History of the Bucks



The original Bootle F.C. were formed in 1880 and played at Hawthorne Road. They were in fact Everton FC's biggest rivals. In 1889–90 Bootle became founder members of the Football Alliance, narrowly missing out on the football league to the blues. That season was the

most successful as we finished league runners-up, reached the quarter-finals of the FA Cup, where we lost to Blackburn Rovers (0-7). When the Alliance merged with the Football League in 1892, Bootle became founder members of the new Second Division. However, despite a respectable 8th place final position, the club dropped out after one season (and were replaced by neighbours Liverpool) and seemingly disappeared due to financial problems.

Football returned to Hawthorne Road when a new club, Bootle Athletic. was later formed with the new team initially playing in the Liverpool Leagues. In 1948 when the club were elected to the Lancashire Combination 2, which was won at the first attempt. However, Bootle struggled in the top-flight and

after several tough seasons withdrew and folded during the 1953–54 campaign. In 1953, the current club was formed as Langton and played in the local leagues. After a very successful spell in the Liverpool County Combination (which we



won on numerous occasions) the club reverted back to it's It's better known identity of Bootle F.C. in 1973; and a year later joined the Lancashire Combination, which we won in 1976 and 1977. Bootle then joined the Second Division of the Cheshire County League, which was won in our first season, and we were promoted to the First Division. In 1982 the Cheshire County League was one of the leagues that merged to form the North West Counties League, which Bootle duly joined, becoming a member of the First Division. The club spent most of their time in the First Division until 2000 when we unfortunately dropped into the Second Division. However, despite finishing 6th in 2002, the club

despite finishing oth in 2002, the club dropped into the Liverpool County Combination. In 2006 the club, with a new ground, were elected back into Division 2 of the North West Counties League. In 2009 Bootle won promotion to the NWCL Premier

Division and also won the Championship. In 2009/10, our first season back in the NWCFL Premier Division Bootle finished a NWCFL highest placing of 3rd. In 2010/11 finished 6th place. They equalled the 3rd place again in 2012. With the ground grading and charter standard status established in 2011/12 the club are looking to progress to the next level.
















The manager of Bootle Football Club

we did before Christmas.





From the town of Chorlton-cum-hardy, four miles from Manchester city centre. The River Mersey runs past Chorlton along it's southern boundary.

Newly elected North West Counties League side West Didsbury and Chorlton FC, have come a long way in their 105 year history which began back in 1908 when the club was founded as Christ Church A.F.C. by Mr R F Hartley, a Sunday School Superintendent at the church on Princess Parkway, West Didsbury.

West first played in the Manchester Alliance League until the outbreak of the First World War (1914-1918).

West Didsbury Choriton

After the War the club joined the Lancashire and Cheshire League for the 1920/21 season and had to change its name to West Didsbury AFC, as the League did not permit association with any other body. The club was placed in Divisions 1 and A and stayed in the top flight for 25 seasons. The first honours were double runners up in Div 1 and Rhodes Cup in 1922/23, and the club remained in that league until 2006, winning many honours and providing 4 League Presidents along the way. Many of the current committee were players in that league.

The club played at Christie Playing Fields from before 1914 but had to relocate when given notice to quit by the Playing Fields Society in the mid 1980's when that body decided to sell the land for commercial gain.

A Bootle Born Legend

This week a surprising announcement of his intentions to retire from football by Liverpool FC club legend Jamie Carragher sent a wave of tributes and memories of the Bootle-born stalwart. So, here at his home-town club would also like to pay tribute to a top professional that has done so much for the town of Bootle. First of all from Philly Carragher:



"Jamie Carragher was born in Bootle and from the age of 3 his Mum and I can remember, that he wanted to be a footballer. By the time Jamie was 7 years old, I had to tell a little white lie and say that he was 8, because in those days you needed to be 8 to play competitive football. He immediately started playing on a Sunday for Merton Villa in the under 11's Bootle & Litherland's District League. Even in those early days Jamie's potential and natural abilities where very obvious; those abilities combined with determination and total dedication to developing the skills necessary to play at premiership level, have ensured that Jamie achieved his dream."

At the age of 8 Jamie Carragher played football for his School team at St James Primary School.

At the age of 9 Jamie Carragher was playing 5-a-side games for the Brunswick Boys' Club most nights of the week as well as for Merton Villa U11's on a Sunday.

At the age of 9 Jamie Carragher also played for Bootle Boys U11's District representing all the primary schools in Bootle.

At the age of 10 Jamie Carragher was made Captain of Bootle Boys U11's District in what was a very successful year.

At the age of 13 Jamie Carragher, having been at Merton Villa for 7 years was chosen to play for Sefton Borough.

At the age of 14 Jamie Carragher attended the former FA school of excellence in Lilleshall.

At the age of 16 Jamie Carragher signed YTS at Liverpool Football Club and played in the Lancashire League and the FA Youth Cup which they won in 1996! The rest of his success, as they say, is history!

Jamie Carragher is the epitome of what supporters love to see on the pitch - a local lad from Bootle who knows just how much Liverpool Football Club means to the people who pay to watch games. Jamie, as a way of saying thank you to the people of Merseyside, has decided to set up the "23 Foundation" to "help give local kids a chance".

Everyone associated with the game wish Jamie all the best for the future.

After several years nomadic existence the club kicked off the 1997-98 season at their splendid new home at The Recreation Ground at Brookburn Road, and began to develop a vision for a community club. This was down to the hard work of a core of players and Committee who refused to let the club fold and secured the new facilities via a Lottery grant, new sponsors and fundraising, but without a penny of help from the Playing Fields Society proceeds.

