born in Liverpool) eventually won the game for Blackburn Olympic. Sydney Yeats, who was unable to travell, was not present when the trophy was awarded to the winning captain Sam Warburton. He was however, waiting on the platform when the Olympic team arrived back at Blackburn Railway Station. The whole town had turned out to greet their hero's and the streets were thronged with people. The players then took their place on a horse drawn carriage that was bedecked in the clubs pale blue colours and, accompanied by three brass bands; they made a triumphant tour of the town. The parade finished at Jack Hunters public house where the celebrations continued well in to the night. Blackburn Olympic, next season, reached the F.A. Cup semi-final tie but were beaten, under farcical conditions, by Queens Park (Glasgow) at the Trent Bridge Cricket Ground in Nottingham. Their defeat left the way open for their neighbours Blackburn Rovers who then went on the win the trophy for three years in succession. Their success rate proved too much for the men from Hole in the Wall who slowly began their decline and, in 1888, they vanished in to the pages of history, Nevertheless, the name of Blackburn Olympic will live on forever in the annals of the F.A. Cup



120 Years ago this week By The Adopted Son

Bootle made two changes to side that had lost 4-0 at Newton Heath when they faced Crewe Alexandra, in the Football Alliance, on the 26th of September. There were around 2,000 people at Hawthorne Road to see the Railwaymen set the game in motion. The game that followed was an "exciting affair" with the play switching from end to end. The visitors had twice come from behind and, with five minutes left to play, the score was standing at 3-3. The home side, however, made one last rally that resulted in Andy Montgomery scoring the goal that gave Bootle their first Alliance victory of the currant season.

There was no Alliance fixture scheduled for the following Saturday so the Bootle club arranged a friendly game with Heywood Central, an amateur side who played in the Lancashire League. Present in their team was Tam Veith a former favourite with the fans at Hawthorne Road. Signed from Dumbarton in 1885 he had proved to be a popular right back and, eventually, became the Bootle captain in 1887. He had now taken up residence, with his family, in Gloucester Road and gained employment, as a shipwright, on the Liverpool Docks. Tam played well over 100 games for Bootle but had now decided to end his playing days in the Lancashire League. Here was greeted by loud cheers when he appeared on the field at Hawthorne Road. Bootle won an uneventful game by 2 goals to 0 and then spent the rest of the week planning for a long and arduous journey, on the 10th of October, to compete in their next Alliance fixture at Grimsby.

The Bootle party left Liverpool Central Station around Friday lunchtime aboard a special saloon carriage that had been supplied by the Cheshire Lines Railway Company. The first stop was Sheffield where their carriage was slipped and attached to train that was bound for Doncaster. Once there the Bootle party ate in the Refreshment Room while their carriage was again slipped and shunted on to the Eastern Railway system where it was attached to a train that was bound for Grimsby. They arrived at their destination around mid-night and settled down for the night at their hotel.

Heavy rain, accompanied by a strong wind, greeted the visitors when they stepped out to face Grimsby Town on what was then their home on Abbey Park. The dreadful conditions made the location look anything but inviting with the small crowd, around 500 in number, making the most of what shelter they could find. Bootle, fatigued by their journey, looked "all at sea" against a home side that was well led by their star player, Haines. The big centre forward helped himself to three of the four goals that were scored Grimsby while a lone strike from Rob Jamieson, was all the visitors could offer in return. The Bootle party left Grimsby straight after the game and arrived home in the early hours of Sunday morning.
