History of the Bucks



The original Bootle F.C. were formed in 1880 and played at Hawthorne Road. They were in fact Everton FC's biggest rivals. In 1889–90 Bootle became founder members of the Football Alliance, narrowly missing out on the football league to the blues. That season was the

most successful as we finished league runners-up, reached the quarter-finals of the FA Cup, where we lost to Blackburn Rovers (0-7). When the Alliance merged with the Football League in 1892, Bootle became founder members of the new Second Division. However, despite a respectable 8th place final position, the club dropped out after one season (and were replaced by neighbours Liverpool) and seemingly disappeared due to financial problems.

Football returned to Hawthorne Road when a new club, Bootle Athletic. was later formed with the new team initially playing in the Liverpool Leagues. In 1948 when the club were elected to the Lancashire Combination 2, which was won at the first attempt. However, Bootle struggled in the top-flight and

after several tough seasons withdrew and folded during the 1953–54 campaign. In 1953, the current club was formed as Langton and played in the local leagues. After a very successful spell in the Liverpool County Combination (which we



won on numerous occasions) the club reverted back to it's It's better known identity of Bootle F.C. in 1973; and a year later joined the Lancashire Combination, which we won in 1976 and 1977. Bootle then joined the Second Division of the Cheshire County League, which was won in our first season, and we were promoted to the First Division. In 1982 the Cheshire County League was one of the leagues that merged to form the North West Counties League, which Bootle duly joined, becoming a member of the First Division. The club spent most of their time in the First Division until 2000 when we unfortunately dropped into the Second Division. However, despite finishing 6th in 2002, the club

despite finishing oth in 2002, the club dropped into the Liverpool County Combination. In 2006 the club, with a new ground, were elected back into Division 2 of the North West Counties League. In 2009 Bootle won promotion to the NWCL Premier

Division and also won the Championship. In 2009/10, our first season back in the NWCFL Premier Division Bootle finished a NWCFL highest placing of 3rd. In 2010/11 finished 6th place. They equalled the 3rd place again in 2012. With the ground grading and charter standard status established in 2011/12 the club are looking to progress to the next level.

back. The first 20 minutes was more of a tactical encounter with neither goalkeeper tested. It was a free kick that gave Bootle a deserved lead after 30 minutes. Pruden swung a great ball to the far post and an excellent header back across the goalmouth was headed in at the far post by Anthony Seddon. This was the least Bootle deserved

for their early domination. Therefore it came as a surprise when Town levelled just a few minutes before the interval. An innocuous looking shot from the edge of the box deceived home keeper, Lea who looked on in horror as the ball squirmed through his grasp into the net. This was the only attempt Macclesfield had on target in the opening 45 minutes.

The second period ended in stalemate, taking the game into 30 minutes of extra time. After a quiet opening 10 minutes Macclesfield got the all important breakthrough. A powerful effort from the edge of the box was well saved by Lea but Macclesfield were quickest to the rebound and knocked home the loose ball. The Bucks had no choice but to push men up and As they tried to find a breakthrough Macclesfield scored 2 more goals on the break in the last 7 minutes to make the final scoreline a rather misleading 4-2. This was a cruel end to a brilliant performance from Bootle. The whole team were exceptional with Archer, Seddon and Cheetham outstanding. Many Thanks to Macclesfield for being gracious enough in victory to recognise the fantastic contribution Bootle made to a great game - good luck to them in the next round.

It's nice to be sitting at the top of the table with 3 games in hand over most of our challengers. However it means nothing if we can't get the results over the next few weeks.



Big FA Cup Day For Abbey Hey

This coming Saturday, Abbey Hey head over the Pennines for one of the biggest games in their history, when they take on FC Halifax Town of the Blue Square Bet North in the Second Qualifying Round of the FA Cup.

Abbey Hey are the League's sole representatives left in the competition, and for a side who have never reached this stage of the competition in their history, it's a daunting prospect to face a team from four leagues above, who are currently sitting fourth in their league and have scored 13 goals in their last three home league games.

But if anyone is looking for omens, Abbey Hey can draw inspiration from the fact that North West Counties League sides have an unbeaten record in FA Cup ties at The Shay! The record however, only covers one previous encounter in season 2008-09, when Silsden went there in the Preliminary Round and came away with a goalless draw, although Town won 3-1 in the replay at Cougar Park in Keighley.