Further name change followed in 2003 to reflect our new location in Chorlton and we were elected to the Manchester League in 2006. In 2007/8 Season West won Manchester League silverware for the first time, lifting the Murray Shield in the last game of our centenary year. That team was the nucleus of the previously successful junior team and the following season West just missed promotion to the Premier Division and again reached the Murray Shield Final. With a new management team led by Andy Nelson, who had previously managed at Leigh RMI, the 2009/10 season was very successful and honours spread



throughout the club. The 1st team won the Murray Shield, (the third consecutive year we have been in the final) and finishing runners-up in the league. The second team won the Bridgewater League Cup and the U17 Youth team won their League. In 2010/2011 the 1st team won the Manchester League First Division title in style with a fantastic points total (65 points out of 72 possible). This ranks as one of the highest points totals per game in the history of the Manchester League dating back over a century. The clubs reserve team and youth teams also had terrific seasons, resulting in promotion and for the second year reaching the Bridgewater Cup Final.


The clubs 'A' team finished and the Youth team reached yet another final where they were just pipped to the trophy by New Mills. The Veterans were runners up in the Premier Division of the Cheshire Veterans League and then started a second veterans team such was the interest in the club. Plans were also made to formally integrate junior football as the club Vision is to be a FA Charter Standard Community Club in every sense. In recent seasons several players who started at West have been signed by top non league clubs, but such is the spirit of the club that many players return to what they see as a family club.

The club now looks forward to fulfilling its ambition to play at the highest possible level it can whilst continuing to be run as a community club and transition to the NWCFL.

The ground and facilities have been further improved and floodlights erected to meet grading requirements and West competed in the FA Vase for the first time in 2011-2012 as a Step 7 club. The club was duly elected to the NWCFL at the AGM on 16th June 2012.



said teammate Mike Pritchard and "sorted out opponents who kicked us". Before the quarter final tie against Bangor City, Pritchard revealed to Harry that he had been 'clogged' several times before by their legendary North Wales hardman Orig Williams. "Leave it to me. I'll sort it", responded Harry.

And he did. Following a midfield melee after just 5 minutes, Williams, who would later become a professional wrestler under the name 'El Bandito', was lying in a crumpled heap on the ground as Harry blended into the background, a picture of innocence. El Bandito had bitten the dust and limped on a dejected and forlorn figure. As for the Welsh cup final, Borough United were expected to be mere also-rans in the two-legged affair against Football League side Newport



County but the unexpected did happen and they triumphed 2-1 before a record 3,500 Nant-Y-Coed crowd; and then held out against fierce pressure at Somerton park to earn a 0-0 2nd leg draw. Borough United had produced the greatest ever shock in the history of the competition and the Welsh Cup was theirs.

The magnificent achievement was not the end of the fairytale for Borough United and in 1963/64 they took their place in the European Cup Winners' Cup alongside Manchester United, Glasgow Celtic, Barcelona, and the holders, Tottenham Hotspur. A lucrative tie against any of the giants were not to be, instead it was Sliema Wanderers of Malta who were paired with the Welsh heroes and a 2-0 aggregate success saw Borough United become the first club from the principality to win a two-legged European tie. Slovan Bratislava administered the knockout blow, 0-4 on aggregate, in the next round and the adventures were over but not the memories.

Sadly, Borough United were forced to disband in 1969 having been evicted from their Nant-Yn-Coed ground two years earlier in order to expand a nearby school.

As for our hero from Bootle, Harry Hodges, he became manager of the very successful Guinness Exports side of the middle and late 1960's and then scouted for Liverpool for 30 years. Harry's most successful 'find' was a 12 year-old Bootle Boys player and Bootle Schoolboy, Jamie Carragher.


El Bandito Bites The Dust By Tommy Barnes

The honour of providing British non-league football with one of its greatest fairytales falls to a relatively short-lived North Wales club, not even named after a place, Borough United.

Borough United were formed in 1954 after the merger of two cash-strapped and largely unsuccessful clubs, Llandudno Junction and Conway Borough. The two neighbouring teams had a combined population of barely 8,000 and the bulk of the clubs players were recruited through advertisements placed in Liverpool, Manchester and Stoke-on-Trent newspapers. They set up home at the old Llandudno Junction ground Nant-Y-Coed and were accepted into the Welsh League North where improvement as immediate and in 1958/59 Borough United won the Championship. A sixth place finish in 1961/62 gave little hint of the success the following season would deliver. In 1962/63 Borough United boasted four Liverpool-based players amongst their recognised thirteen first-teamers, Joey Bebb, Derek Owen, Joe McLaughlin and Harry Hodges; and results proved spectacular with 43 wins, and 3 draws out of a total of 52 league and cup matches. In a season that stretched to June because of the horrendous winter, Borough United were confirmed as clear champions and to this they added the Cookson Cup and the North Wales Coast Cup. By far their greatest

achievement though was in capturing the Welsh Cup, first played for in 1877 and usually dominated by Football League Clubs Cardiff City, Swansea Town (later City) and Wrexham. All this success for minnows Borough United on a total wage bill of just £45 per week.

Borough United progressed hrough the Welsh Cup with an initial success against near neighbours Llandudno 2-1; then ousted Rhyl 4-1, Denbigh Town 4-2, Bangor City 4-1; and in the semi-final at neutral Wrexham FC the defeated Hereford United 1-0. It was one of these games that the attributes



of 36 year-old Harry Hodges shone through. A former Bootle Schoolboys player just before WWII, the veteran right-half had built up a wealth of experience playing representative football in the Royal Navy and in the semi-professional spheres of the Cheshire League. Harry, who worked on the Bootle docks, was a gentleman off the field but when the whistle blew, took no prisoners. "He was hard as nails" Continued on page 16