There is, however, little chance of the Halifax players underestimating Abbey Hey, after their experience of lower league opposition at the same stage of the competition last season.

On that occasion, Town only squeezed past Tadcaster Albion of the Northern Counties East League thanks to a Scott McManus header deep into injury time. That narrow escape proved crucial, as they subsequently progressed to a land tie in the First Round proper at home against League One Charlton Athletic, which was televised live.

FC Halifax Town are managed by Neil Aspin, a familiar name to anyone who followed top flight football in the 1980s and 90s. He made 244 appearances over a seven year spell at Leeds United, before joining Port Vale in 1989, where he made 348 league appearances during the 1990s.

In 2009 he took up his current position as manager of FC Halifax Town and managed them to two successive promotions in his first two seasons at the club. But in an interview with the Halifax Evening Courier newspaper, he explained that memories of last season's FA Cup tie at the same stage will mean that his side won't be complacent.

"It's nice to be drawn at home and people will be expecting us to turn up and win the game because they're a few levels below us," he said.

"But I went to watch them last Wednesday night (at Chadderton) and they've won every game in their division so far this season.

The game itself will kick off at 3.08 pm. The teams will enter the field carrying a Hillsborough memorial banner and at 3.06 pm, "You'll Never Walk Alone" will be played over the PA system, during which time there will be two minutes applause.

AFC Liverpool Chairman Chris Stirrup said: "We feel it's only right we should mark what's happened, at our first home game since the truth came out.

"We did have two minutes applause at Askern Villa, before the FA Vase tie last Saturday, but it was only the travelling Reds which could take part and there will be a lot more people there on Saturday".

In season 2004/2005 Silsden gained promotion to Division 1 in The North West Counties Football League in their inaugural season.



Bootle then entertained Bolton Wanderers, who they beat 2-1, before preparing for their next League fixture, the following Saturday, which was to be against Burton Swifts. The party left from Liverpool Central Railway Station aboard a special "saloon carriage" that had


been provided for them by the Midland Railway Company. They travelled to Derby where their carriage was slipped and attached to a train that took them on to their final destination. The prosperous town of Burton -on-Trent was renowned for the brewing of beer and one quarter of this entire beverage, consumed in England, came from this location, Burton-on-Trent had a population that was roughly the same as Bootle and a round 2,000 people assembled to welcome the visitors to the Swifts ground at Peel Croft, James Law was the only player missing from the side who had played last Saturday and his place was taken by Finlayson. The home



team played in blue shirts and white shorts so Bootle took into the field wearing their changed strip of red shirts. They made a bright start and took a first half lead with a goal that was scored by McLafferty. However, the visitors then began to show signs of fatigue and the home side, with a brace of second half goals, went on to win the game by 2 goals to 1. Bootle then played lucrative mid-week friendly against Blackburn Rovers. The First Division side, who proved too strong for their hosts, won the game by 3 goals to 0. This game then brought the month of September to an end.

120 YEARS AGO THUS WEEK By A Gardener

Bright September sun shine was very much in evidence as
Bootle entertained Burslam Port Vale, at Hawthorne Road, in what
was to be their third Football League match of the season. Alex
McLaughlin had recovered from the knock he had taken at Ardwick
and replaced McKay in the Bootle goal. He was the only change from
the side that had beaten Sheffield United the previous Saturday. The
visitors, who wore red shirts and dark shorts, were first to take the field
followed by Bootle in their navy blue and white striped shirts and navy
blue shorts. The warm weather had encouraged around 3,000 people
to pay for admission and they packed the ground as the play
commenced.



Bootle had much the better of the first half but, at the interval, the score line was blank. The home side, now kicking down slope, then subjected the visitor's goal to a fierce bombardment and were rewarded when one of the Port Vale defenders turned the ball in to his own goal. Nevertheless the home side failed to take advantage of several other scoring chances and the visitors, who hung on grimly, stole a dramatic later equaliser. A few minutes later the final whistle was heard and the game ended in 1-1 draw. Nevertheless, it was game Bootle really should have won
